Christian Symbols

Scepter and Crown

The scepter & crown

are symbols of a king's authority. In Christian tradition, they represent Christ's triumphant rule over all. The final Sunday of the liturgical year is Christ the King Sunday, when we celebrate this very thing. Hebrews 1:8 (NIV), echoing the book of Psalms, reads: "Your throne, O God, will last for ever and ever, and righteousness will be the scepter of your kingdom."

Grapes

Grapes are most often associated with the sacrament of Holy Communion. They also symbolize the fruitfulness of Christian life. Many Bible stories, including "Exploring Canaan" (Numbers 13), mention grapes.

In light of the wave of LGBTQ+ activity, all of which falls under the umbrella of homosexuality, a grievous sin in the Bible, I thought that this article recently prepared by our MO District President, Rev. Dr. R. Lee Hagan, would be very appropriate to share.

The Two Become One Flesh: God's Gift of Marriage

"So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them" (Genesis 1:27).

"Therefore a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, they shall become one flesh" (Genesis 2:24).

he Biblical view of God-given sex and the one-flesh union of man and woman in marriage elicits an angry and at times violent reaction in many corners of our society today. Sadly, what is lost is the beauty, intentionality, and order of God's creation of man, woman, and marriage as foundational for His earthly creation as Genesis 1 describes, "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created

him; male and female he created them. And God blessed them. And God said to them 'Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it."

God's creation of men and women as distinct is according to His design and purpose. Dr. John Kleinig's recent book, Wonderfully Made: A Protestant Theology of the Body, should be read by every Lutheran layperson, as well as each church worker. Dr. Kleinig helps to deepen our understanding and appreciation for the uniqueness of men and women and



how they complement one another as God intended in the one flesh union of marriage. Permit me to share these extended quotes.

"It would be good for Adam if he had a physical 'helper' and a 'partner' (Gen 2:18, 20), but it would also be good for God, because by relying on each other they would learn to rely on him. On the one hand, it was good for Adam to have someone to help him in his work, a coworker

and collaborator, so that there would be a division of labor between them in a common enterprise. On the other hand, and much more enigmatically, it would also be good if that helper would also be his 'partner,' a 'fit companion' for him. In Old Testament Hebrew, this rather unusual term is not used elsewhere as a noun, but only as a preposition for what is 'in front of' or 'opposite' a person or thing. Here it describes a partner who corresponds with him as his opposite, his proper match; she is meant to be his counterpart who will complement him, his other half who will be both like him in some respects and yet unlike him in others. Together they will round themselves off and sharpen each other physically and mentally, so that they will fit together well and work well together as they keep on adjusting to one another" (p. 32-33).



"In their convivial union the two of them become 'one flesh.' Oddly, that unusual term remains unexplained. It is a riddle that plays on the paradox that, in this case, one plus one is one. While the focus of this saying is on the body, it includes the whole person. It alludes to their physical union in marital cohabitation, their sexual union as husband and wife, and to their procreative union that results in the birth of a child as the foundation of a new family. Their two bodies become one flesh, even though they still remain separate from each other. . .

They complement each other bodily in a common life where they are meant to work together as interdependent partners. Nothing could be more physical than that! Little could be more wonderful than that! Their marital, sexual union is the culmination of God's creation of them as a man and woman" (p. 34-35).

"These days, we usually envisage marriage as an intimate, personal relationship between a man and a woman who love each other. It is that! But it is also much more than that, because it involves the bodies of a man and a woman who not just interact with each other personally, but also cohabitate with each other in the same place. Like the home that they establish by their sexual union, it is a place for them to be with each other bodily, a physical state of being for them. So traditionally, marriage was called an estate, a divinely instituted order that provided a safe place for their sexual union to be protected, nurtured, and to thrive" (p. 158).

May these words deepen your understanding of God's precious gift of sex and marriage as His means of sustaining His creation. What a blessed gift and blessing God ordained in His creation of male and female and the one-flesh union of marriage!

