#### **Just One Thing**

Now as they went on their way, Jesus entered a village. And a woman named Martha welcomed him into her house. And she had a sister called Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet and listened to his teaching. But Martha was distracted with much serving. And she went up to him and said, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to serve alone? Tell her then to help me." But the Lord answered her, "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and troubled about many things, but one thing is necessary. Mary has chosen the good portion, which will not be taken away from her." - Luke 10.38-42

Martha was distracted. Jesus and the disciples had come to stay and she was busier than busy. There was too much to do! Someone had to make ready the food and make sure everyone was comfortable. It was her and her alone working. Can you feel her frustration? There sits her sister, doing nothing! Shouldn't Mary help her out, at least a little!

But there is only one thing needful. Jesus reminds Martha that He is that one thing needful. To listen to Jesus and receive Him through Word and Sacrament. That is the one thing needed. Just one thing.

Peter, James, and John were terrified! Were their eyes deceiving them? They had gone up on a mountain with Jesus and now he was transfigured. Shining like lightning! Who could stand to look at Jesus like that! Not one of them. Moses and Elijah were there. The voice boomed and then nothing. It was all gone and they were left alone with just Jesus (Mark 9.2-8).

They had been distracted by their Messianic hopes and dreams. But those were not the plans of the Father. They wanted power and fame for Jesus (and themselves). The disciples did not have in mind the one thing needed. They didn't understand the importance of receiving Jesus. The transfiguration burst their distraction and forced them to focus, for a moment, on just Jesus.

Saul was distracted too. He was busy. He had plans to go to Damascus to round up followers of this Way cult. He knew that they were heretics and needed to be removed before their teachings spread. They had been teaching about Jesus, a man was did amazing things during his life, but who had been crucified. His disciples claimed Jesus had been raised from the dead. But Saul knew that could not be. He was distracted.

Then Jesus appeared right in front of him on that Damascus road. "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?" Saul lost his sight. He was forced to refocus. He now knew the one thing needed, just Jesus. His life would never be the same. Name changed to Paul, and he went from persecuting to preaching about Jesus.

Are you distracted? The devil wanted Martha to be so worried about serving that she wouldn't listen to Jesus. The disciples were so busy making plans for Jesus that they had no time to hear what Jesus would do for them. And Saul was too busy hating Jesus to consider the truth of Jesus. The devil loves to put distractions in our way. Maybe something wholesome like serving or making plans. Maybe it's tiredness or business. Maybe sports or entertainment. Maybe assuming that people just don't like us. Our mind becomes made up that we can't be around Jesus.

So wake up. Remove all distractions and know the one thing needed, just Jesus. He is offered for you each Sunday and Monday in the Divine Service at Immanuel. Here is Jesus for you! Are you too busy? Too distracted to be with your Lord and receive Him for your salvation? Are you Martha, or the disciples on the transfiguration mount, or Saul? What would Jesus say about your distractions? "You are anxious and troubled about many things, but there is one thing needful." Choose to be with Jesus. Don't choose this only once in a while but make it a habit. Be in the Word. Be in worship. Receive Jesus, He is the one thing needful.

## G.L.U.E "<u>G</u>od <u>L</u>oves <u>U</u>s <u>E</u>ternally"

#### Hebrews 12:5-6

"My son, do not regard lightly the discipline of the Lord, nor be weary when reproved by him. For the Lord disciplines the one he loves, and chastises every son whom he receives."

I came across an article in The Patriot Post, "Eye in the Sky." It intrigued me because The Patriot Post is a political newsletter and the article included quotes from the Bible. The article was written by Ron Helle in the July 11, 2025 issue. I'd like to paraphrase the key points in the article.

The article alluded to the fact that "Big Brother is watching you!" The reason he said that was because the US had just sent a drone to launch missiles against Iranian personnel, referring to the US as "Big Brother!" Being a military veteran I am interested in what is happening with our military today.

