

Living Stones

utumn is here, and many of us will take Fall drives to observe the beautiful leaves God has allowed to change colors before falling to the ground for winter. As you drive around, you may observe a dilapidated barn along the way. I always ponder about those barns, wondering how many hours of sweat and toil went into throwing hay bales into the loft in the heat of the summer, or how many early morning and late evening hours were spent milking the Holsteins. How many generations of fathers and sons worked and played together inside these old barns? But I grieve a bit more when I pass a dilapidated church building, especially one made of stone. It seems so sad that these buildings once housed pastors sharing the Word of God and members hearing the Word and responding with psalms, hymns, and prayers. It seems like stone buildings should last an eternity, but we know that

only God's Word and our heavenly lives will do that. All else will perish and become dust. But as we ponder on the activity that took place inside those church buildings, I am reminded of my own upbringing inside a beautiful stone church. And the church isn't about the building, it's about the "living stones" who worshiped and served there. Those were the "living stones" who shaped my faith, not the dead limestone rocks that shaped a building. The Apostle Peter says it so beautifully: "As you come to Him, a living stone rejected by men but in the sight of God chosen and precious, you yourselves like living stones are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ" (1 Peter 2:4 -5). A building is constructed of



cold, dead stones, but the church is filled with warm, living stones which have been claimed by the grace of Christ and enlivened by the Holy Spirit. By His design in Christ, God promises you and your congregation that "You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for His own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light" (1 Peter 2:9). A church building is not intended to be a museum or memorial to the "good ole days," but rather an active center of spiritual vitality, outreach and Gospel proclamation. We are a

We are a people who have been called out of the darkness of sin to the marvelous light of the Gospel of Jesus Christ for the purpose of proclaiming and sharing that Good News as God's people. Thus, my prayer for our congregation is that the Holy Spirit will bless each one of us with mission eyes to see the spiritual fields ripe for harvest, fields that may be next door to us. There is an everincreasing urgency to proclaim Christ's marvelous light to a darkened, dying world! On Palm Sunday, Jesus reprimanded the Jewish leaders, saying that even if the children were prohibited from praising Him, the very stones would shout out. We are His "living stones" and He wants us to shout out His Good News of forgiveness and salvation. So fellow "stones" of Peace, join with me to "proclaim the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light." Go in peace! Pastor Gary Brandt




Every One His Witness

You are His witness: it's your purpose. In the beginning, before creation, God chose a people for Himself. In time, over time, God gathered the individuals whom He had chosen into a people. He gathered them through the proclamation of His Word and His sacramental gifts. He gathered them through those He had already gathered. Before they were gathered, they were not a people. Once they had been gathered, they became the very people of God. As his people, they were a chosen race called out of the darkness of the world: a holy nation set apart for His purpose and His glory; a royal priesthood called and consecrated as intercessors between a merciful God and a multitude of people perishing apart from knowing and believing His promises. In time, you were gathered into this peculiar people. In Holy Baptism, you received what the Lord had ordained you from the beginning. Before, you were not included



in His people and had not received His mercy. But now that you have received His mercy, you are a part of His people, His Holy nation, His royal priesthood. Now you have joined the work of those who have gone before you - through whose faithful labors you have been called to life and salvation – to "proclaim the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light" (1 Peter 2:9) Among those lost in the darkness of sin and death remain those whom God has included in His chosen people. They are not yet a part of His people; they have not yet received His mercy. They are people in your everyday life whom God has appointed you to serve as His priest, His inter-

cessor. He has called you to share the Good News of Jesus with them. They are your friends, co-workers, neighbors, and family members - the very people the Lord has placed in your life. Adam Wainwright is a big-league baseball pitcher. In fact, he's a pretty good pitcher for the St. Louis Cardinals. He does, however, have a rather annoying custom. Every once in a while he puts his glove up over his face. In the past, some pitchers would use a gesture like that to put something into their gloves. The addition might be a little tobacco juice, or petroleum jelly, or just plain spit. You put a little spit on a ball and it will do all kinds of things as it goes hurtling toward the catcher's mitt. But Adam Wainwright says he's adding none of those things. He says: he's praying. He prays before the games; he prays between some of the pitches. And if you're curious about what is in his prayers, he'll tell you. Before the game he's asking the Savior for strength and that "the other team will look at him in fear." Between pitches he's asking the Lord to help him do well. Not bad for a baseball player! Adam seems to have grasped the idea of praying "without ceasing." On the other hand, the idea of God making the other team afraid, well, that seems a bit off the mark. Nevertheless, Adam Wainwright is setting a good example. First and foremost, Wainwright is grateful for the forgiveness Jesus has won on the cross. He knows the risen Savior is with us, interceding on his behalf and for all people. But he is also not too proud to say, "even professional athletes need the Savior by their side." This leads me to say this: If you're watching the TV next summer and you see pitcher Adam Wainwright put his glove up in front of his face, won't you think about this devotion. Then, while he's saying his prayers . . . Won't you say one of your own? In fact, we have a prayer coming up right now.

The Prayer: Dear Lord, we are told we are surrounded by a cloud of witnesses. I give thanks we also have many very real men and women who are glad to make a witness to the fact that You are in their lives. May I, by the Holy Spirit's direction, make my witness to others so they may see the wonders of Your love. In Jesus' Name. Amen.

