Jared Leimbach - Delivered from a Drug Infested Home



Jared's family came to cheer him on as he and many others shared how their lives were fundamentally changed by our Savior. He lived in a drug infested home and one day Jared got down on his knees and held hands with his mother and cried out to the Lord. The police came less than ten minutes, and he remember them speaking of a peace he had over him as they arrested him. In prison, Jared took steps to become closer to our Lord by attending chapel services. He had heard about Mission Gate throughout his previous incarcerations stating, "It was the most heard about place." Knowing he wasn't going back to his old friends and lifestyle he took the steps to move forward, put his application in and after his interview was accepted. Jared will be graduating the program in No-

vember and is currently employed full-time in our community, as well as a bunkhouse leader at Fort Good Shepherd. He knows that God is with him everywhere he goes and loves spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ to all those who come in contact with him.

Alana Waltz - "I Learned how to Become a Wife and Mother"

In 2019, Alana graduated from Hannah's Ranch after being on a path of destruction that led to IV Heroin use, eight rehab facilities, four felonies for drug possession and burglary, and going to prison three times serving 3 years. She says, "By the grace of God I have remained six years clean. I moved to Springfield and married my husband in March of 2020. I obtained my Peer Specialist certification and spent time working with others in drug and alcohol abuse. After we were married, God blessed us with a child, and two more shortly after. Today, we get to teach them about Jesus and have a marriage centered on God. We now own a business, Waltz Family Homes, and last year I obtained a Real Estate license. My husband and I carry a vision to continue helping people and can't wait to see how God works in the next chapter of our lives. I'm forever grateful to Mission Gate for being the hands and feet of Jesus."



Mike Mooney - "Left hospital with IVs still connected"



"On my 14th overdose I woke up in Barnes Jewish Hospital with the doctors telling me I had acute heart failure. I was deep in my opioid addiction which had been going on for twelve years. I needed open heart surgery but I left with the IVs still connected to me because my addiction was so strong. I needed more work on my heart than any doctor could provide. Shortly after leaving the hospital, I was picked up by the cops. When I was in prison and in a 23-hr lockdown, I asked the guard for a Bible. I felt like God was talking directly to me. I had peace on that day I put my trust in Him. This period of self-discovery brought me to growing a relationship with our Lord and even obtaining my HiSet. After getting accepted into Mission Gate, I was released and picked up at the bus station by a Mission Gate employee. Thirty minutes later I was attending Septemberfest 2021, which showed me how Mission Gate was changing people's lives. Two hours before this, I was in a room of felons, and now on that day I felt love, compassion, and

acceptance from caring Christians. Mission Gate has been life changing and I have now served two years as an aftercare assistant in the largest city outreach home, The Osage House, where I get to lead and guide other men in their walk with our Lord."

Tisha Arnold - "it was as if they did not exist"

Tisha stood tall as she spoke of her mother sex trafficking her at a young age to obtain drugs, sadly we hear similar stories like this often. At just ten years old she met her father who also abused her. This led to 30 years of drug use and her being incarcerated in jail and prison. Her two youngest children were living with their older sister and had never attended school or had any vital records, it was as if they did not exist. While in prison she got on her bunk and started crying out to the Lord. Tisha lives at Promises of Hope Ranch with her two youngest children who are both excelling in school. They have all their needs met and are now flourishing. She obtained full-time employment in a factory and was promoted within the company. She has since gotten her HiSet, driver's license and will be working on becoming a Certified Peer Specialist. She is sharing the skills it took to become a good mother, role model, and helps her children walk with Jesus. Tisha is now an aftercare assistant at our Promises of Hope Ranch.