"We've all heard people make that comment, too, meaning that Uncle Sam is watching us. But then the writer added that there was another "eye in the sky," referencing God's ability to "see" us. He cited Psalm 94:9 and Matthew 6:4, 6 and 18, stating that "God sees and hears what we do in secret." Of course, as Christians we know that, too. But, he also says, "Too many Christians today live their lives as if they do not believe God sees their actions."

He referenced growing up in a "small, rural farm community, it was a given that you weren't going to get away with anything. Everyone knew everyone, and if someone saw you doing something inappropriate, your parents were going to find out about it."

Today things are very different. The writer says, "Cities are bigger, people are less engaged, and our society's moral foundation has been seriously eroded. Things that would have shocked people 60 years ago now barely raise an eyebrow. Sadly, many Christians tend to set a low bar in moral attitudes and conduct," he says. I agree with him, do you? He also says, "We compare ourselves to others and come away feeling good about ourselves." The Apostle Paul says this is not wise, or understanding without (II) Corinthians 10:12).

Helle states that, "talking about discipline doesn't get much traction in most churches (I wouldn't know about most churches), but Scripture makes it clear that it does happen." I know that Immanuel has that discipline. We ask for forgiveness every Sunday in the Lord's Prayer.

As Christians "we know that we have been saved for a purpose—God's purpose!" The writer says, "God's Hellfire missile system is reserved for the unrepentant lost, but Scripture makes it clear there is the potential for God's own unrepentant children to experience His discipline. We Christians should take heed.

"The eyes of the Lord are in every place, keeping watch on the evil and the good." (Proverbs 15:3)

As Christians, we know there is another set of eyes watching over us, not just Uncle Sam!

"Big Brother is watching you!" God is watching you! Remember, God Loves Us Eternally!

## How You Can Be A "Marketplace Missionary" Through The Use Of Social Media

A Marketplace Missionary is a follower of Jesus who gives witness to Jesus in all areas of their lives that make contact with people. One very important mission field for making a Christian witness is through the use of social media.

It used to be that we would just send out missionaries to various parts of the world to spread the With today's communication technologies, each of our congregations and ourselves can now be directly involved with proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus to people all across the world. Good Shepherd of the Deaf Lutheran Church (LCMS) in Toledo, OH livestreams its signed worship via YouTube Facebook every Sunday. Because the worship services are orientated to the world-wide deaf community, the church has made contact with many deaf and hard-of-hearing people around the world. Here at Immanuel, we also broadcast our worship services via many different types of social media. Through this use of social media, the seeds of the Gospel are being planted both locally and world-wide.

You, also, can personally be a missionary via social media. If you have a personal Facebook account, you can use it as a personal missionary tool. Ask yourself these questions: Do my Facebook posts clearly show that I am a follower of Jesus? How can I use my Facebook page to plant the seeds of the Gospel of Jesus to all those who view my posts?

There are many Christian Facebook sites that allow you to share Christian messages, photos, Bible verses and artwork directly to your own page. Check out different Christian organizations and groups on Facebook and find some Gospel messages that you would like to personally post. (Keep a written list of these favorite sites for future reference!)

Look over your Facebook "friends" list. Take note of those friends who might not Christians. Bv occasionally posting Christian messages and thoughts, your non-Christian friends might see your posts as they go through your newsfeed. Take great care to cultivate friendships and relationships with your non-Christian friends. This greatly improves the chances of them having a positive reception to the Gospel message.

We have many friends on our personal Facebook site, including numerous non-Christian friends in this country and all over the world. What a joy it is to share the Gospel on our site – knowing that they will

also see these Gospel messages. Our task as "marketplace missionaries" is to just plan the seeds of the Gospel of Jesus and let the Holy Spirit touch their hearts! Always remember these words from Romans 1:16, "For I am not ashamed of the Gospel, because it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes; first to the Jew, then to the Gentile."