The Objectivity of Moral Values & Duties Part 1

We have already noted that the gospel writers told the truth, that God is the creator of Heaven and Earth and all life that exists. Now comes a weighty matter indeed – the moral argument for God's existence. The argument begins with the general knowledge of a universal code, a moral code known as natural law. In Romans 2:14-15 the Apostle Paul wrote "For when

Apostle Paul wrote "For when Gentiles, who do not have the law, by nature do what the law requires, they are a law unto themselves even though they do not have the law. They show that the work of the law is written on their hearts, while their conscience also bears witness, and conflicting thoughts accuse or excuse them." The Declaration of Independence also rec-

laration of Independence also recognizes natural law as the basis for sovereignty and basic human rights: When in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitles them... Though few realize this document was based on natural law, it's not possible to understand the nature of government intended without it. Of course, there are those who do not believe in natural law. A previous column mentions atheist biologist Richard Dawkins. He denies the universal moral code when he says that the universe has no design, no purpose, no evil, no good, and that it has nothing but indifference. But that's merely a consequence of his worldview. Even he can't function without natural law. He condemned a 2015 Islamic attack in Paris that killed twelve people saying that Islam is a religion that promotes violence. But on what grounds? Only by appealing to a natural moral code that identifies good and evil can he do so. Thus, the moral argument for the existence of God asserts that because there is a moral law, then there must also be a Lawgiver. More to come.

Sometimes people don't like it when pastors talk about steward-ship. For some, it hits too close to home. It is easier to talk about bad people in Washington, in history, or wherever than it is to think about what our daily life in Christ is supposed to look like and how we are supposed to love our neighbor.

The fact that we don't like it certainly means we ought to face it. So, here are a few simple and practical realities.

God calls us to first-fruits. **sacrificial giving**. That means that we should give off the top. We should set a percentage of our income as a deliberate gift for the work of the Church and then give that first. We write the check to the Lord's work in the Church before we pay the mortgage or pay for our medicine or pay for anything else. We don't pay for all the stuff we need – and stuff we think we need – and then give from what is left over. That is the first-fruits idea. It is hard because we think we need all sorts of other things first. But that is the point of "sacrificial."

Next, how could the starting point for Christian generosity and sacrifice really be anything less than a tithe - 10 percent? The ceremonial law of the Old Testament was never arbitrary. In the Old Testament, the Levites received this tithe so that they could be full-time ministers.

Does the New Testament have a ministry that is larger or smaller? It is far larger: "Make disciples of *all nations*" (Matt. 28:19). And we are still to have a full-time ministry: "The Lord has commanded that those who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14). So if 10 percent is what it took in the Old Testament, and we have a bigger mission need in the New Testament, how can we expect the Lord's work to be done on less than a tithe?

By first-fruits, sacrificial, and generous giving – that's how. We shouldn't fool ourselves into thinking that we've outgiven God's goodness or that we've given plenty. We might be tempted to think that way, but consider that no

one in the Church has given plenty because no one has given all. No one has died for his sins. Only the sinless Son of God did that. St. Paul brought the Good News of Jesus into the discussion of our giving to support the Lord's work in the Church when he wrote:

"I say this not as a command, but to prove by the earnestness of others that your love also is genuine. For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich" (2 Cor. 8:8-9).

As you can see, what the Bible commands about our stewardship can sting. It's Law, and the Law shows our sins. It calls us to repentance. The Law is meant to expose and accuse for the sake of showing us Christ and His fulfillment of the Law. So if first-fruits, sacrificial giving has you squirming, that's the point.

In Mark's account of the feeding of the 4,000, Jesus took the disciples' seven loaves and blessed

In Mark's account of the feeding of the 4,000, Jesus took the disciples' seven loaves and blessed them. It was nothing among so many, but, of course, it was plenty. Jesus makes something from nothing. Mark doesn't say that all the disciples gave Jesus all the bread they had. It is quite possible that some of them held something back. But even if they did, that didn't stop Jesus from blessing them. Jesus makes something out of nothing. He, who fed His people in the desert with Manna every morning, doesn't need their bread.

But they need to give it. And what they give – however little it might be and however grudgingly they do so – He blesses. He not only blesses those whom He feeds with it, but He blesses them – the givers. He blesses the givers not just in that they wind up with a basketful for each loaf, but they are blessed by learning to trust and rejoice in Him.

The Lord gives, and the Lord takes away. The Lord gives abundantly, or He asks us to fast. We do not know what will happen. Blessed be the Name of the Lord. He does all things well, and He works all things together for good. The disciples don't give their bread to Jesus because it is a good investment. They give it because He is good, because they love Him, and because they trust Him. Let us go and do likewise.



The minutes from the September, 2021 meeting were approved as printed.

Financial Secretary: Vicki presented her report. The report was approved and accepted.

Treasurer: Mic Carlson presented Rita's report. The report was accepted and approved.

Trustees: Susan presented Chuck's report.

- Chuck, Pat, and Jeff Emery have mowed the church grounds when necessary.
- Chuck and Mic met with Mainstreet Asphalt on Sept. 15. They reviewed the contract. Adjustments were made to have cracks filled that weren't covered under the existing contract. Work began that day. Jeff Emery has spoken with the company. A different crew will finish the work.
- On Sept. 24 Chuck sharpened the blades on the Cub Cadet and repaired the roller on its deck.
- On Sept. 29 Pat and his neighbor cleaned out all the brush along the side of the church. The neighbor was paid \$250.00. Mic commented that the price was a real bargain.

The report was accepted and approved. The council appreciates all that our trustees are doing.

Evangelism: Russell reported the following:

- The Sept. cost of mailing postcards to "new move ins" to this area was \$210.00. He stated that cards are going to areas that are a long drive from Peace Lutheran.
