The Beauty of Autumn

f you ask anyone why they live where they do, their answer

would probably be "because I grew up here" (or their spouse) or "I have family here or nearby." Other than those two answers, why do you think we live here in Southern Missouri? My guess is because we love the beauty of hills, trees, and water; and we enjoy the Change of Seasons. The Ozarks certainly provide both of these. We are truly blessed to live in such a beautiful area. I have always loved water. I grew up within a mile of the Mississippi River. When I was young, my neighbor and I often rode our bicycles down to where the Plattin Creek emptied into the Mighty Mississippi. There we would walk south on the Missouri-Illinois Railroad Tracks with our BB Guns to an area known as Buck Knob. We'd usually climb up the steep hillside and bluffs to a cave called Cigarette Cave because it was skinny and narrow; you had to crawl through it—which we didn't do very often! Then we would just sit way up high and watch the currents in the river and hoping a long barge, or several, would come by. Other times we walked North along the Railroad Tracks toward the remnants of Shot Tower. During the Civil War St. Joe Lead Co. would send molten lead dead down the bluff through a tower of some sort. At the bottom, lead shot for bullets

emerged and were shipped to ammunition plants. Other days we would just ride our bicycles all over Festus and Crystal City. No worries about danger; the only requirement, be home for supper or do without! Ha!

When I was 35, my wife and three children moved to Manistee, Michigan. Our threestory house built in 1887 was within a mile of beautiful Lake Michigan. Our bedroom was

The entire west coast of Michigan gets "dumped on" while going inland only 10 miles you may have sunshine. But there is a plus to being on the coast besides the beauty; the temperature never goes below zero because of the warmer waters. Of course that means that January will have a low of 10 and a high of 20! Every once in a while, a Canadian Clipper blew in from the north, bringing high winds and horizontal snow! Guess what? You stayed inside unless you had four-wheel drive or a snowmobile, which several men would ride to the factory I worked at. Ice skating and ice fishing were daily activities for young and old alike. Our kids would ride the school bus one afternoon a week for eight weeks to go snow skiing at a nearby resort for practically no cost. We really enjoyed our six years living there, but will not return. Summer is only in July and August!

When I began my Vicarage in 1992, I was sent to the new mission church, Grace Lutheran, at Holts Summit. The house our congregation rented for us was in Jefferson City, only four blocks from Trinity Lutheran. So nearly everyday I drove across the Missouri River.

As retirement was approaching, I told my wife that I wanted to move to the Lake of the Ozarks. Although I'm not really a boater or fisherman, I love the view of the main channel near Lodge of the Four Seasons on Horseshoe Bend.

What a blessing to be enjoying the cooler temps and knowing that very soon the leaves will be turning to beautiful autumn colors. It's too bad that we don't have a lot of hard maples here; they seem to have the most golden colors, but the mighty oaks can be colorful, too!

As most of us are in the "older age" category, we can take heart in two verses in the Psalms: Chapter 50 verse 2 says, "From Zion, perfect in beauty, God shines forth." Zion is obviously Heaven, and that's where God resides. So what is perfect beauty? I'm not sure, but it's worth waiting for!

David writes in Psalm 27:4, "One thing I ask of the Lord, this is what I seek: that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to gaze upon the beauty of the Lord and to seek Him in His temple."

My prayer for You is that you may breathe the fresh crisp air of God's beautiful creation as you gaze upon the beauty of our autumn Ozark majesty; as we await to reside in the perfect beauty of Zion! Peace be with you! Pastor Gary Brandt





Jesus' Witness to the Truth

Then Pilate said to Him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this purpose I have come into the world-to bear witness to the truth. Everyone who is of the truth listens to My voice." (John 18:37) When Jesus encountered a great crowd of people as he tried to find a quiet place to rest, he didn't turn them away. e celebrate the Reformation at the end of each October. The Reformation began on All Saints' Eve in 1517, which was when Martin Luther posted the 95 Theses to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. So, let's hear from Luther himself on the topic of giving and stewardship.

In the Small Catechism under the Table of Duties, Martin Luther gives specific Bible passages to help Christians know their duty in their various vocations as members of their family, society at large, and in God's family, the Church. Under the heading "What Hearers Owe Their Pastors," Luther lists five passages from the Bible, three of which have to do with giving to your local congregation. They are these:

- "The Lord has commanded that those who preach the gospel should receive their living from the gospel." (1 Cor. 9:14)
- "Anyone who receives instruction in the word must share all good things with his instructor. Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked. A man reaps what he sows." (Gal. 6:6–7)
- "The elders [presbyters, i.e., pastors] who direct the affairs of the church well are worthy of double honor, especially whose work is preaching and teaching. For the Scripture says, 'Do not muzzle the ox while it is treading out the grain,' and 'The worker deserves his wages.'" (1 Tim. 5:17–18)

Luther comments on these passages in his 1535 Lectures on Galatians. He wrote:

Luther comments on these passages in his 1535 Lectures on Galatians. He wrote:

"When Paul says 'all good things,' this is not to be taken to mean that everyone should share all his possessions with his preacher. No, it means that he should provide for him liberally, giving him as much as is needed to support his life in comfort. ... The apostle is so serious in advocating this topic of support for preachers that he adds a threat to his denunciation and exhortation, saying: 'God is not mocked.' ... All this pertains to the topic of support for ministers. I do not like to interpret such passages; for they seem to commend us, as in fact they do. In addition, it gives the appearance of greed if one emphasizes these things diligently to one's hearers. Nevertheless, people should be taught also about this matter, in order that they may know that they owe both respect and support to their preachers. Christ teaches the same thing in Luke 10:7: 'Eating and drinking what they provide, for the laborer deserves his wages'; and Paul says elsewhere (1 Cor. 9:13-14): 'Do you not know that those who are employed in the temple service get their food from the temple, and those who serve at the altar share in the sacrificial offerings? In the same way the Lord commanded that those who proclaim the Gospel should get their living by the Gospel.' It is important for us who are in the ministry to know this, so that we do not have a bad conscience about accepting for our work wages ... it happens when those who proclaim the glory of God and faithfully instruct the youth derive their livelihood from them. It is impossible that one man should be devoted to household duties day and night for his support and at the same time pay attention to the study of Sacred Scripture, as the teaching ministry requires. Since God has commanded and instituted this, we should know that we may with a good conscience enjoy what is provided for the comfortable support of our lives from church properties to enable us to devote ourselves to our office." (LW 27:125–126)
