Transformation: Changing from Glory into Glory

63rd Annual Meeting of the Wisconsin Conference United Church of Christ June 6-7, 2025

Green Lake Conference Center; Green Lake, WI

Report from Delegates Kathi Cauley and Carol Maasz

The theme of the 2025 conference was Transformation: Changing from Glory to Glory, inviting us to embrace the ongoing work of the Holy Spirit as we discern new ways of living out the Gospel in changing times.

A Transformed Structure: Delegates voted to restructure the Conference. Representatives of our four associations voted to dissolve. Then delegates voted to transfer ecclesiastical duties from the associations to a Unified Committee on Ministry; transfer stewardship of former association funds to the Conference; and amend the Conference bylaws to reflect the shift to a single statewide judicatory body. We are no longer the Northeast, Northwest, Southeast, and Southwest associations. There is now a unified Committee on Ministry with the Conference Acting as an Association. The dissolution of the four Associations resulted in three regions – Eastern, Southern, Northern.

State of the Conference: Rev. Franz Rigert, Conference Minister, gave his State of the Conference Address. Amid all the pushback against DEI and the eagerness to deport immigrants, he referred us to Genesis 1, all humanity was created in the image of God. He said, "the Latin phrase is 'imago dei.' Spelled DEI and translated deity. Image that: The very representation of God in creation is in the expression of diversity, equity and inclusion".

Keynote Speaker: Rev. Karen Georgia Thompson, UCC General Minister and President, told us transformation begins in each of us. Transformation of the wider church begins with our spiritual practices. "Our spiritual lives are not meant for ourselves... they are for the community. In much the same way we need community to nurture our faith, we need community to live the faith".

Annual Meeting Closing Sermon: Rev. Jen Petricca Bloesch addressed the meeting's theme — "Transformation: Changing from Glory to Glory". She reflected on St. Paul's letter to the Corinthians "to ponder the many ways transformation will emerge in the future church". Her question to us; "Are we prepared to receive the change in all its diversity and say yes, this is still church, this is still living out Jesus' call to serve and love others?"

Delegate Report

Declaration for a Just Peace Between Palestine and Israel: At the Annual 2024 meeting, there was as affirmative vote to embark on a year of study of a resolution stemming from the 2021 General Synod. The resolution process called for at least 30% of Wisconsin UCC congregations to report they have engaged in some study of the topic before the June 2025 annual meeting. We did not meet the required percentage (60+ churches). It was voted to extend the study which can be in the manner chosen by the local church. The vote on whether to formally adopt the resolution is now slated for the 2026 Wisconsin Annual Meeting.

Business Meetings: There were two Business Meetings with votes on the Dissolution of the Associations, Revision of Bylaws, 2026 Budget, Nominations, votes discussed above, and more.

The conference schedule offered plenary sessions, workshops, and wellness sessions. Workshops attended by our church delegates included:

Spiritual Tools for Transformation and Discernment with Rev. Holly Whitcomb Disability and the Church with Rev. Jacob Nault

WISE Ways The WISE Team with Rev. Lisa Hart and various UCC church members

An Hour of Conversation with Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia A. Thompson, the General Minister and President-and Chief Executive Officer-of the United Church of Christ

Musicians: Richard Bruxvoort Colligan, Rev. Andra Moran, Rev. Jacob Nault, Rev. Nathan Holst, Rev. Christopher Grundy, and Rev. Bryan Sirchio. The Wisconsin Gospellers also performed.

During breaks, hospitality was provided in the exhibit hall, where a variety of exhibitors shared information and opportunity to purchase books, Olive Oil from Palestine, or other items. The conference also provided opportunities for meeting and connecting with others from UCC congregations from around the state.

Excerpted from an article by US PIRG https://pirg.org Microplastics are smaller than a grain of rice, which is what makes them so easy to unknowingly ingest.

Scientific research is beginning to reveal the effects that microplastics may be having on our bodies -- organ dysfunction, metabolic disorders, altered immune responses, neurotoxicity, reproductive and developmental toxicity and more.¹

People are asking how they can reduce their exposure to microplastics. Here are some tips to help you protect yourself and your loved ones from microplastics.

Use less plastic. Plastics shed, so the more plastic in your home, the more potential shedding. Make an inventory of plastic in your home. Are your clothes, kitchen utensils, or cleaning supplies made of plastic? What plastic items in your life and home could be replaced by another material or cut out of your life altogether?

Don't heat or store food in plastic. Plastic containers leach more when heated. Use a non-plastic plate or glass container in the microwave. Try to store leftovers in glass or metal containers.

Eat whole foods. Microplastics have been found in a higher concentration in processed foods.

Filter your tap water. Filtering water can help with minimizing microplastic, but do your homework -- not all filters are the same and some can even add microplastic to your water.

Shift to reusables. Using reusable coffee mugs, water bottles, takeout containers and grocery bags can help reduce your use of single-use plastic and your potential exposure to microplastic.

Don't buy bottled water. Because bottled water is packaged in a plastic bottle, there's a risk that the plastic will degrade and flake off into the water.

As we learn more about the health effects of microplastics on our body, needing to reduce our reliance on single-use plastic will become even more urgent.

Together, we can help keep our bodies, families and communities safer, cleaner and healthier.
