Her selfless commitment and the sacrifices she made to create opportunities for others have left a lasting legacy, and her impact on the community will be remembered with gratitude. 












































































Roundtable Meeting with Congressman Cleo Fields

US Congressman Cleo Fields recently visited Natchitoches for a Congressional Conversation organized by Chamber of Commerce President Laura Lyles. During the event, Congressman Fields provided a comprehensive update on current federal legislative initiatives. He emphasized his commitment to advancing Head Start and higher education programs, supporting critical infrastructure improvements such as local roads, and addressing the significant impact of the Big Beautiful Bill, which is projected to result in the loss of Medicaid coverage for approximately 260,000 Louisiana residents. Congressman Fields also highlighted federal grant opportunities that could support future local projects.

A roundtable discussion brought bankers, business owners, and elected officials together to identify key regional priorities and challenges facing Natchitoches Parish.

Topics included the ongoing teacher shortage, workforce retention, infrastructure needs, grant funding, and efforts to secure new operators for the International Paper plant.

Congressman Fields responded to these concerns and pledged continued advocacy for the resources needed to drive economic growth and improve community well-being.

Congressman Fields reinforced his commitment to representing his constituents first and foremost, stating that his focus remains on the needs of the district rather than politics in Washington. While the Head Start bill may not pass this year, he expressed his continued passion for expanding early childhood education and pledged to keep working on this important issue.

NSU President James T. Genovese discussed major projects in development at Northwestern State University, including plans for an innovation park designed to benefit Natchitoches and surrounding parishes. The park would create educational and employment opportunities for students by aligning curricula with the needs of regional industries such as RoyOMartin. President Genovese stated that the university has secured land, seed funding, and architectural plans, but requires an earmark to move forward. He commended Congressman Fields for being a man of his word, not about politics, but concentrated on what we can do to make Northwest Louisiana better. *Continued next page*

Roundtable Meeting with Congressman Cleo Fields

Councilwoman-at-Large Betty Smith-Kirkendoll requested support in facilitating the reopening of the International Paper plant under new ownership. Mayor Ronnie Williams and President Genovese reported meeting with a potential buyer, but negotiations have stalled due to International Paper's reluctance to sell. Congressman Fields was asked to advocate reasonable pricing in these negotiations. While discussions are ongoing and not yet finalized, there is cautious optimism regarding the plant's future.

Congressman Fields noted that job incentive funding through the state may be available to support any company that acquires the plant. Chamber President Laura Lyles acknowledged that such transitions require time and patience.

Additional grants and resources may be available to support small business owners and to provide law enforcement agencies with funding for initiatives such as solving cold cases. The district attorney plays a key role in requesting supplemental funding for law enforcement needs.

Congressman Fields explained that funding for road and infrastructure improvements is allocated through the state, with projects prioritized based on need and impact. In closing, Congressman Fields emphasized the importance of community engagement in effective representation. He urged officials to return regularly to their districts, actively listen to constituents, and remain accountable to those they serve. Congressman Fields reaffirmed his commitment to ongoing dialogue and partnership with the Natchitoches community.




























Part-Time Job Fair to be held Sept. 9





Proclamation declaring September 19 and 20, 2025, as Natchitoches Meat Pier Festival Days

RESOLUTION NO. 068 OF 2025

PROCLAMATION DECLARING SEPTEMBER 19 AND 20, 2025 AS NATCHITOCHES MEAT PIE FESTIVAL DAY'S IN THE CITY OF NATCHITOCHES

WHEREAS, Records show that the concept of the meat pie took shape in the mid-1700's in Louisiana by Native Americans and later enhanced by the Spanish; and

WHEREAS, 55 years ago, James Lasyone's - opened his meat pie kitchen which is still in operation today in Historic Downtown Natchitoches; and

WHEREAS, the recipe of the meat pie has changed slightly from its inception and has been handed down from generation to generation; however, the basic ingredients and the process for creating a meat pie remains the same; and

WHEREAS, with an abundance of excitement in 2002, the Natchitoches Meat Pie Festival was formed to celebrate the noted culinary staple in Natchitoches, Louisiana; and

WHEREAS, in 2003, the Natchitoches meat pie was named Louisiana's official meat pie, and Natchitoches was one of the last cities to not have an identified food festival until 2002;

WHEREAS, the annual Festival attracts visitors from throughout the state and over a dozen of other states as well each year; and

