"Gripping' God's Word"

s most of you know, I grew up in a small town south of St. Louis. My Dad grew up in Nebraska, 500 miles away, but my Mom never got more than two blocks away from her parents. Not only was I close geographically, but my Grandpa and I were very close. Like me, he was blessed with perfect health; never sick and never in the hospital until he developed prostate cancer at age 92. He probably would have lived to be 98 like his mother or 103 like his brother, but he died a painful death when he was 93 on the morning of my 40th birthday because they wouldn't perform surgery on him at his age. I have many fond memories from my childhood but one of them is what my Grandpa did nearly every afternoon on the cold winter days. In the Fall he would pick walnuts and in the winter he would crack them. I

can still picture him sitting on an upside-down bucket in the basement next to the warm furnace. You can imagine how stained his gloves were and the wooden handle of his ball pein hammer which he gripped. Those gloves and that hammer served only one purpose: cracking messy walnuts. During my 23 years of ministry in Oklahoma, I was the Norman Circuit Counselor for 21 years. During that time I was privileged to preside over many Ordinations of new pastors and Installations of pastors beginning their ministry at a congregation within our circuit. At their Service, they were not given gloves or a hammer to work with, but they were vested with a red stole, by which they symbolically put on the "yoke" of Christ for doing His work. These men made promises to be faithful in their ministry and to seek the empower-

ment of the Holy Spirit for devoted service to Christ and His church. As I installed each one of them, the congregation members also made promises to faithfully help them carry out the ministry entrusted to their specific congregation by God. The divine purpose to which they have been called is described by the apostle Paul: "And he gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ" (Eph 4:11-12). Did you catch what Paul said? A pastor's work of ministry is to equip YOU for doing the work of ministry! In other words, the Holy Spirit puts pastors to work for the purpose of PUTTING YOU TO WORK! The thought of the pastor putting the parishion-

The thought of the pastor putting the parishioners to work seems odd, but that is the work St. Paul is talking about, "to equip the saints." The pastor's work is to guide the saints to the tools needed for the work of ministry and teach them how to use them effectively. Those tools are the Word of God and the Sacraments. The pastor is called to open the Scripture. . .making it understandable. . .remembering that: "All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be competent, equipped for every good work" (2 Tim 3:16-17). The pastor is charged with directing the focus of the saints to God's purpose of "building up the body of Christ." When I was ordained in 1995 I thought that I had to do all the work of ministry by myself—and the "saints" sure let me. But I realized that I couldn't do it alone and that ministry was certainly more than typing and copying the Sunday Bulletin. The Holy Spirit gave me the awareness that this was THEIR ministry and I was called simply to share in it with them. This awareness opened to me the true joy of ministry! Obviously you aren't going to bring a hammer and work gloves to the Worship Service or Bible Class, but you should GRIP your Bible and get to work—reading, studying, learning and inwardly digesting that life-giving Word of God. My Grandpa's stained gloves and hammer produced a healthy nut from within a dirty shell. With the power of prayer and God's Word, the Holy Spirit can and will use us to lead other "dirty, stained" sinners to a healthy, forgiven life with the Lord. Firmly gripping the Word and desiring to do kingdom work makes life exciting as we allow the Holy Spirit's power to work in us and through us! **LET THE WORK**

Sharing Christ with Others

've always been fascinated by trivia. If you are too, here's an interesting piece of it for you. More than 200 years ago, with flint and steel, Tom Dalton started a fire in his Blue Ridge Mountain cabin. That's not all that important until you realize his descendants have kept the fire burning. Requiring a cord of wood a month, the fire has been watched from one generation to another, moved from one cabin to another. It has become the oldest man-made fire in the United States -- perhaps in the world. It's not been an




easy task for the Dalton descendants, but always the fire has been kept burning. Now, that's commitment! You don't hear much about commitment anymore, do you? Almost every year we hear stories about spies who sell out our nation and her secrets. We have seen spouses desert each other; we have watched as promising politicians are elected and promptly forget their campaign commitments. In contrast, Christians are blessed to have a Savior who is constantly committed to the saving of lost souls. That commitment had Him misunderstood by men, betrayed and denied by friends, and crucified by the people He had come to save. Even so, Jesus stayed on the course that took Him to the cross. And because He did that, the open tomb tells us we are blessed to have a Savior in whom we can believe and to whom we can be loyal. Redeemed and restored, like the Dalton family, our lives can now be committed to letting our light shine as a witness to the lost and lonely world.

Planting and Watering Among Unbelieving People

We Americans are a results-oriented people. We strive for desired out-



comes and results that are tangible, measureable, and predictable. But sometimes we tend to turn things upside down when we try to bring those results oriented goals to the work that we are called to do as Christ's witnesses. Instead of focusing on the right things, we get focused on producing the desired results — those that are solely the work of God. In 1 Corinthians 3, we

on producing the desired results – those that are solely the work of God. In 1 Corinthians 3, we read about witnessing as God meant it to be. There was tension in the Corinthian church over who was doing what. God's Word as given by the apostle Paul set them straight... "So neither he who plants nor he who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth" (v. 6 -7). God alone provides the outcome. When it comes to the growth, everyone who plants and waters is nothing. But when it comes to "planting" and "watering", God has made His witnesses of great importance. "Planting" is when we share God's Word with unbelievers like a farmer who plows his fields and then sows the seeds. We plant by sowing, or sharing, the seed of God's life-giving Word. Of course, it's the work of the Holy Spirit to break up the hard soil of ignorance, sin, indifference, hostility, and confusion, and to bring forth life from the seed of His Word. Our role in planting is to speak that Word.

