Breda Town: A Cornerstone of Natchitoches' African American Heritage

Breda Town is a historic African American community in Natchitoches, Louisiana. It developed on the former Breda Plantation site after the Civil War, when formerly enslaved people chose to remain on the land they had worked. The community was built on self-help and a commitment to establishing social and economic institutions for freed people, making it a vital part of Natchitoches' African American history. Breda Town is one of the area's earliest post-emancipation settlements for freed people.

The community originated from the 19th-century Breda Plantation, which was owned by Dr. Jean P. Breda. After the Civil War, the neighborhood took shape adjacent to the plantation. Formerly enslaved individuals formed the core of this self-sustaining area, where they established homes, institutions, and a cemetery that served Black residents. The Breda Town Cemetery, dating back to the 1800s, is a key feature and highlights the enduring legacy of African American self-determination in Natchitoches Parish during Reconstruction.

Breda Town reflects broader regional patterns: after emancipation, freed African Americans built their own churches, schools, and social networks. They also contributed to the rich Creole and multicultural heritage of Natchitoches, one of Louisiana's oldest European settlements, founded in 1714.

Today, Breda Town remains part of the city's northwest section, near addresses such as 1320 Dixie Street. The community is closely tied to ongoing efforts to preserve African American history in the Cane River region.

Demons for Recovery offers extra support for college students healing from addiction

NATCHITOCHES – Northwestern State University students seeking support while navigating addiction recovery have an extra resource starting this semester. Demons for Recovery is one of Louisiana's newest collegiate recovery programs (CRPs), a growing student resource that can be a lifesaver for students making the transition from a home environment to a college environment.

NSU's Department of Psychology and Addiction Studies received a grant from the Louisiana Board of Regents, in partnership with the Louisiana Department of Health, to establish Demons for Recovery, joining several other public and private institutions with such programs. Nationwide, there are nearly 200 college recovery programs. The grant will fund the initiative over a three-year period.

Dr. Charles R. King, department chair; Sarah Ebarb, program coordinator, and Hillary Bennett, peer support specialist, will play key roles in the development and implementation of the program. "Combining academic achievement with recovery support allows students to thrive without sacrificing one for the other," King said.

"The transition to college often includes increased stress, social pressures and a new level of independence," Ebarb said. "For students in recovery, these challenges can be triggering. The party culture, availability of substances and lack of familiar support systems can make it difficult to maintain sobriety. Without adequate support, students may relapse or feel isolated, which can negatively impact their mental health and academic performance."

NSU identified the need for a collegiate recovery program through national data, campus mental health trends, and direct feedback from students and faculty.

Supported by the grant, Demons for Recovery will offer weekly peer support group meetings, educational seminars, sober social and outreach events, scholarships and a designated lounge in Student Union Room 313 for students to gather for meetings, quiet study or connection. Funds will be allocated to training staff and student leaders on how to support individuals in recovery effectively and compassionately. Staff also plan to launch an awareness campaign with informational sessions, class presentations, digital outreach and collaboration with student organizations.

"Our projected outcomes include increased retention rates among students in recovery, reduced relapse rates and improved overall well-being and academic performance," Ebarb said.

While substance abuse recovery is a core focus, recovery can extend to many other behavioral addictions. Administrators plan to take an "All Recovery" approach.

"Recovery is a sign of strength, not weakness. Choosing recovery shows courage, self-awareness and a commitment to personal growth. By normalizing conversations around substance use, we can create a healthier, more inclusive campus culture. Recovery should be supported and celebrated, just like any other journey of self-improvement," Ebarb said.

All funds raised at each BCF Event support educational scholarships for deserving high school graduating seniors.







BEN D. JOHNSON EDUCATIONAL CENTER ADVANCES TO PUBLIC VOTING PHASE FOR UP TO \$120K MULTI-YEAR GRANT FOR A FREE, OUTDOOR MUSIC SERIES IN NATCHITOCHES

September 5, 2025 – Ben D. Johnson Educational Center, in partnership with the City of Natchitoches, is now in the running to bring a free outdoor music series to Natchitoches starting in 2026.

The Levitt Foundation, a national social impact funder at the intersection of music, public space, and community building, supports the largest free outdoor concert series in America. Natchitoches hopes to qualify as a finalist to receive a Levitt Music Series Grant. The public is urged to support Ben D. Johnson Educational Center's proposal by participating in the public voting process, via online or text to vote, taking place from September 5-15, 2025, at levitt.org/vote.

