"In response to Jeff Harold's interesting article about which 3 paintings us members would like to reserve for a time machine, this watercolor I did back in 1963 of an old North Shore Line RR car would certainly be one of my choices. It is a symbolic response to the death of the train line itself, which had its main route going along the north shore between Milwaukee and



Chicago, with a sidestep to Mundelein. I would ride that comfortable old train every day while attending art school in Chicago, and have many happy memories of it. You could even open the windows! Soon after the line went out of business the tracks were torn out and, from the way the landscape now appears, there are no real clues to indicate that it ever existed. Their removal was, however, responsible for the creation of many bike trails along the old RR right-of-way."

Bogs in Art, Nature Photo Contest (& a puzzle project). Please find some time to come visit in the next couple of weeks and *be inspired*.

Volo Bog is in its most gorgeous season –the tamarack trees are golden! These deciduous pines lose their chlorophyll in late October/early November, then drop their needles to create a carpet of gold upon the sphagnum moss. This generally happens around Halloween or during the first week of November, making this the most wonderful time to capture images for next year's *Bogs in Art* show or **photo contest**. And then there's Winter. Winter too is spectacular in Volo Bog. Nature in general can provide the inspiration needed to get out into the cold sunshine and enjoy some fresh air during winter. But then any time is a good time to visit a bog except March. March is well...March.

For the past couple of months we have been asking our photographer friends for high-resolution images of the *Eye of Volo Bog* for our Friends of **Volo Bog Puzzle Project**. We have Summer & Fall images (thank you Sue Olin and Mike



Trahan) but we still need winter & spring – in high definition. Since the minimum order is 64 puzzles and we can do 4 different images, our Friends are aiming to have images in all four seasons. Spring can be challenging so we may just do 22 of each of Winter, Summer & Fall. SO – If one of our photographer friends – or even an artist – wants to work on capturing Winter (and/or Spring), we're bumping the project out in hopes of having them done by International Bog Day in July. BUT, if you have a winter (or spring) one please send it along today. You *will* be credited but not compensated – except for giving you a puzzle of your image. Per **Ryan Miller**, "This event pairs artists with "inspirations" (cancer survivors or their family members) who then collaborate on artwork that represents their personal journey with the disease. My partner this year is **Clarese Orenstein**.



Clarese and I both became artists later in life. For me, painting became a part of a search for better mental health. For **Clarese**, painting blossomed during her battle against ovarian cancer. I was blown away when she first showed me her artwork. Her paintings of flowers are stunning and she is already an artist of note. I think **Clarese** was genuinely shocked when I asked her to collaborate on this painting with me. How could I properly tell her story without having her paint part of it?

A few weeks later, she handed me a canvas graced with three big, beautiful sunflowers. After learning that she had painted them while listening to Carole King's "Tapestry" album, that was my cue to add a vibrant tapestry behind her sunflowers. The two teal colors in the tapestry represent the ovarian cancer ribbon. The purple color represents both the caregiver ribbon and the color of the wig she wore during recovery. The colorful tapestry was left intentionally unfinished on the left side as my message to **Clarese** that her artistic journey is also not complete. My warrior friend has a lot of art to make and a lot of life to live, and I can't wait to see what she does next!"

We are eagerly looking forward to **Clarese's** next artistic accomplishments. Way to go, Clarese!

"Metaphors in Art" also by Jeff Harold

Metaphor – a thing regarded as representative or symbolic of something else, especially something abstract

Minor White (a mid-20th century photographer) wrote "When any photograph functions for a given person as an Equivalent we can say that at that moment and for that person the photograph acts as a symbol or plays the role of a metaphor for something that is beyond the subject photographed." Although he is writing from a photographer's viewpoint, I believe this applies to all forms of art.

Metaphors in poetry can convey the meaning of the metaphor more clearly and to more people than other art mediums. I present two examples. One that is very succinct but its presentation is radical compared to most poetry. The other is more traditional but shows that poetry and the use of metaphors has been with us for many centuries.

E. E. Cummings created his poetry in a visual style that needed to be seen and not just heard to be fully appreciated. Consider the following poem (he very rarely gave titles to his poems so they are most often referred to by the first line).

l(a le af fa ll s) one l iness

It is clearer breaking the poem down to one line - (a leaf falls) loneliness. The metaphor becomes very clear. Loneliness is represented by a falling leaf. You can actually see the leaf fall by the way he constructed the phrase "a leaf falls".

The second poem is by Tzu Yeh, a Chinese poet of the Chin Dynasty 265-419 AD. It's titled "To Him I Love".

Do you not see That you and I Are as the branches Of one tree? With your rejoicing Comes my laughter; With your sadness Start my tears. Love, Could life be otherwise With you and me?

The comparison of love, or the relationship between to people, is to the branches of a tree. Clear and easy for anyone to see. (Yes, technically this is a simile, but a simile is just a subset of metaphors.)

Now, my question to all my fellow members (or anyone else reading this) is do you have a work that represents a metaphor? The included photo is an example of one that can be seen as a metaphor for loneliness. Can you provide us with a work that is a metaphor for love, or any other abstract concept?
