How Did We Get Here? Part 2

As we continue the series on how we got to where we (as U.S. citizens) are politically the next two items that have had a major effect on our thinking are postmodernism and confirmation bias (from Cognitive Dissonance Theory). You may be somewhat familiar with these to "forces" in our culture or completely unaware. No matter. I will do my best to explain the aspects of each that I am claiming are a part of the problems we now face in our country, with a little help from the internet.

irst, postmodernism. Wikipedia does a fairly good job of describing postmodernism when it says, "Postmodernism is a broad movement that developed in the mid-to-late 20th century across philosophy, the arts, architecture, and criticism, marking a departure from modernism. The term has been

more generally applied to describe a historical era said to follow after modernity and the tendencies of this era." Said more crassly, postmodernism moves away from the notion of there being facts and into the realm of 'feelings.'

With the postmodern era, then, came the notion that "My truth is just as valid as yours. Don't try to push your truth on me." I was initially a fan of Stephen Colbert when, in one of his first few episodes, he used the term "truthiness." First heard on The Colbert Report . . . truthiness refers to the quality of preferring concepts or facts one wishes or believes to be true, rather than concepts or facts known to be

In the realm of religion postmodern thinking can be seen in a sentence such as, "We're all heading up the same mountain.



We just have different ways of getting there." Or, as alluded to above, "Your truth works for you, and mine works for me." Therefore, in postmodern thinking no one religion or religious writing can be considered factual, since, after all, they were all written by men who interjected their own truth into the text. Christians (such as those in the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod) who believe that the Bible is completely true are the walking and talking versions of dinosaurs to postmodern eyes.

The mirror image of dinosaurs (such as you and I) in the realm of politics are those who strive to interpret the constitution literally instead of as a "living document." A living document changes when the "truths" of our culture change. However, it should be noted that those who believe in a living document would be

ever, it should be noted that those who believe in a living document would be highly unlikely to use the term truths at all.

I've already run out of space and have said next to nothing about bias confirmation. First, however, one must understand postmodernism to see where bias confirmation fits in. So it's my hope that the brief discussion above has laid a foundation for this next idea. Trust me, much more could be said. Dr. Gene Edward Veith has written a book on the topic entitled Postmodern Times: A Christian Guide to Contemporary Thought and Culture. Let's briefly move on to look at confirmation bias then.

Confirmation Bias is a concept grounded in the study of cognitive dissonance. It is outlined in a book that has highly influenced my way of thinking entitled Mistakes Were Made (but Not by Me), which deals with cognitive dissonance theory, confirmation bias and other cognitive biases, using these psychological theories to illustrate how the perpetrators (and victims) of hurtful acts justify and rationalize their behavior. It describes a "positive feedback loop of action and self -deception by which slight differences between people's attitudes become polarized."

The simplest way of saying that confirmation bias is in play is that it causes us to look for what we consider facts and/or truths that confirm that the way we view things is the correct way. This explains how it's possible that a politician can actually "believe" that the manner in which the U.S. evacuated Afghanistan was the only way it could be done. S/he may firmly believe this to be true, even though those of a different political persuasion might think he is simply and only lying.

Looking for scraps of truth in the junk heap of such an event a person may consider all manner of "facts" to validate what they already believe to be true. The book, Mistakes Were Made (but Not by Me) is both sobering and humorous. If you choose to read (or listen) to it be prepared to have some of your ways of thinking challenged but to also come to a better understanding of others that may even help you share Christ with them. After all, it is no mere confirmation bias to believe, teach, and confess that Jesus (the) Christ suffered and died for the salvation of all who would/will believe.



The Anthropic Principle and New Life Forms

We know how problematic it is for life to have originated by natural means. Darwinists believe that life arose from a one celled organism sometime in the distant past and evolved to more complicated life forms that we see today. This is called macroevolution (from the goo to you via the zoo). They cite the fact that some bacteria resist antibiotics survive and thrive, which, they say, proves their belief in evolution. The problem is that those bacteria are still bacteria. They do not become a different organism. They merely exhibit the God given ability to adapt to new environments and conditions or microevolution. Darwinists make a point of defining evolution broadly to apply evidence in one situation to another. Berkley law professor Philip Johnson has exposed this trick in his book Darwin On Trial. He asserts that none of the 'proofs' for natural selection can create a new species, new organs, or lasting small changes. Other scientists agree that biochemical mutations cannot produce the changes needed to create new life forms. There are several reasons why it can't:

- There are genetic limits a dog is always a dog no matter the breeding and so it is with all other species. A terrier and a Great Dane are both dogs. There can be a microevolution among like species but not a macroevolution to a different species.
- **2** Changes within types are often cyclical Such as the finch's varying beak sizes that Darwin observed which correlated to the weather. The dryer the weather the larger the beak size, enabling the bird to find food in harsh circumstances; the wetter producing smaller beak sizes.
- 3 Organisms exhibit a system of irreducible complexity that is, they are made of parts that if taken away, the organism could not function. In other words, all the parts must be completely formed with their own specifications to perform the function for which they are designed. An analogy often cited is that of a mousetrap. If you take away any part of a mousetrap, it will be incapable of catching mice.
- Transitional organisms between old and new life forms could not survive. The example most cited is the evolution from reptiles to birds and transitioning from scales to feathers. Feathers are irreducibly complex. A creature that is beginning to form feathers would not be able to fly away from predators on land or water and would not be able to survive.
- Evolutionists point to the fact that all life contains DNA genetic code and therefore, a common ancestor. But that does not take into account that the letters of the code (A, T, C, G,) are placed in specific orders in each life form in a variety of ways. For example, from our alphabet, the letters in GOD and DOG are the same but the way they are placed in order makes all the difference in the world. As pointed out in a previous column, a common genetic code is good evidence of a creator who designed all life to live in the specific biosphere we have on Earth. Finally, there is no evidence in the fossil record of transitional forms of life. The only conclusion is that creation, not macroevolution, is true.

Stewardship

hy do we give? Is it simply because God commands us to? Or is there more to it? To be sure, the Word and instruction of God in the Bible says we should give, and this is sufficient to encourage us to give (Luke 6:38; Acts 20:35; 1 Cor. 16:2; 2 Cor. 8:7; Gal. 6:6).

But there's more to it than just obligation. We're not just trying to fulfill a work of the law. We are bearing fruits of the Spirit given to us by our Father in heaven through His Son our Lord Jesus Christ. In other words, we're not just doing what our Father said, we're also doing what He did.

Children emulate their parents. When they grow up, they often carry many of the same mannerisms and characteristics as their parents. But there is more to it than that. Children copy their parents even on a more mundane level. They watch how their parents cross their legs, how they fold their hands, how they stand and sit and walk, and how they do and say most everything. Then children try to copy it.

This can be quite humorous when caught in the act. They do this even when parents don't want them to. Everyone has been in the uncomfortable – and embarrassing situation – where a child does or says something one of their parents have done or said that is less than polite. Sitcoms thrive on these. It only works because of the truth that children emulate their parents, and they do it because they want to be like them.

We are the children of God – by grace through faith. In Holy Baptism, God the Father declares of us what He declared of Jesus at His Baptism in the Jordan, "You are my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." God the Father claims us as His own. He takes away all our sins. In exchange, He gives us His righteousness, His purity, His holiness, and His Spirit – by which we cry out, "Abba, Father."

We are born again – born from above, born of water and the Spirit – to a new life in Christ as His children. We are sons of God in Christ through Baptism. Since we are sons, we are heirs who share in the glory of the Son of God. The inheritance is ours because of the Father's grace, mercy, and generosity in sending His Son in time to save us for all eternity.

This is why we give generously of our income to the work of the church. We want to be like our heavenly Father. We want to emulate His generosity by being generous ourselves. We give to the work of the church because we have witnessed the generous giving of our Father in heaven.

More than that, we are recipients of it. It is because we have received our Father's gifts that we desire to give ourselves. His gifts are not just spiritual. They are temporal and earthly as well. As *Luther's Small Catechism* teaches in the Fourth Petition of the Lord's Prayer:

Give us this day our daily bread.

What does this mean? God certainly gives daily bread to everyone without our prayers, even to all evil people, but we pray in this petition that God would lead us to realize this and to receive our daily bread with thanksgiving.

What is meant by daily bread? Daily bread includes everything that has to do with the support and needs of the body, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, land, animals, money, goods, a devout

husband or wife, devout children, devout workers, devout and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, self-control, good reputation, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like.

In other words, He gives us everything that we need for the care of both body and soul. His generosity knows no bounds.

Therefore, we sit down at the beginning of the year, the beginning of the month, or the beginning of the week and set aside a generous portion of God's daily bread for His work in the church. This is not done because He has commanded us so to do but rather because we, as His children by grace, want to emulate His generosity in our own lives. He is our Father; we are His children. And children want to be like their parents.

How a Small, Country Congregation Became a Megachurch Overnight

his tiny rural church would bulge at the seams with worshipers from realms seen and unseen, all mixed together in the adoration of the Lamb. This is the story of how a small, country church astounded the experts on church growth by becoming a megachurch overnight. Without even trying.

The gravel parking lot around St. John's began to fill early that morning. The shadow from the steeple cast the image of a cross on the western side of the church. Families from miles around climbed out of Fords and Chevrolets to make their way into the sanctuary.

The pastor stood by the front door to greet folks. He asked about Aunt Susan's broken hip, the Reynold's new horse, and how the football game turned out in

The man of God who shepherded this flock wasn't much to look at. He had a bit of a gut. And he laughed too loud, especially at his corny jokes. But they loved the man. He had baptized their children, buried their grandparents, and even preached a decent sermon on occasion.

By the time worship was ready to begin, it still hadn't happened—that shocking influx of worshipers I spoke of. In fact, things looked as ordinary as ordinary could be.

The Kirkpatricks, with their five children, squeezed into the next-to-last pew. The spinster organist, Ms. Schultz, played softly and hit, well, almost every note.

Hymnals were opened to the page where the service would soon begin.

At 10:30 sharp, Pastor Baker walked up front and spoke the same words he did at the start of every Sunday service, "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." And the congregation responded with a hearty, "Amen!"

Then, without any warning, it happened.

The floodgates opened. Worshipers streamed in. Before the congregation had finished saying, "Amen," this rural Texas minichurch was transformed into the mega of megachurches.

Here's how it all went down.

Through the stained glass windows and the steeply pitched roof, seraphim swooped down from heavenly perches. Each sported six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. And around the sanctuary they chanted one to another, "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory!" The foundations of St. John's quaked at the sound of their voices. The whole church swam with the smoke of incense.

But that was only the beginning.

Cherubim winged their way down from the heavenly city. Not the cute, chubby Precious Moments' angels, but manly warriors who stationed themselves like sentinels around the sanctuary. They belted out the words to the hymns, added their Amens to the divine words read and preached that day.

But the angels were not alone. With them came saints innumerable. Men and women who had fought the good fight, finished the race, and gone on to glory. But here they were, back at St. John's on this Lord's day. They added their voices to the earthly choir of farmers and ranchers and coaches and teachers who still trod the pathway toward the heavenly Jerusalem.

The pews were packed. Standing room only in the aisles. Some perched on the rafters and peered down with serene gazes upon the altar. There, wonder of wonders, was a throne. And on that throne stood a Lamb, slain yet alive, sacrificed but resurrected. Every face of every worshiper, angelic and human, earthly and heavenly, was fixated upon his face.

There they looked upon the countenance of the merciful Almighty.

With angels and archangels and with all the company of heaven, the people of St. John's lauded and glorified the name of that Lamb, their Lord Jesus, that day.

Sacred songs shook the building as the choirs wed their voices. The Lord's Supper was a reunion meal. The folks on earth and the saints in heaven dined on the feast of feasts and the drink that slakes the deepest thirst.

It was a day to remember. A day to repeat.
