Easter Revelation

In worship, through the Easter season, we have heard from the book of Revelation for our Epistle reading. It's fitting that we hear this in Easter. After all, Revelation was written by John to give comfort to the churches who are in the tribulation. In every age the church needs this comfort! How fitting to hear from John's Revelation as we know that the battle has been won by Jesus on the tree. As we rejoice in the glory of Easter we know we have that comfort given to us by Jesus.

On Easter 2 we heard from John of the one he saw (Revelation 1.4-18). John saw the exalted Jesus. He looked like the High Priest. Eyes glowing, hair white, his voice like many waters, feet of burnished bronze. Jesus looks otherworldly! Jesus told John to "Fear not." What great words of comfort! Amid the terrifying vision of Jesus, John had nothing to fear. Jesus was there to give him comfort. As we draw near to Jesus through Word and Sacraments we have nothing to fear for Jesus loves us also. He desires that relationship with us and gives Himself to us. He comes among us to bring comfort!

But the vision John saw came to an abrupt halt (Revelation 5.1-14). It all stopped for there was no one who was found to open the seven seals on the scroll. John feels like weeping! Is the vision over? No. One was found, the Lion of the Tribe of Judah, the Root of Jesse! The Lamb on the throne, looking like he has been slain, He has the authority and power to open the seals. John, and we, are reminded that Jesus is in complete control. Nothing happens outside His will. However evil or terrible this world seems, He is still in control. Thus, the elders, creatures, angels and saints sing praise to the Lamb for He ransomed people for God by His blood.

Before the Lamb and the throne stood a great multitude clothed in white and holding palm branches (Revelation 7.9-17). Who are these? They are the ones coming out of the great tribulation. The saints who are on that side of the grave. Who are with Jesus and in the perfect bliss of heaven. We are with Christ, but in this tribulation, not in the bliss of that glory, yet. The church is given comfort here knowing the outcome of our perseverance and patient endurance in the faith. We know that we are with Jesus now, will be with Him in heaven, and will be still with Him after that Last Day. So we will always be with the Lord. The victory is ours through Jesus, the Lamb who has died for us.

Then we are given a glimpse of the Last Day (Revelation 21.1-7). John sees the heavens and earth destroyed and a new heaven and a new earth coming down from heaven. So shall the dwelling place of God be with man. In this recreation there shall be no sin, no evil at all. Just perfection. Through the water of life sinners conquer and are made children of God and heirs of eternal life. He makes all things new-you, me, earth, heaven, all things.

John sees Jerusalem coming down out of heaven next (Revelation 21.9-14, 21-27). The city, to John, looks incredible. Beautiful, even as John searches for words to describe this indescribable scene. The city has no need of light or sun, because Jesus will be the light. Nothing unclean will enter it. Only those clothed in the blood of the Lamb- those whose names are written in the Lamb's book of life. John can be certain that Jesus died for him, his name is there!

Our last reading from Revelation this Easter season is from Revelation 22.1-20, the end of the Bible. The tree of life stands in the city giving its fruit. There is the Lamb on the throne being worshiped by His servants. John sees it all. And then Jesus says, "Surely I am coming soon." John knows that it wouldn't be much longer. He longs to be in that great glory. The comfort given through these readings is real and for you.

You have been washed in the blood of Christ through His death. His death has been applied to you in your Baptism. You have heard His Word and been cleansed of your sins. He speaks you clean every time you are in the Divine Service. You receive Him who died for you in the Supper. He is yours and you are His. So it shall be forever. This place with God is created for you. That place with the angels and elders and creatures and saints is for you. Prepared through the death that Jesus died. It has been given to you. You haven't seen it with your eyes, but you know it is there in faith.

Amid this tribulation, no matter how great it gets, you have comfort and confidence that Jesus loves you. This sinful world is not the end. You conquer in the blood of the Lamb. You shall be with Him eternally. Nothing to fear- fear not. He is the beginning and the end. He is all there is and all you need. His cross is the tree of life. Your Baptism is the water of life. You have life in Him who died for you. He will wipe away every tear. Thus, we pray with the church, "Come, Lord Jesus!"

Your Evangelism Corner:

Remember-God Made You and God Doesn't Make Junk!

In a recent presentation here at Immanuel (sponsored by the Board of Evangelism) Amy Paten from Crossroads Counseling Ministries shared strategies on improving one's self-esteem and mental/emotional health.

Many of us have experienced in our lives times of low self-esteem, feelings of inadequacy and depression. This sinful world will often tell you that you are a failure and a loser. You realize that there are many people that can do things better than you can. It is a favorite tactic of Satan to rob you of your self-worth and joy by comparing your abilities (or lack of them) to other people.

Social Media can play a major part of causing your feelings of low self-esteem. Seeing other people and families post major accomplishments and happiness will tempt you to compare your life with other people's lives and experiences. Online bullying, especially among young people, can be especially devastating to one's self-image.

So what should you do to improve your feelings of self-esteem?

1. Study God's Word. What does God say you are? (A precious child of the Living God) God did not give up on you! The Cross of Christ is proof of that!

- 2. Be spiritually alert when negative thoughts begin to enter your mind. (A Time for Prayer!)
- Recognize and celebrate your areas of strength and ask God to help you to work on areas of weakness.
- 4. Share your hurts, sorrows and grief with compassionate family and friends.
- 5. Pock your friends carefully and associate with people who care about you.
- 6. Stay physically healthy. (Get some exercise!)
- 7. Be content with what God has given you. Enjoy the simple things in life. (Watch out for the "money and possessions" comparisons!)
- Spend time with people and connect with them. (Isolation is not good for one's mental and emotional health.) God created humans, not to be alone, but to be with other people. (This also includes being in church each Sunday and having with fellowship other Christians.)

