in good repair. Doing that is not just the responsibility of our three Trustees, but all of our responsibility either through our own labors or gifts. We need all of your help to accomplish these things. Believe me, I understand we are all getting older and it is more difficult to physically do these things, but we either need to pitch in to get them done (which has always been rewarding and fun when we have done so), or we are going to need to find a way to pay to have them done.

We can have a Saturday work day, or you can suggest another day during the week when we can tackle these tasks. The weather is turning colder, but we need to get these tasks done.

**Project I**: Repair the fence along the South side of the Cemetery. This is not just dig new post holes, this will require we dig or break out some of the existing holes and posts. Replace at least every other post with one deeper in the ground (probably 4' as oppose to the existing  $2\frac{1}{2}$  feet. Find ways to strengthen the two ends, since this is a straight line fence. I will work with the Trustees to insure you have the equipment and materials necessary to do the job.

**Project 2**: General interior church clean up to include washing the windows. Once again I will work with the Trustees to see that you have the cleaning materials here and available.

**Project 3**: Put up the Christmas decorations on Saturday November 30<sup>th</sup>.

You will find a signup sheets on the credenza for Project 1, November 9, and November 23, for Project 2 November 16, and Project 3 November 30 for you to volunteer your assistance.



t. Paul wrote to the Church of Christ in Corinth: "Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor 9:7). *God loves a cheerful giver*. But who is a cheerful giver?

# Say 'It Ends with Me'

That same night the Lord said to him, "Take the second bull from your father's herd, the one seven years old. Tear down your father's

altar to Baal and cut down the Asherah pole beside it. Judges 6:25

When the angel of the Lord called Gideon, he was threshing wheat at the bottom of a winepress, trying to hid the grain from the Midianites (see v. 11). That's interesting, because God was about to use him to destroy the forces of Midian and liberate Israel. But before he could do so, there were a few family dynamics to be dealt with—like the altar his father built to a false god called Baal. It had been in the family for years. So God said, 'Pull down your father's altar to Baal... Then build an altar to the Lord your God' (vv. 25-26). Understand this: things like anger, addiction, abuse, and affairs may be part of your family history, but they don't have to be part of your future. Not only will God heal your heart and hurts, He will use you to heal the hearts and hurts of your children. The generational rubbish can stop here and now. You don't have to give your kinds what youyr ancestors gave you. Bring it out into the open and lay it before the Lord. Revealing leads to healing. And if having a mature Christian counselor helps, get one! 'Let God transform you into a new person by changing the way you think' (Romans 12:2). No, it won't happen overnight. Damage done to you in the formative years of your life will take time to heal, and God will work with you day by day until He has made you whole. But let the healing begin. Rise up in faith, take control of your life, and declare: 'It ends with me, and it ends here and now.'

Heavenly Father, help me know that in You—a God that gives new beginnings—I can start right now—right here with myself. In Jesus' Name, Amen.



ble of the sower - Matthew and watering terms" sharing is what we do to sow Jesus is something people

desperately need to hear whether they realize it or not. Listening, Asking, and Seeking will tell us what the person is filling their life with in place of Jesus. And whatever that is, it can't take the place of Jesus' love, mercy, and grace. For this purpose Christ sends us to share His Good News to all. We are like the sower who went out into the field and sowed his seed, knowing that not all would fall on good rich soil. The sower was generous in sowing the seed and that is how we are to "sow" God's Word. Generously! Jesus wants us to realize that when sowing the seed of God's Word we needn't be concerned that it bears the desired crop. That is done by the Holy Spirit. Our role is to sow the seed. In 1 Corinthians 3:6-7, the planting and watering that we are called to do is by sowing the Word of the Lord. Paul planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth.