Levitt Music Series Grants are an exciting, multi-year matching grant created by the Levitt Foundation to bring the joy of free outdoor concerts to towns and cities across the country. For the 2026–2028 grant cycle, the Levitt Foundation will award U.S.-based 501(c)(3) nonprofits up to \$120,000 over three years (up to \$40,000 per year), to produce their own Levitt Music Series, with 7-10 free outdoor concerts annually featuring a diverse lineup of music genres with professional musicians, activating an underused public space, creating a vibrant, inclusive community destination for people of all ages and backgrounds.

Ben D. Johnson Educational Center submitted the proposal for Natchitoches to present the free music series at Ben Johnson Baseball Park in historic Jackson Square.





The Center's proposal is now posted on the Levitt Foundation website, where the public can vote and learn more about the proposals from across the country that have advanced to the voting phase. An individual may submit one vote for up to five proposals of their choosing. Construction Underway on New Pet Adoption & Welfare Center in Natchitoches Community Facility Will Bring Compassion, Care, and Connection to the Region



Construction has begun on Hwy 1 Bypass for a pet adoption and welfare center that will expand resources for both animals in need and the families who care for them across Natchitoches Parish. The project is led by FAUNA (Friends All United for Natchitoches Animals), a 501(c)(3) nonprofit dedicated to improving animal welfare. To honor a lifetime of advocacy and generosity, FAUNA's Board of Directors voted to name the facility the **Edwina & Sam Friedman Pet Adoption & Welfare Center.**

Made possible through both state and private contributions, the center reflects a parish-wide commitment to compassion. The largest contribution comes from Edwina Friedman, who is dedicating the facility to the memory of her late husband, Sam Friedman, founder of Dimension Hospitality. His career was built on service, dignity, and care—values that now guide the mission of this community resource.

When completed, the new center will not only provide safe housing and adoption services for animals, but will also serve families through affordable spay/neuter and vaccination clinics, education programs, and volunteer opportunities. More than a building, it is designed to be a place where neighbors, schools, and local organizations can come together to strengthen animal welfare across Natchitoches Parish.

Inside, a multipurpose meeting room will host workshops, civic meetings, and other community events. A surgery suite with exam, treatment, and X-ray rooms will provide medical care for animals housed at the center. Outdoors, play areas will give dogs spaces to thrive. Future plans include a nature-inspired walking trail where residents can enjoy the grounds while supporting animal care.

The vision for this center is rooted in a long tradition of animal advocacy in Natchitoches Parish. FAUNA was formed in 2022 when two animal rescue groups, Natchitoches Hope for Paws and Natchitoches Humane Society, combined forces. Collectively, the two organizations have been serving the community for more than 70 years. Today, FAUNA carries forward that legacy with multiple community programs:



- Spay Natchitoches: Provides a robust spay/neuter program to help families manage the care of their pets.
- TNR (Trap/Neuter/Return): Humanely manages community cats to prevent overpopulation, improve health, and reduce nuisance behaviors while supporting rodent control.
- Pet Health Fairs: Hosted several times each year, offering no- and low-cost vaccinations, microchipping, and education on the benefits of spaying and neutering.
- PACT (Providing Animal Comfort Therapy): Brings service animals to nursing homes, offering companionship and joy to residents and staff.
- NSU Veterinary Technology Partnership: Collaborates with Northwestern State University's Veterinary Technology Program, enhancing care for community animals while supporting student learning. As part of this commitment, FAUNA funds an endowed scholarship for NSU Vet Tech students, ensuring ongoing support for future professionals.




How to Help Yourself or Someone Else


- Call or text 988: The 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline offers free, confidential support 24/7 across the U.S. You can call, text, or chat with trained crisis counselors at any time.
- **Recognize warning signs:** Warning signs may include increased use of drugs or alcohol, expressing feelings of being a burden, withdrawing from friends and family, or experiencing extreme mood swings.
- Communicate openly and honestly: If you're concerned about someone, ask them directly if they are thinking about suicide. Don't avoid the word "suicide." Show your concern and reassure them that you're there to support them.
- **Encourage professional help:** People in crisis can benefit from speaking with mental health professionals who offer support and guidance. Ongoing therapy or clinical care may be helpful for continued support.
- Remove potential hazards: If there is an immediate risk, try to remove access to firearms, medications, or other items that might be used for self-harm.
- **Connect to resources:** Help link individuals to support systems and people who can help keep them safe. Many national and local resources are available to assist.

