### **RBC WORKSHOPS**

- Our Youth Council and Youth Group participants were able to take part in small business workshops presented by RBC.
- RBC partnered with local small-business owners to teach the youth how to start their own businesses from the ground up.
- A few of our youth started their own landscaping business during Summer 2018 and transitioned into a snow removal business for the Winter.









- In September of 2018, the Youth Council competed in annual the Amazing Youth Race.
- They raced all over the city and discovered new youth organizations and competed in challenges.
- We won the social media prize and received passes to Fun Haven!

### COMMUNITY HOLIDAY DINNER

- Youth Council planned a holiday dinner for the children and families living in the neighbourhood to celebrate the end of 2018 before our Winter break
- Syrian Kitchen catered a delicious dinner and the youth served the community.
- Youth Council planned and implemented winter themed games and activities for the children



### STOVE FUNDRAISER – SOUP OTTAWA



- In February of 2019 Youth Council applied to be a presenter at the Soup Ottawa Spring event.
- Soup Ottawa is recurring micro-grant participatory dinner event that happens quarterly. Presenters showcase projects that benefit their communities and people attending the event vote on which project should receive all of the proceeds form the event.
- Youth Council applied with the "Community Cooking corner" project and we were aiming to get a new stove for the Community House so that we could bring in new cooking programs for the neighbourhood.

### SOUP OTTAWA – STOVE FUNDRAISER

- Youth Council put on a skit that immediately captivated the audience and the night ended in Soup Ottawa's first ever tie!
- We tied for first with another fantastic organization and we ended up losing by 1 vote when they redid the vote, but audience members loved the youth's presentation so much that they vowed to get us a new stove anyway. It should be arriving soon!



# How much did we do?

- Provided service to 406 individuals and made 46,512 contacts
- Reached 86 households
- Provided 234 hours of tutoring services
- Implemented 7 community led initiatives and 17 community programs
- Provided 7 employment workshops and 13 employment opportunities
- Provided **2 \$1000** Bursaries
- Equipped **124** children with school supplies/backpacks
- Provided 29000lbs of fresh food to our neighbours