## Speak to a Person's Head, Heart, or Hands

People are apt to listen to what we share when we examine how they connect and communicate. A HEAD person is interested in propositional truth, debating, and exploring ideas, etc. Sharing facts and apologetic resources will resonate best with such a person. Since a HEART person is less concerned about facts and debates, share words of love, hope, and acceptance instead. A HANDS person wants to know how truth works out in practical ways so share how an idea or concept works to make a positive difference. Even though it may feel unnatural or uncomfortable, avoid speaking to them from your own style of communication. Adjusting the mode of communication will not change the message but rather make that message easier for the person to digest. It is not "making God's word relevant" but rather showing how God's Word IS relevant. Even so, how we present God's Word will not make an unbeliever receptive to it because our sinful nature causes them to oppose and reject it. The task is to share the Word so that people will hear and contemplate it.

## What to share: Substance!

Share God's word. It's the only thing that can change the human heart. If we only stimulate a HEAD person intellectually, make a HEART person feel better, or give a HANDS person something practical to do, then we've missed out on sharing the love, life, and salvation of Jesus. Only the Word of Christ can bring the dead back to life. When Jesus said to the twelve," Do you want to go away as well?" Peter answered," Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." (John 6:66-69) Keep the conversation centered around Jesus - share His story.

Sharing God's Word is more than just throwing out a slew of Bible passages like some sort of robo-infomercial. It's about listening, asking, and seeking to see which Bible passages fits the person and the situation and how to go about sharing the Word. One may need to create a narrative or story that accommodates a certain person. Narratives are a powerful, time tested way of sharing, truth, wisdom, and history that sages fits the person and the situation and how to go about sharing the Word. One may need to create a narrative or story that accommodates a certain person. Narratives are a powerful, time tested way of sharing, truth, wisdom, and history that can shape the thinking and identity of those listening. Even so, human stories are limited in that they only tell of what little we know about life, purpose, and meaning. At best they can only inform and entertain. But God's Word is different. It's the greatest narrative and it does what it says. It sets people free from spiritual bondage and brings life from death.

Should you tell your own story? Though you may know your own story and know it well, and no one can argue against it, remember that some will relate to it, others may not. Sometimes telling one's own story is a great way to get to Jesus' story. Sometimes it just gets in the way. Sharing one's story is optional. Sharing Jesus' story is foremost. His story is the only one that brings life and salvation. A witness wants to keep the conversation about Jesus by sharing history.

# What to share: Contextually

Context is essential in sharing God's word. It includes the setting, timing, how one connects, experiences, life circumstances, and the relationship between you and the person you witness to. One must ask and listen to determine the context the other person relates to. Otherwise you may give a "canned" presentation resulting in the person not listening. Consider their age, eagerness or reluctance to hear, and if they are a head, heart, or hands person. Be aware that contexts can change; one may be closed minded one day and open the next. Listen, ask, and seek to understand the context that makes it easier to share God's Word.

## What to share: Law and Gospel

While the Law is not good news for anyone, there can be a place for it in evangelism. But not for everyone. The key is context. Listen, ask, and seek find out a person's position on their sins. One may be comfortable in their sins or not even realize that they are sinful. Then it is proper to speak the Law as the Gospel would be pointless to them. But we must do so in loving kindness and caring rather than being harsh and judgmental by knowing how a person connects and communicates. Sharing the Law is designed to have the person come to realize their sin and need for God's forgiveness. Then they can be open to hearing the Gospel. Plant and water, then trust the Lord to work through it as only He can.

# What to share: Share What You Can

Even though you may Listen, Ask, Seek, and Share, not everyone will listen. When it is frustrating and discouraging, remember your role as a witness is to "plant and water." The Lord provides the growth. Some will be closed to God's word no matter what you say. Share what you can and God will bring the results as he wills. Please share the Good News of Jesus! # **October 15 Voters Meeting**

Following a spaghetti dinner, President Mic Carlson called the meeting to order at 6:30 P.M. He opened with prayer. There were 22 members in attendance. The minutes from the April 16 voters meeting were approved as printed.