The first Black Woman to run for judge in Natchitoches Parish was Carmella Parker.

Her career includes serving as an assistant attorney general and president of the Crime Stoppers Natchitoches chapter.



Current Mandatory Age Requirement for Louisiana Judges

Louisiana's current law requires judges to retire by age 70 but allows them to complete their term if they reach that age during their tenure.



Proposed Amendment (House Bill 63)

Louisiana's legislature approved a measure this year (House Bill 63) to place a constitutional amendment on the ballot for voters to decide if the retirement age should be increased from 70 to 75. Election date: April 18, 2026

NSU family remembers 9/11 with Patriot Day ceremony

NATCHITOCHES – The Northwestern State University family paid tribute to those who lost their lives in the 9/11 attacks with a Sept. 11 Patriot Day ceremony that began at precisely 7:46 a.m., the moment the first plane crashed into the World Trade Center 24 years ago.

With flags lowered to half-staff, Student Government Association President Madysen Morgan of Bossier City asked for a moment of silence. A choral ensemble sang the national anthem.

"Today as we gather to commemorate the day, we remember and honor those who lost their lives on that sober day in 2001, the courageous first responders and selfless heroes who risked their lives and pay tribute to the countless individuals who emerged in its chaos to save others during this dark hour in our history," Morgan said.

"Many here today remember exactly where we were and what we were doing at 7:46 a.m. on the morning of Sept. 11, 2001. In fact, many of us were right here on this campus, and today we're together," said Reatha Cox, vice president for the Student Experience and dean of Students. "On Patriot Day we honor every life that was taken too soon. We honor the first responders, firefighters, law enforcement officers, emergency workers and service members all who answered the call of duty. We also thank and recognize the everyday citizens who rushed into action to save lives that day. Truly, there were no strangers that day."

For many students, the impact of 9/11 has resonated through their lives, even though it took place before they were born. Morgan said military members of her family were at Barksdale Air Force Base when President George W. Bush landed there in an emergency diversion the morning of Sept. 11, 2001. Later that day, Bush delivered a televised speech from Barksdale.

"My whole life I've known exactly what was happening, since they were so connected to it all. It's a really big deal for us coming from a military family," Morgan said.

Abigail Petermann, also of Bossier City, has a similar experience.

"Both my parents are veterans. When we were in school, they made a point to educate people on 9/11 and why it happened, how it happened. We grew up never forgetting, even though we weren't there," Petermann said.

RESOLUTION NO. 068 OF 2025

PROCLAMATION DECLARING SEPTEMBER 19 AND 20, 2025
AS NATCHITOCHES MEAT PIE FESTIVAL DAY'S
IN THE CITY OF NATCHITOCHES

WHEREAS, Records show that the concept of the meat pie took shape in the mid-1700's in Louisiana by Native Americans and later enhanced by the Spanish; and

WHEREAS, 55 years ago, James Lasyone's - opened his meat pie kitchen which is still in operation today in Historic Downtown Natchitoches; and

WHEREAS, the recipe of the meat pie has changed slightly from its inception and has been handed down from generation to generation; however, the basic ingredients and the process for creating a meat pie remains the same; and

WHEREAS, with an abundance of excitement in 2002, the Natchitoches Meat Pie Festival was formed to celebrate the noted culinary staple in Natchitoches, Louisiana; and

WHEREAS, in 2003, the Natchitoches meat pie was named Louisiana's official meat pie, and Natchitoches was one of the last cities to not have an identified food festival until 2002;

WHEREAS, the annual Festival attracts visitors from throughout the state and over a dozen of other states as well each year; and

WHEREAS, the festival has always been a family-oriented, non-admission required event over a two-day period in Downtown Natchitoches, helping to enhance the area's economy with individual activities that can be enjoyed at a small fee; and

WHEREAS, the organizing committee for the Festival is a complete volunteer committee;

WHEREAS, the Natchitoches Meat Pie Festival is returning by popular demand after a two-year break due to the novel coronavirus.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Ronnie Williams, Jr., Mayor, and the Natchitoches City Council, do hereby proclaim September 19 and 20, 2025 as:

NATCHITOCHES MEAT PIE FESTIVAL DAY'S

in the City of Natchitoches, and invite all residents to participate and enjoy the two-day Festival, that will include various bands, fireworks, vendors, children's performances and play area, and a "how to" workshop will encompass this year's celebration.


Natchitoches Community Rallies to Recover Stolen Bike for a Local Resident.


