The First Sunday in Advent: The Hope Candle

About Today's Candle

P: Today we light the first candle on our Advent wreath. In one tradition it is called the Hope Candle. The light of this candle reminds us that Jesus Christ is our hope. Because God's Son came as our Savior we are freed from sin and death and have the sure hope of eternal life with Him.

C: Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for He who promised is faithful! (Hebrews 10.23)

Lighting the Candle – We sing LSB 350, verses 1 and 2

Collect for the First Sunday in Advent

P: The Lord be with you.

C: And also with you.

P: Let us pray.

C: Stir up your power, O Lord, and come, that by Your protection we may be rescued form the threatening perils of our sins and saved by Your mighty deliverance; for you live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

This collect may be said each day during the week as the family lights their Advent wreath.

The Lord's Prayer Continued

The Fourth Petition

Give us this day our daily bread.

What does this mean?

God certainly gives daily bread to everyone without our prayers, even to all evil people, but we pray in this petition that God would lead us to realize this and to receive our daily bread with thanksgiving.

What is meant by daily bread?

Daily bread includes everything that has to do with the support and needs of the body, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, land, animals, money, goods, a devout husband or wife, devout children, devout workers, devout and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, self-control, good reputation, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like.