Prayer: Most gracious God, we give thanks for the joy and blessings that You grant to husbands and wives through the gift of marriage. Assist them always by Your grace that with true fidelity and steadfast love they may honor and keep their marriage vows, grow in love toward You and for each other, and come at last to the eternal joys that You have promised; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

Witness Extends the Outreach of the Congregation

Not only do we need the church, but our congregation also needs us. As an organization, a congregation has limited connections in its community. There are certainly ways in which the congregation can attract and connect with nonchurched people, but they tend to be limited. Outreach events, programs, services, and so on do bring some people to the congregation's location or enable the congregation to connect with some people in other locations of the community. But as an organization, a congregation's reach doesn't usually extend vary far. The members of the congregation can always reach further than the

congregation as an entity. Individual members are active and involved in workplaces, classrooms, family gatherings, neighborhood events, sports, hobbies, civic organizations, and so much more, that the congregation has no role or means of gaining entry. 

Six Fundamental Principles of Natural Law

It was noted previously in Romans 2:14-15 that Paul states, "Gentiles who do not have the law... they are a law unto themselves" and "they show that the law is written on their hearts." From this passage, six fundamental principles can be stated.



Natural law is instinctive.

Those who do not have the law do so by nature. From this statement we get the term 'natural law'. It's a part of our genetic code. We do not need to use logic to be aware of it, the knowledge is just there.





Natural law is singular and universal.

Notice Paul is treating moral law as being one singular entity. The content of all of them are one and the same. Gentiles do not have a different moral law from the Jews who have the revealed law. The content of the moral law, whether by revelation or instinct, is one and the same.



Natural law includes both tables of the Law i.e., the existence of God and our responsibility to others.

C. S. Lewis in his book Mere Christianity (37-39) explained that if a moral law exists, then a lawgiver must also exist. The two are necessarily interconnected. Aka the moral argument, Lewis observed that all people groups adhere to a common moral code. It is both instinctive and at the same time a logical conclusion based on observing the natural world. It is, therefore, scientifically observable and can be studied scientifically.



Altar Guild **About the Church Building**

The church building is properly oriented if its main axis is laid from west to east. Such orientation is a matter of tradition and significant symbolism. The light of God is regarded as rising in the east as does the sun. Reference to Ezekiel 43:4: "And the glory of the Lord came into the house by the way of the gate whose prospect is toward the east." Since the altar symbolizes the presence of God in the church, it was set in the east end of the building. Thus the people face the east when they worship.

It is not absolutely necessary because it may be impossible to do. The church building is the sacred house of God where Christians assemble in the name of Christ to: celebrate Holy Communion service; receive God's Grace and blessings through His Word and sacraments; offer God sacrifices of self, prayer, praise, thanksgiving, adoration and possessions; edify one another through mutual participation in worship; engage in the services of preaching, Baptism, confession and absolution, matins, vespers, weddings, and funerals; and enter at any time for individual prayer and devotions.

Go ... Sell All You Have?

"What must I do to inherit eternal life?" asked the rich young ruler. Jesus said, "You know the commandments." And he replied, "All these I have kept from my youth." And Jesus said to him, "One thing you still lack. Sell all that you have and distribute to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me" (Luke 18:18-22).

When we hear this story, this question comes to mind: is Jesus speaking to us also, or only to the rich young ruler? In other words, is Jesus telling us to sell all that we have and give it to the poor?

As good Lutherans, we answer, "No!" But why? Why should we not sell all that we have and distribute it to the poor? The simplest explanation is this: if we sold everything we have, our wife and our children would be neglected. In other words, to sell everything we have and give it to the poor would ignore, even abandon, those whom God has placed in our care. Our money, everything we have, is not to be used solely for the church. But that doesn't excuse us from using our money for the purpose God intends.

Everyone has three stations in life, three spheres in which we live and are to be of service to our neighbors. These stations are the church, the family and society. We are members of all three of these by birth. We are born into the church by water and the Word of God, and our duties to others in the church arise from our Baptism into the church. We are born into a family, and our duties to others stem from our birth into that family. Finally, we are born into society, which is simply a further extension of our birth into our family. The duties we have toward other members of society come from either our own birth or the birth of others into the same society.

All that we have and all that we are ought to be pressed into service for the church, the family and society. If we were to sell all we have and give only to one, the other two would be neglected, and we would falter in fulfilling our duties.

So, consider your life and all that you have in light of these three stations. You pay taxes to support and help those in society. You save for college for your children, and provide food, clothing and shelter for the members of your family.

But the station that is usually thought of last is the church. Since the needs of the family and society are more immediate, the church is often given what is left over. This is not how it should be. Rather, we are to give of our first fruits, from off the top, the best, even as Abel gave the best of his flock.

