Mother and Daughter Begin College Together at NSU-Shreveport



NATCHITOCHES – Shawna Pike and her daughter, Addison Berg, will begin classes together this fall at Northwestern State University's Shreveport campus, where they will experience college from two different stages of life.

Pike first attended college after graduating from high school in 1995 but later put her education on hold.

She returned in 2017 before pausing her studies again after the birth of her third child. This fall, she will resume working toward an Associate of Science in Nursing degree with plans to continue into the Bachelor of Science in Nursing program.

"Now is the time to go back and finish my nursing degree at almost 50 years old," Pike said.

"I am going to do the RN program and then go to the BSN program."

Pike said beginning college alongside her daughter will make the transition back to the classroom easier.

"My daughter just graduated from high school this year. We both were able to go to school at the same time, so she decided to come live with us," Pike said. Berg said she looks forward to experiencing college alongside her mother.

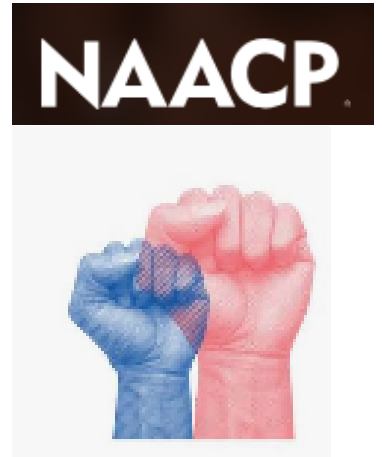

Immigration and Custom Enforcement (ICE) is meant to preserve American security and public safety, mainly within U.S. borders, by enforcing immigration laws. ICE is responsible for detaining, deporting, and convicting unauthorized immigrants.

ICE has been weaponized in local communities, conducting raids that have swept up both immigrants (whether here lawfully or not) and American citizens. As more raids are expected across the country, it's important to know your rights and protect yourself.

IF YOU'RE STOPPED BY ICE, HERE ARE A COUPLE OF POINTS TO REMEMBER:

- Remain calm and do not run away.
- If arrested, you have the right to speak with a lawyer.
- Do not sign anything without the advice of an attorney.
- You have the right to record any interaction with ICE as long as you are not interfering with an arrest
- If you are a U.S. citizen, you can say "I am a U.S. citizen and you do not have authority to arrest or detain me." If they decide to arrest you anyway, you have grounds for a federal civil rights lawsuit alleging unconstitutional detention or arrest.

Is 2819 Church About Jesus — or Philip

Anthony Mitchell?

2819 Church's rise to fame has sparked a debate: is the movement centered on Jesus, as Pastor Philip Anthony Mitchell insists, or has the pastor himself become the focus of devotion?

Mitchell's preaching style—urgent, emotional, physically expressive—draws thousands of mostly young worshippers who line up before dawn for Sunday services. His messages emphasize repentance, holiness, and the imminent return of Christ, resonating with Millennials and Gen Z disillusioned by scandals and shallow spirituality in other churches. His sermons regularly go viral, and the church has grown from under 200 attendees in 2023 to roughly 6,000, with massive prayer gatherings that overflow arenas.

Yet, this intense popularity has raised concerns about celebrity culture in the Black church. There has been a recent warning from prophet Joshua T. Giles, who claimed to witness a “shift... into an idolatry exaltation of the leader” during a spiritual encounter at 2819 Church. He described the altar as becoming “defiled” by excessive focus on Mitchell, prompting him to publicly caution the congregation.

Mitchell himself repeatedly tells followers not to idolize him, insisting that “2819 Church” exists solely to make Jesus known.

He attributes the church's explosive growth to God's sovereignty rather than strategy and speaks openly about surrendering personal ambition when re-launching the church under its new name, drawn from Matthew 28:19.

“I want to be clear: I have never watched a single teaching from Philip Anthony Mitchell,” Giles wrote. But his warning was clear: “The greater the platform, the more fiercely we must guard the altar.”

The post generated more than 1,000 reactions and hundreds of comments within hours, with Christians divided over whether Giles had issued a necessary prophetic warning or unfairly cast suspicion on a pastor whose teachings he acknowledged he had never heard.

“2819 Church” sits at a crossroads familiar in American Christianity: a powerful spiritual movement led by a charismatic figure whose influence risks overshadowing the message he preaches. Whether the church remains centered on Jesus—or drifts toward personality-driven devotion—depends on how both Mitchell and his followers navigate that tension.

City Clarifies Garbage Collection Schedule Amid Temporary Delays, Actively Recruiting CDL Drivers

The City of Shreveport Department of Public Works is reminding residents that regular garbage collection days have not changed, despite temporary delays on some routes in recent weeks.

The delays are the result of a shortage of qualified truck drivers within the Solid Waste Division. Public Works currently has employees available to staff the back of garbage trucks but is 11 drivers short of the staffing level needed to operate a full collection schedule.

The department's goal is to have approximately 40 garbage trucks operating each week. Currently, staffing levels allow the City to operate approximately 30 trucks, which has made it difficult to complete the heavier Monday and Tuesday collection routes on schedule. Thursday and Friday routes generally have lower collection volumes and have experienced fewer delays.

Residents should continue placing their garbage cans at the curb on their regularly scheduled collection day. Collection days have not changed. If a can is not serviced on its scheduled day, residents are asked to leave it at the curb so crews can complete the route as soon as possible.

