A Message from Pastor Brandt

emember when the coronavirus scare first came out early this year? We were told that when summer came the heat would kill the virus—that it would all be over. But instead, it got worse. So now we ask, when will it end? A friend of mine said that he believes it's here to stay; that they will come up with a vaccine and it will be like the flu or other diseases like the measles or mumps or shingles. What do you think? Somebody else said the

coronavirus is like politics—here to stay and will only get worse! Wow! While the Scriptures don't address the coronavirus, God's Word certainly provides comfort and assurance during these troubled times. Psalm 138 is only eight verses long, so I encourage you to read it. Verse 7 begins, "Though I walk in the midst of trouble, you preserve my life; you stretch out your hand against the anger of my foes, with your right hand you save me." This psalm was written by David, and more than once he faced grave danger; the wrath of unnamed enemies, just as the terrifying enemies of fear and doubt, sin and death reach out for us. Sadly, the virus isn't the only thing troubling us. On the national scene, it's continued riot-

ing and defunding police departments when they are needed more than ever. And now, we're only a few months away from a major presidential election. Whoever you support, you feel that our nation is in big trouble if your opponent wins. But closer to home, there can be so many personal issues. You know my situation: I'm smack dab in the middle of a divorce. Who would have thought that after 49 years and 7 months of marriage that this would happen. I can ask, "Why," but I won't get an answer, at least not yet. So let me share another personal story with you that has a happy ending: My daughter-in-law, Jeni, Drew's wife, has worked for 24 years for the same company out of Ada, OK, where they



lived until she persuaded them to let her work from home seven years ago. So they "stole" (just kidding but it felt like it), our two granddaughters and moved back to her home up here at Russellville. About two months ago, very unexpectedly, she and several others were fired—without any advanced warning. And by the way, she made very good money, and knew she wouldn't be able to match it with a MO State job, even if she got one. To cut to the chase, yesterday, she returned to work, performing the job she previously had before the current one. All her seniority is being carried forward and she's receiving the same pay. What a blessing and answered prayer! That ties in with what I keep saying about my situation: God is in control. God has a plan. He has always taken care of me. So what about you? God Has Promised to Be With You

No one will be able to stand up against you all the days of your life. As I was with Moses, so I will be with you; I will never leave you nor forsake you. Joshua 1:15

he Bible says, 'After the death of Moses...the Lord said to Joshua... "Moses my servant is dead...get ready to cross the River Jordan into the land I am about to give to [you]" (vv.1-2). Joshua knew Moses was dead, and Israel knew it too. So why did God remind him? Because Joshua wasn't just following a leader, he was following a legend. Moses had been Israel's security blanket for forty years. He was the essential go-to guy. He led an entire generation out of 400 years of captivity in a single night. He parted a sea with the wave of a stick. He prayed and God rained down bread from heaven each day. When the nation was about to die of thirst, he struck a rock and water filled canteens. By any measurement, Moses was a massive success. Buy why? Was it his ingenuity? His creativity? His genius? No, it was the presence of God in his life. But now Moses was gone, and for Joshua that was bad news. But the good news was that God remained. 'No one will be able to stand up against you all the days of your life. As I was with Moses, so I will be with you; I will never leave you nor forsake you.' You say, 'But that's an Old Testament promise.' Then read this: 'For no matter how many promises God has made, they are "Yes" in Christ. And so through him the "Amen" is spoken by us to the glory of God' (2 Corinthians 1:20). Today God has promised to be with you. Believe Him!

ost of you are aware we are trying to update the 2019 Planning Report, approved by the Voters during July of 2019.

The first step is always to look at the makeup of our membership. I hate to admit I am getting older, but when I look at the congregational facts, we are getting older.

57.6 percent of our congregation is age 70 and older. If you take that down to age 60 and older the percentage becomes 68.2 percent and if you take it down to age 50 and older the percentage becomes 89.4 percent. I wish I had the data and information to see what the congregation was 10 years ago, or even 20 years ago. I would probably be shocked to find that while a little lower, it wasn't that much lower.

The other interesting statistic is that 45.5 percent of our membership lives in the Camdenton zip code, 18.8 in the Gravois Mills and 12.2 percent in the Sunrise Beach zip code. That accounts for 76.1 percent of our membership.

The question I have been asked is why are we going to the trouble to update the planning we completed just over a year ago? We are doing so, to stay on top of trying to grow this congregation and doing it to keep our congregation informed. Transparency has become an important part of our society, and we want everything that is being done and happening, to be openly available to each and every member of the congregation.

