
#### **CHAIRWOMAN'S CORNER**





This is a private event for the Chalon Tribe.






#### Winter Solstice Among the Chalon People Charles Ettner, Ph.D.

After the acorns have been gathered, other nuts and seeds have all been collected, and the fall harvest has been properly stored the days grow shorter as the Winter Solstice approaches. It is the one ceremony marked on the Chalon calendar, the most important ceremony of the year.

In some ways the ceremony has meaning for Chalon people very similar to indigenous peoples all over the world. Winter Solstice is traditionally for many societies a time of thanksgiving for the bountiful harvests and for all good that nature has provided throughout the seasons. There is much to be thankful for and many to thank including the Chalon ancestors whose teachings and knowledge guide and protect the Chalon people. In particular, the Winter Solstice ceremony is a time when all of those who have crossed over the sea to the West in the past year are remembered and honored. A sacred time when Chalon people makes great efforts to have only good thoughts and feelings in ceremony and in preparation for beginning the coming year.
