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A Political Storm, Part II

A Message from Pastor Anderegg

It's been several months since I started writing about the political landscape in our country. Back then, I had no idea that this would become a series. I titled the first article *The Perfect Political Storm*. However, back then, none of us had any idea that rioters would "storm" the U. S. Capitol Building seeking to get the election results overturned. Nor did we know that some members of congress would add fuel to the fire by referring to these rioters as insurrectionists or even terrorists. The political landscape has gotten even uglier since I wrote that first article, moving me to continue to address this issue.

This most recent event, regardless of who might have carried out previous similar protests turned riots, turned

"out of whack" has not been good for our country. Many Christians are aware that there are actually times when we can participate, in good conscience, in civil disobedience. We know that there was a time when the apostles were told to quit preaching in the name of Jesus, but they refused. Peter, no doubt speaking for the other apostles as well, said "We must obey God rather than men." (Acts 5:29) My dear Sisters and Brothers, this is the **only** time the Lord allows

His chosen people to disobey the governing authorities—namely when obeying the authorities would go against the Lord's will.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer was a Lutheran pastor, theologian, and anti-Nazi dissident in the 1930's and 40's. He participated in a plot to assassinate Adolf Hitler. Many have debated over whether or not it was right *in God's eyes* for him to do so. Though I believe it was right, I caution you not to think that we are in the same situation in which he was. (Our sinful nature is so tempted to grab hold of anything that validates the anger we feel and gives us a reason to practically yell out "I'm as mad as hell, and I'm not going to take this any-more!")

Allow me to be blunt. The rioters who stormed our nation's capitol were *completely* in the wrong. I would label the fact that they were able to allude any measures that were in place to protect those who worked there exhibit A if I were a lawyer. Regardless of what they (and quite likely many of us) were concerned was going to happen to our country they were simply wrong to try

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
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any measures that were in place to protect those who worked there exhibit A if I were a lawyer. Regardless of what they (and quite likely many of us) were concerned was going to happen to our country they were simply wrong to try to bring it about by force. And yet there is plenty to fear.

Let's address those fears—many of which have come true—now. Our nation is on a different course now. It is being led by those who seek to fundamentally change our society and our system of governance. The list of things that could change, or already have changed could extend well down this page and/or down the entire next page. But rather than focus on what *has* changed, I want to focus on what *has not*. Has Jesus' promise that we do not need to worry about how we are clothed (Matthew 6:25-34) changed? (If we were in church I might even ask you to speak your answer out loud, and I would expect to hear everyone say "No!")

"Do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear."

MATTHEW 6:25, NRSV



Has our Lord's promise that we do not need to worry about whether or not we will have enough to eat changed? (NO!) Has His promise that He will never leave us or forsake us changed? (NO!) Has His promise that He will return and bring His reign/kingdom to its full fruition changed (NO!!) Has his promise that to the one who endures what is undoubtedly the end of the age He will give the right to eat from the tree of life changed (NO!!!) You can see where I'm heading with this, I hope, trust, and believe. Listen to the good doctor from the hymn that is his most famous, "He's by our side up-on the plain with His good gifts and Spirit. And take they our life, goods, fame, child, and wife, though these all be gone, Our vict'ry has been won; the Kingdom ours remaineth."

Dear friends, there may come a time in our lifetime that we are called to civil disobedience, but this is not it! Regardless of how strongly we may feel about any manner of political issues, God has not yet called us to take up arms and fight. For this is *not* the good fight that we are to fight with all our might. And perhaps the Lord will spare us from having to consider when to be a part of a crowd of insurrectionists by bringing about the resurrection. Can I get an amen?


Every One His Witness

Second Article Apologetics

Ten Reasons That the New Testament is True

Reason #10

The writers of the New Testament (NT) virtually overnight abandoned ancient Jewish faith, customs, and practices and were willing to die for their testimony. Animal sacrifice was replaced with the perfect sacrifice of Jesus. The binding Law of Moses was no longer deemed the path of salvation because of the sinless life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. They now worship Jesus, true God and true man, when “man worship” had always been considered blasphemy, punishable by death. The Jewish strict monotheism – “The LORD our God is one” (Deut. 6:4 and 2) was now the Triune God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit in one essence. They no longer observed the Jewish Sabbath, also punishable by death. They no longer believed in a temporal conquering Messiah, but instead a sacrificial lamb who died for the sins of all. Also, note that thousands of Jews and many priests were converted. They all abandoned their traditional, cherished beliefs and practices for a new faith in Jesus. Why? How does one explain this monumental change if the NT was made up and the Resurrection didn’t happen? Not only were old beliefs abandoned, but new ones (considered radical) were adopted: Sunday worship, baptism, and communion became common practices of the new faith. Communion is especially unexplainable unless the Resurrection is true given that it is the true body and blood of our LORD Jesus. Why would they make up such a controversial practice? And finally, the NT authors, apostles, and disciples were persecuted, tortured, some even to their deaths, AND not one recanted. If they were not truthful, certainly they would’ve said so when they were about to be crucified (Peter), stoned (James), or beheaded (Paul). It is said that all but John were martyred for their faith and John was forced to live in exile. Why would they go all through that for a lie? It doesn’t make sense! Even Peter had already denied Jesus three times to “save his skin”! He certainly would’ve denied Jesus again if he was promoting a hoax. These facts all point to the truthfulness of the NT.

