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Christian Symbols



Advent Colors

One of the season's symbolic colors is blue, representing hope. During Advent, we wait in hope to celebrate again God's coming in human form,

and we look forward in hope to Christ's coming in glory at the end of the age. Purple symbolizes the royalty of Jesus, the coming Prince of Peace, and the penitence with which we receive him. Some congregations also use pink or white candles in Advent wreaths, with pink symbolizing joy and white symbolizing the Christ child.

Candle

The candle symbolizes Jesus being the light of the world (John 8:12), as well as his call for Christians to

be lights (Matthew 5:14). Candles play a prominent role in the Christmas season. Each candle on an Advent wreath has a special meaning. Many churches have a candlelight worship service on Christmas Eve, often at midnight.

The End Times

esus had quite a bit to say about his return. The signs that we are in the last days are clear. He will return suddenly, so be ready! The angels will descend, the dead will come to life again, we will all gather before his judgment throne. The lost will then be thrown with the devil and his angels into hell and we will go with him to live forever. But where is talk about the Tribulation and the Millennium? Jesus never speaks about a seven year period of special punishment of the world for their sins or an earthly reign at the end of time, much less a thousand year one. So where does the talk of a millennium on Christian radio, in endless end time and prophecy books come from?



The concepts of the Rapture, the Great Tribulation and a one thousand year reign of Christ prior to the final judgment are less then 200 years old. John Nelson Darby first taught the idea that faithful Christians would be "raptured" - removed from the world at the end of the current age just as God poured out his wrath in a seven year "Great Tribulation"


when the Anti-Christ would rule and severely persecute people who became Christians — mostly Jewish people. At the end of this period Christ was to return to rule the world for 1000 years. After that he was to judge the world, condemning the lost, the devil and his angels to hell, while the saints will live with God forever.

These views, popularized by the Scofield Reference Bible and evangelical authors, became an established theology among Fundamentalist, Evangelical and independent Protestant Churches. Some Pastors and Evangelists speculated that current events fulfilled Biblical prophecies, treating the Bible like a giant algebra problem. Some even set a date for the rapture — and recalculated when the prediction failed. Yet the whole view of the end is not true.

Applying Natural Law to Evangelism cont'd

orality is not a matter of personal opinion. It's a matter of what objectively exists in the real world. We should recognize that in the missionary presentations recorded in the New Testament, the evangelists spent relatively little time proclaiming the moral law.

They didn't need to say very much—their listeners knew the law because it was written on their hearts. At the same time, however, the moral law, whether understood by being a human or by instruction, prepares people for the Gospel, and in that sense, makes evangelism and mission work possible. It also gives us a much needed road map for con-


ducting our lives as well as restraining evil to a degree that makes civilized life possible.

We must always remember, though, that our work as evangelists is effective for one reason and one reason only—it connects lost sinners with the power of God in the glorious message of Jesus Christ.

The moral law has no power to save; that power only lies in the Gospel message of Jesus. And this Gospel message contains the same power of God that called the entire universe into existence out of nothing.

We can never overestimate the Gospel's amazing ability to call lost souls into the kingdom of Christ. It's because of God's saving and almighty power in this message of the Savior that we are successful in evangelism and mission work.


What does God look like? Some years ago a pastor asked his Sunday school that question. The replies he received were most interesting:

- One child said, "God is a human being with eyes like fire, and He shampoos His hair every day."
- Another youngster replied, "He's tall. He looks like my daddy. He wears a jumpsuit on weekends and has a bald head."
- One Sunday school scholar commented, "I think He's an old man with a long, gray beard, and He sits on a throne like the king of all mankind and He drinks all the Dr. Pepper He wants."
- The last said, "He looks like Jesus, but I'll tell you a secret: I'm not sure, 'cause I've never seen Him."

What does God look like? To find God's answer to that question we need to look in Bethlehem. There we will see a Child, God's Son, our Savior. He looks like a baby because

He is a Baby, but He is an exceptional Baby because this child will live His life without sin.

What does God look like? To find God's answer to that question we need to stand before Calvary's



cross. There we will see the Child has grown into a Man: an exceptional Man. Throughout His life and ministry He has befriended those who were lonely, reached out to those who were untouchable and provided comfort to the heartbroken. On the cross we see Him dying

the death that our sins have demanded.

