Whenever there was a job to do, a class to teach or a meeting to attend...one name was on everyone's list, "let Someone Else do it". Someone Else was also among the biggest fivers in the church. Whenever there was a financial need, everyone assumed that Someone Else would make up the difference.

This beloved church member was a wonderful person, sometimes appearing to be superhuman, but one person can only do so much. Everybody expected too much of **Someone Else.**

Consider him who endured such opposition from sinful men, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart. Hebrews 12:3


Do you remember the old hit song by Elvis Presley, '*Don't you step on my blue suede shoes*'? You won't get too far in life before somebody does

that very thing, and steps on your toes. But before you get discouraged and throw in the towel, take another look at the life of Jesus. Though He was perfect in all ways, He was criticized continually. His enemies called Him a 'glutton and a drunkard' (Matthew 11:19). They even accursed Him of being possessed by a demon (see John 8:48). Yet He never allowed bitterness or discouragement to defeat Him. To Him, every obstacle was an opportunity to demonstrate grace and grit. His heart was broken by those He loved, yet He understood and comforted others. He saw disease as an opportunity to heal those who were sick; hatred as an opportunity to love His enemies; temptation as an opportunity to overcome the carnal impulses we all deal with; and offences as an opportunity to forgive. He went through life turning trials into triumphs-and he's our example. The Bible says, 'Consider him who endured such opposition...so...you will not grow weary and lose heart.' Pick up your Bible and reread His teachings. In His famous Sermon on the Mount, Jesus said: 'You're familiar with the old written law, "Love you friend," and and its unwritten companion, "Hate your enemy," I'm challenging that. I'm telling you to love your enemies. Let them bring out the best in you, not the worst...Live generously and graciously towards others' Matthew 5:43-48). "Thrivent.com/vote." You'll need your Thrivent.com user ID and password, or your member ID (found on your contract statement or your member ID card) and your date of birth.



This interview started out like all the others; unplanned, unscheduled and flying by the seat of my pants.

B ob was born October 31, 1941 and grew up in the North part of St. Louis. Where his home was, is now covered by highway 70. Bob attended Lutheran Central. In high school his interests were scouting and what we used to call, visual aids, setting up projectors, microphones, and their operation (not terribly different than what he does for Peace). Bob graduated from high school in 1959.

Diane was born August 3, 1943 and also grew up in the North part of St. Louis. She started hanging around a stable near her home where she learned to love horses and would ride on Saturdays when her mother would drop her off to go shopping. Diane's father was a square dance caller, and she first met Bob as a young girl, at the age of seven or eight, when Bob's parents were learning to square dance. Diane also attended Lutheran Central.

One of the things we talked about, was how nice it was when we were young. They told me about always walking everywhere, or taking the bus and never being worried about it day or night and we reminisced about how easy it was.

They became re-acquainted on a blind date in high school, and were engaged just before Diane graduated in 1962. They were married September 29, 1962.

Bob held several jobs with Von Hoffman Press, Christian Board of Publication and eventually ended up working at General Motors. He worked at the Chevrolet assembly plant until it closed, then moved to the Corvette assembly plant and ended his career at the Wentzville plant.

After high school Diane worked for Manpower as a temporary employee and worked as a card punch operator. A friend invited them to come to Peace to visit, before they left the church, they were given a box of envelopes and told they were for when they joined. thing) but rather the seeking done by the witness looking for opportunities

to tell others of Jesus. An example can be found in Paul's witness at Athens (Acts 17:16-34) troubled by the idols on display in the marketplace, he began speaking about it to the people there and then to philosophers who became interested to hear more. He was then invited to address the Areopagus, a gathering of revered philosophers, which was an honor and a rare opportunity. Paul knew that those idols presented a point of connection with those in attendance. His connection point was the altar with the inscription 'to the unknown god ' that he saw among the idols. He told them," What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you." Paul connected with them and they wanted to hear more.

We may never get the opportunity to address a group in a place like the Areopagus, but in our everyday lives, we have occasions to connect with idolaters like those in Athens. As we seek a point of connection, the way is opened to share the message of God who loves them though He is unknown to them.

Seek A Connection With Head, Heart, or

Hands. Notice how a person connects. A **head** person connects intellectually as ideas and concepts are discussed on the basis of some understanding of truth. One can gain a head person's attention by stating a proposition that can be discussed or debated as Paul did in Athens. A heart person's conversation will be based on emotion and how a person feels on a given subject. This calls for a discussion on what feels right or wrong or brings a sense of peace and contentment. A hands person is concerned about practical ideas and concepts for improving something that will have a positive impact.

