A Message from Pastor Anderegg

hat memories do you have from your childhood surrounding Lent? It's kind of a strange question, isn't it? We can probably all remember Easter traditions or even the kind of candy the Easter Bunny brought, but memories of Lent might evade our thought process. Off the top of my head, I cannot remember any of the particular Lenten sermon series the different pastors preached. What I do remember is that we went. (I also remember, when I was really little,

wondering how Jesus could have been born in December but be an adult and be hung on the cross only three or four months later.)

On Wednesday night we (my family) went to observe Lent. And after all of those years I still appreciate and value of the "season." It may sound odd, but I even enjoy it! And because I do I thought I'd share a few facts about Lent with you followed by an invitation:

- The dates for Lent work kind of "backward" on the church calendar. If you start by figuring out what day Easter falls on you can back up six weeks to Ash Wednesday. (Back up one more day and you have Fat Tuesday, which is historically the "last hurrah" for Roman Catholics as they and others "pig out" and enjoy as much decadence as possible before observing the somber season of Lent.)
- In 325 AD, the Council of Nicaea established that Easter would be held on the first Sunday after the Paschal full moon, which is the first full moon on or after March 21. Easter thus always falls between March 22 and April 25. (From: www.catholic.com)
- Lent lasts for forty days, but the forty days do *not* include the Sundays that occur during the time period. Every Sunday is supposed to be a "little Easter," because it is the day of the week Jesus rose from the dead.
- During Lent, the Church's worship assumes a more penitential character. The color for the season is purple, a color often associated with penitence. The "Hymn of Praise" is omitted from the liturgy. The word "Alleluia" is usually omitted as well. (This and *all* the following bullet points are taken from www.lcms.org)
- By not using the alleluia a joyful expression meaning "Praise the Lord" until Easter, the Lenten season is clearly set apart as a distinct time from the rest of the year.
- Additionally, Lent forms a powerful contrast with the festive celebration of Jesus' resurrection when our alleluias ring loud and clear.
- Finally, the penitential character of Lent is not its sole purpose. In the ancient Church, the weeks leading up to Easter were a time of intensive preparation of the candidates who were to be baptized at the Easter vigil on Holy Saturday. This time in the Church's calendar was seen as an especially appropriate time for Baptism because of the relationship between Christ's death and resurrection and our own in Holy Baptism (see Rom. 6:1-11).

Too much information! I know. But there's much more if one desires to learn it. But none of that *really* explains why I appreciate, and even like, the season of Lent so much. Basically, it boils down to the fact that our culture focuses so much on being happy and feeling good that we almost wish we had a pill that could take away any and all somberness or sadness. But those "negative" emotions are a part of life as well. Indeed, I remember the pastors in my circuit discussing this topic, about a decade ago, and one pastor seemed proud of his "defiance" of what the rest of us did in the congregations in which each of us served. His church was going to continue having five or six praise and worship songs *every* Sunday because God wants us to praise Him continually. And that was that! He would not be talked out of it.

Some would argue that Lutherans and Catholics just aren't any fun. They're always talking about sin; always being made to feel bad. I would argue (indeed I'm currently doing so) Roman Catholics, Lutherans and others have a more "rounded experience" than the rest of the world, which tries to avoid any and all sad feelings at all costs. Some even think that Christians are always supposed to be peppy and walk with an extra spring in our step because we're . . . well, just supposed to. Hogwash!

You see, it's not just Lent that I like. It's the entire church year and the system of readings we use (known as the lectionary) that makes for a well-rounded life. Sometimes we are elated! Christmas and Easter are two of those times, but there are many more. Sometimes we are sad and somber because we see (and hear from God's Word) that life is not a bowl of cherries and that sin is a part of our lives and the world "as it turns"

If you don't normally attend Lenten services I want to invite you to start a new tradition during this month of March.

Join Pastor Brandt and myself as we learn more about the "emotions" that were a part of Holy Week and Easter. Here is a preview of some of the different passions/emotions about which Pastor Brandt and I will be preaching during the season . . .

The Passions of the Passion

Confusion - John 14:1-6 - In this discourse on Maundy Thursday evening, the disciples are confused about many things. When we become confused, we often become frustrated.

For a lack of understanding equates to a lack of activity. Jesus spends time with His disciples clearing up their confusion. In so doing, He is preparing them for their future activity as apostles.

Disappointment - Isaiah 53:3-5 - Judas, the Twelve, and ultimately everyone, became disappointed in Jesus. He was not what they expected and wanted. He was "like one from whom men hide their faces." "He was despised, and we esteemed Him not." That's the mystery of the cross. Initially, it's the object of shame and scorn, derision and disappointment. But because of what Jesus did on the cross, now we heartily sing, "In the Cross of Christ I Glory." And with other hymns and statements we are drawn to the cross.

Grief - John 16:16-22 - Jesus recognizes the grief that His disciples will experience, beginning just several hours from that moment. He recognizes that this grief will result from the loss of their Loved One, Jesus. Everyone experiences grief in life as a result of the loss of a loved one, either through death or through geographic relocation. We draw comfort and support in knowing that Jesus understands that grief and that, because of His work, Jesus turns that grief into joy through a reunion with our departed saints.

