Rock — We call Christ "the Solid Rock," remembering his parable about the wise and fool-

ish builders (Matthew 7:24). Jesus changed his disciple Simon's name to Peter, meaning rock, saying he'd build his church "on this rock" (Matthew 16:18). Although some Christians understand Peter to be the rock-foundation of Christ's church, others interpret the foundation as faith in Christ, which, Jesus said, was revealed to Peter by God.

Water — Water flows through the Scriptures: the Flood, the Red Sea crossing, water springing from a rock to nourish Israelites in the wilderness, the healing of Naaman's leprosy when he washed in the Jordan River, John baptizing Jesus and, chiefly, our baptism into Christ. The water of baptism symbolizes cleansing from sin, the quenching of our spiritual thirst and God raising us from death (drowning in sin) to life everlasting. Just as we cannot live without physical water, neither can we truly live without the living water Jesus gives (see John 4:13-14).


Since we have been singing our favorite hymns during the month of October, and since October 31 is the day to celebrate Martin Luther's Reformation, I thought that the following article by our MO District President Lee Hagan would be very appropriate.

Confessing Luther's Theology in Song

n July 1, 1523, two Augustinian monks were put to death in Antwerp for refusing to recant the theology of Martin Luther. To honor these martyrs of the faith, Luther wrote his first hymn, "A New Song Here Shall Be Begun." His second hymn would be

the more familiar, "Dear Christians, One and All, Rejoice" (Lutheran Service Book 556). A few months later, the first Lutheran hymnal would be released containing eight hymns for congregational singing. These early milestones opened the flood gates for setting the Biblical theology of Luther to music, which would go on to influence the vast majority of Christianity.

The significance of the common people singing Luther's theology cannot be overstated. For generations, the faith of Lutherans has been shaped by the Scriptures, the



Small Catechism, and the hymnody. Lutheran worship is still shaped by the practice of involving the congregation in the Church's song by singing hymns that confess the truth of Holy Scripture. It's not about singing Luther's hymns, though sometimes we do; it is about singing hymns that proclaim Christ and God's Word.

Towards the end of October, Lutheran congregations will likely join in singing Luther's "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" or "Lord, Keep Us Steadfast in Your Word." However, take time to peruse some of the other hymns by Luther and other Lutheran hymn writers of the past such as Paul Speratus, Phillip Nicolai, and Paul Gerhardt. But also, give thanks to God for those who have risen up in every age to confess Christ through hymns of faith. Newer examples are Pastor Stephen Starke, who has contributed a large canon of hymns in this current hymnal, and also Lisa Clark, from Concordia Publishing House, who has written a growing number of hymns that are being introduced to congregations today.

Just think about it, prior to Luther's reforms, singing was the function of the choir. Luther brought not only the Scriptures to the hands of the people, but also placed the songs of faith into the mouths of God's people throughout Christendom. It is good for us to remember Martin Luther for more than just the 95 Theses and the Small Catechism. Give thanks to God for the continued witness of Dr. Luther as you sing every Sunday in worship!

Devotion for October



(Jesus said) "You are the light of the world. ..." Matthew 5:14a

Tesus telling His followers they're the "light of the world" is no small thing.

As Christians, the times we have to share Christ as our Lord and Savior or, in other words-to be His light to others in this world-actually occur fairly often.

Unfortunately, we often dismiss or sidestep these chances as we carry on with our busy and important lives. Sometimes, however, we may find ourselves in a place where we would never have imagined sharing the Gospel with others.

Such was the case of Nury Escobar de Milian of Guatemala, a Sunday school teacher who has been sharing the Good News with students for more than 25 years.

Five years ago, Escobar de Milian was kidnapped and held captive for five days in the jungles of Central America. When she was abducted, she had one book in her possession-her Bible. That proved to be a blessing for her and those among whom she was held hostage. With it she read to the children of the women who were taking care of

her doing this trying ordeal. What a wonderful time and place to apply all those years of teaching Sunday school!

Some months later following her release, Escobar de Milian learned that missionaries were not allowed to come into those



jungle communities or they would be threatened with death. Although outwardly her situation had the uneasy possibility of becoming a terrible experience, God gave her the strength to share the light of the Gospel with her captors.

As Jesus is the light of the world, so are we called to carry that light to those places where others need to see it. That may

be at your neighborhood farmers market, while watching your kids play soccer or, as in the case of one Guatemalan Sunday school teacher, while held captive in a jungle.

The message of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection transcends cultural barriers and has the power to transform any life. Thanks be to God who has given us the privilege of sharing His light with the world!

The Prayer: Father in heaven, thank You for giving us the light of the Gospel. Help us to reflect Your light and glorify You in the different situations of our lives. This we pray in Jesus' Name. Amen.

Using First Article Gifts

od is a good and gracious giver. He always provides us with everything we need to do the work to which He has called us.

