


Significance of the Community Culture Parade March 22, 2025!

Remembering Creole Musician Lynn August

Joseph Leonard August, Jr. (1948-2025)

Born Joseph Leonard August Jr. on Aug. 7, 1948, in Lafayette, LA, Lynn August started out playing drums at age 11 before learning organ and piano in the 1960s. Recognizing the increasing popularity of zydeco, he bought an accordion and in the 1980s formed his own band, the Hot August Knights.

His first recorded album, "Zydeco Groove" from 1988, as well as others like "Creole Cruiser," "Creole People," and "Sauce Piquante" from the 1990s, expressed August's deep pride of his Creole identity and its cultural traditions. Through his albums and multi-decade performance career as a zydeco accordionist, keyboardist, and singer he helped introduce Creole culture to new audiences while keeping its traditional roots alive. This included a performance at the 1998 Natchitoches-NSU Folk Festival which celebrated all things Creole and the newly established Creole Heritage Center at NSULA.


Beyond his musical career, August was an entrepreneur and innovator. Drawing from his reality of being blind from an early age, in the 1990s he founded Touch Tech, a company dedicated to designing and selling computers for visually impaired individuals.

August was buried at Evangeline Memorial Gardens in Carencro, LA in late February, but his music will continue to empower Louisiana Creoles for generations to come.


Author Spotlight Jennifer Dorsey

Department of Biology and Microbiology to sponsor Venomous Handling course in May

NATCHITOCHES - The Department of Biology and Microbiology at Northwestern State University will sponsor a certification course in Level 1 Venomous Handling for the general public on May 24-25 from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in Room 122 of Bienvenu Hall. The course will be taught by the Rattlesnake Conservancy, a non-profit organization committed to the long-term preservation of imperiled rattlesnake species. The fee for the course is \$349.

This course is designed for a land manager, environmental consultant, first responder, homeowner, zookeeper, veterinary professional, biologist, herpetology enthusiast, photographer or anyone looking to learn how to safely handle venomous reptiles while receiving a professional certification.

This two-day course combines classroom instruction in topics including native venomous snake species, ecology, snake anatomy and physiology, reproductive behavior, venom toxicology, emergency snakebite management, captive husbandry. and more. It will include hands-on techniques like single hooking, double hooking, bagging, and containing venomous snakes.

These courses have been taught to thousands of students across the United States and set the industry standard in safe handling practices.











Natchitoches Regional Medical Center recognized and honored the contributions of ten of their African American doctors.

Mr. Oswald Taylor Jr.

Recognized by Yvette Garrett Ceasar-Williams

Oswald Taylor, Jr. is a City retired of Fire Natchitoches Captain. Mr. Taylor began working at the Natchitoches Fire Department in 1969. He was one of two blacks working there at the time. He acquired all the necessary skills of a dependable and capable fire fighter. In 1975, he passed the Captain exam and became the first black Captain for the Natchitoches Fire



Department. He was proud to be a fire fighter for the city. Mr. Taylor retired from the Natchitoches Fire Department in 1998. Mr. Taylor has been married to Mrs. Genevieve Taylor for 55 years. He has three sons – Michael Smith, Dion Barber, and Oswald Taylor III; two daughters – Melissa Robinson and Yvette Ceasar-Williams; and multiple grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Mr. Antavious Roberson Recognized by Pastor Steve Harris Sr.



Roberson, a native of Bienville Parish, has a proven track record of educational leadership. He began his teaching career in Bienville Parish, quickly distinguishing himself as an exceptional classroom leader. His commitment to student achievement was recognized with the TP Chaplin Outstanding Educator award in 2019 and Teacher of the Year award in 2020.

Jesus Calls Us to Come to Him by Francis Day

Jesus kept things simple. His message was often simply, "Come!"

Are we curious? Are we looking for something more in life? Two of John's disciples heard John refer to Jesus, "Behold, the Lamb of God!" They were curious and followed Jesus. Jesus asked them, "What are you looking for?" Perhaps unsure what to say, they answered, "Rabbi, where are you staying?" Jesus answered, "Come and see" (John 1:36-39).

Perhaps we are busy with our work and daily lives. Like the fishermen at Lake Galilee, we are busily fishing or fixing our nets. And Jesus suddenly says, "Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men" (Matthew 4:18-22).

Sometimes Jesus speaks to our hearts in moments of quiet prayer. At other times, it is in our busy daily lives that we hear his call, "Come!"

Perhaps we are struggling. Perhaps we are weighed down with burdens. Jesus says, "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28-30).

But if Jesus invites us to come to him, we may need to leave other things behind. In Matthew 19:16-30, we read of a rich young man who felt drawn to Jesus. He sensed a need for something deeper to fulfill his life. In response to his persistent questioning, Jesus said to him, "Go, sell what you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me."

Especially, we long to hear Jesus tell us to come to him at the Last Judgment, as we read in Matthew 25:31-46. To those on his right Jesus says, "Come, you who are blessed by my Father." To those on his left Jesus says, "Depart from me." This passage speaks of feeding the hungry, welcoming the stranger, and caring for the ill and those in prison. Jesus explains that whatever we do for these least ones, we do for him. Mother Teresa of Calcutta often reflected on these words of Jesus, "You did it for me."

In John 6:35 Jesus says, "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst." In John 6:37 Jesus says, "Everything that the Father gives me will come to me, and I will not reject anyone who comes to me." In John 6:44 Jesus explains, "No one can come to me unless the Father who sent me draw him, and I will raise him on the last day."

In John 11 we read of the death and raising of Lazarus. Perhaps we are spiritually dead in sin. Perhaps we feel empty and dead inside. But Jesus can call us to new life. In the death of our sin, may we hear Jesus call us by name, even as he said to his friend, "Lazarus, come forth!"


As it says in Psalm 95, "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts." As Samuel said, "Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening" (1 Samuel 3:1-10).

Jesus is looking at you and at me. He is repeating to you and me what he said to others. "Come, follow me!" "Come to me, you who are weary and find life burdensome." 


