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Christian Symbols

Anchor Cross The anchor is a symbol of the Christian's hope in Christ. "We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure" (Hebrews 6:19, NIV). The early Christians used this cross during the days of persecution. They saw hope in the anchor's cross, while non-Christians saw nothing but an anchor.




Triquetra

This early symbol for the Holy Trinity is formed from three

equal arcs. The arcs represent equality, the continuous line expresses eternity, and the interweaving represents indivisibility. At the center is a triangle, another symbol of the Trinity. Because of its beauty and simplicity, the triquetra is often used as a design element in church architecture.

St. Mary Magdalene: Another Unlikely Saint

n July 22, the church remembers and celebrates St. Mary Magdalene. Before the new hymnal came out, the appointed Gospel lesson was Luke 7:36-50. There, we hear about an unnamed prostitute anointing the head and feet of Jesus while He ate with a pharisee. We learn more about Mary from the next chapter of Luke's gospel: she had seven, yes, seven demons cast from her. Put that all together and



you a picture of a woman who knew God's grace and knew it came from Jesus, God's own Son in the flesh. It makes complete sense that she stuck so close to Jesus, following him and providing for him and the disciples out of their means.

You might say Mary is an unlikely saint, but becoming a saint is not something that we do for ourselves. No, God must do the work of making saints. Just as He did for Mary, He has done for you.

Just think about who God chooses to be his own. Abraham, he was the son of an idolater and a liar, as the story in Egypt shows. Jacob was a deceiver.

Judah took a prostitute, who happened to be the wife of his dead son. David, the best of the Old Testament Kings, had a man killed because he would not lay with his wife to cover up the fact that David had taken her for himself and that a child was on the way. The ones chosen by God are not saintly by the world's standards at all. And that's just in the Old Testament! The new testament is just as littered with unlikely saints, Paul being the most profound.

But that is what our Lord does. He does not *find* saints, instead he *makes* them. He makes saints out of sinners. He takes hold of them,

He makes them clean; He cleanses them just as He cleansed you by water and the word to be his holy bride. And that's no matter who you are. Jesus wants you for Himself. He came that you might be His and His alone.

You may have heard of the book *The Da Vinci Code* by Dan Brown, maybe not. It's a riveting tale of fiction that depicts that Mary Madgalene was the wife of Jesus in an earthly sense. And that Jesus was a mere human. Scripture and the Church Fathers never say such a thing.

The Bride of Christ is His Church—the whole Church. Mary, like you and I, are members of this body. You and I, along with Mary, are the bride of Christ by faith. Christ has made Himself one flesh with us. Christ has given us all that He is and all that He has. Christ went so far as to die for us, that having cleansed by his own blood, He might present to himself a clean and perfect bride. This bride did nothing to deserve Christ's love and devotion. This bride did not take hold of Christ, but Christ sought her out and made her His bride. He clung to her even through death, and He still clings to her now that she might be with Him always.

Mary Magdalene goes to the tomb that first Easter all upset, empty, and drained from the previous day's events. Before Jesus, she was the prostitute and woman with seven demons. Her life was a living hell. Then Jesus took hold of her. She was granted new life in Him, but as she walked to the tomb had hell really won? Had death and hell taken Jesus away from her? The images of the cross and the sound of the stone being rolled in front of the tomb screamed, "Yes!"

But the tomb is empty when she walks up. However, her thoughts

only make her feel worse. Had someone stolen the body? Where did they take him?

"Why are you weeping?" The angels know the truth of the resurrection, but Mary is unable to consider the resurrection. "Why are you weeping?" asked the man, whom she assumed to be the gardener. She is standing outside of a tomb. Why do you think she would be crying? Dead men don't rise.! She still is look-



ing for the dead body and asks for the location.

Then the most perfect word comes from the mouth of this man: "Mary." **The Shepherd calls His sheep by name**. Mary knows. She goes to Him and does not plan to ever let Him go again. However, Jesus has one more thing to teach Mary. "I am giving you my body and blood to cling to in a better and even fuller way, a way for all people to cling to me. You shall cling to me by Word and Sacrament. And most importantly, I will cling to you, that you have life everlasting."

