Gifts Given

These also King David dedicated to the LORD, together with the silver and gold that he dedicated from all the nations he subdued, from Edom, Moab, the Ammonites, the Philistines, Amalek, and from the spoil of Hadadezer the son of Rehob, king of Zobah. – 2 Samuel 8.11-12

David was an odd king. Where so many other kings failed David succeeded. Saul had been greedy. When God told Saul to destroy the plunder from other nations Saul hoarded it for himself. Jeroboam had been unfaithful, building golden calves for the Israelites to worship. Ahaz had been prideful. When God told Ahaz to ask for a sign Ahaz refused. But David, David was just an odd king.

David was chosen to be king of Israel by God. The youngest of Jesse's boys, no one expected David to be a king. Even Samuel knew that the next king would be one of the older boys of Jesse. But David was chosen. David refused to kill Saul, although he had chances. Saul was chasing David to kill him. Wouldn't it just be fair for David to take the life of the man seeking to take his life? But David refused to kill the Lord's anointed.

David was an odd king. His actions give us a window into his soul. Amid all the battles he fought, David gained much wealth. With every city that fell, every nation that was conquered, David gained plunder. But he didn't use this for himself. Instead, he handed it over to be used as God directed. God hadn't told him to do this; David just did it. He wanted to give back to God because God had made him king and given him so much. It was only right.

All that David had saved up, David eventually wanted to use to build God a glorious Temple in the city David conquered, Jerusalem. But God rejected David's idea. It would be David's son Solomon who God wanted to build the Temple. After all that David saved up, he would never see the Temple built. Yet, David's generosity toward God reveals his faith and trust in God. He could have used the gold and silver for his own palace or to pay more men for his army. He could have showered the wealth on other nations to gain favor with them. But David wanted to give it to God.

David proved himself a faithful servant to God. David's faithfulness was the measuring line for all the other kings of Judah and Israel. Would they be faithful like David had been? But what about you? You are not a king of Israel or Judah but your actions and giving reveal the faith and trust you have in God. David was faithful with little (when Saul was chasing him all over) and he was faithful with much (when he was king, winning battle after battle). It didn't matter how much David had, he was faithful. But the more he had, the more he was able to give back to God.

Is this you? Your actions and giving are a window into your soul also. If you are faithful with little, are you not faithful with much? And if you are not faithful with little, how could you be faithful with much? Do your actions show that you are faithful? David knew he could not serve two masters: God and money. What do you think? When David was storing up all that gold and silver did the people see him doing it? Did they wonder why the king was storing all this up and giving it over to God? There can be no doubt, the people knew exactly what David was doing. They saw the mountains of wealth being given to God. They saw the faith of their king.

What about you? Do others see your faithful actions? Do they see you giving to God? Do they see you living like a Christian? What good is a lamp if it is hidden? Our giving is not meant to be hidden. Think about Cain and Abel. Cain saw exactly what his brother gave. He knew it all and was jealous because Abel's offering was accepted. What about that widow who put into the Temple treasury two small copper coins? Didn't Jesus see her putting in all she had? Or consider Jesus. How public was His offering on the cross. Our entire lives should be given over to living and giving the Gospel of Christ that others would see and believe.

Giving large sums to church does not mean that you are saved, nor does it mean you are buying your salvation. Giving is a window into our hearts. It shows our faith and trust in God. Being generous whether we have much or little shows the depths of our faith. We are to learn to rely on God for all things- earthly and spiritual. Giving forces us to realize that all our gifts come from God. He is the giver of all gifts. Our giving is a response to what God has done first for us in Christ. Giving is part of that third use of the law, the guide. We get to give back to our God who has given us all through the death of Jesus.

Be encouraged by the example of David, Abel, and so many who have given and given. Trust God enough to give of your first fruits. Trust God enough to step out and step up in giving. He loves you enough to give you all you are and have. He loves you so much to give you His only Son for your salvation. How can we not respond in generosity that others would see the faith and trust we have and be encouraged by us.

Voters' Meeting **September 22**

Elders: The new program with 7-8 graders has begun, they need 20 church service hours and church attendance. We hosted 2 outdoor services, one in June and one in July. The September Elder breakfast netted \$800. Megan, Evan, Brynn and Brie Terrian transferred out, Tom Claerhout was released.

Trustees: A new scoreboard in the gym has been installed! The old science room is finished – new ceiling, lights, etc. We are looking into a company from Ohio for check out the bell tower. The new heating system for the church will likely be put in this spring/summer.

Evangelism: We are hosting a Prayer Vigil on Saturday, September 27. We are hosting a Christmas Concert on Sunday, December 7 at 3pm. Mr. Bunke reports that the Luckhard Museum has been closed for 3 years and is now open. Check it out! There was a 3-part vision for the museum – historical outreach, education, and evangelism. The museum is open April to October. More volunteers are needed to continue the museum adventure.

Stewardship: Watch for the weekly Bible verse in the bulletin. October 15 we will be celebrating Pastor Appreciation Sunday. The cookbook deadline was extended to October 20. We need your recipes to make this fundraiser a success!

Youth: Collide hosts twice monthly youth nights on the 1st and 3rd Sunday of the month with Jr. High from 4-5:30 and Sr. High from 6:30-7:00. Octoberfest is Tuesday, September 23 at CTK from 4-6:30. USA Homecoming is Friday, October 3, join us for facepainting and glowsticks. Sunday, October 5 from 4-7, Kohl Farms is hosting a youth event. CTK Trunk-or-Treat is Friday, October 17 from 4-7. Sunday, October 9 from 2-4 will be Pumpkin Rolling at Sherwood on the Hill.

School Board: Matt Deneed is now teaching at Bethlehem in Saginaw. Renee Repkie has been hired as a long-term sub. She will handle 8th grade homeroom, music, gym and art. Nicole D. and Casey are back in the preschool with 1 full classroom. We have implemented the Earn sick time act for hourly staff. We have a Wellspring counselor coming every two weeks, this is grant funded. School board has begun work on their 5-year plan.

Principal's Report: We had a busy start to the school year! Our theme verse is Matthew 17:20, Faith can move mountains. CTK 3-4 graders went to Project Red. Grade 7 went to help load the truck at Orphan Grain Train with a shipment heading to Latvia. We celebrated Patriot and Constitution Days. Fall into Reading took place with the 7-8 graders reading to PreK-1 grade. PreK-1 went to Johnsons Pumpkin Farm.

Athletics: Volleyball is applying to the state tournament. Soccer will be going to the TCLL tournament. As of August 31, Athletics has \$15,329.21 in their account. Parent Night for 8th grade volleyball players is Tuesday, September 23.

shut-ins as well as Christmas Caroling phone calls. A visit to the Planetarium in Bay City is being planned.

New Business: Discussion was had on modifying Voters' meetings – taking the number of meetings from 5 per year down to 3 and moving them to Sundays following church service. Discussion was had on a Commitment Sunday "Give as you are Blessed."

Pastor's Report: Pastor and Nancy Brown went to the District Convention, ask them about it! There was a Pastor Visitation Conference on September 17-18. Pastor will be attending the All-Pastors Conference October 6-8 at Boyne Mountain. There is a Circuit Forum on September 28 at Immanuel; Pastor and Peter Boyer will attend.

Elders are thinking about getting a new safety committee together to reevaluate our safety plan. There will be a CPR and First Aid training class offered for up to 20 people, cost is \$20, date is TBD.
