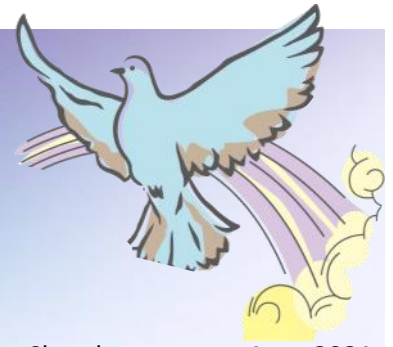

Returning to Normal after the Pandemic

W^{hew!} It seems that our country is close to returning to normal, at least with regard to the abnormal things the coronavirus brought on. There are fewer mandates, less people trying to dictate, and more and more places allowing us to take off our masks. The so-called new normal is approaching with good speed. I, for one, am relieved that we’ve made it through the hardest part of the pandemic, the loss of loved ones. But I dare say there’s more we need to do to get back to a good normal here at Peace.

The elders, Pastor Brandt, and I are in the process of discussing which of the changes we made, at the beginning and during the pandemic that should now be reversed. Our goal is to get even closer to normal before, during, and after the Sunday morning service. So I would like to lay a foundation with some gentle suggestions. I will approach the first topic rather bluntly . . .

We sort of stumbled into at least one change in practice that was very well received; that being that we all remain seated in the pews and have the pastor and elder bring the body and blood of Christ to us during the service. That, possibly along with the song/hymn “One Bread, One Body” seemed to strike a chord with quite a few members of the congregation. Eating the Body of Christ *together* and drinking the blood of Christ *all at the same time, together* was and is very meaningful to many of you, as well as to myself. Indeed, I had a wonderful professor who, at some time during the thirty hours of class we had on the topic of the Lord’s Supper said, “We are bodied and blooded together into one Body”—a statement that flows directly from 1 Corinthians 10:15-17. But having communion in our seats is *not* what we’ve normally done over twenty-nine years of the thirty-one the congregation existed. And, to be blunt, it’s not something other Missouri Synod churches have done or do.



Wouldn’t it be both ironic and tragic if we were to end up having a “knock down, drag out” over the question of when and how to return to the communion rail? Wouldn’t the Old Evil Foe just love to see us divided into factions because of something that is known as an adiaphora (that which is neither commanded nor forbidden by Scripture)? And so, my first gentle suggestion is to be patient. Perhaps there is a way for us to have our oneness and eat it to. I have an idea in mind, but it would be inappropriate for me to discuss it here

all, those who are “called” to make decisions about what is best for the spiritual well-being of the congregation.

When will we return to having some form of goodies after the service, taking down the tape that is currently separating folks into six-footed segments, or having the pastor not wear a mask when he speaks the words of institution? These are all good and godly questions. Some of them seem to be almost answering themselves as we feel more and more free. At the same time—and more *importantly*—we do well to look around and see whether any of our sisters or brothers is feeling uncomfortable. I could write anywhere from 3 to 10 pages, easily, about how Scripture tells us to care for our siblings in Christ, but I trust that it is not necessary. I trust that you trust me when I say that under normal circumstances we do not make sweeping changes abruptly in the church. I have heard it said that one of the mottos of one of our armed forces is to leave no man behind. So it’s possible, perhaps even very likely, that returning to normal will go slower than the changes that were thrust upon us by the pandemic.

I encourage you to be patient with the leaders you have chosen and with every member of the congregation. A “new normal” is on its way, and we will rejoice to see its day!

