# **Glittering Vices**

### A Series of Services for the Season of Lent

lices are habitual dispositions of the sinful heart that show forth the reality that we, as people of God, fail to fear, love, and trust in God above all things. In place of God, vices cling to the self, or the

things of this world, in an attempt to secure our own good. We seek justice, and don't trust God to provide it, so we take justice into our own hands and lash out in anger at our enemies. We want status, but instead of seeking our worth in knowing Jesus, we envy others and tear them down. Indeed, vices "glitter" with the appearance of



providing "do-it-yourself" short-cuts to happiness. But while they look good on the surface, in the end, they turn out to be idols that fail us every time.

In the passion account of our Lord, we find these vices manifesting themselves time and time again as broken people live their sinful lives. The disciples show their greed when the Lord is anointed with expensive perfume and they label the money as "wasted." Judas betrays our Lord for the false security of silver he can hold in his hands. Prideful Peter boasts his faith is so strong he will never betray the Lord. *Slothful* disciples slumber in Gethsemane, unable to watch with our Lord even a single hour. Scripture says it was out of envy that the Pharisees and the Sadducees delivered up Jesus for crucifixion.

When we do endeavor to fear, love, and trust in God above all things, we increasingly free our hearts from the grips of idolatrous vice, and are enabled to pursue holy habits—habits that run intentionally counter to our unholy penchants. Instead of being greedy, we strive to be generous. In place of pride, we learn humility. Rather than to be slothful and lazy, we pursue the tasks of the Kingdom with diligent zeal. Instead of hating our enemies in anger, we forgive them, pray for them, and even serve them in Christian love.

As we journey through the passion account once again this Lenten season, we invite you to peer into the story through the lens of virtue and vice. As you do, examine your own sinful heart to recognize the vices that dwell deep within. ears ago, it was one of the highlights of the summer for a family to go to a state or county fair. Of course, very few of today's local fairs have the significance and importance of London's Crystal Palace Exhibition which opened in 1851. It was the golden age of steam. On display were steam plows, steam locomotives, steam looms, steam organs, and even a steam cannon. Among all those wonderful exhibits, the first-prize winner was a steam invention composed of 7,000 parts. When the machine was turned on,



its pulleys, whistles, bells, and gears made a lot of noise. Unfortunately, the steam contraption didn't do a thing! Really. Nothing. This all goes to prove noise and movement don't always equal accomplishment.

When I look at our expressways I wonder if some of our comings and goings might not fit under that same category: movement without accomplishment. Look at the people, all rushing from place to place, many of them impatient, frustrated. People-like

the moving parts in the contraption above-can move about a lot but not necessarily accomplish much in terms of merit, importance, or lasting quality. All too often noise and movement have taken the place of purpose and accomplishment.

Those of us who know the Savior should be thankful Jesus has given our lives a little fuller aspect. Because we have a God who cares for us and a Savior who has redeemed us, we have been given a direction, a purpose, a job to do: our job is to share His great grace and sacrifice with an unbelieving world. That's not to say I'm going to change the world. I can't. That is the Holy Spirit's job. My job is to put myself into the hands of the Maker and do what

He wants me to do. And what He wants is for Christians to have spiritual children.

here's a terrible lie in our culture regarding people's success in life. This lie claims that some people are "self-made" men or women. The idea behind this lie is that people are in control of their lives and have made their way from little or nothing to great success by making the best

### **Soft Tissue In Dinosaurs**

Fossil Record Continued

It should be mentioned that scientists now admit that "soft tissue" is frequently found in dinosaur bones. Soft tissue is all the tissue in the body that is not hardened by the ossification or calcification like bones and teeth i.e. muscle, tendons, ligaments, fat, fibrous tissue, lymph, blood vessels, and membranes. ### Lenten Discipline: Denying the Self

e are at the beginning of Lent. During the Lenten season, the church calls to our attention the sufficiency of what God gives. It points to the sufficiency of God's grace in the atoning work of Jesus. It shows us the sufficiency of faith in Jesus' work for us. It makes known the sufficiency of God's Word in faith and life.

But Lent doesn't just remind us of the sufficiency of God's spiritual gifts — the gifts that pertain to our redemption and salvation. Lent also reminds us of the sufficiency of the physical, temporal gifts of God which pertain to this body and life. In other words, it reminds

us of the importance of godly contentment and of outward discipline and training of the body.

This outward training of the body teaches us not to give in to every de-



sire of our flesh, but to learn to say no to them. And it does this in such a way that if you fail, it is no sin. It is a way to practice without putting yourself into a compromising situation.

Fasting is a good example of this outward training. When you fast, you are practicing saying no to the desires of your body. But if you fail in this, if you break your fast, you have not sinned. But you have learned something about how your flesh works, how difficult it is to fight against it, and how you need help from above to discipline the desires of your body.

Another example is almsgiving. An increase in giving to the church and its mission during Lent is also a form of outward training. We all know that our flesh finds security in money and stuff. By committing to give more to the church, you are training your flesh. You are, by this outward discipline, training yourself to be content with what God gives. You are practicing saying "no" to your desires. Again, if you fail, you have not sinned. But you've learned just how powerful your flesh is — it leads you instead of you leading it. You've learned how you need help from above in being content with what God gives.

