
Where Are You From? Happy or Sad?

feel blessed to live at Treetops Condos on Horseshoe Bend overlooking the main channel of the Lake near the 13 mm. Besides watching boats cruise the water, eagles soar overhead daily, squirrels, and various small birds perch on my patio. Right below me is one of the outdoor pools and within 100 feet is a very nice indoor pool. I've always liked to swim and years ago I earned my Boy Scout Lifesaving Merit Badge. My two granddaughters in Russellville are in their third year as lifeguards at their city pool; a great summer job for college students. I try to swim daily in the pool here and I usually ask one or more people where they're from. As you can guess, the answer is typically St. Louis, Kansas City, or elsewhere. Strangely, this week there were occasions when two people said Fenton and House Springs, MO which are the two nearest towns to where my oldest son lives; and one of

them graduated from Herculaneum High School where my wife went to school. The next day a lady said she was originally from Crystal City, which is where I am from. Her two cousins went to school with me all 12 years. And yesterday, a lady said she was from Southeast Oklahoma. It turns out that she lives about 20 miles from Ada and I know exactly where her road is. What a small world! But while I am always curious about their geographical home, if possible, I try to learn more about their life, and invariably you find what one might expect: Happiness or sorrow. The lady from my hometown re-



vealed that she lost her husband quite suddenly two years ago. He was only in his fifties. When I told her that I was a Lutheran pastor, she said that she was



Catholic, but hadn't gone to church since his death. She was troubled also because a friend had told her that she was really weak in her faith. She began asking several "why" questions—the kind which usually don't have an answer or at least not a satisfactory one. I used the opportunity to share that we live in a sinful world, filled with much pain and suffering; and even Jesus Christ, although born without sin, endured an earthly life filled with suffering. Ultimately, He suffered more than any of us probably ever will. Jesus said, "The Son of Man must suffer many things" (Mark 8:31). Born to suffer and die, He submitted

to His Father's will, fulfilling a perfect plan to bear our sin and deliver us from death. Therefore we are comforted in our suffering, knowing that this Christ Child is the long awaited promise, come down to earth to give us forgiveness, life, and salvation. Psalm 119:50 says, "This is my comfort in my

continued

affliction, that your promise gives me life." The Babe, the promise, has come to be the sacrifice, so that those who are baptized in His death might live the perfect life with Him to eternity. Paul reminds us in Romans 5 that our "suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not put us to shame" (3-5). For it is in Christ that we find our true joy, having this hope and rejoicing in the suffering that drives us to Him again and again, knowing "that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us" (Rom 8:18). His strength is made perfect in weakness, so when we are weak, we are strong in Christ (2 Cor 12:9-10). He is the only perfection we need to seek. A life without a long-time spouse or with a chronic disease is not anyone's picture of the perfect life, but the perfect life is not perfect because it has no suffering; rather, the perfect Life was made perfect through suffering (Heb 2:10), which means salvation for all. For where suffering is, God is not absent—there, God is working! Our Immanuel was born among us, enduring the Passion and humiliation of the cross, and He is still with us, giving us His perfection in His Word and Sacraments. He is with you, and you can be confident "that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ" (Phil 1:6). The lady at the pool even asked me how she should pray. She was eager to grow in her faith and find peace. The Lord not only works in mysterious ways, but He oftentimes uses us to accomplish His mysterious ways. Praise be to God! Pastor Brandt




Game Night a Success

Everyone His Witness

Witnessing is proclaiming God's Word to unbelieving people.

"But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, **that you may proclaim** the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light." (1 Peter 2:9)

By nature, witnessing demands sharing to unbelievers by speaking or writing of God's Word – a Means of Grace - as the Holy Spirit works faith in them. The Means of Grace also includes Baptism and Holy Communion, but the Word of God is the Means of Grace most available to us as witnesses. There are many ways to prepare people to hear God's Word just as there are many ways to share God's Word with them. The Miracle of DNA continued


We know that DNA is the fundamental building block of life. Every living cell is a chemical factory that takes raw material and processes them and constructs products that can be used by the cell as well as by other parts of the organism. The living cell also functions like a computer. The computer center (cell nucleus) contains a biological library of files where all the blueprints and instruction manuals for the organism are stored. These are necessary for the

building and replication of all life which are stored in code form on DNA much like on compact disks. – remember A,T,C,G from last month. When a cell is damaged, a messenger (mRNA) is sent to the genetic library to make a copy of the blueprints and instructions (DNA) for repairing the damaged area. When copying is complete, mRNA heads off to the damaged site where it

area. When copying is complete, mRNA heads off to the damaged site where it builds little robots (specific protein mole-

cules) from the blueprints to repair the damage. This is a fundamental explanation on how a living cell functions but at the same time it shows just how complex it is. How could these processes have come about accidentally? Where did all of the information that every living cell uses come from? The chemical messages could not have caused the messages any more than the chemicals in ink and paper can cause a message to be written down. Like the program in a computer, it must have had someone do the programming since it could not have programmed itself. That and the specified complexity of the processes involved point to an all knowing, all powerful being. And that being is God - the creator of Heaven and Earth!! *More to come next month*. has afforded us. We are right to do this. We should be thankful for these liberties – the freedom to gather together to worship and to live out what believe in our daily lives.