Fear leads us to do something stupid and senseless. In the case of the disciples in the Garden of Gethsemane, they failed to stand up for what was right. Nothing has changed in people today. When we are afraid, we display a lack of faith. We show a lack of courage. Thus, we sin. In contrast, Jesus courageously faces all opposition; takes on all challengers. After witnessing, not just His courage, but also the result of His courage for our salvation, the disciples and we are encouraged to boldly face all opposition, even as the Christian martyrs did.

Other passions/emotions/experiences upon which we will focus include: anguish, determination, compassion, praise, and, of course, joy! Make this a special Lent by joining us this special series as we make our way to Jerusalem, Pilate's palace, the cross, and finally the empty tomb.

What's Cooking?

Sausage Breakfast Casserole

4 slices bread

1 lb pork sausage

1 1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese

9 eggs

2 cups milk
1 tsp. dry mustard
1 tsp. salt

Dash of pepper

Lightly grease or spray a 9 x 13 inch baking dish. Place bread that has been torn in pieces in baking dish. Brown and drain sausage. Spoon sausage over bread. Sprinkle cheese over sausage. Beat together eggs, milk, dry mustard, salt and pepper. Pour egg mixture over the cheese and sausage in baking dish. Bake in preheated 325 degree oven for 50 to 55 minutes or until it is set in the center. Prepare the night before; cover with foil and refrigerate, then bake the next morning.

Here's What's Happening at Peace

ebruary is historically a reasonably quiet month at Peace. That has not been the case this year. In fact, we have been busy as a congregation.

We are converting our membership and giving records to a new system, Power Church Plus. Pastor Anderegg gave us a hand in transferring some of the base information from the old Shepherd's Staff. Then Vicki Stauch took that base and set up our membership information and the contribution record keeping. Thanks to both Pastor and Vicki for their assistance and diligence. Both Vicki and I believe this is going to be easier to utilize and maintain.

While we have the organ working again, we will continue to utilize the Concordia organist music for our services. After authorization from the Voters Assembly we purchased an iPod. Each week we will put that week's music on the iPod and utilizing our speaker system, play the music we utilize in our services. We will be recruiting two or three people to be responsible for operating the iPod and assisting with the liturgy and hymns. Every one of our children and grandchildren could do this with their eyes closed, but while older, we are trainable. Thanks to all for suffering through the learning period.

The various conversions are being made from our old computer to the new one. Next up is converting Lutheran Service Builder from the old computer to the new, and converting from a dial up system to an online system. This should be accomplished the first week in March. You will not notice anything different; our weekly service

When we get all this complete in March, the new computer is much faster and easier to operate. This computer is utilized by Rita Riemann in her treasurer function, Vicki Stauch in the financial secretary function, the president and primarily by the secretary.

Finally the Voter's Assembly has authorized us to get the Carillons and Bells working again (hopefully in March), to have the fence along the south side of the property repaired and replaced (hopefully in May), and for the Stewardship Board to begin a new program of greeting card sales, with the proceeds to go to missions.

We have begun updating our Planning Report for 2019. The combined Planning and Finance Committees will be working with our two Pastors and a coaching service being provided by District to assist us. The coaching is being provided to those churches that participated in a conference last August on Church Planting and Partnering. This will give us five or six online sessions to help us with our planning.

I believe we had a very successful Thrivent Action Team, "Go Nuts for Bible Study" that will pay for the Lutheran Study Bibles that are now being used in our adult Bible study. Thanks to Pastor and Sara Anderegg and the rest of the action team; Jeff and Dawn Hedberg and Sheryl Bald.

More importantly we are seeing improving numbers of attendees at adult Bible study on Sunday mornings after church. Lutheran Apologetics

Reasons We Believe (Special Revelation) Early Testimonies of Jesus' Resurrection

ast month we began the study of apologetics by saying that our apologetic is based on three forms of revelation: general, special, and personal. The general form is often used to provide evidence for God's existence but not necessarily the Christian God. So, for now, we'll begin with the special revelation of our Lord Jesus Christ - the usual Lutheran approach and take up the general and personal evidence in future issues. There is no better place to begin then with the fact that on the third day Jesus' tomb was empty. What are reasons to believe this is true? How can we know? First off, we have the eyewitness testimony in the Gospels. In a court of law eyewitness testimony is paramount, but it must be credible to be effective. There are many reasons to believe that the Gospels are credible. Because the empty tomb presents a problem to unbelievers, skeptics, and atheists alike, many have tried to make the point that the New Testament was written in the second century AD and, therefore, are not from eyewitnesses, and so are not reliable accounts, but rather legionary myths. Some even suggest that Jesus never existed at all and was the invention of an early second century cult. However, the evidence points in the opposite direction. The early Church knew the writings to be apostolic and most were written within two generations from the resurrection. To be apostolic they had to be written by evewitnesses either directly or indirectly. As F.F. Bruce in his book New Testament Documents stated, "The New Testament books did not become authoritative because they were formally included in the canonical list; the church included them because she already regarded them as divinely inspired." Early Church lead-