This is why St. Paul instructs young Pastor Timothy in this way:

But godliness with contentment is great gain, for we brought nothing into the world, and we cannot take anything out of the world. But if we have food and clothing, with these we will be content. But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs. (1 Tim. 6:6–10)

Our sufficiency is not of ourselves; it is in God. Let us learn this without sin by training our flesh this Lenten season.

# Council Meeting February 21, 2023

Vice President Brock Kliewer called the meeting to order at 6:30 P.M. Pastor Anderegg opened with prayer.

The following board members were present: Pastors: Pastor Anderegg, Pres.: Bob Hansen, Vice Pres.: Brock Kliewer, Treas.: Peg Callahan, Sec.: Susan Kral, Trustees: Chuck Kral, Board of Elders: Jeff Hedberg, Board of Education: Sara Anderegg, Cemetery: Diane Borgmann, Stewardship: Dawn Hedberg, Evangelism: Russell Schulz, Member at Large: Paula Emery, and Church Member: Pat Callahan Absent: Financial Sec.: Brett Niebur, Pastor: Gary Brandt

The minutes from the January 2023 meeting were approved as printed.

**Financial Secretary:** A written report was accepted and approved.

**Treasurer:** Peg presented the following:

- Bills are current and paid.
- Mic Carlson assisted in the preparation of 1099 forms for pastors and office staff.
- Mic Carlson will assist in the preparation of church taxes in early March.
- Weekly accounting sheets will be updated.
- All signatures on bank accounts at The Bank of Versailles have been updated to reflect current council membership.
- The Missouri District Convention Assessment bill reflects church membership: we are charged 53 cents per member per year.
- It was agreed that Wednesday evening collections be counted on Sunday mornings so that counters will not stay late on Wednesdays. Deposits will reflect both services.
- Peg requested that a second computer be provided so that work proceeds more efficiently. The council approved the purchase.

The report was accepted and approved.

**Elders:** Jeff had no report.

**Trustees:** Chuck reported the following:

- Chuck contacted Central Mo. All Service Plumbing for major work. All flush valves on urinals were replaced. The urinal in the upstairs men's room had to be removed from the wall because a seal was leaking. The charge for the work totaled \$865.00.
- Chuck replaced the tank seals in the toilet in the upstairs ladies room. The narthex was flooded. Don Springer cleaned up the water.
- Don Springer and his daughter re-vacuumed all the pews. They cleaned the wood on the pews and the altar railings. Don cleaned the carpet on the altar stairs and the carpet in the communion room.

His report was accepted and approved.

**Education:** Sara reported that the LWML will meet in March. Pastor Anderegg will begin a new Bible study. Her report was accepted and approved.

**Evangelism:** Russell reported the following:

- Lake Media will be charging \$9.45 per week to run our ads.
- 180 outreach cards were sent in Jan. The cost was \$160.20
- Life Line Screening is scheduled for our facility on Thursday, June 22, 2023.

• Russell has made Facebook posts and has submitted articles for our monthly newsletter.

His report was accepted and approved.

**Stewardship:** There was discussion regarding budgeted donations to worthwhile causes. Pastor Anderegg suggested that the lion's share be donated to district.

Member at Large: There was no report.

**Cemetery:** Diane will request two Thrivent cards for the purchase of new flowers and for lawn supplies. Her report was accepted and approved.

#### **Pastors' Reports:**

Pastor Brandt submitted a written report.

- He visited Irma Trego on Feb.6 at Lake Regional Hospital. He took communion to her on Feb. 8. He and Linda visited Irma on Feb. 12.
- He visited and took communion to Sam and Sharon Gilliam on Feb. 8.
- He visited with Tammy Snell and Kyle Wright after the Feb. 12 service. They plan to take a New Member Confirmation Class.
- On Feb 7 he attended the Jefferson City/Columbia joint Circuit Pastors' Conference at Christ the King.
- He participated at the Annual Witness Workshop in Jefferson City. Approximately 24 pastors attended.
- On Sunday, Feb.19 he represented Peace Lutheran at the installation of Rev. Stephen Rutherford at Zion Lutheran in Lincoln. MO.
- He is preparing six sermons for Lenten Midweek Services beginning with Ash Wednesday.

Pastor Anderegg reported the following:

- He attended the Jefferson City circuit conference at Christ the King.
- He and Brock worked on the sound system. They checked out the board. It seems to be working properly. Pastor replaced a microphone.
- Our church secretary, Pudge, has requested guidance regarding the procedure for assisting walk-ins requesting financial assistance.
- We now have the setup for a telephone voice system.

- An acceptable bid has been received from John and Sons Tree Removal to remove and clean up debris from the large oak tree by the parking lot light. The total cost will be \$800.00. The council approved the expenditure.
- Mic Carlson is pleased with the progress Pudge has made in learning her new positon. She's doing very well. The council requests that members respect her working hours and not ask her to perform tasks on Sundays. Her office hours are Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays from 8:00 A.M. -1:00 P.M.
- A pay increase for Don Springer was discussed. The matter will be finalized at the next council meeting.
- A new sign will be posted on the front door reflecting the new office hours.

Pastor Anderegg closed with prayer.
