A Decade of Artistry: Takerria Kahey's Journey to the Christmas Poster Competition








## Concerned Citizens Have Questions for the Natchitoches Community Improvement Foundation

Dear Editor,

Several concerned citizens are seeking answers from the Natchitoches Community Improvement Foundation (NCIF). Established in 2003, NCIF manages a settlement fund from a Tennessee Gas Pipeline Company lawsuit over a late-1990s PCBs spill in Sibley Lake. The foundation was ordered by the court to distribute the funds to Natchitoches citizens through grants and scholarships for education, housing, recreation, and economic development.







NCIF became a 501(c)(3) nonprofit in 2014, requiring annual IRS financial disclosures. Public pressure also led to increased annual disbursements to citizens. In October 2023, Harold Bayonne, board member Helen Obioha, and Citizens for Democratic Action sued NCIF to force six board members to relinquish their seats for exceeding term limits. During his decision, Judge Peters also noted that while the foundation had been a great opportunity for the community, it needed to improve its financial management. He commended the foundation for growing its fund but stressed that oversight was still necessary.

The court order removed board members who violated term limits, paving the way for new elections and greater transparency. The lawsuit and court order led to greater public oversight and accountability for NCIF's actions and finances. After the ruling, Harold Bayonne became NCIF president and focused on youth projects, such as a free STEAM summer camp. He aimed to direct the Sibley Lake settlement fund toward improving the lives of Natchitoches residents.

Board members have accused Chairperson Harold Bayonne of not following Robert's Rules of Order and of lacking financial transparency. Concerned citizens want to ensure community funds are used fairly and honestly. The court warned that the community could lose these funds to another organization if NCIF does not comply with requirements. According to Chairperson Bayonne, no public meetings will be held until the judge approves the amended by-laws. Citizens remain deeply concerned about losing funding and seek answers.



### **Summary of Robert's Rules of Order**

Robert's Rules of Order is a comprehensive manual used to guide the conduct of meetings and organizational decision-making. Developed by Henry Martyn Robert in the 19th century, the rules are designed to ensure meetings are orderly, fair, and democratic. The system provides a framework for proposing motions, debating ideas, amending proposals, and voting on decisions.



Key principles include protecting the rights of all members, ensuring the majority's will is carried out, and respecting the opinions of the minority. The rules outline the roles and responsibilities of officers (such as the chairperson), establish an agenda, and detail the proper procedures for handling motions, points of order, and amendments. They also prescribe how to manage debates, call for votes, and keep accurate meeting records (minutes).


By following Robert's Rules, organizations can prevent confusion, resolve disagreements effectively, and promote active participation among members. The structure provided by these rules is widely adopted by nonprofit groups, boards, clubs, and other associations to facilitate transparent and efficient governance.


















































**Healing and Hope: Starting Over After Divorce** 



### Vickie Johnson Named Grand Marshall of the 99<sup>th</sup> Annual Natchitoches Christmas Festival Parade



**NATCHITOCHES, LA** — **October 21, 2025** — The Natchitoches Christmas Festival Committee is proud to announce that Vickie Johnson, a recent Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame inductee, former WNBA All-Star, and respected professional coach, will serve as Grand Marshal of the 99th Annual Natchitoches Christmas Festival of Lights Parade on Saturday, December 6, 2025, at 1:00 p.m. in historic downtown Natchitoches.

A native of nearby Coushatta, where she was one of the country's most sought-after high school girls' basketball recruits, Johnson has built a remarkable resume as a player and a coach. Following a standout collegiate career at Louisiana Tech University, where she twice earned All-American honors and led the Lady Techsters to the 1994 NCAA national championship game, Johnson went on to become one of the most accomplished players in WNBA history.

Johnson's continuing involvement with professional basketball spans more than 40 years as a player and later as a coach in the WNBA, in addition to playing 15 seasons overseas in France, Israel, Italy, Hungary, and Turkey.

Her professional career began when she was drafted 12th overall by the New York Liberty in the inaugural WNBA Elite Draft in 1997, making her one of the original 32 players to compete in the WNBA and marking the beginning of a 13-year playing career. During her tenure, she earned two WNBA All-Star selections (1999 and 2001) and received the Kim Perrot Sportsmanship Award in 2008. Johnson became the first Liberty player to reach 2,000 career points and later concluded her playing career with the San Antonio Silver Stars, where she played her final four seasons.

Her impact on the game extended well beyond her playing days. Johnson has served as a coach and mentor at the highest levels of the sport, including leadership roles with the San Antonio Stars, Las Vegas Aces, Dallas Wings, and the Atlanta Dream.

In recognition of her achievements, Johnson was inducted this summer into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame, located in downtown Natchitoches, a fitting connection as she returns to the community to lead this year's parade.

"I am honored to serve as Grand Marshal of the Natchitoches Christmas Festival Parade," said Johnson. "Louisiana has always been home for me, and to celebrate this incredible tradition in such a historic and welcoming community is truly special."

"We are honored to welcome Vickie Johnson as our Grand Marshal," said Sandra Dickens, HDBA President. "Her leadership, excellence, and Louisiana pride perfectly reflect the spirit of the Natchitoches Christmas Festival and our celebration of homegrown achievement."

As Grand Marshal, Johnson will lead the Festival of Lights Parade, greeting thousands of visitors gathered along the historic Natchitoches riverbank. She will also participate in special events throughout the weekend as part of the city's beloved holiday tradition.


Unbreakable Bonds: Honoring Mothers Who Endure the Loss of Children to Violence.