But freedom and liberty in our age have devolved. It has become a freedom from duty instead of a freedom for it. Indeed, freedom and liberty in our age

Returning to the Communion Rail

Dear Christian Friends.

The Elders and Pastors are pleased to announce we will return to a more normal communion format beginning, Sunday, July 4.

A great deal of time was spent discussing this return. Many things were taken into account, including the long history of receiving communion kneeling or standing at the rail before the altar.

Our COVID practice of taking the body and blood of our Lord and Savior Jesus to our congregation and visitors in the pew has served us well. That was what we have done for individuals who could not physically come to the rail for years.

Beginning Sunday, July 4, we will return to our normal communion with these modifications:

• We will continue to ask our congregation to pick up their

- service folders at the credenza in the Narthex.
- The offering plate will continue to be located at the rear of the church, so as to not handle or pass them during the service.
- Pastors and assisting Elders will continue to sanitize their hands before the Service of the Sacrament.
- We will continue to utilize the individual cups for communion.
- Ushers will direct an aisle or pew to rise and move to the rail. Please maintain the same social distancing at the rail, that you had I the pew.
- Once you have received communion and the blessing, return to your pew, maintain the same social distancing as before communion.
- If you are unable to come to the rail, or if you would prefer to receive communion in your pew, remain in the pew when the ushers ask the people in your pew to move the rail. At the end of communion, the Pastor will ask those remaining in the pew, desiring to receive communion to rise and the Pastor and assisting Elder will bring communion to those recipients.

We will also resume coffee service after our worship service, and Bible study will begin at 10:30 a.m. in the Friendship Hall.

The minutes from the May 11, 2021 meeting were approved as printed.

Financial Secretary: Jeff Emery presented Vicki's report. The report was accepted and approved.

Treasurer: Rita presented her report. Her report was accepted and approved.

Elders: There was no report.

Ushers: Bob Borgmann reported the following:

- Due to a large number of visitors on May 30, the tape blocking off pews is strewn about.
- The council decided that all tape should be removed.

His report was accepted and approved.

Member at Large: No report

Trustees: Susan presented Chuck's report.

• Jeff Emery, Pat Callahan, and Chuck have all spoken with the roofing company under contract. Due to excessive rain, they plan to begin our job in about two weeks.

- On May13, Chuck used the weed eater around both sides of the cemetery fence, sprayed for weeds and purchased mowing fuel.
- Jeff Emery mowed the cemetery on May 25 and June 5.
- Pat Callahan and Chuck mowed on May 14, May 26, and June 5.
- Chuck removed and sharpened the tractor blades and took the recycling material on May 18.
- On May 19, Chuck met with Straight Flush Plumbing.
 They replaced a leaking line on the water filtering system.
- Chuck replaced a toilet seat bolt in the upstairs ladies room, replaced a flush handle in the downstairs ladies room and replaced fittings in a kitchen sink on May 30.

Chuck's report was accepted and approved. The council appreciates his time and work.

Education: No Report

Evangelism: Russell reported the following:

- Dues for membership in the Lake West and Camdenton Chambers of Commerce are paid.
- The June Life line Screening is fully booked. (55 slots) He will open the downstairs at 8:15 that morning. He sent thank you notes to the media for their advertising of the event.
- Main Street Opry is opening on June 10. Russell tried contacting them to learn if they are running ads.

Stewardship: Dawn reported the following:

- She received a thank you note from The Pregnancy Crisis Center for our \$89.00 donation. She will deliver one of our pamphlets to them.
- Diane Borgmann purchased notebooks for new member books.
- She requested that members continue to bring cans for recycling and thanked Bob and Penny Hansen for delivering them.
- She noted that Sheryl Bald is doing a wonderful job of publishing our newsletters.

Dawn's report was approved and accepted.

Cemetery: Diane reported the following:

- On June 5, she and Dawn Hedberg installed soaker hoses in two flower beds. Jeff Emery assisted when he finished mowing. The installation will be completed when there is a dry Saturday and help is notified.
- The cemetery checking account balance is \$2,525.95

Diane's report was approved and accepted.

Pastor's Reports: There were no reports.

President's Reports: Jeff reported the following:

Old Business:

- A review is being conducted regarding the State of Missouri requirements for the registering our cemetery for perpetual care. The cost of registering a cemetery is considerably less than what was originally thought \$2,500.00 vs. \$25,000.00.
- He and Mic Carlson will review and evaluate the necessary steps to complete the registration.

• Parking lot resurfacing will be scheduled when the roof work is completed.

New Business:

- The upgrade of the parking lot lighting has been completed. The cost was \$200.00 less than the estimate. We paid \$1,300.00 for the work.
- Evangelism teams will be established to follow up on the contacting of visitors and potential new members.
- A committee has been established to review the installing of a new church sign. The members are: Bob Hansen (chairman), Sheryl Bald, and Carol Murrell. The committee met on June 8, 2021. Pastor Brandt and Mic Carlson were also present at the meeting.
- A committee to determine the donating to missions as per the April 20, 2021 Voters Meeting has been set up.
 Dawn Hedberg, Paula Emery and Vicki Lamb are the committee members.
- Jeff thanked Sara Anderegg for organizing the monthly game night. Fourteen members attended.
- Vacation Bible School planning is in progress. It will be held the first week in August.

Jeff's reports were approved and accepted.

The meeting was adjourned. Pastor Brandt led the board in closing with The Lord's Prayer.
