Christian Symbols

OPEN BOOK — A book symbolizes the Bible, the written Word of God. When shown open, a book represents truth or revelation. Apostles and saints are often pictured holding an open book, understood as the New Testament writings of the early Christian church.

TRUMPET—In the Old Testament, trumpets, often made from ram's horns, called people to worship or war (and often promised victory). Joshua and the Israelites used trumpets to fell the walls of Jericho. Under Gideon, the small Israelite army blew trumpets and smashed jars to confuse the Midianites into surrender. The



New Testament says trumpets will sound at the Last Judgment and the resurrection of the dead. In Reve-

lation 11, a seventh trumpet proclaims God's final and complete triumph.

The Perfect Gift

or Christmas, I write checks to my kids and grandchildren. I figure that is the most simple way for me, and then they can buy exactly what they want. But I do shop for the perfect gift for a few other people. Generally, I decide what I want to buy, and then go get it—as easy as getting a gallon of milk. But other times, I have no idea what to find that will be pleasing to him or her. That was the case recently when I shopped at several stores in a small mall in Branson and then on the way home at the Shepherd of the Hills store in Lebanon. I really don't care to shop—I'd rather just get it and go! But I also want to get the perfect gift so that both the giver and the receiver are happy.

What about God? Did He go on a quest to discover the perfect gift for us. Well, no doubt the Gift had to be perfect, but He didn't have to go shopping. He knew what the Perfect Gift was going to be shortly after the beginning of the world. In the midst of His perfect creation came sin-saturated Satan in the guise of a serpent. Adam and Eve gave into his temptation to sin.

But instead of annihilating them, God's overwhelming mercy desired to save them. So He made a promise as He cursed the satanic serpent: "I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; He shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise His heel" (Genesis 3:15).

He promised them the Perfect Gift to restore all things to the perfection He had first designed. That Perfect Gift is indeed our Lord Jesus Christ. And when the time was just right: "God sent forth His Son, born of woman, born

under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons" (Galatians 4:4-5).

The coming of God's Perfect Gift is what our Advent and Christmas observances are all about. The word "advent" means "to come" and the focus of the season is all upon the coming of Jesus. We celebrate His "humble coming" for us at the manger in



Bethlehem, His "gracious coming" to us through His Word and Sacraments, and we anticipate His "Glorious coming" on the Last Day—the day of resurrection—when we shall be in His presence everlastingly!

This Perfect Gift of God became the atoning sacrifice for our sins and the sins of all people as He poured out His life-blood on the cross. His resurrection from the dead demonstrates how perfect this gift of God really is.

As we make our way to Christmas (I'm writing this the week before), it is important that we keep our focus on this Perfect Gift. It is relatively easy for us to become distracted by the trappings of Christmas which are intended to direct us to the Perfect Gift. In fact, that is what the devil desires us to do. Our sinful nature makes us prone to be like a child ignoring the gift and instead, playing with the box in which it came. In doing so, we may miss Christmas entirely, and feel emptiness in our celebration.

Avoid distractions! Stay focused on God's Word through which the Holy Spirit works, the very Word that reveals to us our Savior. Programs, parties, and presents are fun, but do not let them distract you from "fixing your eyes on Jesus." With eyes so fixed, God's Perfect Gift—Jesus—will have a powerful impact on your life. And when individual lives are impacted by Jesus, so is the witness of our congregation within our community.

May the Holy Spirit give us all shepherd hearts, eyes and mouths: "And when they saw it, they made known the saying that had been told them concerning this Child" (this Perfect Gift!). Christmas Blessings to each of you!



Externals Are Important A Second Principle

Another principle is that everything in worship exalt God and bring His grace to man. Everything in worship is to aid the communication of the Gospel so that man may be attracted to it and, the Grace of God, be sanctified and edified by it. Nothing in worship practice should have the purpose merely of giving man pleasure, entertainment, or emotional thrill. This is idolatry.



"When Jesus was baptized, immediately He went up from the water, and behold, the heavens were opened to Him, and He saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and coming to rest on Him; and behold, a voice from heaven said, "This is My beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased." Matthew 3:16-17

o, do you remember where you were and what you did last Epiphany? You really don't have to answer that question. I'm impressed anytime someone from the western branch of the Christian Church remembers Epiphany is the day to celebrate the coming of the Wise Men to worship the baby Jesus. If anyone remembers the day and what he or she was doing, well, that's a bonus. On the other hand, if you are a member of the Russian Orthodox Church and live in Moscow or just about any city in that immense land, I would be surprised if you didn't remember what you did last Epiphany.

Why the difference?

