



From Jeff Harold: Why Do We Bother?

More precisely, why do we bother creating our own art? Since I've started photographing birds, I have had to ask myself why I bother and put so much effort into it. I can easily go on the Internet, Instagram or whatever and find thousands of excellent photographs of birds, a lot of which I will never see, let alone photograph.

I find there's more than one answer for me.

- First, I'm constantly learning about my camera and photo software every time I start on a new project.
- Second, I believe that creating my own art, regardless of what is already out there, is beneficial to my mental and emotional well-being. Whenever I'm feeling low, being outside looking for photographs is something that raises my spirits and gets me motivated to make more out of life in general.
- Third, and probably my biggest motivator, is the challenge. When searching the world of bird photographs, or anything else I might be working on, the most important photos are those that I don't find. It's in this realm that I explore how to create something that is different from the vast majority of work out there.



Avian Portraits - YAHOOOO!!!

This hummingbird photo is an example of something I don't see much of when looking at photos and videos from other photographers. Most hummingbird photos are of the hummer sitting on a branch or hovering as it drinks from a flower. I really like the fact that this little guy is flying directly at me and I caught him face-on in mid-flight.

There is another important fact about what is on the Internet. In most cases I can't hang that picture on my wall to always be able to enjoy it. Ethically and legally, I definitely can't sell it as my own and I can't print it and enter it in a show as my own. I enjoy being surrounded by art at home, my own and others, and changing out my own work on a regular basis.

These are all ways my life is improved by creating my own photographs. The mental and physical health benefits of any kind of art have been documented in many studies, hospitals, and rehab centers, and schools recognize that having art on the walls is a positive motivation to the people they serve.
