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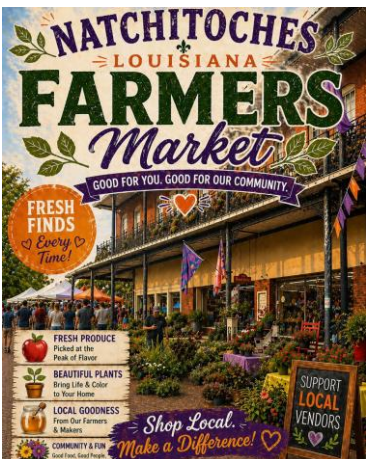
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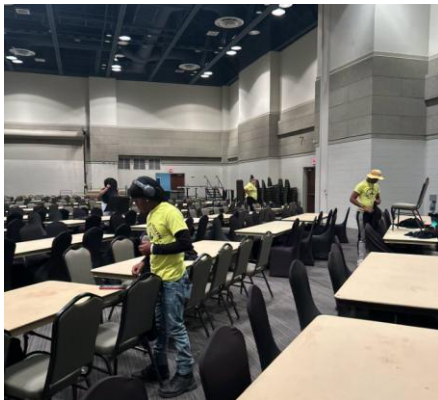

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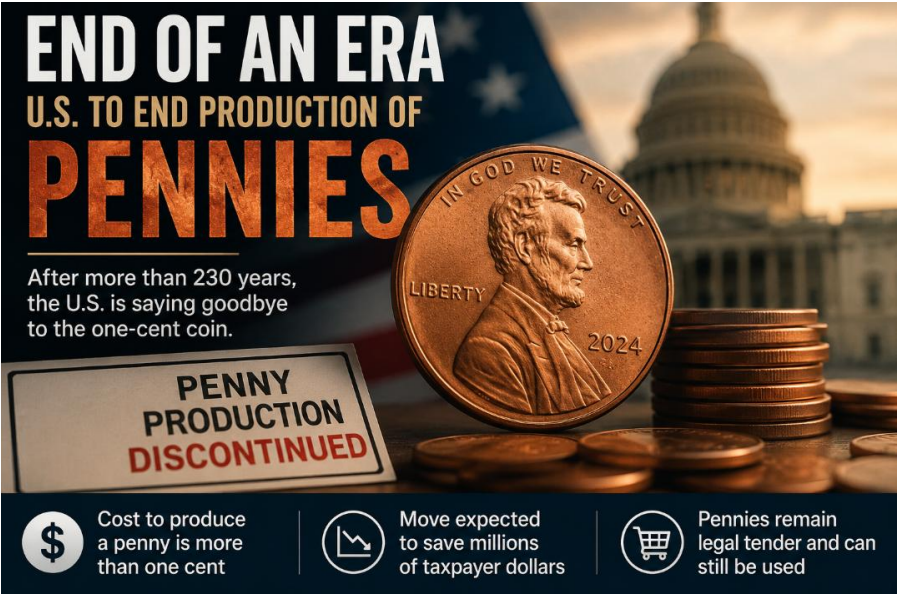
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No More Pennies: U.S. Ends Production After 232 Years

The United States Mint struck its final circulating penny on November 12, 2025, at the Philadelphia facility, closing a chapter that began in 1793. After more than two centuries, the one-cent coin is no longer being produced for everyday use.

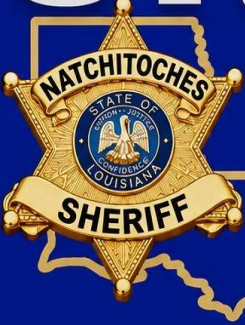


The decision stemmed from simple economics. Producing each penny had climbed to roughly 3.69 cents—more than three times its face value—due to rising material, facility, and overhead costs. Officials project annual savings of about \$56 million by stopping production. With cash transactions declining and the penny’s purchasing power near zero, the Treasury Department determined continued minting was neither fiscally responsible nor necessary.

Existing pennies remain legal tender. Estimates of those still in circulation range from roughly 114 billion to 300 billion—far more than commerce requires. The Federal Reserve will recirculate them for as long as possible. Businesses may continue pricing in one-cent increments, though some are already rounding cash transactions to the nearest nickel as supplies tighten in certain areas. Limited numismatic versions will still be produced for collectors. For most Americans, the change will feel gradual: the familiar Lincoln cent simply won’t be replenished. The move mirrors earlier retirements of low-value coins in other countries and marks the first U.S. circulating coin discontinued for low value since the half-cent in 1857.