That is what we have. We have a Lord and Savior who clings on to us. It is He who makes us His saints. Unlikely and full of sin as we are, yet He loves us just as He loved Mary. That same mercy and grace that was shown to her is shown to you day in and day out. Recall how Christ called you out of darkness and into his marvelous light via the waters of holy baptism. Look to the altar and recall the sacrifice Christ made, giving up his body and shedding his blood for you and your forgiveness. All works done by Christ for you to make you his own.

So let us take our place at the table of unlikely saints with St. Mary and receive again that grace and mercy of Bridegroom Jesus Christ and rejoice in the love shown to us all. Christ has made his Bride forever. Rev. Jacob Hercamp

The Meaning of Membership



klahoma Pastor Ricky Jones tackles the meaning of church membership, or being part of Christ's body. "Leaving the church is not simply leaving a club," he writes at the Gospel Coalition website. "When you walk away, you dismember yourself from the body. Jesus and the rest of the body sorely miss you, and bleed after your departure. You cut

yourself off from your only source of life and nourishment. Like an amputated hand, you will slowly bleed out, wither, and die." Jones contends that "being a part of the universal church without submit-

ting to a local church is not possible, biblical or healthy." It's impossible because you need to be part of a smaller community before you can be considered part of a greater community. It's unbiblical because the New Testament epistles are addressed to specific local churches. And it's unhealthy because wanting to independently make your own choices is "at the heart of sin," the pastor writes.

"You need to know we're all in this life together, and we won't walk away from you just because you let us down or we disagree," says Jones. "Together we build each other up into the image of Christ; no one can make it alone." from ChurchArtPro

Every One His Witness: The LASSIE Approach To Witnessing

Ask In Order To Listen

s a rule, people enjoy talking about themselves and their interest. Questions can play an important role in guiding what they share as they talk about their spiritual lives, beliefs, fears, concerns, etc. The goal of asking good witnessing questions is to encourage discussion to best discern how to best serve as a witness of Jesus. Here are some suggestions on how to frame questions:

Do Be Genuine

Ask questions that reflect sincere interest and concern, looking for things you have in common.

Do Use Open-Ended Questions

Questions that can't be answered with a simple yes or no, which will encourage people to give extended answers. Asking "Why did you feel hurt by that?" to encourage a detailed response is better than asking "Did that make you feel hurt?" which will get only a "yes" or "no" answer.

Do Ask Non-Threatening Questions

Remember you're having a discussion, not conducting an



inquiry. When you ask a question that might be challenging, ask in a way that might doesn't make the person feel that they're under attack. Think how they will best receive the question.

Do Use Questions to Clarify

When people use terms or concepts that are unfamiliar, rather than assume anything, ask for an explanation to clarify. That may open up the possibility of further discussion.

The Andrew Evangelism Devotion



O ne of the two who heard John speak and followed Jesus was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his own brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which means Christ). He brought him to Jesus. John 1:40-42a

O ver the years I have seen evangelism programs come and go. Some have been good and effective; others have been less so. All were motivated by a desire to fulfill the Great Commission's commands to go, teach, preach and baptize.

Of course, there is one evangelism program that has always proven itself to be quite effective: "The Andrew Evangelism Program." Now the name of the program may be new to you. The program itself is quite old. It is based

on the style used by the New Testament's Andrew to reach out to his brother Simon. The Andrew Evangelism Program asks its adherents to do this:

1. Think of someone who is important to you who doesn't know or worship Jesus.

2. Moved by an overwhelming desire not to see that person in hell, go to them and say, "I've found the Savior. I'd like you to know Him, too. Would you come with me to church?"

That's it. That's the whole program. It doesn't call for a lot of training; it doesn't ask you to learn a gazillion Bible passages; it doesn't ask you to knock on the door of total strangers. It does ask you to reach out to somebody because you are the one who can do the job better than anybody else.

Now there are two reasons I bring this up. The first reason is a gentle reminder that more souls have been won by this simple approach than any other. The second reason is because September 18 is **National Back to Church** **Sunday**. Now we both know that every Sunday ought to be back-tochurch Sunday. Why somebody picked this particular date is beyond me. And even though **National Back to Church Sunday** is hardly an official church holiday, picking a date like this to invite somebody back to worship is a pretty good idea.