In the Russian Orthodox Church, Epiphany marks the baptism of the Savior. In many places it is celebrated by the local church by cutting a very large cross-shaped hole into the ice of a local river. When that is done, many of the believers from the church jump into the water as a remembrance of Jesus' work and their baptisms. This year that meant people jumped into the river when it



was about 13 degrees below zero outside (Fahrenheit). One man, his hair frozen into mini-icicles, said, "After the Epiphany dive, all your illnesses, all your problems just fade away." Now if you're thinking that custom is a bit strange, you won't get any argument from me. And if you're thinking that's the kind of custom that is probably dying off, well, you'd be absolutely wrong. More and more people -- young people -- are participating in the ceremony. There are probably all kinds of reasons why they would do such a thing, but more than one has said this: "Jesus suffered for me and His baptism was the beginning of that suffering. I suffer for a moment to remember how His suffering, His death, and His resurrection have taken away my sins." If that's what they believe, that's wonderful! I'll join them! -- in the belief, that is, not the river.

The Prayer: Dear Lord Jesus, I give thanks for all You did for my salvation. Help me. Help me remember and share with others the love and sacrifice You made so my sins might be washed away. In Your Name, I ask it. Amen.



Your Past Does Not Define Your Future

ew Year's is a celebration of the past and the future. We take stock of the past with thanksgiving and sometimes even relief (that it's over), and we look to the future in hope and anticipation, and perhaps with some worry, for what it holds.

The point is that New Year's celebrations remind us of who we are as opposed to who we would like to be, what we have done in comparison to what we want to do. It reminds us of our accomplishments, but mostly it reminds us of our failures. What we've lost. Who we've lost.

New Year's is our own version of Charles Dickens' classic, A Christmas Carol. And we all play Scrooge. We are visited by the ghosts of our pasts, presents and futures.

St. Paul writes: "The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that having all sufficiency in all things at all times, you may abound in every good work. As it is written, 'He has distributed freely, he has given to the poor; his righteousness endures forever.' He who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will supply and multiply your seed for sowing and increase the harvest of your righteousness. You will be enriched in every way for all your generosity, which through us will produce thanksgiving to God" (2 Cor. 9:6–15).

St. Paul tells us that the Lord will both supply and increase what we need to give to the church for

its work in the world. He tells us that this work God does in us will enrich and bless us in every way, and through this, will produce thanksgiving to God. With this in mind, here is some practical advice to help you take stock of your giving in years past and change what needs to be adjusted, improved, or done away with altogether.



First, attend the Divine Service to receive God's gifts of forgiveness, life and salvation. If you've not been faithful in attending worship to hear the preaching of God's Word, to receive forgiveness and feast on the rich food of our Lord's body and blood for the eternal benefit of your body and soul, then repent and come to receive the gifts God freely gives. God doesn't want your money. He wants you — all of you (Matt. 22:20–22).

Second, pray for the Lord's help. Your right as a Christian is to speak with your Father, the King of all creation, freely through His Son, our Lord, Jesus Christ. Go to the throne of grace and ask for strength and wisdom to follow His bidding faithfully (John 15:1–16).


Third, consider what the church is and what the church **does**. The church is a place of mercy. It inhales the mercy of the Father by the death, resurrection and ascension of His Son through the preaching of the Gospel and the Sacraments. It exhales this mercy in love toward neighbors. You are a member of the church, of God's family. Thus, you are not only a recipient of God's mercy, but a bearer of that mercy for the life of the world. You spread that mercy through the generous giving of your income to support the work of the church in the world, as the Israelites did in the Old Testament (Lev. 27:1

Fourth, take stock of your current giving in light of the New Testament's teaching on supporting the work of the church.

Are you giving of your first fruits, taking it out of your paycheck first, or does God get what's left over? Are you giving voluntarily and cheerfully? Are you giving proportionally and generously? The Old Testament required a tithe, or ten percent. The New Testament gives freedom to be generous, to give more for the Church's work. Are you relying on God's promise to provide and increase what you need to do His work? If your answer is no to any of these, repent. If God gave you His only Son, will He not provide for you all things, even physical things? Trust Him, His Word, and heed it.

So, don't let your past define your future. Rather, commit for the year a generous proportion of your income, which is God's gift to you for this body and life.