WHEREAS, the festival has always been a family-oriented, non-admission required event over a two-day period in Downtown Natchitoches, helping to enhance the area's economy with individual activities that can be enjoyed at a small fee; and

WHEREAS, the organizing committee for the Festival is a complete volunteer committee; and

WHEREAS, the Natchitoches Meat Pie Festival is returning by popular demand after a two-year break due to the novel coronavirus.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Ronnie Williams, Jr., Mayor, and the Natchitoches City Council, do hereby proclaim September 19 and 20, 2025 as:

NATCHITOCHES MEAT PIE FESTIVAL DAY'S



Class reunions celebrate old friendships and offer a chance to catch up since graduation. They also let you reflect on how you remember your high school days.

On May 23-24, 2025, Memorial Weekend, "St. Matthew High School Dynamic 12" hosted a class reunion. The event included classes from 1970 to 1981, with participation from other classes as well. The festivities began with a "Wild, Wild West" western-themed meet-andgreet on Friday, May 23, 2025. On Saturday, May 24, 2025, several activities were planned. These included a boat ride on Cane River Queen, a tour of Fort St. Jean Baptiste, and a Louisiana Hall of Fame Tour. Saturday night ended the reunion with a dazzling dinner dance banquet, themed "St. Matthew Goes to Hollywood." This weekend helped us take a trip down memory lane as we socialized, mingled, and relived those unforgettable memories. St Matthew High School opened its doors in 1952. It gained significant local importance in education and ethnic heritage. The school was the first public high school building constructed for African-Americans in Lower Natchitoches Parish. It provided education for rural families in Cane River, Melrose, and Natchez, LA communities. At that time, it was one of only two public senior high schools for African-Americans in the parish. Motto: "Look Sharp, Be Sharp, Stay Sharp," as Mr. Noble Bulter would say.





St. Matthew sits in the heart of Cane River plantation country, about three miles from Melrose Plantation and community. St. Matthew's history dates back to a "church school" established at St. Matthew Baptist Church in 1916. The school permanently closed in 1989.

It has been 44 years since the last class graduated from St. Matthew High School. It was a great time to reconnect with old friends and staff. We hope this will continue the spark and conversation. We want to revitalize this building into a community center that would serve the South area of Natchitoches Parish.

Sheriff-Elect Stuart Wright has not publicly confirmed whether he intends to participate in the upcoming election.

Community members have expressed concerns regarding the sheriff's visibility and communication, noting a perceived lack of engagement with residents on local issues.

Steve Pezant has been encouraged to run for City Marshal, Ward 1. However, it is reported that the Current City Marshall, Randy Williams, intends to seek reelection. In the past, Pezant has faced criticism regarding the use of excessive force during his tenure.

Former Sheriff Victor Jones has received some backlash from the community for backing Sheriff Stuart Wright over Michael Wilson.

Although he still has strong community support, some concerns are that he would only run for one more term. Some have suggested that current and/or former captains want him to return for financial reasons.

Chad Nelson- word is that he would have the support of the Mardi Gras krewe he is a part of, but that he is not experienced enough in the field to be Sheriff.

Michael Wilson- word has been said that he is not always truthful, and because of an old case involving a family member of a prominent Pastor, he won't get the support from the community. Some have suggested he run for City Marshall.

Richard "Shane" Lacaze, in his earlier career as an officer, was known as a "pit bull" and had no problem with being overly aggressive when called out to arrest someone. He has changed within the last 5 years, but that is his history.

Preston Durr, it has been stated that Rapides and other area police chiefs have shared that he would not be a good candidate for sheriff, and Natchitoches needs someone else. It was suggested that he was released from his duties in a surrounding parish for a questionable job injury.

Other - Some have suggested that if Sheriff Victor Jones does not agree to return, Natchitoches Parish should consider finding another candidate from the pool of candidates listed above.

