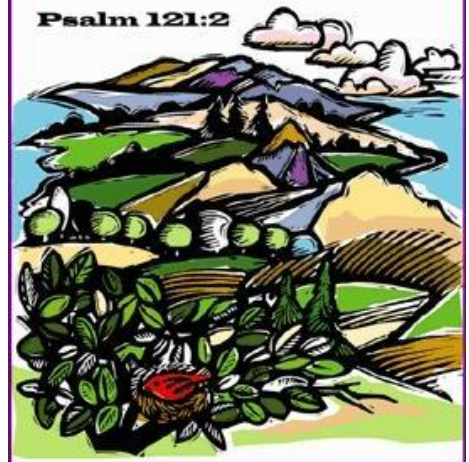


A Message from Pastor Brandt Psalm 121

I almost hesitate to bring up this subject, but we are certainly living in troubled times. This coronavirus pandemic is impacting everyone in the whole United States and most of the world in various ways: there is illness, death, loss of jobs and businesses closing, not to mention how the rest of us feel like we have been “sentenced to house arrest.” And then the protesting, rioting, and tearing down of historical statues. Will we be burning history books next? That’s what Hitler did! I recently read an article about this ANTIFA group. It’s a highly organized, well-funded radical left-wing Socialist group which is endorsing just about everything that Christians despise; including abortion, homosexuality, and denying Christian beliefs in Jesus Christ. Then if all this isn’t enough, let’s get closer to home: nearly every one of us has a close friend, family member, or we ourselves with a major issue such as health, death, or divorce. These things are weighing heavily on many of us. For me personally, my situation is not getting any better. I have gone from a state of shock to grief. I cry every day. But then I always look to the One who will ultimately, in His own time and manner, bring about change and the solutions we need. Recently, Pastor Anderegg and I met with the Sedalia Circuit for their monthly pastor’s conference. The Circuit Visitor, Rev. Jeremy Freeman, gave a four-page presentation on Psalm 121. Like many of you, I’ve read all the psalms, but I hadn’t paid any attention to this one. I know that God put it there for me, and I think it may be of benefit to many of you. It’s only eight verses, so allow me to share it with you: **“I lift up my eyes to the hills—where does my help come from? My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth. He will not let your foot slip—he who watches over you will not slumber; indeed, he**

Psalm 121:2



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not let your foot slip—he who watches over you will not slumber; indeed, he who watches over Israel will neither slumber nor sleep. The Lord watches over you—the Lord is your shade at your right hand; the sun will not harm you by day, nor the moon by night. The Lord will keep you from all harm—he will watch over your life; the Lord will watch over your coming and going.”

The psalm is one of 15 known as “A song of ascents” (Psalms 120-134). Historically, it has been understood that the “songs of ascents” were spoken or sung by the Israelites making their annual pilgrimage up the hills to Jerusalem. The psalm is well-loved by Christians because of its strong words of assurance, especially in times of doubt. It provides comfort with the promise that God is keeping watch over us every step of our way. My brief translation is like this: When we are down in the pits, we cry out for help. And we look up to the Lord, the Maker of the heavens and the earth—the Almighty

One! He is always watching over us—He never sleeps—and He will not let you slip—He is stronger than the Evil One, the Devil! The psalmist repeats, “The Lord watches over you.” He is our shade, not letting the sun beat you down; and He will keep you safe at night by the light of the moon. And again, “The Lord will keep you from all harm—he will watch over your life; the Lord will watch over your coming and going” (v 7-8). Notice that the psalm does not imply that trouble nor danger will never befall a believer in God. There is no promise that bad situations in our life or the world will never happen again, but it does say that God is there, ready to help. He promises to be forever present and protecting. I pray that you and I will **always** trust in Jesus Christ to carry us through our “valley of shadows.” He will never leave us nor forsake us. PEACE be with you!