The Miracle of DNA

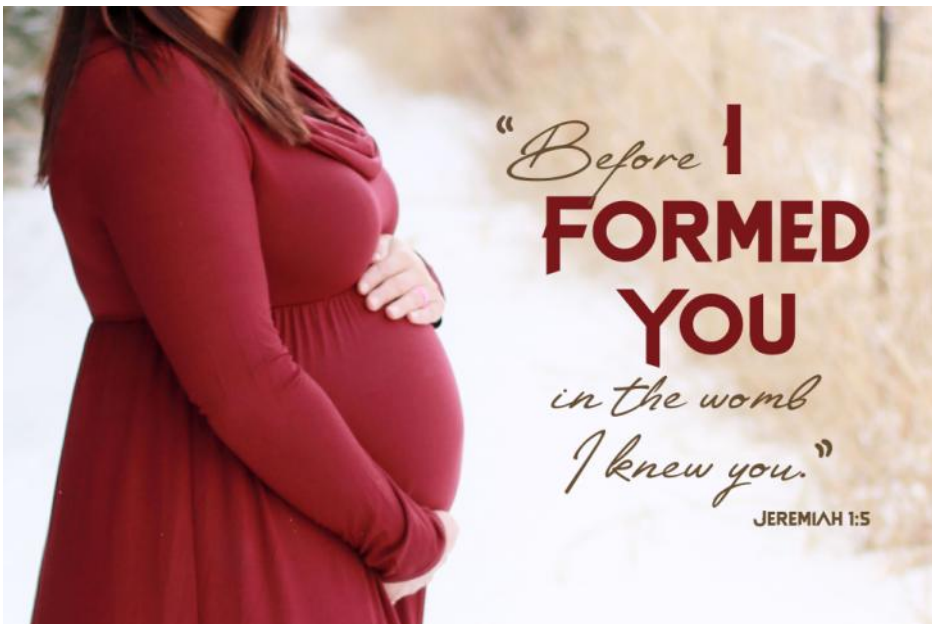

I Don't Have Enough Faith to be an Atheist by Geisler and Turok

For the moment forget the Darwinist assertions about humans descending from apes or birds evolving from reptiles. The big problem for atheists is the origin of first life. They say that life was made spontaneously from nonliving substances, which is not a simple idea. This became clear when DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid – the chemical that encodes instructions for building and reproducing all life - was discovered. DNA has a structure that resembles a twisted ladder of which sides are made of alternating molecules of deoxyribose and phosphate and rungs made of four nitrogen bases in a specific order. These bases – adenine (A), thymine (T), cytosine (C), guanine (G) – communicate specific messages in the countless ways they are placed in a precise order. The information given by all of the messages in one living cell nucleus is said to exceed what is in the pages of all thirty volumes of

the Encyclopedia Britannica. In the single cell of an ameba, multiply that by 1000. So, think of these letters A T C G as a genetic alphabet. And like our English alphabet when placed in a specific order spell out messages and information. This genetic alphabet spells out the direction for every living entity, giving them their structure, identity, and biological processes. These messages, therefore, determine the unique genetic makeup of that living entity whether plant or animal. This incredible specified complexity of life becomes evident considering that several thousand one celled amoebas in a line could fit in an inch - and even more so when you consider the genetic messages contained therein. The evidence of DNA most certainly points to the Creator of Heaven and Earth. There is much more to say on the complexity of life; more to follow in next month's installment.

Every One His Witness

What does a witness do? Speak what you know to be true. "What no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor the heart of man imagined, what God has prepared for those who love Him – these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit. For the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God Now we have received not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit who is from God, that we might understand the things freely

given us by God." (1 Corinthians 2:9 -10, 12) All Christians share in a corporate calling and have a role to play as a member of the body of Christ. This "Great Commission" calls us to go out and make "disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you". While we entrust much of the corporate work

of the Great Commission to men who have been called into the Office of Public Ministry – baptizing, conducting worship services, administering the Lord's Supper, leading Bible studies – each and every believer has an active role. So, what does a witness do? Witnesses speak of what they know to be true. One can tell of what they have seen in an automobile accident without explaining how an engine works, amount of force exerted, amount of energy released by the impact and how it is dissipated by the crumple zones of the vehicles – unless, of course, they just happen to know. Most of us would just tell what we saw and know. As a witness of Christ, you aren't expected to tell people what you don't know, but by what you do know. And you know quite a bit! You know His Word, His love and His grace. You are a firsthand witness of God's love and grace in Christ Jesus. You became a witness to His death and resurrection when you were buried and raised with Him in Holy Baptism. You became a witness to His life and presence by touching and tasting Him in the Holy Supper. You are witness to His compassion and mercy by living in His grace each and every day. As an authentic witness of Jesus, you know God's word to be true and you share it with people so they can come to know His love, mercy, and grace. Sharing the good news that Jesus has paid for the sins of the whole world so that other people can come to know and might have what we have – that's what a witness does. The Head, the Purse, the Heart

“There are three conversions necessary to every man: the head, the heart, and the purse.” Attributed to Luther, though yet to be located in his vast writings, this statement echoes what Jesus taught about hearts and treasures. He said, **“For where your treasure is, here will your heart be also.”**

(Matthew 6:21; Luke 12:34)

But which conversion comes first? I submit that the order is this: first the head, then the purse, then the heart. Let’s explore this topic.

Our Lord Jesus Christ dwelt among us to save us. He took on our flesh, fulfilled the demands of

 the law in our place, became sin for us, and suffered torture and death on our behalf.

