Faithful to God's Word – we receive, celebrate and share Jesus Christ.

Devoted

Were they devoted? They had followed Jesus for three years, but had let Him down in the end. They had all fled in the garden. Some had denied Jesus three times. One even betrayed Jesus. Who was there when Jesus was on trial? Did any one of them help Jesus carry that cross through the city? They were devoted, but it sure didn't look like it before Pentecost.

They had followed Jesus. They had given up all and traveled with Him. They listened and listened to Jesus. They saw the miracles. They marveled at the parables. They were devoted, but they didn't understand.

The disciples had not understood what the work of the Christ really was all about. They wanted an earthly king, but what they got was a suffering servant. Is that what they wanted? James and John wanted to sit on Jesus' right and left when He came into His power; they wanted to be princes! They wanted to have the easy life: fame and fortune. Who wanted to be called to suffer for the Name of Jesus?

On Pentecost the disciples realized what Jesus had done. They understood that Jesus had paid the full price for their sins and opened the way to enteral life for them. No earthly king could do this; only Jesus! They were devoted. Luke records it well, "And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers (Acts 2.42)." They were devoted.

They were devoted to hearing the Word of God. They wanted to hear it. They wanted to study God's Word. They wanted to know God's Word. Their desire was not because they felt compelled, but they actually wanted to learn His Word. They wanted to come together, they wanted that fellowship. They desired to talk to each other. Could they uplift another today? Could another encourage them? They wanted to be together. They wanted to receive the Supper. Jesus commanded it; and they desired to receive Jesus in that meal. They were devoted.

You have come through the festival half of the church year. You heard the Old Testament promises of the Messiah coming. You rejoiced with the shepherds that the Christ was born in Bethlehem. In Epiphany, you heard of the early life of Jesus and the wise men seeking the King of the Jews. You received that ashen cross on your forehead on Ash Wednesday and heard those terrible words, "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return." You journeyed on with Jesus as He made His way to Jerusalem for the Passover and His death on the cross. Of course, you rejoiced in the resurrection of the Lord on Easter Day.

You know that this all happened so long ago, but we travel through the church year for you. That you would relive the events in the life of Jesus and that you would receive Him who comes to you in Word and Sacrament. This really is all for you, that you would be devoted.

Are you devoted? Have you been with us through the church year to celebrate and receive Jesus? Do you realize your sins and your need for a Savior? Are you devoted to the apostles' teaching, the fellowship and the Supper? Are you here? There are many other places you could be as there were for the disciples. Jesus tells the parable about our excuses. It's in Luke 14.15-24. A man prepared a great banquet. He invited many guests. But they were far too busy to attend the feast. Their poor excuses showed that they cared nothing for the man who prepared the banquet. One bought a field and had to inspect it. Another bought oxen and had to check on them. Another just got married. Who had time to come? Who was devoted to this loving man? The man went and invited everyone and anyone he could that the house would be filled.

Are you devoted or are you too busy like those in Jesus' parable? The Lord's banquet is prepared. He offers to forgive your sins through Word and Sacrament. What, then, is your response? Have you excuses to offer? Too busy with sports, kids, life, family, business? Maybe the weather is too bad or too good? Maybe you are angry with a brother or sister? Maybe if the pastor was better you could come? Maybe you just bought a field or oxen or just got married? Who has time for Jesus amid all this.

Jesus is not fooled by our pitiful excuses. The forgiveness He spent His life to win for you is offered Sunday after Sunday. The church doors are open to you. His Word is read and preached for you. The Supper is given that you would receive Jesus. What would Jesus have you do? What would Jesus want?

Be devoted. Come and receive Jesus. Not sometimes. Not once in a while. Receive Him every Sunday... be devoted.

Acts 1:9 And when he had said these things, as they were looking on, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. (ESV)

As Christians what do we think of on Ascension Day, the 40th day after Easter? Do many even remember this day? Even though we have a church service on Ascension Day, it is not very well attended. Why is that? Is the day that Christ ascended into heaven not that important? Should it be? Why is Ash Wednesday so well attended? Is it because we receive the sign of the Cross on our foreheads signifying that one day we will return to dust? Wednesday, as we know, begins the journey of Christ to be crucified for us.

Ascension Day is Christ's last day on earth in His human form. During the 40 days after His resurrection from the dead He spent time with the disciples telling them that they, too, would be baptized in the Holy Spirit and be witnesses to Christ and spreading His Word "to the ends of the earth (Acts 1:8)." The disciples watched ascend into heaven. Shouldn't we, as Christians, attend church on this day, also, to "see" (hear about Christ's ascension) as the disciples did? It is a glorious day and is to be celebrated by many, not so few.

Following Christ's ascension is the day of Pentecost; the 50th day after Christ is risen from the dead.

Pentecost literally means the "50th" day. It is the end of the Easter period and the "first in-gathering of believers into the church (LW, May 8, 2008, The Gift of the Holy Spirit)." The Holy Spirit works within all of us. He works within us and brings us to church each Sunday. He brings us to Bible Class to further hear and share the Word of God. Is the celebration of Pentecost so well attended because it always falls on a Sunday when we are already in church? It would seem so. If it were always on a Thursday, like Ascension Day, would it be so well attended?

