




Fort Atkinson Food Pantry

Each year, the Fort Atkinson Food Pantry assist many families in need of food. In 2024, there have been **2785 families provided with food**.

Besides serving families, the Food Pantry also distributes **Smarty Packs** weekly to students in the Fort Atkinson School District who are facing food insecurity. During November, **773 students were served** by our Fort Atkinson Food Pantry Smartie Pack program. Five dollars can provide a Smartie Pack for a student for one week, while \$180 can support them for a year. All money donated to the Fort Atkinson Food Pantry goes to cover food for families in need and food for the Smarty Pack program.

From **January 5 to January 26, 2024**, Outreach is asking for monetary donations for the Fort Atkinson Food Pantry. Please make checks out to First Congregational UCC. It's Winter in Wisconsin!

It only takes 1 teaspoon of salt to pollute 5 gallons of water to a level that is toxic for freshwater ecosystems!

Once salt is in the environment it doesn't go away. It ends up in our lakes, rivers, streams and wetlands. **Salt weakens the concrete, brick and stone that make up our** homes, garages, bridges, and roads. **Road and** sidewalk salt can irritate your pets' toes, feet, and skin. Problems can also arise if a dog eats salt or licks their paws after a walk. Salt can stress plants and animals that have adapted to freshwater environment.

You can keep sidewalks and driveways safe this winter while protecting our waters by following these simple steps:

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- 1. Shovel: Clear walkways and other areas before the snow turns to ice. The more snow you remove manually, the less salt you will have to use and the more effective it will be.
- Scatter: If you use salt, scatter it so that there is space between the grains. Believe it or not, a coffee mug of salt is enough to treat an entire 20-foot driveway or 10 sidewalk squares.
- 3. Switch: When pavement temperatures drop below 15 degrees, salt won't work. Switch to sand for traction or a different ice melter that works at lower temperatures.
- 4. Select a Trained Contractor: Ask your contractor if they have already sent staff to a Smart Salting workshop. If not, encourage them to attend a class and to follow appropriate application rates.

Sweeping leftover salt reduces damage to concrete and protects local waterways. Dry salt can be reused if needed after a future storm event.

In the interest of reducing the negative impact of plastics upon our environment, why not make the change back to environmentally friendly and safe tap water instead. Save a number of the plastic bottles you purchase. By keeping them properly cleaned, they can be re-filled with tap water and re-used many times before disposing of them for recycling. Furthermore, the money you save will begin to count up over a period of time