### Northwestern Lyrica and Orpheus to perform fall concert Sunday

## Manipulating the Ballot: Tactics Corrupt Politicians Use to Sway Voters

Corrupt politicians often try to win people over by taking advantage of their needs and struggles. They employ various tactics to secure votes, typically by targeting the most vulnerable individuals.

Here are some of the common ways they do it:

•Cash Handouts: Sometimes, politicians simply give people money before elections. This usually happens in poorer neighborhoods, where even a small amount of cash can make a big difference in someone's daily life.



- •Free Stuff: Politicians may hand out things like food, clothes, or even appliances. You might hear stories about people getting boxes of fried chicken, malt liquor, watermelon, and/or free medical checkups around election time, all in hopes they'll vote a certain way.
- •Job Offers: When jobs are scarce, some politicians promise people or their family members a job in exchange for their vote. These promises often sound appealing, especially to those struggling to find work.
- •Big Promises for the Neighborhood: Politicians might show up and say they'll fix roads, job shortages, or make the communities safe again. These promises are often made during campaign season, but sometimes nothing happens afterward.
- •Special Favors for the Powerful: Some politicians do favors for local leaders or influential people in the community, like giving them special treatment or contracts, hoping these people will convince others to vote for them.
- •Threats and Pressure: In more serious cases, there are stories about people being threatened or told there will be trouble if they don't vote a certain way. Sometimes, it's about offering 'protection'—but only if you cooperate.
- •Spreading False Information: Politicians might use social media, radio ads, or local rumors to spread lies or make fake promises, trying to trick people into supporting them.

As the founder of Soar Counseling and Consulting Services, LLC, she is dedicated to helping individuals and families navigate life's challenges, heal emotional wounds and achieve personal growth.



Wallace is a proud alumna of NSU, having earned her Bachelor of Science in Psychology in 2005 and Master of Arts in Student Personnel Services – Counseling in 2008. She has over a decade of experience providing compassionate, evidence-based care to children, adolescents and adults. Her therapeutic approach blends Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT), Person-Centered Counseling and Solution-Focused Brief Therapy (SFBT) to empower clients to build resilience and rediscover hope.

Wallace's personal journey through adversity inspired her mission to help others Soar -- finding strength, optimism, awareness and renewal through the counseling process. In addition to her clinical practice, she serves as a mentor and supervisor for provisional LPCs, supporting the next generation of mental health professionals.

Wallace's work spans a wide range of focus areas, including anxiety, depression, anger management, family dynamics, life transitions and grief recovery. Known for her authenticity, empathy, and practical wisdom, Wallace has become a trusted advocate for mental wellness across Louisiana communities.

Wallace visited with a colleague recently to talk about her passion for helping others, her private practice Soar and her transition from counseling to academia. The conversation has been edited and condensed for clarity.

### Can you tell me about your background and education? When did you becoming interested in counseling?

I grew up in Baton Rouge and began attending NSU in the fall of 2001, majoring in Psychology with a minor in Speech. While at NSU, I was active in several student organizations, serving as president of the NSU Angels, a basketball auxiliary organization, and as a proud member of the lota Mu Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. I completed my Bachelor of Science in Psychology in 2005.

Following a very personal loss, I returned to Northwestern to pursue a Master of Arts in Student Personnel Services, Counseling track and completed the program in 2008. I was drawn to counseling during that time of grief; it was in my own season of healing that I recognized how vital it was for others to have access to the same kind of support I so deeply needed. That experience became the foundation for my passion for helping others through loss and emotional recovery.

## Dr. Tarkisha Wallace helps individuals SOAR through teaching, counseling

### What drew you to enroll at NSU as an undergrad?

Initially, I wasn't sure where I wanted to attend college, but not going wasn't an option in my household. My mother had a friend whose daughter attended NSU and spoke very highly of her experience, so we decided to visit.



For my parents, NSU was close enough to reach me if needed but far enough to allow me to gain independence and grow. By the end of my first semester in fall 2001, I had fallen in love with the campus culture, student life, and the community that makes Northwestern so special.

### Did you have any special mentors or outstanding experiences that impacted you as a student?

Graduate school brought two individuals who left a lasting impression on my life. Dr. Danny Seymour became a mentor and has continued to be a source of support and encouragement even 17 years later. I also had Mrs. Frances Conine as my Counseling Skills instructor, and her compassion and understanding during my time of grief made a profound impact. The kindness and guidance both provided still influence the way I teach, counsel and mentor others today.

### What drew you from the counseling practice to the university/academic setting?

I often say that while I am a great counselor, I'm an even better trainer. I have a deep love for training and professional development, and teaching allows me to merge those passions. Educating and preparing future counselors to serve in the field is one of the most fulfilling aspects of my career. I view this season of my life as one focused on imparting knowledge, compassion and practical skill to the next generation of counselors, helping them develop the confidence and competence to carry the profession forward.

### Can you talk about Soar?

Soar Counseling and Consulting Services is my private practice, which I founded in 2015. At the time, I had stepped into a leadership role that involved more administrative oversight than direct counseling. Soar allowed me to continue doing the clinical work I loved while also mentoring and developing professionals in leadership and mental health settings. It represents both my commitment to helping individuals heal and my dedication to empowering professionals to grow.

### What would you say to an individual interested in the field of counseling?

Counseling is truly "heart work." While we learn techniques and theory, at its core, counseling begins with empathy, compassion and the desire to help others. The counselor's role often leaves a lifelong impression; people may forget what we say, but they rarely forget how we made them feel. It's a field that requires both skill and heart, and it's an incredible privilege to walk alongside others as they navigate their healing journey.


