Daily Scripture and Prayer To be Used in the Home Getting Ready for Proper 10 C Immanuel Lutheran Church

Theme for Sunday: Walking in the law the sinner finds it demands more and more. Jesus fulfills the law and grants the sinner forgiveness.

The following short order may be used for devotions at home during the week or Daily Prayer for individuals and families may be used in the hymnal (LSB page 294 and following).

Invocation

In the Name of the Father and of the Son (+) and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Introit for Proper 10 C Psalm 136.23-26; antiphon Ps 136.1

Talk About Next Sunday's Old Testament Reading: Leviticus 18.1-5, 19.9-18

How were the Israelites to walk?

Talk About Next Sunday's Gospel Reading: Luke 10.25-37

Why does Jesus answer the lawyer with law?

What is the point of Jesus' story?

<u>Catechism Selection (this may be read, recited, or spoken responsively)</u>

The Fifth Commandment

You shall not murder.

What does this mean?

We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body, but help and support him in every physical need.

The Sixth Commandment

You shall not commit adultery.

What does this mean?

We should fear and love God so that we lead a sexually pure and decent life in what we say and do, and husband and wife love and honor each other.

The Seventh Commandment

You shall not steal.

What does this mean?

We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor's money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income.
