## From Chris Tanner: Remembering Lee Radtke and His Abstracted People

Below is a memory of how one of our members, the late Lee Radtke, developed his own way of painting people quickly with his clever little abstractions. We of course understand that adding people can greatly enrich our paintings. Now, at the threshold of the 2024 plein air season, you can learn how it's done and then spend the summer developing your own style.

I probably painted 50 plein air landscapes and cityscapes with the late Lee Radtke, and immediately noticed how fast he would produce an oil painting. His procedures were very efficient: Find a manmade structure in a loose but recognizable setting, introduce a large dark shape to work around, build interesting contrasts, toss in a handful of people, and the next day add a few color accents in his studio. Energy and spontaneity came naturally from his speed, he sold a lot of paintings and he won a lot of awards. Lee loved to paint plein air, while I and others loved to paint with him.

If there was one thing about Lee that especially fascinated us was the way he used people in his work. They seemed real and natural, and they made the scene strangely familiar. Yet in his hands, these bodies were simply abstracted and deliberately obscured. Yet in our imaginations they almost seemed to move.

Above is a detail of one of his paintings of the shipyards in Sturgeon Bay, WI. Lee's suggestion of busy yard workers gives us the clanging of metal and the smell of diesel exhausts. So, too, a distant shout or beep-beep-beep of a back-up alarm. You notice that your hands are dirty and make a mental reminder to wash up before lunch break. Then the spell breaks and you wonder: How on earth did he manage that?

There are rules of course, rules about perspective, proportions, point of view, relative values and so forth. It seemed to me that Lee didn't follow them very carefully, though. Mostly he created patterns to suggest the rhythms of human activity, the poetry of a gathering of people. He usually did that with a few thoughtful dabs of paint, just enough to trigger your imagination, and he did it *en plein air*.

# From Ernest Schweit: First Winter Shoot of the Year: Wet and Blustery

The weather conditions were less than ideal along Lake Michigan the day I found the scene that was to become "Tumult."



The temperatures hovered around a more-than-chilly 25 degrees; the winds made it seem much colder as I made my way along the shore; camera, tripod and bag full of gear on my back. This was my first time out shooting since a balmy day in October and the change from fall to winter made the cold seem even colder.

Walking was especially hard as my feet continually slipped along the tiny rocks that lined the sandy beach. It got even worse when waves lapped along the top of my shoes as I set my tripod down in front of a rusty iron break wall that jutted out into the undulating waves.

I tried to ignore the slowly spreading cold as it moved from my toes, to my instep up towards my ankle. Instead, I focused on how the break wall drew my attention from the shore out into a lake that moved back and forth in the wind.

More than once, the tripod sank in the wet sand as the waves crashed against my feet, making the task of dialing in camera settings a special challenge. None of this was helped by the tripod moving slightly from side to side as each wave rushed by.

I finally figured out their timing and managed to press the shutter between each onslaught of water. I clicked off 22 frames as I held one hand on the camera and one on the tripod, all the while trying to dodge the next attack. I must have looked like some insane, slightly soggy dancer moving about in the waves.