What does God look like? To


find God's answer to that question we need to go to a locked room in Jerusalem. There we will see the risen Lord appearing to His hiding, troubled disciples. We will hear Him offer God's peace, which comes to all who are brought to faith in the Redeemer -- the Redeemer who has offered His life in exchange for ours.

What does God look like? He

looks like Jesus, whose birth we are blessed to celebrate. Thanks be to God we have seen the Savior -- the personification of God's great grace.

The Prayer: Dear Lord, today I give thanks the Holy Spirit has allowed me to see Jesus, my Savior. May I always treasure Him, who has given His life so I might be freed from the grasp of sin, death and devil. As the opportunities allow, may I share my Savior with others who are still wondering what does God look like? In Jesus' Name I pray it. Amen.

On your own, you are powerless against this enemy and unable to convince anyone that God's Word is true. But you are not alone. When Jesus gave the Great Commission, He made a point to include the assurance, "I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20).

Advent Meanings

During Advent, which begins this year on December 3, many churches and families use wreaths to symbolize watchfulness and increasing joy as Christmas approaches. Colors for the candles vary, with some traditions using blue (for hope or creation) and others preferring purple (for royalty, humility or penitence).

The four candles that each represent a week in Advent also signify hope, peace, joy and love. (The third candle is often pink.) In the center is the white Christ candle, representing Jesus as the light of the world. That candle is lit on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.



The round, green Advent wreath has special meaning of its own. It symbolizes eternal life and the unending love of God, who sent his only Son to earth to die in our place.

The Measure of Our Generosity

If you open up the Small Catechism, you'll find a shortened version of the Third Commandment: "Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy." But if you look up the list of the Ten Commandments in Exodus, you'll find the full version:

Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor, and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, you, or your son, or your daughter, your male servant, or your female servant, or your livestock, or the sojourner who is within your gates. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested on the seventh day. Therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy. (Ex. 20:8–11)

Why did Luther shorten this commandment for the Small Catechism? Was it so that the kids wouldn't have so much to memorize? No, it was because Luther knew that all the details of the Third Commandment were part of the "shadow" of the Old Testament (Col. 2:16). Or as St. Paul puts it, there is "letter" in the Old

Testament law and "spirit" (2 Cor. 3:6). The details of not working on Saturday were fulfilled by Christ. That part of the Sabbath regulation no longer applies. But the spirit of the law does remain: We need to dedicate sufficient time each week to hearing God's Word and giving it honor and respect. Or as Luther sums it up in



the Small Catechism's explanation to the Third Commandment: "We should fear and love God so that we do not despise preaching and His Word but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it."

The same sort of analysis applies to our giving. In the Old Testament, God commanded the Israelites to give a tenth of their income to the Levites so that those men could dedicate their lives to serving in God's house,

teaching the people, conducting worship, etc. In the New Testament, there is a rigid requirement listed about handing in your tax forms to church to make sure you've given enough. But the mandate to have a full-time ministry, which is the spirit of that law concerning tithing to the Levites, is right there in 1 Corinthians 9:14: "The Lord has ordained that those

who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel."

The New Testament church's job is significantly larger than the job of Old Testament Israel. We are commanded to preach the Gospel to all nations. There was only the temple to maintain in the Old Testament, but we have churches, schools, universities

and seminaries, plus missionaries everywhere. So you tell me: Can we really undertake the work of the ministry if our giving doesn't even measure up to Old Testament levels of generosity? reprinted from LCMS Stewardship

Council Minutes November 14

Vice President Brock Kliewer called the meeting to order at 6:30 P.M. Pastor Brandt opened with prayer.

The following board members were present: Pastors
Pastor Anderegg and Pastor Brandt, President Bob Hansen, Vice President Brock Kliewer, Treasurer Peg Callahan Sec. Susan Kral, Board of Elders Jeff Hedberg, Cemetery Diane Borgmann, Stewardship Dawn Hedberg, Evangelism Russell Schulz, and Church Members Pat Callahan and Rodney Schulz

Absent: Financial Sec Brett Niebur, **Education** Sara Anderegg, **Member at Large** Paula Emery, and **Trustee** Chuck Kral

The minutes from the October 10, 2023 meeting were approved as printed.

Financial Secretary: Brett submitted a written report. Offerings are behind this time last year, but we have not exceeded expenses. His report was accepted and approved.

