November 2025 Presidents Letter



I have just returned from a lovely sojourn to the New York State Wool & Fiber Festival in Rhinebeck, NY. I used to live not very far from there and was very much looking forward to seeing the blazing colors of a northeast autumn. It was pretty, but not the spectacular display I was expecting. The reds, oranges and yellows were there but in muted shades. As I later

learned in Time Magazine, the muted colors were due to climate change, it hadn't been cold enough for the trees to produce their usual brilliant displays.

The festival itself was wonderful, with hundreds of vendors, a full roster of free demos, adorable animals and plenty of gourmet food trucks. We were all looking forward to a particular event, "Leaping Llamas". We filed into an arena where a vaulting bar had been set up. Then began the parade, Llamas, alpacas, and goats were led into the arena by their handlers. The bar was set at its very lowest position, only an inch or two above the ground. The first round was a piece of cake for all the animals except one named "Tiny Goat". Tiny Goat was the runt of his litter and was truly miniature. But even he nimbly stepped over the bar and was not eliminated. For the second round the bar was raised a foot off the ground. All the spectators knew this was impossible for Tiny Goat, and indeed, Tiny Goat knocked over the bar and was eliminated. The spectacle of easily 500 people cheering "Tiny Goat" in unison struck me as one of the silliest things I had ever heard. We all knew Tiny Goat would not clear the hurdle, Tiny Goat was a goat and really didn't care if he cleared the hurdle or not. Cheering him on was a supreme act of whimsical silliness. I plan to find more whimsical silliness anywhere I can and incorporate it into my life and my creativity.

'Coiled Fabric Baskets' with Nancy Gould

No Sewing Machine and No Rope Core Technique

Students will explore making coiled fabric baskets using two basic techniques. Light weight fabric wrapped around a core cloth wrapped and stitched with a thin binder material and/or another using heavier/bulkier fabric without a core that is wrapped but not sewn with a thicker binder material. We will play with thread tension, fabric manipulation and going where the process takes us.

It isn't likely you will walk away with a finished project (unless it is very small or you work very fast) but you will be able to continue on your own journey into endless possibilities. I find the process to be relatively simple, relaxing, inexpensive and as creative as one wants to be.



I will have supplies and materials to use but you might want to go through your stash if you want a particular color or simply want to try with your own materials. We can work with almost anything for fabric and any binder that will fit through a large eye tapestry style needle. **Student Supplies:** Scissors, Binder clip (used to hold papers together), Old sheet (to use as a core cloth), Outer fabric — cotton / upholstery / just about anything. Heavy thread / embroidery floss / crochet thread / etc. Needle — I like to use size 3 doll needles and large eye blunt tapestry needle, thimble and craft pliers (optional). A willingness to let perfection go, relax, enjoy, de-stash.

'Weaving with Little Looms with Lindy Brigham Continuous weaving method to create accessories and clothing.

This is designed as a beginners class on pin loom weaving. But those who have some experience may also find it interesting in that we will start the process for a completed project going from basic weaving to joining the squares. A manual will be provided with information on different kinds of pin looms available, tools needed, yarn considerations, joining techniques, and useful references. A simple scarf of individual squares will be started in the class and students should have enough information by the end of the workshop to complete it at home or during the workshop if you have made pin-loom squares before!

A kit is available with enough yarn to complete a pin loom scarf for those with their own pin-looms. \$10.

A kit with a pin loom and yarn for a scarf \$40.

In the class we will weave at least two squares and then attach these two with a join of your choice. The kit has enough material to finish the project on your own.

'Double Weave on 4 Shafts' with Patty Huffer

Date: March 13, 14, and 15, 2026

Level - Beginning to Advance - Students should be able to read a draft and weave without assistance.

Explore the potential of double weaving in this class. Using only four shafts, you can create cloth that is twice the width of your loom. You can create tubes, pockets, multiple layers, and even pick-up designs.

During class you'll learn the theory of double weave, experiment with different materials, and complete a storage caddie sampler that you can use for shuttles, scissors, or other weaving tools.

Note: Students will receive warping instructions and loom set up in advance of the workshop.



Bio - Patty Huffer has been weaving since 1981. After graduating from Central Washington University, she took a summer class in weaving. This began her almost 40 years of weaving and teaching. The love of fibers and teaching others has been a life-long inspiration for her. She always looks forward to the moment when a student understands for the first time how a woven piece is constructed resulting in a beautiful finished piece. Patty's experience and use of many types of looms, and threading possibilities has contributed to her ongoing passion for weaving.

'Eco-Dyeing Magic' with Lori Kovash

Do you want to experience the magic of eco-dyeing? You will learn how to create a one of a kind piece of art using leaves and flowers. I will walk through the process of how to prepare your fabric to accept the tannins and natural dyes from plants. We will talk about how to use leaves and flowers to create the clearest prints. I have several examples of natural dyes you can achieve in your own home with plants and flowers locally grown. These natural dyes pair so beautifully with eco-dyeing. I just love it and hope you will too!