"Garbage collection is a basic City service, and our residents have every right to expect it to be reliable," said Mayor Tom Arceneaux. "Right now, we simply do not have enough qualified drivers to put the number of trucks on the road that we need. That is the problem, and we're working to fix it. In the meantime, the employees we have are working extended hours in difficult summer conditions to serve this city, and I appreciate the work they're doing. We know we need to get these routes caught up, and that is our priority."



City Actively Hiring CDL Drivers

The City is actively recruiting qualified drivers to help address the shortage.

Applicants must have a Commercial Driver's License (CDL) and at least one year of professional driving experience.

"We need drivers, and we're hiring now," said Mayor Arceneaux. "If you have a CDL, the required experience, and you're looking for steady work serving your community, I encourage you to apply. We have positions available and we need good people to fill them."

Interested applicants can apply through the City of Shreveport's website by visiting ShreveportLA.gov, selecting the Human Resources tab and clicking Current Job Openings.

Public Works typically experiences greater staffing challenges during the hottest months of the year, when outdoor working conditions are particularly demanding. At the same time, collection volumes fluctuate throughout the year. With the beginning of the school year and an anticipated seasonal decrease in residential collection volume, the department expects conditions to improve as it continues recruiting drivers and working through delayed routes.

The City asks residents for patience as crews work to return all routes to their regular schedule and reminds residents not to change the day they place their carts at the curb.

For missed collections or other service concerns, residents can submit a request through Port City 311, available through the City's website at ShreveportLA.gov, by downloading the Port City 311 app, or by calling 318-673-5510.



ENVIRONMENTAL & CLIMATE JUSTICE

We work to dismantle misinformation and disinformation by reclaiming environmental and climate storytelling and public education through the voices, leadership, and lived experiences of Black communities. We address this challenge in four components:



Black Communities and the legacy of entrenched pollution and climate injustice----For generations, discriminatory zoning, toxic industrial siting, and pollution from air, water, and soil have placed disproportionate burdens on Black neighborhoods.

The True Cost of Creating Intentional Sacrifice Zones---False "climate solutions" have been concentrated in frontline communities while fundamental needs and best practices for a sustainable future have been delayed or denied.

Emerging Threats Are A Reminder of Our Continued Fights---From plastics and synthetic textiles to new energy-intensive AI data centers, Black and frontline communities face a dangerous resurgence of environmental risk.

The Need For Renewable Energy and a Just Transition---Black families continue to face higher utility costs, limited access to clean energy resources, and exclusion from key energy policy decisions. Deregulated fossil fuel expansion and uneven clean energy development deepen inequality, creating another generation of harm.

What we're fighting for?

Making Polluters Pay---Holding corporations and industries financially responsible for the harms they cause. Ensure that polluter-pays mechanisms fund cleanup, equitable infrastructure, and community-led climate solutions worldwide.

Energy Justice---Expanding access to affordable, community-owned renewable energy. Insurance companies and financial institutions retreat from high-risk areas, abandoning communities rather than investing in resilience.

Sustainable communities and a toxic-free environment. Rebuilding clean water systems, housing, and transportation that serve people, not profit.

Pope Leo Finally Addresses His Black Ancestry and Slavery

In a candid interview, Pope Leo XIV has publicly addressed his family's complex racial history, confirming for the first time that his lineage includes both enslaved people and slaveowners. The revelation, shared with NBC News, has reignited conversations about race, identity, and the Catholic Church's historical relationship with slavery.

"On my mother's side, we have people who were both slaves and slaveowners," Pope Leo said, noting his family's deep roots in New Orleans' Creole community. While he did not describe himself as Black, he acknowledged the significance of his mixed heritage and the importance of confronting uncomfortable truths.

Historians and genealogists had uncovered details of the pope's ancestry within hours of his election, but until now, he had remained largely silent on the matter. His remarks mark the clearest acknowledgment yet of a personal history intertwined with America's legacy of slavery.

The first American-born pope, Leo's comments come at a time when the Catholic Church faces renewed calls to reckon with its role in the transatlantic slave trade and the systemic racism that followed. Advocates say his openness could help foster dialogue and healing, particularly among communities historically marginalized by the Church.

Pope Leo emphasized that acknowledging the past is not about assigning guilt to descendants, but about understanding the truth and its impact on present-day society. "We cannot change history," he said, "but we can change how we live with it."

His statement has been met with both praise and criticism—some see it as a courageous step toward transparency, while others believe it should be accompanied by concrete action. Still, many agree that his words have opened a new chapter in the Church's ongoing conversation about race, justice, and reconciliation.

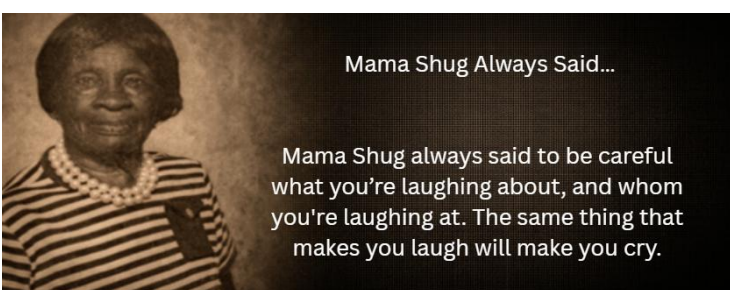

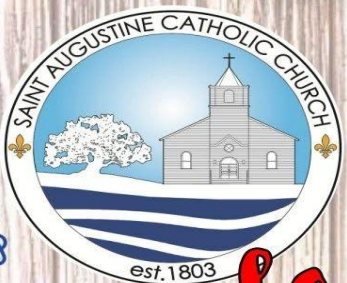