We will probably not present the 2020 update to our planning until the January 2021 Voters Meeting. Our next Voters Meeting will be in October, and that meeting is always taken up with the election of officers and directors and the 2021 budget. Your Council is working on developing the

Continuing the Special Revelation of Jesus and Ten Reasons to Believe That the New Testament (NT) Writers Told the Truth

Reason #5: They included events of the resurrection that they wouldn't have made up:

- 1) The account of Jesus' burial. The NT authors say that Joseph of Arimathea, of the Sanhedrin, took the body of Jesus and buried Him. Considering that the Sanhedrin was the Jewish governing body that sentenced Jesus to death, why would they put a member of that body in a good light? The bad blood between the disciples and the Sanhedrin is well known so why would they make Joseph of Arimathea honorable and brave, and why would they put Jesus' body in the tomb of a Jewish official if it wasn't true? And keep in mind that if the narrative was false, it could be easily refuted. But the Jewish authorities did no such thing and offered no alternative account.
- 2) The first witnesses of the resurrection were women according to all four gospels. One of the women was Mary Magdalene, who Luke says was demon possessed (Luke 8:2). It is very unlikely that the gospel writers would include such a person in this narrative if it was made up. A person who was demon possessed would not be a credible witness. Also remember that women in first century Jewish society were not considered to be reliable witnesses. Given that their testimony would not even be admitted in legal proceedings, why would they be included in the account? Wouldn't it make more sense to make themselves the men to be the brave and mighty heroes if they were fabricating a story? This fact is good evidence of the integrity of the gospels.
- **3)** The Jewish narrative: According to the last chapter in Matthew some of the guards came to the chief

- **3)** The Jewish narrative: According to the last chapter priests and told them what had happened. The chief priests then met with the elders and they devised their own narrative, bribed the guards and told them to say that the disciples had stolen the body. In return the Jews would vouch for them and keep them out of trouble. And that's the story that went out. Note that Matthew says that his readers already know this when he writes," This story has been widely circulated among the Jews to this very day." So the gospel readers and the Jews would certainly know if Matthew was telling the truth or not. If Matthew was lying, the resurrection story could easily be refuted and exposed as a false account. The only possible explanation is that the tomb was really empty and that the Jews really did circulate their false account and Matthew was telling the truth.
- 4) Many priests were converted: Luke writes," The number of disciples increased rapidly, and a large number of priests became obedient to the faith" (Acts 6:7). They even helped to create controversy when some of the Pharisees stood up and demanded that "Gentiles must be circumcised and required to obey the law of Moses" (Acts 15:5). The main point here is that Luke wouldn't have written these accounts if they weren't true. Why so? Again, these accounts could have easily been proved false if they were not true. Whether there were priestly converts or not could have easily been determined by anyone reading the accounts. Luke would not have given anyone an easy way to falsify his writings and, therefore, his narratives must be true.

That point, of course, is not about missing mattresses, lost millions, or a misplaced silver coin. Today, we think about sinners who are spiritually lost and need to be found. More specifically, we are thinking about your sinner. No, not you, but someone who is close to you, someone whom you love dearly, someone who feels -- for whatever reason -- he, or she, doesn't need the Savior. What I'm proposing is this: let's take the tens of thousands of people who read these devotions and bring them together in prayer. Let's unite all of our hearts and all of our prayers and bring these lost, our lost, to the Lord. So, in the prayer that follows, please substitute the name of your lost coin, your missing mattress, your loved one who is gone. Spend an extra moment thinking of that person and know thousands upon thousands of others are doing the same.

God calls those who govern to bear the sword, that is, to punish those who do evil (those who live contrary to God's will) and to

reward those who do good (those whose lives are lived in conformity with God's will). Those who are governed are to obey their leaders as to the Lord Himself, for their leaders bear the sword of God's temporal justice for a purpose.

As members of God's own family, the Church.

He calls those who preach and teach to do so in faithfulness to His holy Word. To preach and teach the Law of God to convict the hearts of hearers of their sin and to encourage, admonish, and exhort them to do good works in accordance with God's will. They are to preach and teach the Gospel, the full



forgiveness of their sins accomplished by Christ and received through faith, not by works. They are to administer the means of grace in accordance with the Gospel and the Word of God. They do all this for the young and old alike, for those who are near and far off. Those who hear and learn are to submit themselves to their preachers and teachers. They are support them by their prayers and their gifts.

Each of these callings from God place a duty on us. They make a claim on our presence; on our prayers; and our time, talents, and treasures. So, "Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might" (Eccl 9:10). Pray for your family, your government, and your church.