**LWML:** Jaccy Heinlein reported they are winding down for the year. They will have an election of officers in November and their LWML Christmas party on December 9<sup>th</sup> hosted by Carol Murrell and Paula Emery. She reminded the members to bring their Christmas Stockings, the proceeds from those along with a gift from Donna Bierbaum, will go to King's Academy at Christ the King towards a program or tuition for the students.

**Thrivent:** Jaccy reminded Thrivent members to be sure and vote by November 23<sup>rd</sup>. If you are a policy holder or have investments, you are eligible to vote.

Thrivent has two Action Teams working right now which is the repairing of the fence by the cemetery and also a reminder that the Trustees will be needing some man power to make that happen.

On October 31 our  $2^{nd}$  annual Trunk or Treat will be held from 4 to 6:30 pm. We will be giving away hot dogs, which Paul Bartels will be grilling in advance. We will be having the registration for the boys and girls bikes, plus handing out candy from the trunks of vehicles. We still need a few more cars for the trunk or treat. Her report was accepted.

## Pastoral Office: Vacant

**President's Report:** Mic began by asking for silent prayers for our dear departed brother in Christ, Jerry Schwab and his wife Diana and family. We greatly miss Jerry, a long time servant here at Peace, who was called home to his Heavenly Father.

- Mic expressed appreciation for the pastoral coverage provided by Pastors Anderegg and Brandt. They have covered worship services, made home and hospital visits and done all that we have asked. We also thank their wives for their patience and understanding.
- He stated that attendance was up thanks to the congregation, our snow birds and many visitors.
- In the absence of a Pastor's report, our membership at the end of September was 56 confirmed and baptized and 63 baptized. At the beginning of this year it was 61 and 68.
- Our average attendance through September is 50.9 compared to 46.5 last year at this same time.
- Our Call/Planning Committee is basically on hold. There is little more that we can do until we receive direction from Circuit and District.
  - 1. Bob Mueller and I attended a District Meeting on planting churches in late August. It was interesting and stimulating but the actual results were not exactly what we had hoped for.
  - 2. Out of that meeting we got encouragement or perhaps described as informal direction from District that since we were having such good luck with our two "interim Pastors", perhaps we should contract with them to continue but pay them appropriately. On several occasions I have started to talk with each of these men about the concept, but I backed

two "interim Pastors", perhaps we should contract with them to continue but pay them appropriately. On several occasions I have started to talk with each of these men about the concept, but I backed off. Before I do this, I need your direction since this is not what you directed us to do in July.

- 3. As I have mentioned to you before, District and I certainly agreed, felt a long term arrangement with Christ the King (CTK) would probably be to our benefit. At the time of that discussion, Pastor Ron was the Pastor at CTK, there was little question about his interest and his ability to move it forward. Since his bout with cancer his and CTK's circumstances have changed and I am no longer convinced it would necessarily be in our best interest. This is particularly the case since there is little they could do to help us in the coming year with Pastoral coverage.
- 4. Consequently I am proposing the following to you.
  - a. Jeff Emery and I meet with Pastors Brandt and Anderegg separately to determine if each of them would have any interest in such a contractual arrangement.
  - b. If they both have an interest, Jeff and I will develop a contract outlining duties and responsibilities, and we will come back to you, probably at a specially called Voters Meeting to review it with you and get your approval.
  - c. If either of them do not have an interest, or have reservations about such a contractual arrangement, we will contact District and insist we get a list of part time Pastors, including Pastors Anderegg and Brandt. As soon as that list can be obtained and reviewed by the Call Committee and recommendations made, we will call a special Voters Meeting to review the committees recommendations.

There was a great deal of discussion. The questions were, can we afford both Pastors, and the response is we can afford a part time (50 percent) Pastor, and if we are going to contract with them that is all the resources we have available and so it would be two 1/4 time Pastors. There were questions about whether it would help us get some of these people we hope are going to join the church. The response was we would have two pastors' names on our marquee sign and letterhead.

It was moved by Bob Borgmann and seconded by Dale Montague that Jeff Emery and I be authorized to implement the outline above. The question was called and there was a unanimous yes vote. The President's report was accepted.
