In important note from our Membership Committee

The VFAG Board has requested an audit of the Membership Roster. This is something that occurred every year before the Covid 19 period and hasn't been done since. The Board feels it's time to tidy our roster. We need to do this in order to create an operating budget per our By-Laws.

The VFAG dues are still only \$25. per year, a bargain when you consider the general meeting Programs, Study Group privileges and the access to classes & workshops available each year. The dues also pay for things you may not have considered; along with Program fees, the general meeting room fees, our liability insurance, the website Go Daddy hosting, library books to name a few. We all make an investment in the guild each year when we pay our dues. The dues for each VFAG season are due by APRIL 30, 2024 and are considered delinquent after JUNE 1st.

We know it can be difficult to keep track of these things so if you paid dues between March 1st and December 31, 2024 you are up to date. The Membership Committee will have a roster list with your payment noted if paid during that period. If your name is not on the list, your dues are still due for the current guild year. prepare the fabric, warp the loom,
basic twinning technique, adding
strips to weave and finish the

provided. Participants should bring a sewing shears to the first class. Yvonne will bring samples of her work and talk about the class at the October general meeting. During the first class Yvonne talk about the fabric choices and quantities before you actually bring weaving fabric for the project. You have the use of a loom to finish your project.

a version of this cutual article in our to session class. You will make a folded leather style suitable for a shopping list pad and coupons, knitting needle case or a clutch style purse that is approximately 10"x 6" folded. The leather will be etched, painted with leather dye and sewn as necessary for the case design you've chosen to explore. Leather piece, dyes, finishing wax and thread will be provided in the workshop kit at Debbi's home studio.