If you don't like the date, pick another. But please, pick one. Pick one because every survey I've ever seen has said, "Many people would go back to church, if someone close to them asked them." Whether these statistics are true or not, I can't say. I can tell you the day Andrew talked to his brother, Simon saw Jesus and the Holy Spirit brought him to his Lord. The Andrew Evangelism Program worked that day and it works still. Please, give it a try.

Prayer: Dear Lord, because someone, somewhere told me about Jesus, I have been given faith in the Savior. Now may I, as opportunity presents itself, be such a "someone" for others around me. This I ask in the Name of the crucified and risen Savior. In His Name. Amen.


Questions and Suggestions

Some people say, "We don't even know if there ever was a Jesus of Nazareth." How might you respond?



Suggested Answer: You

should explain that it would be difficult to find any credible historian who agrees with that statement because the historical evidence for Jesus is overwhelming. You might add that if we don't know that Jesus lived, then we also don't know if Socrates, Aristotle, or even Alexander the Great lived, because the evidence we have for Jesus is at least as good, or better, than any of these other historical figures. Then invite them to consider some of the evidence that Jesus lived in real history and invite them to consider what Jesus has done for us on the cross.



Jesus asked, "Were not all ten cleansed? Where are the other nine?" Luke 17:17, NIV



Suggested Answer: You can say that Jesus did a great many miracles proving that He is the Son of God and point to the evidence that He died and rose from the dead. You could also note that "existence" is a miracle in itself. (from: The Reason I Believe by Allen Quist)

Continuing Education

In September, Christian education programs are in full swing. How wonderful to see classrooms of children learning about Jesus! But what about the grown-ups? Some parents who make sure their kids get to Sunday school don't attend Bible study themselves.

Following and learning about Christ are lifelong pursuits. If we are to love God with our *mind* (as well as with our heart, soul and strength), then we must keep learning even into old age. Plus, when we are well informed about God's Word and our faith, we can share it with non-Christians and express the reason for our hope (see 1 Peter 3:15).

To love God with "all your mind" (Mark 12:30), find an adult Bible study or small group that dives into Scripture. Then humbly wear the label of lifelong learner, knowing that God still has new things to teach even the most seasoned Christian.



We encourage all of our members to attend the weekly Bible study that are held after worship each Sunday beginning at 10:30 a.m. in the fellowship hall.



Stewards, Called to Forgiveness

Here and redeemed to be stewards. Bearing the image of God (Gen. 1:26–28), the steward was created to reflect the Creator within creation. In a way, stewards are simply mirrors. Mirrors cannot do anything to the image that is placed in front of them.

A mirror was the first item in creation that embodied the computer term GIGO. "Garbage in, Garbage out." In a computer, if you enter good data, you get a good result. You enter bad data; you will get a garbage result.

In photography, you can run an image through a filter, which can remove imperfections. Myriad apps allow for the option to cut people out, add people in and change backgrounds all in an attempt to make the perfect image. Mirrors cannot do that. They do not provide anything new. Mirrors are created to reflect, not process, an image. They simply reflect the person standing in front of them.

Stewards are like this. Created to reflect, a steward will reflect the God in front of them. The steward will either reflect a godly stewardship that holds that God is the owner of all things (Ps. 24:1) and is the One to whom they are accountable, or they will reflect the god of self and see the created order as something to be possessed, used, and in far too many cases, abused. It is not a question of **if** the steward reflects, it is really a question of **who** is being reflected.

For this reason, the *Lutheran Service Book* has included a necessary hymn worthy of meditation: "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (*LSB* 788). Its first verse reads:

> Forgive us, Lord, for shallow thankfulness, For dull content with warmth and sheltered care,

For songs of praise for food and harvest press, While of Your richer gifts we're unaware.

This is a fitting call to repentance for every steward. Our thankfulness is so often shallow. We get comfortable with the overflowing blessings we have entrusted to us by the Lord. These trusts are so many that the steward often forgets the One who entrusts them. Worse, with so many physical trusts evident, the steward loses sight of the



greatest trust: the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The failed steward sees so much plenty that they lose sight of the treasure: Jesus!

So, we confess our shallow thankfulness. In absolution, the imperfections of the failed steward are wiped away and a new image is sent into the world. We release our hold on stuff. We rethink our relationship with the created order and recall that it is all to be used **for Jesus**! This keeps the richer gifts in view, for us and for those we know and love who need Jesus.