because she already regarded them as divinely inspired." Early Church leaders Tertullian (A.D. 160-220), Papias (A.D.60-135) a disciple of John, Justin Martyr (A.D.100 -165) and Irenaeus, a student of Polycarp - who also was a student of the Apostle John - all corroborated that the Gospels were directly written under Divine authority by Apostles John, Matthew, and Peter (through Mark) and also Luke (through Paul and many others). While there are no original NT documents, there is an abundance of early manuscripts or copies - 5,700 in Greek, 9,000 in other languages – nearly 15,000 as reported by Geisler and Turek in 2004, which vastly out number manuscripts from any other ancient writings. (Homer's Iliad is next with 643) The 27 New Testament books is a collection of sources that were written by nine authors over a 20 – 50 year period beginning around A.D. 50 when the Gospel of Mark is believed to have been written. That's within 20 years after the resurrection, and too early to have been legionary. There's strong evidence that Acts, written by Luke, was authored around A.D.62 and therefore, since the gospel of Luke is considered a continuation of Acts, the gospel would had to have been written earlier. Further, there is also no mention of the fall of Jerusalem around A.D. 70 in any of the books. That extremely important event would have been mentioned if those books were written any later. There are many early non-Christian sources as well. First century Roman historian Flavius Josephus finished his work Antiquities of The Jews in A.D. 93. In book 18, ch.3, sect. 3 he mentions Jesus, that he was a wise virtuous man, that many Jews and Gentiles became his disciples, and that Pilate condemned him to death by crucifixion. That his disciples reported to see him three days after his death, that he rose from the dead, and was considered the Messiah of the prophets. There are at least nine more non-Christian sources written within 150 years of Jesus' life such as those written by Tacitus, Celsus, and the Talmud, (considered anti-Christian) that tell of Jesus' life including: He worked miracles, had a brother James, lived during the reign of Tiberius Caesar, was virtuous, was considered to be the Messiah, was crucified by Pilate on Passover eve, that darkness and an earthquake occurred when he died, his disciples said he rose from the dead and were willing to die for that belief, that Christianity spread rapidly throughout the region as his disciples worshiped Him as God instead of Roman gods. That puts to rest the notion that Jesus never existed and helps to affirm the early testimony of the Gospels. Remember, also, that most people were illiterate at the time and news was spread mostly by word of mouth so writing down the Gospel account was not necessary at first. **Next month:** more on eyewitness testimony

Some will oppose you. Speaking of Jesus is likely to stir things up in a world held captive and ruled by Satan. Still you cannot keep silent. Christ has called you to be His witness. In the midst of the challenges we are reminded to "love His appearing." His first appearing when he gave His holy life as a ransom and rose victorious from the grave, and His second, when He will come to judge the living and the dead. We proclaim his first appearing so that other people can come to love and look forward to His second appearing.

Prayer: Dear God. Thank you for the free gift of eternal life in Christ Jesus. Help me to share the news of this important and valuable gift. In Jesus' Name, amen.

We are at the beginning of Lent. During the Lenten season, the church calls to our attention the sufficiency of what God gives. It points to the sufficiency of God's grace in the atoning work of Jesus. It shows us the sufficiency of faith in Jesus' work for us. It makes known the sufficiency of God's Word in faith and life.

But Lent doesn't just remind us of the sufficiency of God's spiritual gifts, the gifts that pertain to our redemption and salvation. Lent also reminds us of the sufficiency of the physical, temporal gifts of God, those that pertain to this body and life. In other words, it reminds us of the importance of godly contentment and of outward discipline and training of the body.

This outward training of the body teaches us not to give in to every desire of our flesh but to learn to say no to them. And it does this in such a way that if you fail, it is no sin. It is a way to practice without putting yourself into a compromising situation.

The easiest example of this is fasting. When you fast, you are practicing saying no to the desires of your body. But if you fail in this, if you break your fast, you have not sinned. You have, though, learned something

have not sinned. You have, though, learned something about how your flesh works, how difficult it is to fight against it, and how you need help from above in order to do it.

There is another example of this. It is alms-giving. This is an increase in giving to the church and its mission during this time. We all know that our flesh finds security in money and stuff. By committing to give more to the church, you are training your flesh. You are, by this outward discipline, training yourself to be content with what God gives. You are practicing saying "no" to your desires. Again, if you fail, you have not sinned. But you've learned just how powerful your flesh is in leading you instead of you leading it. You've learned how you need help from above in being content with what God gives.

This is why St. Paul instructs young Pastor Timothy in this way:

"But godliness with contentment is great gain, for we brought nothing into the world, and[a] we cannot take anything out of the world. But if we have food and clothing, with these we will be content. But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs." (1 Tim 6:6–10)

Our sufficiency is not of ourselves; it is in God. Let us learn this without sin by training our flesh this Lenten season.