As stated earlies, "God Made You and God Doesn't Make Junk!"

SYMBOLS

Proceeding down the center aisle to the left is the south wall with three groups of windows with three windows in each group (holy trinity). Looking at the windows from the left to right is the window of God the Father with a hand with two fingers pointing up and the thumb out. This is the hand of

giving and blessing. The crown of thorns depicts Jesus wearing the crown of thorns placed on his head on Good Friday. The last figure in this group is a dove. Which most often is used to represent the Holy Spirit. The four evangelists report about the baptism of Jesus, that the heavens were opened and the Holy Spirit came upon Jesus in the form of a dove.

Looking to right is the north wall having the same window configuration but three different figures. A chalice used for Holy Communion in which we receive the blessing of forgiveness of our sins, peace with God, eternal life. A shell represents baptism. The bible text does not say if a shell was used by John The Baptist for baptizing Jesus but ancient pictures show him, John, using a shell. The open bible with a sword, a symbol representing the apostle Paul. In Ephesians 6:17 Paul interprets this symbol "Take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God."

Jesus in My Coat Pocket – A Prayer Walk Story

On a sunny day in the fall of 2024, several members from Christ Milford Lutheran Church in accompanied Andrew Pastor Johnson on a prayer walk. He quickly reached into his pocket and pulled the slightly dirty and grimy Jesus figurine out of his pocket and said he had picked it up form the fire hydrant in from of the station last year. "I've kept this in my pocket on every run since I found it!" he exclaimed. "It makes me feel safer and I figured there was a reason why I found it." Jeff explained that we had left it there and described that our prayer walks were all about, including the prayer that was said in front of the fire station that day for the fireman's safety.

There are many ways to express your faith, and this small one make a difference in this person's life.

Voters Meeting May 19

Elders: Outdoor church services are being planned for July 13 and August 10 with potluck breakfasts. Budget has a 3% wage increase for both Pastors and Barbara Bleck. Questions on moving the communion rail to the base of the stairs to allow easier access were debated, it will not be moved at this time. We will continue to deliver communion to pews. Discussion was had on hanging screens (technology) in

Trustees: The biggest change this year is in property insurance. A lot of discussion was had on changing deductibles, etc but nothing mad a huge impact. Budget presented \$172,034. Discussion on the bell tower and how we are proceeding: we are still waiting for the repair man. We are at the mercy of his schedule.

Stewardship: Budget remains the same.

Evangelism: Increases in the budget come from Portals of Prayer, children's devotionals, streaming copyright and the Lutheran Hour Broadcast. It was noted that Shirley from LHB would like to stop working on the broadcast and is seeking a replacement. If interested please reach out to Nancy Brown for contact information.

Youth: A Confirmation reception was held May 4. A Graduation reception was held May 18. Jr High Collide invited the 5-8 graders for a bonfire, it was well attended. We will be having the ice cream social at SugarFest on Sunday from 2-4pm. Proposed budget \$28,396.

School Board: Budget changes include the phone bill increased \$2,700, we had one wage clarification and will eliminate one staff in the pre-school. Proposed budget \$355,478.

Principal's Report: Field Day was held. Confirmation season is in full swing! CTK 6-7 graders will have a booth at SugarFest to raise money for their DC trip. 8th graders leave for DC next week. Graduation and closing chapel are the first week of June. Senior return to CTK day will be Tuesday. Duck Day at the Unionville

campus is May 29. Music Festival was last Friday. Lots going on! Keep our kids, teachers and staff in your prayers.

Committee Reports:

Sunday School – Last week of Sunday School was May 18. We have had a very low turn of with 0-3 kids per class in the lower grades and 2-5 kids in the 5-8 grade class. Please reach out with suggestions or ways to help improve our numbers.

Athletics: Last Saturday track attended regionals with 25 kids qualifying for the state meet! The next AD meeting is in June. We finalized the schedule for next year. The new scoreboard is in the works, hoping to have it installed before school starts in August.

OWLs: We only have 3 members visiting the Medical Care Facility. Won't you consider joining us so we can visit more people? We go once a month, leaving at 1 and returning by 3. We are planning a trip to the Huckelberry Railroad, the Planetarium and maybe the Polar Express. Watch for details. It was asked "What are we doing at Bay View Gardens" since a few of our members are there? We have installed a large screen TV to live broadcast the service and we offer and support the radio broadcast.

Unfinished **Business:** Discussion on adding a name to the ballot for school board. Elders reviewed the name and it was decided it would be a conflict of interest. Glen V moved to unanimously accept the ballot as written since there was opposition in any category. Supported by Brent V. After reviewing the constitution it was noted that it must be a handwritten ballot process. We voted with paper ballots on the budget, 36 yes, 24 no. Budget passed.

up to be ushers. Nancy Brown will be attending the District Convention June 22-24, thank you Nancy. Pastor will be gone to the All Pastors Conference Tuesday and Wednesday and attending the DC trip next week. Ascension Day is Thursday, May 29 – worship at 6:30pm.

President's Report: Ballot results — all nominees were approved. A motion was made to destroy the ballots, moved by Dale T, supported by Ryan K, motion passed.


