NEW MEMBERS/GUESTS

The Valley Fiber Arts Guild is always pleased to have visitors and prospective new members. This month we welcomed Sue Kalamodo who knits, tie dyes and weaves. Lindsay Brigham and her sister are weavers and Tunisian crocheters. Deb Melton is a knitter and Sandy Gold is our newest member. Welcome All!

SHOW AND TELL

Debra Brown showed us her embroidered totems, which briefly are 2"x4" wooden lathes covered with fabric. The fabric is embellished with small woven medallions, embroidery and other embellishments. She uses Sunbrella fabric so they can be displayed out of doors. Debra has also been working on samples for the Tapestry Weaving Study Group and woven potholders for TAG.

Peggy McGaughey has been making cards with mixed media. She uses burnt edge organza to form flowers, acrylic paint and machine embroidery embellishments. She calls them cards but they are actually assemblage works of art using a variety of found objects, textiles, embroidery and paint. They are wildly creative and very beautiful. And if that wasn't enough, Peggy crocheted pumpkins to decorate her home for the coming season.

Sue Miller has been busy rug hooking. She has used some of her stash to make 15 blocks of multi-color circular motifs in a 30"x40" rug appropriately named "Using Up My Stash" Her beloved 5-year-old granddaughter is the very lucky recipient of a rug braided wall hanging that shows the phases of the moon. It is 3' wide and the length of a bed. This little girl is assured of sweet dreams with her grandmother's gift as the last thing she will see as she closes her eyes each night.

Fran Lunney stayed busy this summer beading beads and a Tuscan Vine Necklace and earring set. She has gotten a new embroidery machine and has been happily exploring its capabilities making note pad covers with logos and readable QR codes. She has also made sewing project bags with embroidered motifs and a table runner with matching coasters from recycled denim.

Marge Lind wove 3 pine needle baskets with central cabochons, these are graceful and beautiful creations. Marge was not immune to the "stash-busting" fever" this summer and wove placemats with hand-dyed warp yarn. She also wove towels using 8/2 cotton as an unsuccessful attempt at further stash-busting but had to buy more fiber. This seems to be a widespread side-effect of stash busting. She also wove chenille scarves that I personally can't wait to feel in person and a mobius wrap....

Karen Gabriel made beaded eggs with bunny motifs. They are composed of separate triangles stitched together to form a 3-dimensional egg. I wonder who the very lucky Easter egg hunter will be at her family gathering this spring

Sudie Durham sewed scarves from silk neckties. This is a lovely use of no longer used neckties.

Jane Temple knitted an intricate scarf and jacket and a lovely purple lace shawl for the coming cooler nights.

Sharon Laws used size 11 beads in Tuscan Vine necklace.

Eileen Coyne is unpacking moving boxes. She is working on organizing her studio.

Laura Ramp knitted a stranded sweater in red with grey motifs for her granddaughter Julia, who modeled the sweater with a head full of delightful curls and a bright smile.

Ebba Anderson needle felted a dynamic landscape of the Cape Cod dunes. The piece measure 14"x12" and a seascape of Cape Cod. She also felted a 14" roundel of butterflies.

Our members have spent this summer in crafting a wide variety of original works of art. It is truly inspiring to see the variety, craftsmanship and artistry of our members.
