

In Memoriam

Wilma Myers (May 1927 - March 2022)

Wilma Myers loved knitting, felting, quilting, basketry, and making paper, but her favorite fiber art was definitely weaving. Many of our longtime guild members will remember Wilma as one of the first persons to welcome them to the guild. Or, of sitting beside her in one of the guild's many classes that she took - - and she enjoyed taking classes. Fellow guild member Irene York taught Wilma how to make "My Recovery Buddy" dolls. And Wilma ended up making 50 of them to give as donations!

Wilma grew up in Oregon and moved to Los Alamos, New Mexico, as a newlywed. After moving to Green Valley in 2003, she was quick to join the Green Valley Weavers and Spinners Guild. She was the guild's first Publicity Chairperson and served as Chair of Community Outreach for several years, as well as joined many guild committees whenever assistance was needed.

Wilma passed away at home peacefully on Sunday, February 27, 2022, after being in hospice for a week. Her son David Myers, and daughter-in-law Heather, send along "a special thank you to all who kept in touch with her through emails and cards and especially for being her friend; it meant a lot to her."

David shared if anyone would like to remember Wilma, per her request her remains were donated to research for Spasmodic Dysphonia, with assistance from the <u>Harvard Brain Bank</u> and <u>Science Care</u>. Carolyn Webb presented her program on "The History of Knitting in America". Carolyn, a long-time member of our guild began knitting as many of us did, as a young girl taught by her mom. "Lulu" as her mom was affectionately called explored many different fiber media but always returned to her passion, knitting. Carolyn's parents opened an antique shop where Carolyn was exposed to many beautiful examples of knitting and other fiber arts.

Carolyn gave an overview of knitting from its earliest days to its importance during our Revolutionary, Civil and both World Wars. They say an army lives and dies on its stomach but Carolyn showed us the importance of knitted socks for our soldiers. A pair of socks can save a soldier from frostbite and infection. One quote that stood out to me is "Remember Pearl Harbor - Purl harder!" Her beautifully illustrated presentation showed us how knitting went from the utilitarian to become an important part of fashion.

In Gretchen's stash, she found a length of crocheted lace using a heavier thread. Her grandmother originally crocheted the lace for a round tablecloth. Turns out, it was the PERFECT length to encircle the rug! Gifts given us by people we cherish deserve the care and artistry that Gretchen used in refurbishing this family treasure.

Debbi Brunner remains ultra-busy and took an online course from Sarah Woodyard (<u>sewncompany.com</u>), a historical stitcher at Williamsburg. Debbi made an 18th century styled chemise all hand sewn with flat-felled seams. She used fabric from a linen twill tablecloth that has been in her family for years. Although Debbi has been sewing clothing for over 60 years, this her first garment sewn entirely by hand!

Jol'ene Northup lost 25 pounds of hand-spun yarn to moths. She believes they were attracted to the lanolin as they did not choose to eat her purchased yarns. So take caution and make sure your yarns are safely stored. Jol'ene wishes she had a picture to share - she was very sad.

Each month the group chooses a skill to learn. There is so much talent in this group, often time someone will offer to teach a specific project or the group assists in problem solving issues. Show and tell is always something this group enjoys doing - lots of inspiration! If you are considering joining this group please don't be frightened off, even if you haven't completed or even started your project for the month, you won't be graded or shunned!