Answering Objections to the Faith

The Problem of Darwinism from The Reason I Believe by Allen Quist (From Ken Ham's debate with atheist Bill Nye: Old Tjikko)

ye's second argument against the creation account in Genesis centered around an old Norway spruce tree called Old Tjikko which he said is 0.550 years old. Was the aga

said is 9,550 years old. Was the age determined in a reliable and verifiable manner such as counting growth rings? Not so. Nye didn't mention how that age was arrived at or that according to an article in National Geographic the age is actually around 600 years at most. So how was the 9,550 years arrived at? It was supposedly calculated by means of carbon 14 dating methods used on the tree roots found underneath the tree. It was believed that the tree had died off many times each time the roots would send up new shoots to become new trees. That alone calls into question the methods used on this tree, but the real reason questions are raised is because carbon dating can only be used on plant and animal matter after it has died. That leads us to ask, could dead Norway spruce roots survive for 9,550 years in moist soil without rotting away. I have a number of those spruce trees on my property one of which died 50 years ago leaving the stump left in the ground. In order to determine the status of the roots, I pulled up the roots with a tractor and chain. As expected, the stump rolled out of the ground and the roots had rotted away. So how could the



roots from Old Tjikko survive nearly 200 times that long? Such a claim is clearly unbelievable making the argument totally fabricated. We now commonly hear of "fake news." So, when it comes to Darwinism, we are largely dealing with fake evidence.

Former Member Dies Nov. 27



Ronald Arthur Mueller, 77, of Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, went to be with the Lord on November 27, 2022 at 6:15 a.m. Ron, formerly of Galesburg, Illinois, died surrounded by family at McLeod Hospice House in Florence, South Carolina.

He was born Ronald Arthur Weimann on July 11, 1945 in Wildau, Germany, where his mother Erna Martha Weimann and her family had moved from Michigan before World War II. When Ron was 11 months old, the family re-

turned to the United States on the transport ship USS Marine Perch and settled in Chicago. Ron's last name was changed by adoption in 1952 after his mother married Heinz William Mueller. The family later moved to Lombard, Illinois. There Ron was a member of the Class of 1963, the first students to spend all four years at the new Glenbard East High School. His love of sports led him to the football field and track, as well as the baseball field and basketball courts. He was happy later in life to reconnect with his former coaches, the legendary Liz Astroth and Jerry Leggett.

Ron attended Whitewater College in Wisconsin and earned a Bachelor of Science degree from Elmhurst College. He was drafted into the U.S. Army after graduation and served in Vietnam as a member of the 1st Engineer Battalion 1st Infantry Division. Much of his vast body of work as a photographer in Vietnam is now in the collections of the First Division Museum at Cantigny in Wheaton, Illinois. One of his articles appeared in Stars and Stripes in 1969. Ron also managed an Officers' Club in Vietnam. He was awarded the National Defense Service Medal, Vietnam Service Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal, Army Commendation Medal with 1st Oak Leaf Cluster, and Air Medal.

Ron married Ann Marie Tracy on June 28, 1972 in Macomb, Illinois and was a proud father of two daughters, Michelle Leanne Davidson and Lindsey Marie (Drew) Berson. He is survived by his wife, daughters, son -in-law and six grandchildren, Tyler, Trey, Corinne and Jared Smith and Anneliese and Juliette Berson.

After Vietnam, Ron attended Carl Sandburg College on the GI Bill while working full-time. He managed several area businesses, including the Western Stores (later SuperAmerica) in Monmouth and Galesburg, Yeager Hardware, Jewel Home Shopping Service, and Meadow Gold Dairy. Ron also co-founded M & M Mobil with his friend, Mike Mooney, and owned rental property with his wife, Ann. Ron and Ann later relocated to Lexington, Illinois, where he owned an Archway Cookie route. Ron's final career, while living in Heyworth, Illinois, was as a caseworker for the State of Illinois Department of Human

Services in Decatur.

After retirement, Ron and Ann lived on the Lake of the Ozarks in Missouri, before moving back to Galesburg, then to their final home together in Myrtle Beach. His family will miss having Ron with them for vacations and holidays, Chicago Cubs and Myrtle Beach Pelican games, concerts, and afternoons on the Garden City Pier.

He was preceded in death by his mother, biological and adoptive fathers, grandparents, an aunt and two uncles, and one nephew. He is also survived by his aunt, Irma Weichenhain, brother, Robert Mueller, sister, Deborah Spaletto, mother-in-law, Kathryn Tracy, and several cousins, nieces and nephews, and great-nieces and nephews.

Ron was a member of Risen Christ Lutheran Church, Myrtle Beach, American Legion and Society of the 1st Infantry Division and a Life Member of the VFW. He often served as an usher or in leadership roles at the churches he attended.

Ron's visitation will be Friday, December 16 from 5-7 p.m. at Hinchliff-Pearson West Funeral Directors and Cremation Services Galesburg Chapel with funeral services on Saturday, December 17 at 10 a.m. at Galesburg Covenant Church. Burial with military rites will follow in Warren County Hope Cemetery, a few miles from the Westport Subdivision where Ron and Ann raised their daughters.