"Watering" is what we do to nurture the soil after we have sown the seed of the Word. Like the work of sowing, to nurture what we have sown is to share God's word with people so that the seed has what it needs to grow. Of course, we witnesses cannot produce the growth. We plant and water but only God gives the growth. We sow the seed of the Word, we nurture that seed with more of the Word of God, and the Holy Spirit works faith when and where He wills in those who receive the Word.

st Article Apologetics Principle

Astrophysicist Carl Sagan wrote this about the human brain: "The information content of the human brain expressed in bits is probably comparable to the total number of connections among the neurons – about a hundred billion bits. If written out in English, that information would probably fill some 20 million volumes, as many in the world's largest libraries. The equivalent of 20 million books is in the head of every one of us. The brain is a very big place in a very small space. The neurochemistry of the brain is astonishingly busy; the circuitry of a machine more wonderful than any devised by humans." Sagan realized that the human brain is more specified and complex than any machine ever created by mankind. However, he was also a staunch evolutionist,

he was also a staunch evolutionist, believing that life began with one cell, progressing to all forms of life we know today. The question is, if intelligent humans can't create anything close to the human brain, why should we expect non-intelligent natural laws to do so? How is it possible to go from one cell to something as complicated as the human brain? And where does the equivalent of 20 million books of information contained in the human brain come from? While the path from one cell to the human brain is a long one, as we saw last month, going from non-living matter to a living cell is too big a task to happen by natural means. Evolutionists do not have an acceptable answer. They all believe that one life form evolves to another. But that's impossible unless you



other. But that's impossible unless you have preexisting life. It takes intelligence to create life. It takes intelligence to create a brain. It takes intelligence to create intelligence. Therefore, the best explanation for the human brain must be an intelligent, conscientious, all powerful being – a Beginner, a Designer, a Sustainer – God of all creation! Stewardship

At the end of the first of his chapters on the virtue of faith in *Mere Christianity*, C.S. Lewis provides a helpful reminder, by way of analogy, for the foundation of stewardship. He wrote:

"Every faculty you have, your power of thinking or of moving your limbs from moment to moment, is given you by God. If you devoted every moment of your whole life exclusively to His service you could not give Him anything that was not in a sense His own already. So then, when we talk of a man doing anything for God or giving anything to God, I will tell you what it is really like. It is like a small child going to its father and saying, 'Daddy, give me sixpence to buy you a birthday present.' Of course, the father does, and he is pleased with the child's present. It is all very nice and proper, but only an idiot would think that the father is sixpence to the good on the transaction. When a man has made these two discoveries God can really get to work. It is after this that real life begins. (128-129)."


This is the first thing we are given to confess about steward-ship, and it has to do with ownership. God owns everything, and we are simply managers – stewards – acting on His behalf. This is true not only of all that we have in this life (Deut. 8:17–18) but also all that we are in this life (1 Cor. 6:20).

The rest flows from here. Since we are stewards, or managers, of what belongs to God, entrusted to make use of it according to His will, there is an expectation of responsibility and accountability. For the Lord said, "Everyone to whom much was given, of him much will be required, and from him to whom they entrusted much, they will demand the more" (Luke 12:48b). And from this comes blessing and reward: "Well done,

whom they entrusted much, they will demand the more" (Luke 12:48b). And from this comes blessing and reward: "Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master" (Matt. 25:21).

We have everything we need to support this body and life from our God's fatherly divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in us. We have everything we need for our spiritual life also from His merciful hands. On account of the sacrifice of His Son, our Lord Jesus, through the preaching of the gospel and the administration of the sacraments, we have the forgiveness of sins, eternal life, and everlasting salvation delivered to us with absolute certainty that it is ours – not as stewards but as sons (Gal. 4:1–7). Let us then, as His own sons, press all that He gives to us into the service of His church and to His glory.

The minutes from the July 13, 2021 meeting were approved as printed.

Financial Secretary: No report

Treasurer: Mic Carlson presented Rita's report. At present we have an operating loss of about \$740.00. The

report was accepted and approved. **Elders:** Jeff Hedberg had no report.

Ushers: Bob Borgmann reported the following:

- He asked if there is interest in returning to having ushers pass the collection plates. The board voted to continue having the plates at the back of the sanctuary.
- Due to health considerations, Bob requested that he be removed from the position of head usher. The board regretfully granted his request and sincerely thanks him for his 26 years of service. He has done an excellent job.

Member at Large: No report

Trustees: Chuck reported the following:

- On July 14 he used the weed eater around the fence line, purchased fuel for mowing, and sprayed for weeds behind the fence. He mowed on July 24.
- Jeff Emery mowed on July 21 and the 27. He cleaned up trash from the front yard.
- Pat Callahan mowed on July 21 and July 31.
- Chuck added salt to the water softener on July 25.
- On August 6 Chuck used the weed eater along the fence and around the bridge in the valley. On the same day he worked on the furnace next to the water softener. The filter was loose due to a broken bracket.
- On August 9 Chuck used the weed eater around the mailbox and made a cover for the drain in the front yard.
- On August 10 he repaired gutters that were damaged when the new roof was installed.