Treasurer: Peg submitted her report. All bills have been paid. Her report was accepted and approved.

Elders: Jeff reported the following: Christ the King Pastors have offered to fill in when needed. Jeff's report was accepted and approved.

Trustees: Chuck submitted the following information.

- Pat Callahan and Jeff Emery have performed mowing chores.
- Chuck filled the hole where Pat removed a stump.
- Chuck and Bob Hansen met with Anderson Windows. The council accepted the bid to have a new window installed in the library.
- Chuck and Bob cut down the cedar tree by the front entrance.
- Chuck contacted our snow removal company. The price for removal will not change.
- Chuck contacted the company that inspects our fire extinguishers. They have been approved for all of 2024.
- The fire alarm system was inspected. Repairs will be made when the company can send a repairman.
- Chuck called Catalyst Electric to fix the unlit exit signs. There will be an \$80.00 service call and an \$85.00 an hour fee.
- Pat Callahan and Chuck pulled out all the front bushes and seven in the back. Pat hauled off the brush and will burn it when there is no wind.

- The leaf vacuum needs to be replaced, and a commercial backpack leaf blower is needed. Pat contacted The Motor Hut. They submitted a bid of \$552.00 for a backpack blower and \$1614.99 for a leaf vacuum. The council approved those purchases. The Motor Hut will pick up the old leaf vacuum and put it for sale on consignment.
- Rodney Schulz obtained an estimate for installing a handrail in front of the church. The council requested that he get a second bid.
- Rodney will head a committee, next spring, to decide what to plant in the front of the church where the bushes were removed.

Chuck's report was accepted and approved.

Education: There was no report.

Evangelism: Russell reported the following:

- 167 outreach cards were sent in October. The cost was \$148.63.
- Life Line Screening will be held here on November
 16. Russell will be present in the morning. Dawn
 Hedberg will be present in the afternoon.
- Russell will place an ad in the local newspaper announcing our Christmas Eve service.

Russell's report was accepted and approved.

Stewardship: Dawn had no report.

Member at Large: There was no report.

Cemetery: Diane reported the following:

- Rodney Schulz applied fertilizer to the cemetery grounds.
- Rodney and Russell cleaned up the cemetery leaves and hauled them away for burning.

Her report was accepted and approved.

Pastors' Reports:

Pastor Anderegg announced that due to health and family needs he is officially resigning effective immediately. The board thanked him for his five years of faithful service and regretfully accepted his resignation.

Pastor Brandt reported the following:

 In spite of some of our members having health or personal issues, we can celebrate the joys of this time of year. Celebrations were held for our newest members' confirmations and for All Saints' Day. We will celebrate Thanksgiving with a Wednesday evening service. The beautiful season of Advent will be celebrated with three Wednesday evening services. An Advent Service will be held Sunday morning and the Christmas Eve service will be held in the evening.

- He will cover all services except Sunday, Dec. 17.
 Christ the King will provide a support person that day.
- He provided Pudge with hymn numbers and scripture readings for the new church year.
- He also sent her the three midweek services' information. He has proofread the Nov. 19 bulletin.
- On November 14 he attended the monthly Circuit Pastors' Conference at St. John's Church which is northwest of Cole Camp.

President's Reports

Old Business:

- Anderson Windows has been given a down payment of \$3413.00 to begin building a window for the library. The final payment of \$3414.00 will be made when installation is completed. The new window will be installed within the next two months.
- We will grant easement to the power company so that power can be installed to the property behind
- Jeff and Paula Emery and Peg and Pat Callahan will hold a meeting of the church safety committee.

New Business:

- We thank Bob Borgmann for making new reflectors for our parking lot entrance. Thanks to Pat Callahan for installing them.
- Pastor Anderegg will be removed from the payroll as of November 15. His name will be removed from the church information.
- Bob Hansen explained what needs to be done if the electronic sign is not on. The large circuit breaker box needs to be opened and the circuit breakers shut off for 15-20 seconds. Then turn them back on and wait for about one minute. The sign will light up.
- Dawn mentioned that the carpet in the altar area is not smooth. She will contact carpet companies for suggestions of what needs to be done.
- Jeff mentioned that he had a call from the sheriff's department because the alarm went off. As was mentioned in the trustee report, a repairman has been called.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 P.M.