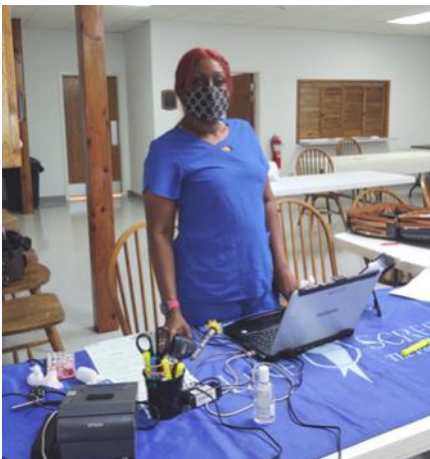

Everything around the Lake seems to have gotten back to some level of historic normalcy. New normal, but still fairly routine. In general people are trying to maintain the new norm, “social distancing”. While it certainly was not the case with visitors and young people at the Lake over the Memorial Day holiday. The coming 4 of July weekend will be even wilder, with even greater numbers at the Lake. It was reported our total around the Lake normal population of around 79,000 grew to close to half a million for Memorial Day, we can expect that number as a minimum for the 4th weekend. Stay safe, stay home (except for church on Sunday), just be careful.

DEALING WITH COVID-19



I haven't seen any significant increase in masked population, I find myself wearing a mask when I go to get groceries, particularly with the summer crowd at the Lake.

We did not have our April Voters meeting, and there are no plans to “make it up”, but we will have our July Voters meeting. We will not have a potluck (one of my favorite things), we will have the business meeting and we will have it in the chapel where we are better set up to handle the appropriate social distancing.

If you read the Church Council meeting minutes published in the newsletter, you will have noticed we continue to survive quite well, in spite of not having regular church services for seven of the twenty-six Sundays through June. Said differently, we have missed 26 percent of our church services the first six months of this year. During that six month period:

- We have added nine new members.
- Our giving to God is higher for the first five months of this year than last.
- Most importantly, we have maintained close contact with our friends and fellow congregation members.
- We are learning to cope and work within the new norms placed on our society by this virus.

We can give thanks to God and Jesus Christ, His Son, Our Savior, for getting through these first six months of 2020. We can be thankful for being able to attend church, to be able to worship with friends, to hear inspiring sermons and be able to participate in communion on a regular basis. God is good!

Vengeance Is God's Job, Not Yours

Do not take revenge, my friends, but leave room for God's wrath, for it is written: "It is mine to avenge; I will repay," says the Lord. Romans 12:19

Vengeance is God's job, not yours. He will repay—whether on the Day of Judgment or in this life. He can discipline your abusive boss, soften your angry parent, and bring your ex to his knees or her senses. Forgiveness doesn't diminish justice; it entrusts it to God. He guarantees the right amount of retribution. We give too much or too little, but He has the precise prescription. And unlike us, He never gives up on a person. (And you should be glad about that.) Long after we have moved on, God is still there probing the conscience, stirring conviction, orchestrating redemption. Fix your enemies? That's God's job. Forgive your enemies? Ah, that's where you come in. 'Never pay back evil with more evil. Do things in such a way that everyone can see you are honorable. Do all that you can to live in peace with everyone. Dear friends, never take revenge. Leave that to...God. For the Scriptures say, "I will take revenge; I will pay them back," says the Lord. Instead... "If your enemies are hungry, feed them. If they are thirsty, give them something to drink. In doing this, you will heap burning coals of shame on their heads." Don't let evil conquer you, but conquer evil by doing good' (vv. 17-21). Author Max Lucado says: 'Revenge builds a lonely, narrow house. Space enough for one person. The lives of its tenants are reduced to one goal: Make someone miserable. They do—themselves. No wonder God insists we "Keep a sharp eye out for weeds of bitter discontent" (Hebrews 12:15).'

Prayer: Heavenly Father, help me always remember that vengeance is NOT my job, but Yours. Thank You! In Jesus' Name, Amen.