In the last ten monthly newsletters we have discussed ten good reasons that enable us to defend the New Testament (Second Article **Special Revelation** Apologetics):

1. Describe embarrassing details about themselves,
2. Include embarrassing details and difficult sayings of Jesus,
3. Include demanding sayings of Jesus,
4. Meticulously distinguish Jesus’ words from their own,
5. Include events about the resurrection that they would not have made up,
6. Mention at least 30 historically confirmed people,
7. Include divergent details,
8. Encourage readers to verify their accounts,
9. Describe miracles as historical events in ordinary unadorned accounts,
10. Abandoned their sacred beliefs and practices, adopted new ones, did not deny Christ and were true to their witness, even unto death. At the end of the day, these arguments can effectively defend the faith to the unchurched. It may also strengthen the faith of believers and give some answers to questions they may have.

“For the Word of God is living and active”

Hebrews 4:12a

Before each of my English classes I write a short Bible verse at the top of the white board. Because it’s in the direct line of sight of the students, they can’t miss it. Even those students who aren’t interested in hearing about Christianity can’t help but read it. I’m sure some students read it more than once during the class. In the middle of one of my classes I was teaching about past tense. After a few examples and some practice, I asked if anyone had any questions. One student raised his hand. “I’m wondering about the meaning of what you wrote at the top of the white board,” he said. “Could you please explain it to me?” Of course he was referring to the Bible verse. On that particular day the Bible verse was “Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners” (1 Timothy 1:15b). To explain the verse I spoke about how all people are sinners and how we are unable to save ourselves from the punishment we deserve for our sins. I told him Jesus was the Son of God, and that God loves us so much He sent Jesus to die on the cross to suffer the judgment we all deserve. In the midst of teaching past tense, I was given an opportunity to share the Gospel with the whole class. The Word of God is indeed living and powerful. The Holy Spirit used it to touch the mind of one student. It

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stimulated his curiosity and prompted him to ask about its meaning. As a result, every student in the class heard the Gospel. In the book of Isaiah God says, “So is My Word that goes out from My mouth: It will not return to Me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it.” God’s Word is powerful. God sends out His Word to do His work and it succeeds. When my students read God’s Word on the white board, God’s power works within them. God’s Word is not only beneficial in teaching and strengthening us as we study it, but it is also an effective tool for us to use in reaching out to people who don’t know Jesus as their Savior. Sometimes we want to witness to someone, but we don’t know what to say. Our words are often weak and stumbling. But God’s word is sure and strong.

Generosity in Giving

Without commands or even arm-twisting, St. Paul encourages, even challenges, the Church in Corinth to demonstrate the sincerity of their faith by their generosity in giving. He does this because giving generously is a gift of the Spirit given to us through the Gospel.

St. Paul wrote: “**But just as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in your love for us—see that you also excel in this grace of giving**” (2 Corinthians 8:7). In other words, just as we grow in faith and speech and knowledge of eternal things by the Holy Spirit through the Word of God, so also do we grow in giving from the same Spirit through the same Word.

The problem is that the grace of generosity often grows cold in us. It’s not so much that we stop giving, but we don’t put it first. We treat it like all the other bills that must be paid. It becomes a chore, just one more thing to check off a list of things to do. That empties it of its spiritual power and robs us of the joy that Christ and the Scriptures assign to it.

On top of that, since this generosity is linked to faith and knowledge of divine things, a lack of excelling in giving is sure sign that our faith and knowledge of God are under attack as well.

Thus St. Paul points to the foundation of generosity: the generosity of Christ Himself. Even though He was rich, He became poor so that

Thus St. Paul points to the foundation of generosity: the generosity of Christ Himself. Even though He was rich, He became poor so that we who are poor might become rich. Thus, the incarnation, suffering, and death of our Lord on the cross is the reason, source, and driving force for our generosity in giving to the church.

And since Christ who was rich became poor so that we might be rich in His grace—of which generous giving is part—so we also who are rich in His grace can excel in pressing His grace into service toward the gracious work of the church.

Pay attention to what you give to the church so that you may excel at it. And if you find that your heart has grown cold or indifferent toward it, immerse yourself in God’s Word. Read it at home. Attend Bible Class. Hear and listen to it preached in the Divine Service. Be reminded of what Christ has done for you in His incarnation, suffering, and death. For this will strengthen your faith and knowledge. And where that excels, so will the grace of giving excel also.

Documents for the perpetuity registry of the Peace Lutheran Cemetery are not completed.


New Business.