These questions are asked because I have wondered why the celebration of Christ's Ascension seems to be just another day of the week. Is it? It shouldn't be. Both Ascension Day and Pentecost are so relevant in the celebration of Christ's life on earth. Can you imagine watching Christ ascend into Heaven, or to speak in tongues to celebrate the introduction of the Holy Spirit? Something to think about, isn't it? Thank the Lord for coming to earth, ascending into Heaven and bringing the Holy Spirit to us, by celebrating in church on Ascension Day and the Sunday of Pentecost.

How You Can Be a "Marketplace missionary" At Restaurants!

A Marketplace Missionary is a follower of Jesus who gives witness to Jesus in all areas of their lives that make contact with other people. One important mission field for making a Christian witness is when you go to eat at restaurants. Here are eight ways you can share Jesus at restaurants:

- 1. Preparation Before you go to eat at restaurants, take time to pray that God may open up opportunities at the restaurant for you to share your faith even in small ways. Make sure you have several Christian Gospel tracts with you. Also, plan to have cash on hand so that you can leave a cash tip.
- 2. Upon Entering the Restaurant As you enter, hold the door open for other customers who are behind you and extend a friendly greeting. Have patience while you wait to be seated (especially if the waiting time is long). If you see the need, let other customers go before you.
- 3. Establish Cordial a Relationship With Your Waiter/Waitress Waiting on tables can be tiresome and stressful. Showing friendliness and patience can bring a smile on those staff who are serving your table. Your task is to try to make their job as easy as possible. sure to express thankfulness when they bring your drinks and food to your table.
- 4. <u>Hold Up Other Customers In</u> <u>Prayer</u> As you wait for your

- food to arrive, take time to look around the restaurant. Select certain people at the other tables and have a silent prayer for them that they may encounter Jesus in their lives. Ask for God's blessings in their lives and that they too may follow Jesus.
- 5. Have a Prayer Before Eating When your food arrives, take time to have a meal prayer of thanksgiving to God for the gift of physical nourishment. This may be silent or aloud at your table. Don't be shy if other tables hear and observe your meal prayer. Your meal prayer might give them a good example to follow. (Note: Pray with humility and not in a loud "look at me" manner.)
- 6. Clean Up Your Table When you are finished with your meal, clean up any mess at your table. Stack all the plates, cups and silverware neatly at the edge of the table. Use napkins and try to clean the surface of the table. Why? It will bring happiness to the wait staff by making their job easier and will establish a strong Christian witness which they will notice.
- 7. Leave a Christian Tract With Your Tip By being kind and friendly to your waiter/waitress and leaving your table neat and tidy, they will be more receptive to the Gospel when they read the Christian tract you will be leaving. Also, be sure to leave a very generous cash tip, too!
- 8. Give Compliments and Blessings To The Staff Upon Departure When given the opportunity, compliment the staff on the food or the

friendliness of the workers. (Be sincere, though) There is nothing wrong with saying, "May Jesus Bless Your Day!" as you leave. You will be giving a witness to Jesus as well as probably bringing joy to the restaurant staff.

Following these eight steps of restaurant witnessing takes much spiritual practice and discipline. You might often forget some of these witness steps. Ask the Holy Spirit to give you the spiritual wisdom and awareness to witness to Jesus when the next restaurant opportunity arrives. May God bless your ministry as a "marketplace missionary" at your next restaurant meal!

SYMBOLS

Proceeding down the center aisle from the chancel to the narthex are twenty seven rows of pews on both sides of the aisle. There are additional pews on the south aisle and in the balcony. Eight designs are engraved onto both ends of the pews.

Two of the most significant engravings are the <u>wheat and grapes</u> representing the sacrament of the altar, holy communion, the Eucharist.

Another design very familiar to Lutherans is <u>Luther's seal</u>. This seal is composed of five features: the Black Cross (Jesus dies on the cross to save us from our sins); the Red Heart (Jesus shed his blood for us); White Flower (we have peace because of our faith); Blue Background (we have hope that we will be in heaven one day); and the Gold Circle (because of our precious Jesus we are provided endless joy). Luther's Coat of Arms was designed by Luther around the Reformation.

Continuing down the aisle another symbol is an engraving of a <u>Bursting Pomegranate</u>. This means all believers have the same faith in God's word.

The Oak & Acorn symbol represents those who repent will be redeemed and those who mourn will be comforted (Genesis 13:18, Isaiah 1:27-32 & 61:1-11).

The <u>Easter Lilly</u> celebrates the resurrection of Jesus.

The sin of man disobeying God is represented by the symbol of the <u>Thistle</u> (Genesis 3:17-19 and Matthew 13:1-9).

<u>Palms and dates</u> symbolize the laying of palms on Palm Sunday and deliverance from our sin.

The organ console has a <u>Christmas Rose</u> celebrating the Nativity of our Lord Jesus.