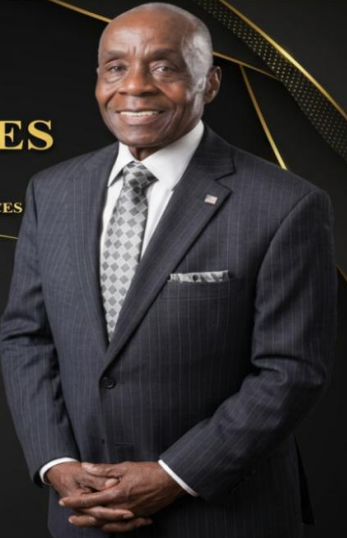
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Reception to mark closing of Hotter 'N Hell National Art Exhibition

NATCHITOCHES - The closing reception for Hotter 'N Hell National Art Exhibition 2026 will be held at Northwestern State University's Orville Hanchey Gallery on Saturday, Aug. 8 from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. This year's exhibition features artists from 17 states.

The Hotter 'N Hell Exhibition is a juried show featuring all art forms that use fire and heat as part of the creative process. That could include ceramics, glassblowing, welded sculpture, poured metals, wood-burning, metalsmithing, burned textiles and more.

This year's juror is Michael Williams, MFA. Raised in Pineville, Williams is an artist whose work is grounded in a deep engagement with three-dimensional form and visual storytelling. He earned his Bachelor of Arts in Studio Art with a Concentration in Ceramics from Louisiana College (now Louisiana Christian University) before continuing his studies at Mississippi College in Clinton, Mississippi, where he received a Master of Fine Arts in Visual Arts with a Three-Dimensional Studio Concentration.

Williams's artwork has been featured in more than twenty solo and group exhibitions, reflecting his ongoing commitment to material exploration and contemporary craft. In addition to his studio practice, he is a published illustrator whose work spans multiple media.

He currently serves as the gallery director at Louisiana Christian University and is a professor in the School of Media, Communication, and the Fine Arts, where he holds the Eugenia Colvin Dawson Professorship in Art. Through both his professional roles and his artistic practice, Williams continues to foster creative growth in his community while contributing to the broader visual arts field.

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Covington facilitates N.C. summer math camp for K-12 teachers

NATCHITOCHES – Judith Covington, professor of mathematics at Northwestern State University, served as a facilitator for the North Carolina Network of Math Teachers' Circles (NCNMTC) Summer Math Camp for K-12 teachers at Western Carolina University in the mountains of Western Carolina. The camp took place July 20-22.

Participants were housed at the North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching (NCCAT <https://www.nccat.org/>). Due to the renovations at NCCAT, the sessions were held on the campus of Western Carolina University.

"While at the camp I facilitated three sessions. The first was FLIP 7 where participants learned about the FLIP 7 game and discussed the mathematics involved in the game and what a good strategy would be for playing the game," she explained.

"The second session was about Parking Functions where drivers had preferred parking spots and guidelines about how to park. Participants analyzed whether or not all cars would be able to park. In the final session, titled Math or Magic, participants watched a video of a card trick and determined the mathematics that made the trick work.

This is the 12th year that NCNMTC has held a summer camp and the eighth year that Covington was invited to facilitate sessions. She said the best part of attending Math Camp is working with the teachers involved.

"These teachers are always so eager to jump in and participate and they enjoy the challenges presented to them. Being in the mountains in July is not bad either," she said.

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NSU-Shreveport Registration Rally brings enrollment support to north Louisiana students

One-stop event connected students with university offices and resources ahead of the fall semester.

NATCHITOCHEs – Northwestern State University students from across north Louisiana preparing for the fall semester completed enrollment, met with university staff and connected with campus resources during Registration Rally at the NSU Shreveport campus July 27.

The event, held from 9 a.m. to noon, brought together representatives from Financial Aid, the Registrar's Office, Student Accounting and Cashiering, Admissions, academic colleges and other university departments to answer questions and guide students through the enrollment process. By hosting Registration Rally in Shreveport, NSU gave students across north Louisiana the opportunity to complete enrollment closer to home before classes begin.

Payton Romero, assistant director of recruiting for transfer and graduate students at NSU, said students could complete several enrollment steps during one visit.

"Today on the Shreveport campus, we have representatives from admissions, Financial Aid and their academic advisors here as well," Romero said. "They are checking in with us. We are making sure they are good on the admissions side, making sure they do not have any registration holds and that we have all of their documents. Then they can meet with Financial Aid. They can also get their student ID today, and then we will send them to meet with their advisor and get registered for fall classes. It's a one-stop shop for everything today."

Chandler Gardner of Shreveport attended Registration Rally to prepare for the fall semester.

