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Jesus, Our Ever-Giving Savior

e have a generous Creator. We can sense His attributes everywhere in creation. Yet we hear His voice, see His face, and come to know Him personally in His greatest gift: Jesus of Nazareth, the Son of God.

To the religious leaders of His day, Jesus looked like a homeless Galilean peasant who claimed to speak for God. Other Jews, who followed Him and heard His words, saw a king and conqueror. He is the King, but He conquered by serving, giving, and offering Himself as a sacrifice to set His people free.

Centuries earlier, the people of Israel had been slaves in Egypt. But through God's miraculous intervention, Moses led them out of slavery.

The night before they were released, God instituted the Passover feast. Each household sacrificed and roasted a lamb.

then marked their homes with its blood to protect them from God's coming judgment.

Passover was a parable in action. It illustrated the world's captivity to sin, and Jesus is the fulfillment of the Passover promise. Passover foreshadowed Christ's sacrifice for us.

Jesus is the Lamb of God, slain to rescue all mankind from enslavement to sin. He gave Himself for all.

As Christians, Holy Week is the high feast of our church year. We celebrate who Jesus is and what He has done for us by His death and resurrection. But our celebration doesn't end with Easter. Because He lives, we rejoice every day, knowing He will raise us to life, too.

Although He was rich, He became poor for us. He paid the penalty for our sins. In His love for us, He gave us His best.

It cost Him everything...yet He spares no expense. Today, He still gives His best to us in Holy Communion, His body and blood hidden in the bread and wine. And He instituted this sacrament with a promise for the future: "I will not drink again of this fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new with you in My Father's kingdom" (Matthew 26:29).

He has given Himself so that we, by faith in Him, can spend eternity with Him in His Kingdom, where He has prepared for us a seat at another feast: the wedding feast of the Lamb.

Jesus has swept us up into the longer arc of His story.

Yet His giving does not end with you and me. It includes those around and beyond.

He gives for the outcast and the stranger. . .for foreigner and foe. . . and even for people who



betray us. Together, we have the privilege of pointing others toward the generous arms of our ever-giving Savior.

Thank you for being part of the Peace Lutheran Ministry Family. As we prepare to celebrate a Day of Thanksgiving and then rejoice in the Advent Season, the time to prepare for the birth of our Savior; and then the blessed birth itself, celebrated at Christmas, may the Lord grant us a special sense of peace and create for us the opportunity to tell others that Jesus has given Himself for them, too.

Answering Objections to the Faith

<u>The Reason I Believe</u> by Allen Quist (The Basics of Christian Apologetics)

The Problem of Darwinism

It's a common belief that Darwinian evolution disproves the historical accuracy of the book of Genesis. A Gallup Poll in 1914 found that 42 percent of Americans believe that God created the world



pretty much in its current form within the last 10,000 years or so. It also found that 31 percent believe in theistic evolution, while 19 percent believe in atheistic evolution. The continuing discussion will focus on the arguments for evolution as stated by Bill Nye in his debate with Ken Ham (Answers In Genesis). It is expected that Mr. Nye presented the best arguments in support of evolution, since he was likely advised by other evolutionists. It is also expected that he was widely advised by other evolutionists on how to make the best possible case for his arguments. Dur-

ing the debate, Mr. Nye raised three objections, all of which focused on the age of the earth, and the idea that science has shown that the age of the earth is much older than Genesis allows. Nye apparently believes that this is where Genesis is most vulnerable.

The three arguments Mr. Nye presented are:

- 1. ice-core dating,
- 2. Old Tjikko an ancient spruce tree, said to be nearly 10,000 years old,
- 3. the fossil record.

In the next newsletter, we will begin an evaluation of Mr. Nye's arguments beginning with the Ice-core dating argument. Russell Schulz, Chairman of Evangelism



ost historians would say that Pat Garrett killed Billy the Kid on July 14, 1881. Most people would think Billy's death should have closed the history books on the outlaw's notorious life. If that's what most people think, they would be wrong. Now, almost 130 years after the events transpired, the governor of New Mexico, Bill Richardson, is thinking about granting a posthumous pardon to Billy. It is a gesture that is not sitting well with the descendants of Pat Garrett. They have a number of objections to the matter. First, it would call into question the actions of their ancestor. Second, they think it's wrong to pardon a criminal who was responsible for the murder of two lawmen as well as many others. Now the purpose of this devotion is not to share my opinions about a governor who wishes to pardon a murderer who has been dead for 125 years. I have some definite feelings about the matter, but they are not important here. No, the purpose of this devotion is to talk about the

idea of a posthumous pardon. As far as the Lord is concerned, there is no such thing - not when it comes to humanity. The Lord very clearly tells us that if we are to be pardoned from our sins, it will happen while we are alive -- not after we're dead. If the substitution of the Savior is to have an impact, if Jesus is to save us that must happen when we're living. There are no do-overs once we're dead.

This is one of the reasons the Savior has asked us to share His story of salvation with those around us. God wants all people to be saved, and that includes those who are in our immediate family and circle of friends. This is why I encourage you to keep on witnessing to the greatness of God's grace which we've seen in the Bethlehem manger, Jerusalem's cross, and the borrowed tomb. Today is the day to believe. Today is the day to share.

The Prayer: Dear Heavenly Father, I give thanks for the faith You have given me. Now may I -- whenever I can -- share the Savior's story with others. Keep me from postponing my proclamation of Jesus. Don't let me wait until it's too late. In Jesus' Name. Amen.

