From Chris Tanner: How the LCAL Got its Start

Ever wonder why a handful of artists decided to start an art league in 1934 in the depths of the Depression? Here's what I found printed on a wall entering a related show in the Smithsonian Institute's portrait gallery last month.

"The 1930s was a heady time for artists in America. Through President Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal programs, the federal government paid them to paint and sculpt and urged them to look to the nation's land and people for subjects. For the next decade - until World War II brought support to a halt - the country's artists captured the beauty of the landscape, the industry of America's working people, and a sense of community shared in towns large and small in spite of the Great Depression.

"Roosevelt's pledge to help 'the forgotten man' also embraced America's artists. The Public Works of Art Project (PWAP) enlisted artists to capture 'the American Scene' in art that would embellish public buildings across the country. Although it lasted less than one year (Dec 1933 to Jun 1934), the PWAP employed thousands of artists, giving them an important role in the country's recovery. Their legacy, captured in more than 15,000 artworks, helped 'the American Scene' become 'America seen.'

Deb Edmunds also did some research and here is her report:

"The art league was conceived and was started in October 1934 in Waukegan. After searching the census of 1930 and 1940, I found some of the answers about who Mrs. *TWF* Davies was. To my surprise, she was really Mrs. *JWF* Davies (Cora). In 1930, she and her clergyman husband, Pastor JWF Davies, lived in Winnetka. Both were in their 50's and both were college educated and known as "freethinkers." Cora was a college teacher who also painted. Soon after, they relocated to Waukegan on 334 N. Utica. Although that home still exists, the street was renamed Martin Luther King Dr.

James WF Davies most likely had been offered a position as pastor at First Congregational Church on Grand Ave. Cora possibly wanted to share her knowledge of art, so she formed the art league to have comradery with other artists in the area. Her husband had been given credit for founding The Winnetka Community House, a place for the community to hold events and enjoy activities of all kinds. I am sure she must have missed having the challenges and joy that Winnetka gave them, so the art league was a way to continue contributing to their community through the arts."

From Fran Isaac: My Daughter, the Budding Composer

My daughter, Michelle Isaac, just won first place in the 4th Annual Chicago Song SLAM, an art song contest. I'm just so happy for her!

Michelle is on the right with her winning certificate. With her are the pianist and the soloist. Michelle entered an art song contest with a piece that set to music a poem by a suffragette at the turn of the century. Six other composers entered the contest, and the audience (present and online) voted for their favorite composition.

Many of these art songs were somewhat esoteric, sung by operatic voices. Michelle's piece was a poem about a judge pontificating about how absurd it is to give the women the vote because they are so emotional and flighty. The suffragette responds sarcastically that she sat through the judge's diatribe, proving that she was not at all like his description.

Because of the era in which this poem was written, Michelle's music reflected a cowboy rhythm and tone, and the lady's response was short and sweet. Last year her art song took 3rd place.