About Covid 19: We Are Open For Worship

Dear Christian Friends,

The Pastors and Elders are concerned for the health of all citizens of our country and most particularly in the health of our congregation and visitors. We are attempting to follow any guidelines provided by our government or District.

During the shut down in Missouri, we provided video taped services on Facebook and emailed copies of the sermons to all our members. On April 26 and May 3, we had drive in services in our parking lot, and transmitted the service on FM radio.

On May 10, 2020, we resumed services in the church, following the recommendations provided by the Governor of Missouri. The challenge for us as a Church is to be mindful of our concern for the health of the body and the soul of our members and guests. We continue our services and:

- Encourage all who are sick or feeling under the weather to refrain from attending services.
- One of the trademarks of members at Peace, is the friendly greeting, handshakes and hugs as we enter and leave the church, greeting each other, visitors and guests. We strongly recommend during this time to forego handshakes, hugs and any physical greetings before, during and after church.
- We have hand sanitizer at the door as you enter.
- We recommend wearing a mask, but a mask is not required. About half our members wear masks. We also have masks available in the Narthex.
- As you enter, please pick up a Service Folder off the credenza, so we can eliminate as much handling as possible.
- Ushers will lead you to a seat in the Chapel. We will place people in a location that maintains appropriate "social distancing" in the Chapel.
- Offering plates will be located at the rear of the Church, so they do not have to be handled during the service.
- We will not be using the common cup during communion.
- Pastors and Elders will sanitize their hands before the Service of the Sacrament.
- Please note, we will not be going to the rail to receive communion. The Body and Blood of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, will be distributed to you, in your seat, by Pastor and the Elders. Once delivered to you, hold these until the Pastor returns to the Altar and offers the blessings.
- The Ushers will collect the cups after the completion of communion.
- The Ushers will dismiss the congregation by rows, beginning at the back of the Chapel after completion of the service.



Ten Reasons We Know That the Gospel Writers Told the Truth

Reason #3: Some pronouncements by Jesus were extremely strict and difficult to follow. If the apostles were making up the gospel narratives, they definitely didn't make life easy for themselves or anyone else. Examples can be found in the Sermon on the Mount:

1. Committing adultery just by looking at a woman lustfully (Matt. 5:28).
2. Anyone divorcing his wife, except for unfaithfulness, causes her to be an adulterous, and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery (Matt. 5:32).
3. Turn the other cheek, if someone takes your tunic give him your cloak as well, if someone forces you to go a mile go with him two miles, be generous to those who want to borrow from you (Matt. 5:39-42).
4. Love your enemies; pray for those who persecute you (Matt. 5:44).
5. Do not store up treasures on earth but instead store treasures in Heaven (Matt 6:19-21).
6. Do not judge or you will be judged (Matt. 7:1-2).

These are examples of demands that people would not impose on themselves simply because they would be too difficult to follow. If thought about a sin is sinful in itself, then everyone including the authors would be guilty. The demanding standards for divorce and remarriage would not be in the best earthly interests of the writers. It's not in our instincts to resist the insults of evil persons. It sets up standards of behavior that was inconvenient to the apostles as they were being persecuted themselves. Praying for enemies and exhibiting kindness toward them is not the natural thing to do. Perfection is not possible for broken human beings. The tendency is to point out the fault of others and judging them accordingly. Why would they impose these impossible commands on themselves and others? Who could live up

Why would they impose these impossible commands on themselves and others? Who could live up to them? Only a perfect person could. Maybe that's the point. We know that the law often acts as a mirror, showing us our sinful nature and our need for a Savior. Only Jesus, the perfect Son of God, could keep such standards.

