Dear Secretaries of State,

We write to raise our concerns over the use of systemic state-imposed forced labour of Uyghurs and other Turkic and Muslim-majority peoples in industries critical to the clean energy transition. We are particular concerned over the exposure of the UK solar industry to human rights abuses occurring in the Uyghur Region. We propose three measures to address these concerns and advance the Government's pursuit of a just transition to clean energy:

- 1. The introduction of import controls to insulate our market from all goods made wholly or partially with forced labour.
- 2. Complementary measures to enable the diversification of solar and other clean energy industry supply chains.
- 3. Targeted sanctions to bar offending solar companies from operating in the UK.

Uyghurs and other Turkic and Muslim-majority peoples in the Uyghur Region have been subjected to crimes against humanity committed by the Peoples Republic of China including arbitrary detention, forced sterilisation programmes, political 're-education', abduction and indoctrination of children and mass forced labour. The UN Special Rapporteur on Contemporary Forms of Slavery in 2022 found the nature and extent of powers exercised over the ethnic groups in the Uyghur Region may amount to enslavement as a crime against humanity. These policies underpin a campaign by the Chinese Communist Party to destroy Uyghur language, culture, and society. The House of Commons unanimously voted in April 2021 to declare the situation a genocide.

Industries key to the clean energy transition are particularly dependent on systemic state-imposed forced labour, with the solar industry representing an acute example of supply chain dependency. Sheffield Hallam University's reports 'In Broad Daylight' (2021) and 'Over-Exposed' (2023) document the extent to which the solar industry relies on raw materials from the Uyghur Region. Currently 89% of polysilicon, a key component of solar panels, is sourced from China, with an estimated 35% produced in the Uyghur Region. Solar companies also use lithium-ion in batteries that store solar energy. As of December 2022, China produced 60% of the world's lithium. The percentage of lithium refining, which is a process that precedes lithium production, is also growing in the Uyghur Region.



The UK's international partners have already acted to tackle this issue. The US passed the Uyghur Forced Labor Prevention Act in 2021, which bans goods made in whole or in part in the Uyghur Region on the presumption they have been made with forced labour. Silica based goods, in particular solar panels, have been prioritised for enforcement. Likewise, in September 2022, the EU Commission announced a proposal to ban all goods imported into and traded within the EU market which have been produced with forced labour. An import ban for goods made with forced labour is in place in Canada and Mexico and there are efforts towards their introduction by NGOs and parliamentarians in Australia with specific provisions made for goods made with Uyghur forced labour.

The UK is quickly becoming a global outlier in tackling Uyghur forced labour in supply chains and will become even more isolated once the proposed EU regulation comes into force. We are fast becoming a dumping ground for products made wholly or partially with forced labour, particularly in clean energy industries such as solar. The US has seized thousands of solar imports since June 2022. The UK is yet to seize a single solar import, <u>ever</u>.

Therefore, we are calling on the Government to urgently implement import controls to block any materials or goods made wholly or partially with forced labour. The Government must also introduce measures which will enable diversification of solar supply chains. This should include the use of development finance and other financial incentives to develop alternative supplies of materials.

Furthermore, we would urge the Government to sanction the worst offending companies and bar them from building key national infrastructure projects in the UK. Companies such as Canadian Solar have well-documented links to forced labour yet are currently applicants in nationally significant infrastructure projects (NSIP) planning proposals. This is unacceptable and there should be a mechanism to bar companies who benefit from systemic state-imposed forced labour from being awarded lucrative contracts and development rights.

The green transition is vital and urgent, but it must not be built on the back of forced labour and genocide. As the world legislates to insulate their markets from goods made by forced labour, the UK is fast becoming a dumping ground for those same goods. We must act now, introduce import controls, diversify our supply chains, and sanction those companies most implicated in benefitting from and contributing to these abuses.

We would be grateful for a meeting to discuss these proposals further.
