
The Perfect Political Storm

B efore or after? Are you reading this before or after election day? In a very real sense it doesn't matter all that much. Either way, we are still going to be in the midst of a "perfect" political storm. And, just as tropical storms form quite a ways away, in the far southeast, so too this storm has an origin; a place we can almost pinpoint where things began to spin out of control now.

For quite a few years I have claimed that everyone "believes" in something. It's possible that, like me, you prefer to use the word belief for things that are found in Scripture, but the word gets tossed around in the realm of politics as well. I don't "believe" in gun control. I do *not* believe in people wielding power they don't really have to force others to tow their political

line. You get the idea. And to be sure there are places where political "beliefs" come into sharp focus and are or are not in line with our religious beliefs: I do not believe in the right to choose to abort a living human being; infant, fetus, zygote and whatever other gestational phase one might name.

My theory is that the "perfect" political (fire) storm began when our world moved from the modern era to the postmodern era. I won't dwell too much on the modern era, but many of us still draw our political ideologies (a better word than beliefs?) from facts and data. But somewhere in the last several decades the world moved into a postmodern era. Postmodernism claims that each person's truth is valid. I have the right to believe (There's that word again!) what I want



about abortion, and you have the right to believe what you want about it. Your truth may be true for you but not for me. "Live and let live, Man," you can practically hear the child of the sixties say.

And so, much of the world believes that all beliefs are subject to the perception of the individual believ*er* (and even I don't know where holding to an ideology and believing strong stops or starts). Couple this with another troubling fact and the storm begins to take on a life of its own. That fact is that people no longer see much use for attending religious services. It began somewhere in the last twenty-five or thirty years ago, but if you believe it was longer or shorter than that it's okay. But people no longer invest their energy into matters of the church. Rare is the twenty-something-year-old who takes on a role in the church and pours him or her self into doing what they were elected to do.

Although there likely are more pieces of the puzzle these will suffice to draw the picture I'm about to draw. So suppose that our culture is like the culture to which Paul spoke on Mars Hill. They had so many statues to gods that they even had a statue to the unknown God, just to cover all the bases. But imagine that we all have a certain amount of energy for matters of "faith," but genuine faith is looked upon as relative, just like all truths (Postmodernism at it's finest!) "You *can believe* whatever you want to *believe*, just don't tell me what or how to believe."

So the teenagers, twenty-somethings, and even thirty or forty-somethings don't consider church attendance, etc. to be necessary. But they have all this "energy" for *something* in which they "believe." So they can take at least an afternoon, day, or several days to attend political protests (certainly not wrong, in and of themselves). And they show up. They want to be heard (again not a terrible thing). One thing leads to another and they are soon ardent supporters of whatever cause they have chosen. The last ingredient can now be added to the storm: a demand to be taken seriously. All of this has the potential to result in peaceful protests or, with a little help from The Old Evil Foe, violent aggression and attacks on those with whom they disagree.

This is, in my humble opinion, America's "new religion" for many individuals and part of how we have reached the point we're at in this country. Solutions? I'm just not sure. But I do know God is in the mix and that He calls us to love our enemies and pray for those who persecute us. Certainly, there is much more to be said, but this has already run long. I therefore offer the simplest approach to the solution right now. I invite you to pray:

Heavenly Father, help the citizens of our country pour themselves into things that are pleasing in your sight and do good *because* of what we deeply hope they will learn and hold fast to: The death and resurrection of your Son on behalf of each of us. And grant that we may walk in faith and love as we encounter those who *believe* other than we do. In Your Son's name we pray. Amen.



Thoughts from Our President

ost things are moving along well at Peace. We are still facing the issues of fewer people joining and attending church and an aging membership. At the same time, we have been through much tougher times than we are going through today.

If you have been to church this past month, we have another new milestone. We have two individuals who have stepped up and are taking the time to practice and play the organ at our services. Halleluiah! I did not realize how much I missed Jerry, Carol and Donna playing the organ for our services. *My heroes of the month are Pastor Brandt for playing on the Sundays he is not preaching and Diana Schwab for setting at Jerry's organ on the alternating Sundays.* Both of these people have played before...thirty years ago! It takes a lot of *moxy* to start doing something you haven't done for 30 years, thanks to both of you.



Some time back, I received the following email from a friend of mine in C Troop,

25 Recon Battalion, 15 Cavalry. We served together in Texas and Germany from 1957 to 1960. He had forwarded this email from the author, who also served in the Army in another unit for the same period of time. This has circulated the internet, Facebook and countless emails and you may have read it, but I thought our church membership should relate to this quite well.

We are the Children of the Tough Generation!

Born in the 1930s and early 40s, we exist as a very special age group. We are the smallest group of children born since the early 1900s. We are the last generation, climbing out of the depression, who can remember the winds of war and the impact of a world at war which rattled the structure of our daily lives for years.

