

Get Ready for a Stampede of Smiles!

Saddle Up for a Wild Weekend

At Yee-Haw VBS, kids kick up their heels as they stampede through the wild frontier and celebrate the greatest truth of all—God is good! They'll round up a whole herd of friends and discover that Jesus is God's greatest gift.

Moo-sic & More is the first station kids visit each day, where they sing fun songs and discover the concepts they'll be learning. As the Moo-sic & More Leader, you'll welcome everyone, introduce the Bible Point and Bible verse, lead upbeat worship, and play a role in a silly skit with Rawhide McSpur.

Closing Corral is the last station each day, where kids and leaders all gather for lots of fun-filled, audience-involving activities that will reinforce what they've learned. As Closing Corral Leader, your job is to send kids off empowered by the fact that God gives good gifts!

- * Everyone's on the move. Check out the sample schedule on page 6 to get an idea of the flow of each day's activities and how Moo-sic & More and Closing Corral fit in.
- * Everyone's in a Crew. At Yee-Haw, kids travel in small, mixed-age groups called Crews, with up to five elementaryage kids and one adult or teenage leader. Mixed-age Crews are a fresh, incredible way to reach kids! You'll see older kids help younger ones with challenging tasks. Younger kids seek to emulate the older kids in their Crews. Preschoolers, ages 3 to 5, participate in Crews in a special preschool program. Both elementary and preschool Crews will come to Moo-sic & More and Closing Corral at the same time.
- * Everyone has a job. Every day, kids can choose a different Crew role. Different Station Leaders call on different roles, ensuring that everyone gets in on the fun. Crew roles include Thank You-er, Guide, Prayer Person, Materials Manager, and Schedule Supervisor.
- * Everyone's learning one key truth. Every activity at Yee-Haw reinforces one simple Bible truth, called a Bible Point. It's important to use the Bible Point as it's written since it's integrated into the experiences and activities throughout the entire program. Yee-Haw is intentionally designed so that some stations focus more on the key Bible verse (John 3:16) and some focus on the Bible story. However, every station connects to the Bible Point.

HAVE YOU HERD?

Every day, you'll use an attention-getter to get everyone focused on you for more fun. A Buckaroo Bell (available from Group Publishing or your Group VBS supplier) or other attention-getter saves time and is loads better than lots of shushing or shouting.



Buckaroo Bell

Kids will be listening for the Bible Point, which is **GOD GIVES GOOD GIFTS.** When kids hear the Point, they'll shout "Yee-haw!" Each time kids shout the response, they'll raise a fist in celebration.

Here's What You Need to Do

- * Prepare your heart. Pray for the kids who will come to Yee-Haw, for the parents, and for the other volunteers on your team. Ask God to guide and encourage your VBS Director through this exciting event.
- * **Prepare your supplies.** Work with the VBS Director to collect necessary supplies. Check with church members to see what items you can borrow.
- * Prepare your team. The large-group experiences flow more smoothly when you have a small team of assistants. (Middle schoolers and high schoolers make excellent assistants!) They might do small tasks such as hand you props, lead song motions, or help you with preparations. Be sure you have an experienced person running your sound system.
- * Prepare your show. Rehearse a few times with your assistants. Run through the technical side (microphones, sound system, DVD player, and projector) with your audio/visual assistant. Be familiar with your script so you can comfortably move through the activities without reading it. Be sure to use emotion, expression, and excitement as you lead.
- * Prepare your wardrobe. Wear jeans, a flannel shirt, boots, and a cowboy hat; or ask your Director what you should wear. Staff T-shirts are available from Group Publishing or your Group VBS supplier.
- * **Prepare your room.** Choose a room such as a sanctuary or fellowship hall that will comfortably seat all the participants for both the opening and closing stations. Then have fun creating a western-ranch-inspired setting that looks like a great place to horse around! You can get *fun* thematic decorations at group.com/vbs.







Making a Crew Sign Stand

- 1. Screw a ¾-inch galvanized iron floor flange to the center of a 12-inch particle board square. Screw a ¾ to 1-inch male adapter to the flange.
- 2. Insert a 2-foot-long piece of 1-inch PVC into the male adapter. Paint the PVC black (optional).
- 3. Make two small holes near the top of the Crew sign on each side of the PVC, and run a plastic zip tie through the holes, pulling tight to fasten.



Print Crew signs from the Yee-Haw Clip Art & Resources CD, and write an identifying number or name for each Crew. Use spray adhesive to attach the signs to foam core. Tape the signs on the seating rows in your room, or make stands with PVC pipe and a square wood base. Cover the wood base with cloth bandannas, and add plastic "barbed wire" to the PVC. Or make mini hay bales by covering paper lunch sacks with yellow paper springfill, then slide them on the PVC pipe.