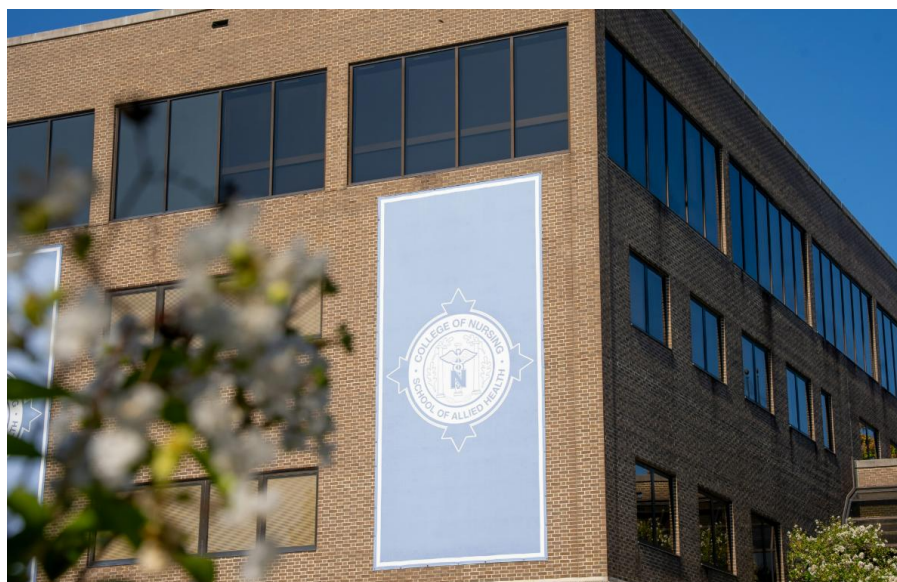
"I just got all my classes scheduled, talked to the financial people about my tuition, got my ID. Now I'm ready to go," Gardner said.

More Unanswered Questions Fuel Doubts In Nolan Wells' Death

Ocean Springs, Mississippi — Weeks after the tragic death of 18-year-old Nolan Xavier Wells on Horn Island, new details from an independent autopsy have only deepened the mystery surrounding his final hours, leaving his family, the community, and observers nationwide demanding clearer answers from authorities.



Wells, a promising student-athlete and wide receiver at Southwest Mississippi Community College, disappeared on July 4, 2026, during a Fourth of July boat trip with friends to the popular barrier island off Mississippi's Gulf Coast. His body was discovered two days later on July 6 by a National Park Service ranger, face down near the shoreline.

Inconclusive Autopsy Raises New Concerns

On July 22, civil rights attorney Ben Crump, representing Wells' family, announced the results of an independent autopsy performed by Dr. Roger Mitchell, a respected forensic pathologist and president of the National Medical Association. The report listed both the cause and manner of death as "undetermined" pending further investigation.

Dr. Mitchell found no fractures, deep tissue injuries, or lacerations. However, he noted a significant area of red discoloration in the soft tissue on the back of Wells' head (roughly 8–12 inches), which he described as inconclusive and worthy of additional review. Crucially, the pathologist stated he could not rule out non-accidental factors contributing to or causing the death.

The examination faced major limitations: key structures from the state autopsy (including neck organs, trachea, and hyoid bone) were unavailable, and advanced decomposition further complicated findings. As a result, Dr. Mitchell could not confirm whether Wells drowned, whether water was present in his airways, or if he had neck injuries or a brain bleed.

- The independent report outlined seven key unanswered questions, including:
 - Why and how did Wells enter the water?
 - What was his body position when found?
 - Was there water in his airway?
 - Any evidence of neck injuries or brain bleed?
 - What were his stomach contents and toxicology results?

Conflicting Accounts and Lingering Mysteries

- Family members and Crump have highlighted several inconsistencies in witness statements: Conflicting reports about whether Wells intended to stay on the island or return with the group.
- Why Wells' cellphone was not with him (his family reportedly located it via tracking apps).
- The absence of any witnesses seeing him struggle or drown despite the crowded holiday setting.
- Reports of a possible altercation on the island, including audio of raised voices.

Authorities with the Jackson County Sheriff's Office initially stated no foul play was suspected, but the investigation continues. The official state autopsy results and toxicology reports have not been publicly released, with the case expected to go before a grand jury.



A Community Seeking Transparency

Wells' parents, Christine Wonsley and Elmore Wonsley, have expressed deep frustration and a desire for full transparency. "The only question we have is, 'What happened to our son?'" his mother has said.

The case has drawn national attention, with involvement from figures like Rev. Al Sharpton and Colin Kaepernick (who helped fund the independent autopsy). It has also sparked broader conversations about trust in investigations, especially given Mississippi's history.

As the investigation proceeds, Wells' family and supporters continue to call for the release of all evidence, including full toxicology results, witness statements, and any video or photo footage from the island. The Real News Louisiana will continue to follow this developing story and provide updates as more information becomes available. Our thoughts remain with Nolan's family during this difficult time.

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