What's Keeping Us From Being Active Witnesses?

Our Own Brokenness and Idolatry

Learning to be a faithful and effective witness of Jesus in your everyday life doesn't begin with a blank slate. All of us have been influenced and shaped by ideas about witnessing that are not helpful. Many of these ideas about witnessing are quite popular and have become widely accepted among Christians—so widely that some people are surprised to learn that they are not biblical. The following are some common myths about witnessing:

- ◆ A witness is someone who shows people how to "accept Jesus into their hearts" (or "give their hearts to Jesus")
- ◆ A witness guides people to "surrender their lives to Jesus" by praying the "Sinner's Prayer."
- A witness must have a compelling personal story to share in order to have an "effective witness."
- ◆ **A witness** is only being faithful and effective when he or she "leads people to Christ."

These myths are not harmless. They bring ideas into witnessing that contradict God's Word. They turn people from the Holy Spirit and His work and toward their own efforts as witnesses. They focus on getting results we desire rather than do the things we are called to do and trusting the Lord for the results. (see 1 Corinthians 3:5-9)

Witnessing myths lie underneath and are often stated in popular sayings about witnessing. These sayings have worked themselves into the Church and are often embraced as truth even though they contradict God's Word. A few of these sayings and ideas are:

- "Preach the Gospel at all times and, when necessary, use words." This is often attributed to St. Francis, even though it is not found in any of his writings. It implies that we can proclaim the Gospel without words even though the Bible makes it clear that the Word is always necessary. (Romans 10:17)
- ◆ "You may be the only Bible that someone reads." This idea implies that how we live our lives is enough to convey the truth of the Gospel. While how we live is important, and it can open doors to sharing God's Word, it is not a "Bible" and cannot replace the Bible.
- ◆ "Your prayers can be a powerful force in the lives of unsaved relatives and friends if you know how to pray for them." This quote from televangelist Kenneth Copland's website

 (www.kcm.org/real-help/prayer/pray/how-to-pray-saved-loved-one) is typical of people who believe we can save others through our prayers. It reflects a myth about prayer (that prayer is a Means of Grace) married to the myth that "we can save people."

When witnessing use the LASSIE approach: Listen, Ask, Seek, Share, Invite, Encourage. The Holy Spirit will do the saving! by Pr. Mark Wood director of LCMS Witness & Outreach Ministry

What Makes for a Cheerful Giver?

St. Paul wrote to Church of Christ in Corinth: "Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor. 9:7). God loves a cheerful giver. But who is a cheerful giver?

Abel was. By faith, he gave the firstborn of his flock, and it was acceptable in God's sight. Abraham was. By faith, he prepared cakes and



a tender choice calf for God and entertained angels unaware. So also were David and Solomon. By faith, David would not make a sacrifice to God that cost him nothing, so he paid Araunah his due. By faith, Solomon built a house for God, where his name would dwell and thereby where He would dwell to be Israel's God and they His people.

What more shall we say? For time would fail us to tell of all those who gave not simply for the joy of giving but for the joy of knowing the One to whom they gave.

So also our Lord, who for the joy set

before Him, gave everything – yes, even His life – enduring the cross and scorning its shame. He gave to the shedding of His blood, willingly and resolutely setting His face toward Jerusalem to die for the life of the world. Though He was rich in every way, He became poor, so that by His poverty, we might be rich beyond measure.

So then, let us like Abel and Abraham, like David and Solomon, and even like our Lord Jesus Christ, give cheerfully to God for the work of His kingdom in our midst. Like them, let us decide in our heart for the joy set before us. It's the joy of knowing the One to whom we give is the One who gives us all good things.

The minutes from the September 2022 meeting were approved as printed.

Financial Secretary: Jeff Emery presented Vicki's report. It was accepted and approved.

Treasurer: Peggy presented her report. The report was accepted and approved. The board thanks Peg for simplifying the report. It is much easier to read.

Elders: Jeff stated that common cup communion and "favorite hymns month" are going well.

Trustees: Susan reported the following for Chuck:

Honoring Our Veterans

Veterans Day has its roots in what was called Armistice Day, when a peace agreement ended World War I on November 11, 1918. President Wilson proclaimed that Armistice Day was to be marked with solemn pride in heroism and with gratitude for victory as well as the "opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice." In 1954, the remembrance was renamed Veterans Day to honor all U.S. military personnel. It's a reminder to pray for and honor all who serve and sacrifice, to support and assist their families, and to pray that God will bring peace on earth.

Christian Symbols

Irumpet—In the Old Testament, trumpets, often made from ram's horns, called people to worship or war (and often promised victory). Joshua and the Israelites used trumpets to fell the walls of Jericho. Under Gideon, the small Israelite army blew trumpets and smashed jars to confuse the Midianites into surrender. The New Testament says trumpets will sound at the Last Judgment and the resurrection of the dead. In Revelation 11, a seventh trumpet proclaims God's final and complete triumph.



Coins—The Bible often uses coins to symbolize human greed. During Holy Week, 30 silver coins — usually shown with a bag or purse — represent Jesus' betrayal by his disciple Judas (Matthew 26:14-16). Many of Jesus' teachings are about money, including the parable of the lost coin. Coins also symbolize giving as an act of worship, just as the widow offered her last "mite" (Mark 12:41-44).