We are the last to remember ration books for everything from gas to sugar to shoes to stoves.

We saved tin foil and poured fat in tin cans.

We saw cars up on blocks because tires were not available.

We helped our parents grow victory gardens.

We can remember milk being delivered to our house early in the morning and placed in the "milk box" on the porch. We are the last to see gold stars in



the front window of our grieving neighbors whose sons died in the war.

We saw the "boys" home from the war, build their little houses. We were the last generation who spent our childhood without television; instead we imagined what we We were the last generation who spent our childhood without television; instead we imagined what we heard on the radio.

As we all like to brag, with no TV, we spent our childhood "playing outside." There was no little league, only ragtag teams from the neighborhood, who played other ragtag teams from other neighborhoods.

There was no city playground for kids. We gather at the neighborhood schools, swung on the swings and played ball on ball diamonds that weren't manicured, where a glove was first base.

The lack of television in our early years meant, for most of us, that we had little real understanding of what the world was like.

On Saturday afternoons, the movies gave us newsreels sand-wiche3d between westerns, Buck Rogers and cartoons.

Telephones were one to a house, often shared (party lines) and hung on the wall in the kitchen (no cares about privacy).

Computers were called calcula-tors, they were hand cranked;

Computers were called calcula-tors, they were hand cranked; typewriters were driven by pound-ing fingers, throwing the carriage and changing the ribbon.

The "INTERNET" and GOOGLE" were words that did not exist.

Newspapers and magazines were written for adults and the news was broadcast on our radio in the evening by Gabriel Heater and later Paul Harvey.

As we grew up, the country was exploding with growth.

The GI Bill gave returning veterans the means to get an education and spurred colleges to grow.

VA loans fanned a housing boom. Pent up demand coupled with new installment payment plans opened many factories for work.

New highways would bring jobs and mobility.

The Veterans joined civic clubs and became active in politics.



The radio network expanded from three stations to thousands. **Our parents** were suddenly free from the confines of the depression and the war, and they threw themselves into exploring oppor-

tunities they had never imagined. continued on page 4

We were not neglected, but we were also not today's all consuming family focus.



They were glad we played by ourselves until the street lights came on. Our parents were discovering the post war world.

We entered a world of overflowing plenty and opportunity; a world where we were welcomed, enjoyed ourselves and felt secure in our future, even though depression poverty was deeply remembered. We came of age in the 50s and 60s.

The Korean War was a dark passage in the early 50s and by middecade school children were ducking under desks for Air-Raid training.

Russia built the "Iron Curtain" and China became "Red China". **Eisenhower sent the first** "Army Advisors" to Vietnam. **Castro took over** in Cuba, and Khrushchev came to power in the Soviet Union.

We are the last generation to experience an interlude when there were no threats to our homeland. The war was over and the cold war, terrorism, global warming and perpetual economic insecurity had yet to haunt life with unease.

Our generation can remember both a time of great war and a time when our world was secure and full of bright promise and plenty. We lived through both.

We grew up at a time when the world was getting better, not worse.

We grew up in a time when Democrats and Republicans worked together for the good of the country. When they campaigned hard for votes, not just spent money; when they faced each other with honest differences of opinion, not just trumped up falsehoods with no facts to back them up.



Every One His Witness

As the faithful witness. Jesus shows us what witnessing is all about. Jesus' meeting with the woman at Jacob's well (John 4) shows us how to engage people of different cultures. Jesus' interaction with Zacchaeus the tax collector shows us how to respond to people who hunger to learn more about the Messiah (Luke 19). In the fifth chapter of Mark, Jesus encounters a man who was possessed by demons. In this account we see the witnessing is about Jesus coming to people who need him. People who don't know Jesus turn to other means of coping in an attempt to deal with the suffering and pain. Only Jesus can help them with this need. There is no other help.

A pologetics: Ten reasons to believe that the Gospels are true

Reason #7 — **Divergent Minor Details.**

Critics are quick to make the claim that the Gospels contain contradicting details and, therefore, are not to be trusted. One example often given is the account of the angels at the tomb. Matthew says there was one. John says two. Does this damage their credibility? On the contrary, it actually builds the case that these are true eyewitness accounts. Matthew does not say there was only ONE angel. He just mentions the one. Obviously Matthew only wished to mention the one angel who spoke and was more prominent then the other, (Matt. 28:5) while John mentions both. (John 20:12). Consider that two news reporters might interview two eyewitnesses for a story. And if one of them gives a slightly different take on what happened, that doesn't mean that one account is false. It could mean that one saw or heard something that the other did not. The Gospel writers center on the major facts of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, while their accounts also contain some minor details. They wrote with different intent, emphasis, and style. Mark, who early was associated with Paul and also an interpreter of Peter, is said to be the first Gospel written and provides a basic framework of the ministry of Jesus using the substance of Peter's preaching. Scholars say Matthew wrote from a Jewish perspective and published his Gospel among the Hebrews in their own tongue. Luke, linked to Paul, did much of his own research to write an historic account, and John, likely the last to write his Gospel, emphasizes Christ's divinity as the Son of God. The most important fact is that they all were inspired and moved by the Holy Spirit to pen these Gospels. John and Matthew were eyewitnesses while Mark and Luke wrote their accounts from eyewitnesses. They were independently written – not copied off one another - and are, therefore, complementary not contradictory.