This requires forethought. It means that you sit down and make a plan of what you will give from the beginning. It means sticking to it even when it seems that there are other more immediate and pressing things.

And this is all the more necessary now as we enter into periods of time where giving is low due to high unemployment or where restrictions on meeting in church limit opportunities to give. If we love God and His gifts of forgiveness given through the means of grace, which we receive at church and only at church, then we will support it, just as we love our country and our family. For all that we have and all that we are is given to us by our gracious God. He spared no expense for us and our salvation. He gave up His Son to death so that our sins are forgiven, and we will live. What's more, He provides for all that we need for this body and life. And our lives in this world, among these three spheres of church, family and society are to mirror the generosity of the one who gave us life in all three at birth.

Don't let the church, your divine family, be an afterthought or even ignored. It is nurturing you, bringing you up in salvation through Word and Sacrament.

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Athanasian Creed Section One Trinity in Unity and

Encore Post: Saint Athanasius was bishop and patriarch of Alexandria, Egypt (under Roman control) from 328-373 AD. He attended the First Council of Nicaea in 325 AD as secretary to his predecessor, Alexander. Athanasius was ordained as bishop and patriarch after Alexander's death. In his 48 years presiding over the region, he was exiled five times, by four different Roman emperors, for a total of 17 years, over theological controversies in North Africa.

Each of the three sections of the creed begins with similar language. The Nicene and Apostles' Creeds start with "I believe..." But, the Athanasian Creed takes a different approach. Rather than solely confessing together with one voice. Here, we also exhort one another, "Whoever desires to be saved must, above all, hold the catholic faith." Then, in each section, we confess the catholic faith.

We Lutherans need not fear the word "catholic." The term catholic does not refer to the modern Roman Catholic Church, but rather to the universal, invisible, orthodox, faithful church of Christ on earth. We retain the use of the term "catholic" in the Athanasian Creed in opposition to the papal church of Rome. "Catholic" simply means "universal," and as such, we boldly confess it from our Lutheran identity.

The first section addresses the unity of our Triune God. He is uncreated, infinite, and eternal, "not three Gods, but one God." This language rejects Subordinationism, that the Son and the Spirit are less God than that Father is God. Rather, God is of one substance. Subordinationism was in part an over correction for the error of modalism. Subordinationists were seeking to clarify the distinctness of person within the Trinity. Their over correction created a theological position that hedged upon tritheism. In an attempt to protect our understanding from merging God into just one thing of only one sort, they created an understanding where God can easily be three things of three sorts. And these three, loosely connected God characters, have a hierarchy within their pantheon. This is an error.

The *modalist* error is also addressed by the second section of the Creed. This serves to remind us that the opposite of an error isn't always a truth. Sometimes the opposite of an error can simply be an error, in the opposite direction.

"But the Godhead of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit is one: the glory equal, the majesty coeternal." The Godness of the Trinity is whole and one. The attributes of God in His unity are shared and are one: uncreated, infinite, eternal, and almighty. But, these are not a dozen attributes, four of each, unique to each person. There are four attributes that each person possesses as one. There are not three gods, but one God. There are not three lords, but one Lord. There are not three eternals, but one Eternal. We worship one God in Trinity and Trinity in Unity.

Don't let yourself be dismayed or discouraged by these complicated understandings. They were intense struggles for the early church and remain intellectual difficulties for us today. The big takeaway from the Athanasian Creed is that we can never fully understand the Trinity. We can, with the help of the fathers of the faith before us, identify those things that are outside the proper understanding.

Dear Baptized, let us celebrate the Trinity in Unity and the Unity in Trinity!

- RP Lumber no longer gives us a tax-exempt status due to changes in their corporate office.

Elders: Jeff reported the following:

- The Introit will now become a responsive reading with every other sentence spoken by the congregation
- A Lutheran Study Bible will be presented to all youth participating in confirmation classes. The purchase will be taken from the elders' budget.
- There was discussion regarding the June 25 New Members Brunch.

Jeff's report was accepted and approved.

Trustees: Chuck submitted a written report.

- Pat and Jeff Emery have tended to mowing needs.
- Chuck repaired the ceiling in the downstairs ladies' room with assistance from Don Springer.
- Chuck used his weed eater around the cemetery fence, the front ditches, the ditch behind the parking lot, and around several trees.
- Chuck applied weed killer below the driveway, behind the cemetery fence, and the front culvert.

- He removed four wheelbarrows of dirt from the culvert