Insights From Every One His Witness

What is a witness? What's it all about? There are many competing ideas about witnessing that pose a challenge to what it's about. Some are faithful to biblical doctrine and reflect our Lutheran teachings, but many are not. One popular false idea is called Arminianism. Some misunderstandings of Arminianism are: that it's **your** fault if someone goes to hell, **you** make the decision for Christ, **you** can increase the Heavenly population, and it's **you** who saves others. These ideas distract us and move us away from the true focus of witnessing: Jesus! So what is witnessing all about? The Bible is our foundation for understanding witnessing the way God wants. There are many instances in scripture of God calling His people to bear witness, and how people respond accordingly, and how God came in the flesh to bear witness to the truth. "There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness, to bear witness about the light, that all might believe through him." – John 1:6-8. Witness is a legal term that may entail a person with knowledge of some detail, or a truth that is told (testimony). Witness takes place among God's people to instruct and strengthen believers – Deut. 6:7. Witnessing takes place in the world so others may believe – Acts 10:43. The word "witness" can be a noun as in the testimony itself, or a verb as in the act of giving testimony as in legal matters: Jeremiah 32:9-12, Ruth 4:7-11 or guilt or innocence Deut. 19:15. The Eighth Commandment expressly prohibits bearing false witness (Exodus 20:16). The responsibility to be a witness in Old Testament Law calls for severe penalties against someone who fails to speak up. - Lev. 5:1. God calls on His people to be witnesses to fellow believers and to people in the world. Witness to fellow believers is to strengthen and encourage one another. God's people witness to those in the world so that they will learn of Jesus and His grace. The witness of God's people is for all people in all places.

The prayer: Dear Savior, I am humbled that You believed I am worth dying for. Grant me grace to live my life in thanksgiving for what You have done and help others see the joy of my salvation. In your name, Amen.



“**G**ood Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?” asked the rich young ruler. Jesus said, “You know the commandments.” And the ruler replied, “All these I have kept from my youth.” And Jesus said to him, “One thing you still lack. Sell all that you have and distribute to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me.” (Luke 18:18–22)

As we listen to this, one question is raised in our minds: Is Jesus speaking to us also or only to the rich young ruler? In other words, is Jesus telling us to sell all that we have and give it to the poor? As good Lutherans, we answer: No! But why? Why should we not sell all that we have and distribute it to the poor?

The simplest explanation is this: If we sold everything we have, our wife and our children would be neglected. In other words, to sell everything we have and give it to the poor would ignore, even abandon, those whom God has placed in our care. Our money, everything we have, is not to be used solely for the church. But that doesn't mean it isn't to be used for the purpose God intends.

Everyone has three stations in life, three spheres in which we live and are to be of service to our neighbors. These stations are the church, the family, and society. We are members of all three of these by birth.

- **We are born** into the church by water and the Word of God, and our duties to others in the church arise from either our birth into the church or the birth of others by Baptism into it.
- **We are born** into a family, and our duties to others stem from either our birth into that family or the birth of others into our family.
- Finally, **we are born** into society, which is simply a further extension of our birth into our family. The duties we have toward other members of society come from either our birth or the birth of others into the same society.

All that we have and all that we are is to be pressed into service for the church, the family, and society. If we were to sell all we have and give only to one, the other two would be neglected, and our duties toward them would falter.

So consider your life and all that you have in light of these three stations. You pay taxes to support and help those in society. You provide food, clothing, and shelter for the members of your family. You save for college for your children.

But the one station that is usually thought of last is the church. Since the needs of the family and society are more immediate, the church is often given what is left over. This is not how it should be. Rather, we are to give of our first fruits – the best from off the top – even as Abel gave the best of his flock.

This requires forethought and intent. It means that you sit down and make a plan for what you will give from the beginning. It means sticking to it even when it seems there are other more immediate and pressing things.

This is all the more necessary now as we enter into periods of time while giving is low due to high unemployment or restrictions on meeting in church to give. If we love God, his gifts of forgiveness given through the means of grace we receive at church and only at church, then we will support the church just as we love our country and our family.