Building Homes in Mexico

n Friday, October 2, I returned from my third home building mission trip to Mexico in spite of the COVID-19 pandemic. I have been working with an organization, Casas Por Cristo, since 1997. During that time, I have made many friends and developed many relationships with people in Mexico and fellow mission volunteers. Really, it is all about the people, relationships and opportunities to share the gospel message.

During these many years, I have worked closely with an individual, Donnie Stubblefield. I first met Stubblefield in 1984 when I accepted my first called to serve as principal /teacher at St. Paul Lutheran Church and School in Stover MO. Stubblefield, a member of that Church had a heart and passion for working with youth and recently marked 25 years in fulltime youth ministry and four years working full-time as a missionary with Casas Por Cristo.

So what does a home building mission trip look like? Let me break down my last trip day by day. At 3:30 PM on Saturday, September 26, I parked my vehicle in the parking lot of Peace Lutheran Church (Thank you!) and was picked-up by Stubblefield in a 15 passenger van that came down from York, Illinois. We drove to Tulsa, OK where we spent the night and worshiped at Ablaze Lutheran Church and picked-up two volunteers from that Church. From there we drove down to San Antonio where we spent the night and picked up additional volunteers from the airport. The three hour drive from San Antonio to Del Rio. TX gave us a chance to get acquainted with fellow volunteers. In Del Rio, we met up with our Casas Por Cristo host and crossed the border into Acuna, Mexico.

Once in Acuna, we drove to our place of lodging, a former church building converted into a bunk house. There we were given information on the Garcia family whose



place of lodging, a former church building converted into a bunk house. There we were given information on the Garcia family whose house was being built. The Garcia's were promised a house back in March, but because of the pandemic several mission teams cancelled their trip. Unfortunately the Garcia's watched as the house materials had to be picked up and taken away along with their dream of having a home of their own. Our team would re-ignite that spark of hope and build their future home.

Work Day 1

Upon arriving at the site, we met the Garcias, prayed with them, and began our work. Casas Por Cristo is extremely organized and has jobs for everyone, even for this overweight out of shape man. My job on day one was cutting lumber. I was given a lumber material list with measurements. I had a team of three individuals working with me and together we would eventually cut every board going into the house. Simultaneously, others ally cut every board going into the house. Simultaneously, others were leveling the home site and building forms for the concrete foundation. The concrete truck arrived mid-morning and the foundation was poured. Other members of the team were already taking cut boards and, because space was limited on the plot site, began building walls on the street. The walls were taken off the street and stacked on the lot. End of work day one.

Work Day 2

The walls were stood on the foundation. Again many jobs working simultaneously. I worked on nailing black press board to the outside walls. Others were setting rafters, working on the roof and began dry wall work. After the black board was applied, I was put on the chicken wire team. The entire house is covered in chicken wire so as to hold the stucco that would be applied the next day. Following the chicken wire job, I was

would be applied the next day. Following the chicken wire job, I was assigned to frame all outside windows and a door with beautiful green trim. End of work day two.

Work Day 3

If you are keeping track, it is now Thursday, October 1. I was given the recipe for the stucco and filled buckets with sand, cement, calcium carbonate, and water. These were mixed in a cement mixer and wheel barrowed to the stucco team. While the house is being stuccoed, the dry wall team is finishing up their work. We are finished with the house by midday. Yes, a house built in two and a half days.

The highlight of the trip is the dedication. During the dedication, the keys are handed to the family along with a Spanish Bible. I'm usually not an emotional person, but seeing the family with tears of joy enter the house, now their home, usually gets to me. End of work day three.

By late afternoon on Thursday we cross the boarder and begin our trek home. I returned to the parking lot of Peace Lutheran Church (thank you again for allowing me to park there) exhausted, greatly blessed by the people I met, the relationships that were fostered, and the opportunity to serve an awesome God.

Every mission trip is unique. Each one has a story. For example, on the trip I took in July, Pastor Mauricio, an LCMS pastor from St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Harlingen, TX shared the gospel message and before the house dedication baptized five individuals. God is so good.

Indeed as long as I am physically able, I plan to return to Mexico on future mission trips. If you are warm and breathing, you are welcome to join me. I'd be happy to share future dates and more detailed information about going on a mission trip. The cost usually runs about \$300 per person.