He did this in order that we would be free from sin, death, and hell. He gives us what He accomplished through Baptism, Absolution, and the Lord’s Supper. And so, He doesn’t just do it for us but gives it to us. He makes what He did ours by making us His. Thus, we are called by His name: Christians. We have a new life in Him.


Through the preaching of Law and Gospel, God grants us repentance, a changing of our minds. It is a conversion of the mind. We are called to turn away from our sins and turn toward Him for forgiveness, life, and salvation. For when God calls us away from something, He is, at the same time, calling us to something.

And thus, He calls us to a new life, with new deeds. This is the conversion of the purse. Jesus said that “it is easier for a camel to enter through the eye of a needle than

for a rich person to enter the kingdom of God.” (Matthew 19:24) “For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.” Notice that our hearts follow our treasures, not the other way around. As Christians, God calls us to invest our treasures in His Kingdom to ensure that the gospel is preached and the sacraments are administered. He calls us to share all good things with the one who teaches us the doctrines of Christ. He calls us to be generous in giving to the church, for it is more blessed to give than to receive.

So where is your treasure? If it is not invested in the kingdom of God, then the only response is repentance – a conversion of the heart – and to begin doing just that. And as our Lord promised, where your treasure is there your heart will be also.

This is not to say that you earn your way into heaven. It is simply

 to say that as Christians, those who have been made to be temples of the Holy Spirit, who have

been given a new life in Christ, who are dead to sin and now alive in Him, we are actually to live – think (conversion of the mind), do (conversion of the purse), and be (conversion of the heart) – a new life in Him. And when you fail, know that God in Christ loves and forgives you and still calls you away from that and to Himself.

In fact, George Washington Carver called nature “an unlimited broadcasting station, through which God speaks to us every hour, if we will only tune in.” And Martin Luther said, “God writes the Gospel not in the Bible alone, but also on trees, and in the flowers and clouds and stars.”

Luther also noted: “At home, in my own house, there is no warmth or vigor in me, but in the church when the multitude is gathered together, a fire is kindled in my heart and it breaks its way through.” When we’re away from God’s house, we miss blessings and opportunities including communion, fellowship and support. So this summer, spend time in nature but don’t neglect “to meet together” (see Hebrews 10:25)!

“For if I preach the Gospel, that gives me no ground for boasting. For necessity is laid upon me. Woe to me if I do not preach the Gospel!”

1 Corinthians 9:16



The apostle Paul leads into this verse sounding a bit disgruntled. He (and Barnabas) are doing the Lord’s work—serving others, teaching them about Jesus, conscientiously working among the Corinthians so as not to be a cause for their stumbling—or grumbling. Yet, still they’re encountering some resistance from those they’re helping and, as a result, they’re having to provide for their own needs—even as they’re serving others. Ministering under the critical eye of others, Paul puts forth his position to those who are questioning his ministry methods: “This is my defense to those who would examine me. Do we not have the right to eat and drink? Do we not have the right to take along a believing wife, as do the other apostles and the brothers of the Lord and Cephas? Or is it only Barnabas and I who have no right to refrain from working for a living? Who serves as a soldier at his own expense? Who plants a vineyard without eating any of its fruit? Or who tends a flock without getting some of the milk? ... If we have sown spiritual things among you, is it too much if we reap material things from you?” (1 Corinthians 9:3-7, 11). Paul knew his “rights” as a Christ-worker—how those who do such work should be able to draw sustenance and shelter for their work. “But I have made no use of any of these rights, nor am I writing these things to secure any such provision. For I would rather die than have anyone deprive me of my ground for boasting” (1 Corinthians 9:15). Paul knew that the very fact he was sharing Jesus with others was reward enough—regardless of how the Gospel was received. Remember, Paul came from a religious mindset where the thought of telling others about Jesus would have been the most outrageous, most preposterous thing he could have ever had imagined himself doing. But God had won his heart, and here he was: sharing the love of Jesus, telling others how the Heavenly Father had fulfilled all His promises in the life, death, and sin-crushing resurrection of His Son, the Messiah. Paul knew that whatever push-back he received from those he served (in Corinth or elsewhere) was a small hassle indeed compared to what God did to save mankind. Going forward, Paul was compelled to preach the Gospel. It was his necessary duty. And to do so, he endured all sorts of hardships along the way. Paul’s singular mission was to share God’s mercy with others. “I have become all things to all people that by all

means I might save some. I do it all for the sake of the Gospel that I may share with them in its blessings” (1 Corinthians 9:22b-23).

Prayer: Heavenly Father, empower us to share Your Son with others, always thankful for the honor to do so. In Jesus’ Name. Amen.

Evangelism: Russell submitted a written report.