For all that we have and all that we are given to us by our gracious and giving God. He spared no expense for us and our salvation. He gave up His Son into death so that our sins are forgiven, and we will live. What is more, He provides for all that we need for this body and life. And our lives in this world, among these three spheres of the church, the family, and society, are to mirror the generosity of the one who gave us life in all three by birth.

Don't let the church, your divine family, be ignored or even an afterthought. The church is nurturing you, bringing you up in salvation by Word and Sacrament for eternal life.

- At the circuit meeting he learned that all other area churches are now singing hymns. He asked the council to approve the singing of hymns. Council members were in favor of that suggestion. Mic stated that our elders would have to approve.
- Both reports were accepted and approved.

Old Business: President Mic Carlson reported the following:

- Work is progressing on the stained glass window in memory of Dale Murrell.
- The State of Missouri forms to make our cemetery a perpetual cemetery under state guidelines need to be completed.
- Mic, Paul Bartels, and Earl Hartenstein will complete the audit of our books for 2019 when they can get together.
- The annual Report of Operations for the IRS needs to be completed.
- Mic will call a meeting of the combined Planning and Finance Committees when time permits. He will call a meeting to review the planned survey.
- He will organize a Nominating Committee for the October election of officers.


New Business: President Mic Carlson reported the following:

- Farmers Insurance has increased our policy rate. Our facility had been listed as a brick-steel frame building. It is actually a brick-stick frame building. The cost went from \$296.00 per month to \$377.00 a month. The new rate is still lower than the \$596.00 that we paid to American Family Insurance in 2018.
- Diane Borgmann stated that the altar guild needs new candles and other supplies. Authorization was given to purchase what is needed.
- After discussion it was decided that the July Voters Meeting will be held in the sanctuary.

The meeting was adjourned, and Pastor Anderegg led the board in closing with the Lord's Prayer.

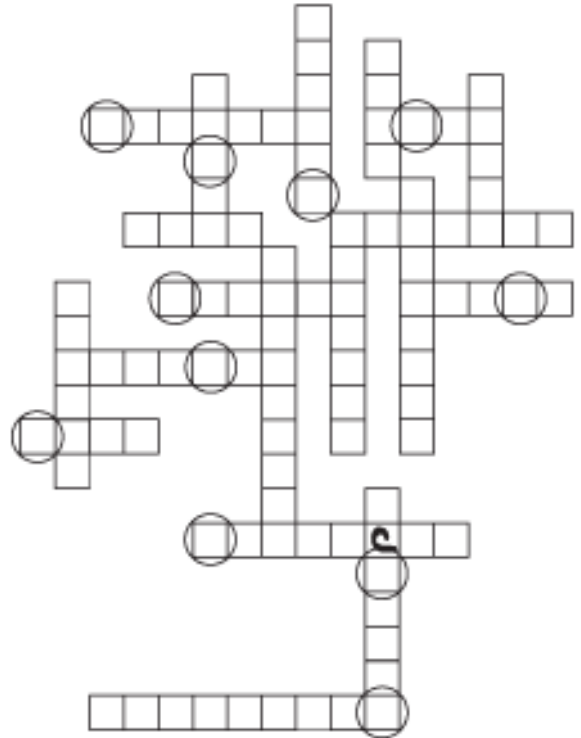

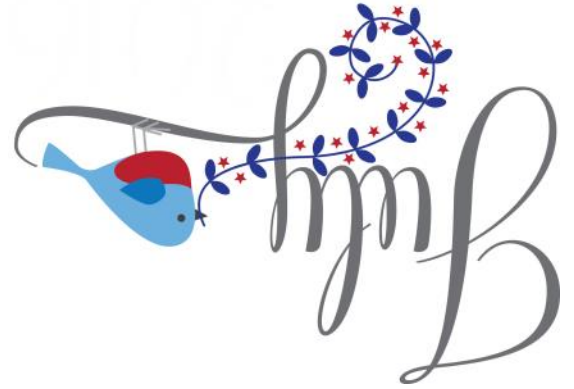