Seek the Holy Spirit. A witness of Jesus Christ is wholly dependent on the Holy Spirit to be effective. Seeking the Holy Spirit is what we do before beginning a conversation in our witness to others and is ongoing throughout the discussion. Remember that the LASSIE approach isn't a series of steps to be followed in order but instead facets of witnessing that can appear haphazard to us. But God does not act haphazardly. We can always trust that the Holy Spirit who dwells and acts within us will lead us. We will find the Holy Spirit where he has promised to be - in His Means of Grace. The place to equip ourselves to witness for Jesus Christ is in the word and sacrament ministry of our congregations. We then receive the Holy Spirit who guides us in our dialogue to those we are witnessing. {Jesus said,} "When they deliver you over, do not be anxious how you are to speak or what you are to say, for what you are to say will be given you in that hour. For it is not you who speak, but the Spirit of the Father speaking

Seek A Point of Connection. There is so much to say about Jesus that sometimes it's hard to know where to start. The good news is that there is so much to share about the Good News to everyone. One difficulty is deciding what to share that has meaning and interest to who we are witnessing to. A Bible verse that may seem brilliant to you (and it probably is) may not seem so to someone else. Finding the point of connection is key. We must Ask and Listen to learn more about a person's interests, views, concerns, hopes, etc. and in doing so we can discover a point of connection to begin sharing about Jesus. Usually it's something in the life of the person you are witnessing to. Some subjects that may come up might include: life events, loneliness, needs, spirituality, meaning, relationships, parenting, illness, disappointment, hopelessness and a host of others. Listen and Ask to Seek a point of connection. Then seek a connection to the Gospel.

Seek An Opportunity to Speak. You have the authority to speak of Jesus.... Use it wisely! Do not confuse the opportunity to speak with permission to speak. As a witness for Jesus you always have permission to speak. When Jesus spoke the Great Commission in Matthew 28:18-19 he told his disciples "all authority in heaven and on earth" had been given to him. He then gave that authority to his disciples. We are His disciples today and have His authority to speak His Word of life and salvation. "We are ambassadors for Christ." 2 Corinthians 5:20. As such, we have all the authority - and permission - we need to speak of Jesus. But we need to use it wisely to seek the best opportunity to speak in a time and a way that people will listen to us. Seek opportunities to speak the truth in love politely, with humility and gentleness.

What's Cooking?

Yum-Yum Cake

- 2 cups flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 teas. baking soda
- 2 eggs

1 20 oz can crushed pineapple with juice (drain some of the juice)

In a bowl, combine flour, sugar, baking soda, eggs and pineapple with juice. Mix well. Pour batter into a greased and floured 9 x 13 pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Ice cooled cake.

Frosting for cake:

- 1 1/3 cups evaporated milk 1 1/3 cups sugar 4 egg yolks 2/3 cup butter
- 1 1/2 teas vanilla
- $1 \frac{1}{3} c$
- 1 1/3 cups flaked coconut
 - 1 1/3 cups chopped pecans

Mix milk, sugar, egg yolks and butter together until well blended. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly until thickened (about 12 minutes). Remove from heat, stir in vanilla, coconut and pecans. Continue stirring until spreadable.

n the early morning hours of Feb. 18, 1546, Martin Luther closed his eyes forever. And the hand that hammered the 95 Theses into the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg on Oct. 31, 1517, penned its final words:

"We are all beggars. This is true."

And this is the truth that our Lord says makes you free. Ironic, isn't it? That, in order to be free, you must be a beggar; you must be utterly dependent and reliant upon God. This makes us uncomfortable – the way we're uncomfortable when someone gets us a Christmas or birthday present when we haven't gotten them one. We feel we owe them. And we don't much like being in someone's debt.

But what Luther would remind us is that we are all indeed beggars. But we're not just anyone's beggars. We're God's beggars. And this is His legacy to the Christian Church. Christ came for sinners. He came to seek and save the lost. He came to heal the sick and raise the dead. He came for sinners, and He dwells only with sinners.

And, if we are to be where He is, we must be willing to be counted among the lost, the sick, and the dead. We must be willing to be beggars. We must cry out for mercy, for grace, and for his undeserved love and kindness. We must be dependent solely on Him and what He gives.

And here's the beauty: He gives us everything. Everything – forgiveness of sins, salvation from death and the devil, and eternal life. This is not because of any worthiness or merit in us, but it is because of His divine goodness, mercy, and grace.

On account of Christ's death and resurrection, the Father forgives you, saves you, and is pleased with you. And you receive. You receive His love, His righteousness, His holiness, His acceptance, and His inheritance. We are all beggars. This is true.

This is the heart and soul of Christianity and the lifeblood of the Christian Church. God justifies us, and He declares us innocent and righteous by His grace received through faith for the sake of Christ. This is not because of our works; this is because of His work on the cross. We, who once were enemies of God, are reconciled to Him and made to be His children. This is what Luther would point us to when He took up his pen for the last time and scribbled "We are all beggars. This is true." We are beggars. But we are beggars of the God who does not ignore us, who doesn't pass by us on the other side. We are beggars of the One who descended from heaven to make His dwelling with sinners.

We are beggars of Him who deigns to dwell with us, among us, and – yes – even in us by grace for Christ's sake. For in the bread and cup that we bless, we share together with Christ and each other the riches of God's grace.

So inexhaustible are the riches of this grace – the Gospel in sermon and absolution, in Baptism and Holy Communion – that our cups overflow. We, who are God's beggars, are not only inexhaustibly satisfied but have something to give back in thanksgiving and praise.

Financial Secretary:

Treasurer:

Rita Riemann presented her report. Deposits were \$5,473.50 and expenses were \$2,537.40 for the month of August. The report was accepted and approved.

Board of Elders:
