Message from the President

ugust has been a busy month as it always is at the Lake. Your Call/Planning Committee continues to meet on the Plus One Initiative as well as planning activities bi-weekly.

As representatives of Peace Lutheran Church, Bob Mueller and I attended an LCMS Missouri District meeting, "Churches Planting Churches". There were eleven churches invited to attend this two and a half day meeting, all involved in the planning process. I think we both thought we were going to be bored, but it turned out to be a well-planned, meeting/work session with the Center for United States Missions and LCMS Missouri District Staff leading the work session. We spent seventeen hours in meetings and another five hours preparing in our rooms for the next day's sessions.

Most of the churches had three to seven members (including their Pastor) in attendance, and had we known how good these sessions were going to be we would have asked the District to allow us to send the whole Call/Planning Committee.

It was a lot of intense education and discussion with other churches about their problems, all different from ours, and discussing ways to attempt to solve them. At the end of the session, each group (Bob and I being a group), was asked to make a seven minute power point presentation on their program, including any modifications that came out of the sessions, then to respond to seven minutes of questions from the group and then to pray for each group to accomplish their goals. Everyone was invited to prepare a written critique (positive and negative) of the presentations and plans. We received twentynine written critiques, which we will share with the Call/Planning Committee.

We went to all the sessions, did our homework and slept, and we still came home tired. Happy we had attended, but physically tired.

We have also had a month of good attendance at church, much of which has been visitors.

This month, as your representative, I will attend a Circuit meeting where both the Pastor and a lay representative of each church will be in attendance. We will not have a Pastor yet, but I have been asked to attend. Since we have never had a lay person attend, although these type of meetings are held twice annually, I am not sure what to expect, but we will be there and represent Peace.

Ladies, if you did not have the opportunity to attend the LWML Salad Luncheon and Style Show, you missed a great lunch and time. Thanks to the LWML for all they do for Peace.

Mr. Jerome Tobias Schwab celebrated his 90th birthday on August 20. He was a 1949 graduate of St. Paul's College and a 1954 graduate of Concordia Teacher's College, Seward, NE (BS Ed). He also received his Masters in Music from Northwestern University in 1957. From 1952 to 1960 Mr. Schwab taught at Messiah Lutheran School and was the Music Director at the church in Independence, MO. He was called to St. Paul's College in 1960 as Instructor (assistant Professor 1966, Associate Professor 1970, Full Professor 1984). He was in charge




of the Music Dept. at SPC and was especially known for his excellent choirs and organ playing. He married Dianna Holland who was also a music instructor (piano) at SPC and they were blessed with three children. When the college dept. closed in June of 1986 they moved back to Independence, MO and



taught at Kansas City Lutheran (high school). They retired and moved to Warsaw, MO. Mr. Schwab's father (the Rev. Walter Schwab) was also a part-time instructor at St. Paul's Lutheran High School for several years during the 70s.



Everyone His Witness: LASSIE



sking questions couples well with Listen because it A encourages people to continue to speak, which presents opportunities to continue to listen. Asking good questions is a great way to learn about a person's life, spirituality, politics, beliefs and a host of subjects and is more effective than merely making statements. It also shows that we are interested in the person as a person, not just as a spiritual conquest and presents to them respect and dignity. Jesus often asked questions when confronting others. (See Matthew 16:13-15, Mark 10:17-18, and Mark16:46b-47, 51.)

There are advantages to asking questions rather than making statements. Questions encourage discussion and thinking about a topic more deeply, and lessens a person's resistance to being open. As statements usually focus on a single point, questions can lead to a world of possibilities. Like listening ,questions should relate to how a person connects and communicates (Remember 'head, heart and hands" as explained in an earlier column.) A "head" person more likely will relate to information oriented questions that will tell you how the person thinks and understands. Ask a "heart" person questions that are centered on emotions in order to tell how the person feels. With a "hands" person, ask questions dealing with practical matters to shed light into the person's sense of purpose and how it refers to spiritual matters. Presenting questions in this manner will make the person more at ease in connecting and communicating. So how can one tell if a question should be geared to the head, heart or hands? By listening! As you listen, endeavor to discover the person's communication preference and then ask questions that line up with it. Remember to be genuine and sincere, use nonthreatening questions, ask to clarify when necessary, and use open-ended questions that can't be answered with a simple yes or no, which will prompt longer, informative answers. Avoid questions that come across as condescending or talking down to people that or make the person feel foolish. Don't interrupt. Let the speaker speak and finish their thought to let them know you are listening and you will also gain more insights into how they feel. Don't word statements as questions. People may see that as a dishonest

foolish. Don't interrupt. Let the speaker speak and finish their thought to let them know you are listening and you will also gain more insights into how they feel. Don't word statements as questions. People may see that as a dishonest attempt to control the conversation. Using questions like," Don't you think that ...?" or ending a question with, "... isn't that right?" is really making a statement instead of asking a question. Also, don't assume. Just because a person uses terms or ideas that seem to be Christian, don't assume that their knowledge and use is the same as yours. Ask for clarification. And don't assume you know what the person is going to say by mentally filling in the blanks or finishing their sentences. And finally, don't try to trap the speaker as if it's a courtroom soap opera. Someone feeling "boxed in" is a good way to end the conversation.

Questions come in three chief forms: basic, exploratory, and challenging. Basic questions start out with Who, What, Why, Where, When, or How and are good for obtaining information and meaning. Examples might be: Who is God? What do you know about Jesus? What are your thoughts on the Bible? etc. Exploratory questions deal with reasons, evidence, and conclusions. They examine the reason why a person says what they say and seeks to understand their viewpoint. Why do you believe that _____ is true? What evidence do you have for ___? Or How do you know

? are examples. Challenge questions probe deeper and key in on worldviews and beliefs such as: What if isn't ? What is true? How would you answer an objection to your response to ? Or What are you implying when you say ? Care must be given not to ask challenge questions too soon in the talk as they could make the person uneasy. And remember the dos and don'ts as discussed above. Listen and Ask in the LASSIE format are designed to keep a conversation going and moving forward.

What This Test is About

These have come so that your faith—of greater worth than gold, which perishes even thought refined by fire may be proved genuine and may result in praise, glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed. I Peter I:7

The tests we face reveal both our weaknesses and our strengths. When the Bible speaks of 'a refiner's fire' (see Malachi 3:2), we're inclined to think of the negative things God wants to remove from our character. But we also have inner strengths and gifts that need to be refined but we're not aware of them because a demand hasn't been placed on them. In 1 Kings 17, when the widow and her son met Elijah there was a famine in the land, and he asked her to share their last meal with him. Maybe you're thinking, 'Typical preacher!' Don't be too quick to jump to conclusions! One of the best days in this woman's life was when God placed a demand on her faith. Her response changed her future and saved her family. So when you're faced with a need, how do you respond? Do you withdraw? Withhold? Give a sense of obligation? Or do you see it as an opportunity to obey God and change your future? You can actually give your way out of trouble? (See 2 Corinthians 9:6-11.) When God sent Moses to Pharaoh, He said, 'The king of Egypt will not let you go unless a mighty hand compels him' (Exodus 3:19). And today God may be permitting the enemy to test you in order to reveal:

- 1) how much He cares for you;
- 2) how you'll act when your back's against the wall;
- who you'll believe when God says, 'I will bring you out with a mighty hand,' and the enemy is saying, 'I won't let you go.'

That's what this test is about.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, test me to make me stronger. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

What is a steward? Most people will say a steward is a manager.

That is correct, but it is only half right. A steward is indeed a manager, but he is a manager of what does not belong to him. Someone else is the owner, and the steward manages the owner's property on the owner's behalf.

We are God's stewards. Our stewardship is that God has made us managers of what belongs to Him:

"For we brought nothing into this world, and we cannot take anything out of the world" (1 Tim. 6:7).

Everything that we have and everything that we are comes from God's fatherly divine goodness and mercy. God is the owner.

This is not only because He created all things; He is also the redeemer. He has redeemed – that is, purchased – and won all things. Therefore, it all belongs to Him.

We are simply managers of everything in this world. Like Joseph in Egypt, we are put in charge of managing what belongs to God. What a privilege.

Think about that for a minute. The all-knowing, allpowerful, all-wise God has asked us to manage his possessions on His behalf here on earth.

And by doing this, He invites us to take part in the allocation of His good gifts. He wants us to give our input and advise Him in where His gifts are to be used. What a privilege indeed.

But what a responsibility!

"Everyone to whom much was given, of him much will be required" (Luke 12:48b).

We are not the owners. And while He puts us as managers, we are still to do with His property what He wants done with it. That means we need to know what He desires and wills for His property.

How do we know this? How can we know the will and mind of God?

We find the will of God in the Bible. There God tells us what His will is for all of His gifts. He tells us how we are to spend our time and use our talents and treasures. He instructs us in the use of our minds, bodies, and souls.

There is nothing we have that doesn't belong to Him.

"Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price. So glorify God in your body" (1 Cor. 6:19–20). God informs us of the big picture, the overarching policy, of how we as His stewards – managers and custodians – are to manage His property.

And that is stewardship. It is simply doing what God wants us to do with what He has given us.

As St. Paul said,

"Do not present your members to sin as instruments for unrighteousness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and your members to God as instruments for righteousness" (Rom. 6:13).

So, let's dive into God's Word, and listen to what He desires from His stewards.


New Business:

- 1. Call Committee Report:
 - The Peace Lutheran Church Planning Report is completed.
 - The committee reviewed the Plus One Initiative proposal. Members will send suggested changes to Jeff Emery. The initiative will be sent to District. District's review and approval will probably take a few weeks.
 - Mic and Bob Mueller will attend a District Conference in Springfield beginning on Aug. 15 to Aug. 17. They hope to encourage a timely formation of a call list.
 - When District provides a list, the committee will review the candidates, contact them the, and present a list to the Peace Lutheran congregation.
- 2. Pastoral coverage is assigned through September.
- 3. The office computer, which was purchased in 2004, is not working properly. It wastes at least 10 minutes to "warm up" when turned on. It stops working when printing and has to be turned off to finish the job. It is out of memory. Microsoft 7 will no longer provide support on line after Dec 31.

The board authorized Mic Carlson to get three cost quotations and select the quote that will best meet the need of the church. He expects that the total cost to purchase a new computer and update the systems will be approximately \$1,100.00.

The meeting was adjourned and council closed with the Lord's Prayer.