Some of what the Lord provides comes in special way through His Means of Grace and the working of the Holy Spirit.

There is certainly no way that we could be faithful and effective witnesses without these gifts.

But much of what we have available to us to bear witness of Jesus in the world is found in the things that God has created and given to all people. These resources are called God's "First Article gifts", in reference to the first part of the Apostles' Creed. First Article gifts include the things that are

listed in Luther's explanation of the First Article of the Creed such as "my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses".

These gifts are given to us to make us fully equipped to do the work of being Christ's witnesses in our everyday lives. They are the "everything" at our disposal that Luther speaks of in his explanation of the calling we have in 1 Peter 2:9 and how speaking of Jesus to those who are lost is our highest priority in all of life.

The importance of making wise use of God's First Article gifts is underscored when we realize that there is no one "biblical" way for us to share the faith with unbelievers. While the Word and only the Word is the effective means of sharing the

faith, there are numerous and various ways through which we can engage people with the Word. Different contexts require us to employ different approaches, terminology, cultural practices, media, techniques and so on to effectively communicate with people.

The LASSIE approach to witnessing makes use of God's First Article gifts to aid us in a relational and contextual manner in order to speak of Jesus with them. It is an application of using the "reason and understanding" that in the Lord, in His grace and mercy, has given to us.

(The LASSIE Approach To Witnessing - Listen, Ask, Seek, Share, Invite, Encourage)




Memories for a lifetime.









Oatmeal Butterscotch Crinkle Cookies

Cream and blend well together:

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup shortening (Do not use butter!)
- 1 cup brown sugar

Add and blend well:

- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 tsp almond extract
- 2 cups flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp soda
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 1/2 cups of old fashioned oatmeal
- 1 bag of butterscotch chips

Method:

Thoroughly chill the dough in the fridge. Scoop out the dough with a 1/4th of a cup ice cream scoop. Form into a ball, slightly flatten and firmly press one side of the shaped cookie dough into a small bowl filled with 1/2 cup of sugar. Cover a cookie sheet with parchment paper and place the cookies, sugar side up, five (5) to a sheet. Space them, because the cookies will spread about three (3) inches! Bake at 350 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes. Cool a few minutes on the sheet before removing. Cool on a wire rack, and store in an airtight container. These cookies have a crispy glaze on the topside!

The Basics of Christian Apologetics


Applying Natural Law To Evangelism

nowledge of natural law is extremely useful in evangelism in that we can engage others with Jesus knowing that they already know moral law.

Although we may have to explain what it means in today's society or how it applies to the person we are addressing, we don't need to spend time convincing someone that moral law exists.

People often rationalize or distort moral code to prevent them from seeing that they have violated it. Sometimes Bible verses only may be necessary such as Romans 3:23 "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God".

However, some may not regard the Bible as being authoritative. Are there ways of proclaiming God's Law without quoting the Bible? Jesus did so with the woman at the well of Sychar. (John 4:16-19) Jesus didn't have to tell this woman the nature of promiscuity, and her comment "He told me all that I have ever did," (v 39) strongly suggests that she stood convicted of her sin. She knew that



adultery is wrong, and she knew she was living in sin.

Jesus made no references to moral standards. He only describes how this woman was living and that was sufficient. In addition he pointed to Himself – the Lamb of God who would take away the sin of the world. Paul followed the same approach at Mars Hill (Acts 17:22-34) and Peter, as well, in his Pentecost sermon. (Acts 2:1-41)

We also see that every missionary sermon recorded in Acts contains three parts – the Law, the Gospel, and evidence to demonstrate that the message is true (Apologetics). The overriding focus is always on the Gospel message.

In summary, we see that morality is not a matter of personal opinion, but rather of what objectively exists in the real world. It's like studying the law of gravity – both are important features of the natural world God has created, impacting our lives every day. We may not like how these laws affect our lives, but we are powerless to change them.

We do well to understand natural law as accurately and completely as possible and adjust our thinking and our living accordingly. (from: The Reason I Believe by Allen Quist)

- She submitted a financial report for September.
- The ladies' yoga group presented a check for \$50.00 on 7/20/23.
- Pastor Anderegg will pay the church phone bill until the contract renews in April 2024.
- Pudge and Jeff Emery will work together to pay bills while Peggy is out for surgery.

Her report was accepted and approved.

Elders: Jeff reported the following:

- The elders met on October 2, 2023. The following people attended: Jeff Hedberg, Jeff Emery, Pastor Brandt, Bob Hansen and Earl Hartenstein
- Jeff Emery will head a committee to review and recommend updates to our emergency operation plan. It was decided to have five committee members rather than four.
- Jeff Hedberg will take a photo of the church for post cards that will be sent to Peace Lutheran visitors. He is waiting until the chancel is decorated.