Louisiana's Legacy of Corruption: A Timeline of Recent and Historical Political Scandals



- •Mayor LaToya Cantrell (August 2025): The sitting New Orleans mayor was indicted by a federal grand jury on charges of wire fraud, obstruction of justice, and lying to a grand jury. The charges relate to her alleged misuse of city funds for travel with her former police bodyguard, Jeffrey Vappie, who was also indicted.
- •Police visa fraud scheme (July 2025): Several police chiefs and other law enforcement officials in Central Louisiana were federally indicted for their involvement in a visa fraud scheme. The scheme allegedly involved accepting bribes in exchange for producing fraudulent police reports to assist foreign nationals in securing U visas.
- •Former state senator corruption (May 2025): A former Louisiana state senator and political party chairman was sentenced to 22 months in prison for a scheme to defraud a campaign entity, donors, and a political party.
- •Governor Jeff Landry's ethics issues (2024–2025): Governor Jeff Landry has been involved in several ethics disputes, including a months-long disagreement with the state's ethics board over his failure to disclose private flights. After the board pushed back, Landry signed a bill in mid-2025 that gave him more control over its members.

Historical Scandals

- •Edwin Edwards casino scandal (convicted 2000): One of Louisiana's most notorious politicians, former Governor Edwin Edwards, was convicted in 2000 on racketeering and extortion charges. The charges stemmed from a scheme to extort millions of dollars from companies seeking riverboat casino licenses. He was sentenced to 10 years in federal prison.
- •William J. Jefferson freezer cash (indicted 2007): In a scandal that drew national attention, former Congressman William J. Jefferson was indicted on bribery and corruption charges. The investigation began when FBI agents found \$90,000 in cash wrapped in foil and hidden in his freezer.
- •Ray Nagin, Hurricane Katrina scandal (convicted 2014): Former New Orleans Mayor Ray Nagin was convicted on 20 of 21 corruption charges, including bribery, wire fraud, and money laundering. He was found to have accepted bribes from contractors seeking city work following Hurricane Katrina and was sentenced to 10 years in prison.
- •Aaron Broussard's retirement scandal (resigned in 2010): The former Jefferson Parish president resigned and later pleaded guilty to corruption charges. Broussard was indicted for using fake retirement benefits to defraud the parish and was sentenced to prison.
- •Huey P. Long (1934): The populist governor and senator known as the "Kingfish" faced numerous accusations of corruption and eventually an impeachment attempt. Though he was never formally convicted, his political machine was rife with allegations of vote buying and misuse of public funds.
- •Cleo Fields scandal (1997): In an incident captured on FBI surveillance video, Cleo Fields was shown accepting a large bundle of cash from then-Governor Edwin Edwards. While Fields was never charged with a crime, the footage was used as evidence in Edwards's federal corruption trial in 2000.



Building Black Wealth

- **1.Shift to a Wealth-Building Mindset:** Overcoming financial trauma from systemic inequities is crucial. Acknowledge that building wealth is possible by focusing on longterm goals rather than immediate needs. This mindset shift counters distrust in financial systems, encouraging participation in wealth-building opportunities like investing.
- **2.Budget with Purpose:** Understand your financial situation by tracking income, assets, and expenses. Set clear, goals-based budgets to prioritize needs over wants. Avoid high-interest debt but consider strategic debt for appreciating assets like real estate or education, which can yield long-term returns.
- **3.Invest in the Stock Market:** Black Americans are significantly underinvested in stocks, which make up only 4% of Black wealth compared to 30% of white wealth. Start small, even with \$5-\$10 weekly, to build the habit. Utilize tax-advantaged accounts like 401(k)s or IRAs, especially with employer matches, to grow wealth efficiently.
- Pursue Real Estate Ownership: Despite historical barriers like redlining, real estate remains a powerful wealth-building tool. Options include house hacking (living in one unit, renting others), partnering for multifamily properties, or investing in Real Estate Investment Trusts (REITs) with low capital.
- **4. Leverage Collective Financial Strategies:** Form Family Investment LLCs to pool resources for investments in property, businesses, or stocks. This approach offers tax benefits and strengthens community wealth. Support Black-owned businesses and banks to keep dollars circulating longer in the community.
- **5. Protect Assets with Insurance and Estate Planning:** Over 70% of Black adults lack wills or trusts, risking wealth loss. Secure term or whole-life insurance, create wills, and name beneficiaries to ensure assets transfer to heirs.
- **6. Advocate for Policy Reform:** Individual efforts must be paired with systemic change. Support policies like baby bonds, reparations, or housing grants to address historical wealth extraction and structural barriers.

These strategies address both personal and systemic factors, leveraging education, investment, and collective action to close the racial wealth gap, which sees the median white household with 7.8 times the wealth of the median Black household (\$188,200 vs. \$24,100). 


















Line dancing class to begin Sept. 9
