March 22, 2025 Equinox



Legislative Update

The Chalon Indian Council of Bakersfield is a founding member of the Coalition of California State Tribes (CCST). The Coalition was alerted to a proposed revision to Assembly Bill 52, that would essential silence the voice of non-recognized tribes in California. Audrey Alvarado, Chairwoman and Sonya Dorado, Treasurer attended a CCST sponsored meeting in Sacramento held on March 23-25, 2025. We met with lawmakers to discuss our concerns about the proposed bill. Our letter of opposition can be found on the next page. Through the Coalition and others' efforts we were able to get the bill delayed for two years. This will provide more time to make our case that the proposed bill which will have detrimental impact on non-recognized tribes throughout California. On another note, the Council submitted a letter of support for Assemblyman Ramos' bill (AB 989) to have a Native American Day as a state holiday in CA.

Re: Strong Opposition to Amendments to Assembly Bill 52 (Aguiar-Curry)

Assemblymember Isaac Bryan:

On behalf of the Chalon Indian Nation of California, I am writing to express our strong opposition to the proposed amendments to AB52. While we recognize the intent to enhance California's legislative framework, the amendments fall short of honoring the unique status and rights of Native American tribes in our state.

AB 52 has played a vital role in ensuring meaningful consultation between California's Native American tribes and state and local governments concerning environmental regulatory laws. Unfortunately, the proposed amendments jeopardize the integrity of this process, potentially undermining the political and cultural well-being of tribes throughout California.

The amendments, as currently drafted, conflict with the principles outlined in Executive Orders B-10-11 and N-15-19, which emphasize the protection of Native American cultural heritage and promote meaningful government-to-government consultation. Specifically, we have the following concerns:

- 1. **Sovereignty Undermined:** The amendments treat non-federally recognized tribes as voluntary participants, diminishing our sovereign status.
- 2. **Hierarchy Reinforced:** The amendments prioritize federally recognized tribes in consultation for lands where no federally recognized exist, creating a hierarchical process.
- Marginalization of Non-Federally Recognized Tribes: Dividing the consultation process between federally and non-federally recognized tribes further marginalizes non-federally recognized tribes.
- 4. **Weakening of Consultation Language**: By substituting terms like 'government-to-government consultation', with 'discussion' or 'participation,' the amendments diminish the self-governance of non-federally recognized tribes and reinforce inequality.

For these reasons, we respectfully urge you to oppose AB52 (Aguiar-Curry) in its current form. California's policies must uphold Native American sovereignty, foster inclusion, and protect cultural heritage.






Congratulations Landon Burrell

Before we gathered the sage for ceremonial purposes Julian reminded us of how we gather sage. We each offered personal prayer and made sure we did not harm the plants or take more than we needed. It was a wonderfully blessed experience for all of us.







GULTURAL SHARING

This past April the Urban School of San Francisco reached out to our Tribe and requested a Cultural presentation to their 10th graders who were camping at Pinnacles. Julian agreed to provide a cultural presentation and teach the youth how to play Staves. He recruited his niece and our Elders Rep. Larry. Here is his recap on what took place.

We welcomed the visitors to our homelands and sang them a welcoming song. We then started things off with introductions and smudging the grounds and leaving an offering to the fire pit. All students and faculty participated. We then did a small talkon traditional practices and land stewardship. We brought traditional materials for the students to see and feel first hand, some items included Cedar, Sage, Abalone, deer bones, deer awis, blackwalnuts, Elderberry, and etc.. We held four sessions throughout the day and had over IDOpeople learn about who we are and about our traditional game of staves. The youth really enjoyed the game and made some amazing sets.