* Prepare your music. Listen to the Moo-sic & More CD or downloads ahead of time, and use pages 36-40 in this manual, where the motions are described next to the lyrics. Be familiar with all the songs and motions so you can teach them with ease. You can also purchase the Moo-sic & More DVD to watch kids doing the actions along with onscreen lyrics. When it comes to leading the songs, you have a couple of options: Have kids sing along with the Moo-sic & More CD or DVD, or use live accompaniment with a keyboard or worship band. You can go to group.com to purchase a package of the piano sheet music for all five Yee-Haw songs. An advantage of letting children sing with the CD or DVD is that the recorded voices carry the words. Kids enjoy the beat and sounds as they sing along. So crank it up!

Bible Point: God gives good gifts.

Bible Story: God sends Jesus to earth. (Luke 2:1-20)

Bible Verse: "For this is how God loved the world: He gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life."

(John 3:16)

Consider This...

- ☼ There are dozens of prophecies in the Old Testament surrounding the birth of the Messiah, and Jesus fulfills every one!
 - Jesus' birth in Bethlehem fulfills Micah 5:2: "But you, O Bethlehem Ephrathah, are only a small village among all the people of Judah. Yet a ruler of Israel, whose origins are in the distant past, will come from you on my behalf."
 - Jesus' virgin birth was foretold in Isaiah 7:14: "The Lord himself will give you the sign. Look! The virgin will conceive a child! She will give birth to a son and will call him Immanuel."
- ☆ After Jesus' birth, Mary wrapped him in cloths and laid him in a manger. Mangers held food for animals, giving them sustenance and life. Jesus called himself the Bread of Life, and he is what gives us strength, nourishment, and everlasting life.
- ☼ The shepherds were the first people to hear the good news of Jesus' birth. Shepherds were among the lowest of the low in their society and considered unclean. Because the angel told these men about Jesus' birth first, God showed that his love and the gift of Jesus are for everyone.

Why It Matters...

Kids love receiving gifts—especially at Christmastime! Yet presents like bicycles and toys break. Kids outgrow new clothes, just as they grow from wanting skates to wanting smartphones. But God's gift of Jesus is the *perfect* gift—one size fits all! As you share the Christmas story in today's lesson, you'll have the opportunity to help kids discover that Jesus is God's most precious gift...for all of us, every day! Use today's experiences to help kids understand why Jesus is a good gift, one that will be with them for eternity!



Bible Point: God gives good gifts.

Bible Story: Jesus dies and comes back to life. (John 16–21)

Bible Verse: "For this is how God loved the world: He gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life." (John 3:16)

Consider This...

- ☼ There's interesting symbolism to Jesus carrying his own cross outside the city. In Genesis 22, Isaac carried the wood that Abraham would use to sacrifice Isaac...until God provided the ram as a sacrifice. And Leviticus 16 commands the priests to take the sin offering outside the camp or city. Jesus—the Lamb of God—became our sin offering!
- ☼ Roman soldiers usually crucified only non-citizens, lower-class citizens, or those accused of high treason or desertion (in wartime). The accused died a shameful, disgraceful, and agonizing death.
- ☼ Continuing the shame and disgrace of crucifixion, soldiers usually tossed the body of the crucified person into a pit. And Jesus, being penniless, didn't have the money to pay for a formal burial. Yet Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus—both members of the Sanhedrin—stepped in. They took Jesus' body and prepared it for burial themselves.
- ☼ Scholars estimate that a typical stone that was rolled over the opening of a tomb cave weighed anywhere from 1 to 3 tons!
- Although we usually think of angels with halos and wings, most times angels appear in the Bible, people describe them as looking like men. When Mary saw two angels near the tomb, she didn't even realize they were angels!

Why It Matters...

On the surface, it may seem odd that we call Good Friday "good." Yet without Jesus' death, there would be no payment for sin. And there wouldn't have been the triumphant, joyful resurrection!

Kids—and adults—find it hard to imagine *anything* good in the midst of sad times. What good can come from a loved one dying? How can a child find any good in a bully? And what's so good about being left out or alone? God never promises that this life will be pain-free. But he *does* promise to be near when we're hurting. What a beautiful gift! And, more important, God gave the gift of hope and joy to come. Use today's experiences to help kids explore the eternal gift of life God gave us through Jesus.

Moo-sic & More-Day 1

Before Kids Arrive...

- * Rehearse the Rawhide McSpur skit. Rawhide is a goofy cowboy who bumbles into your station, looking for advice, friendship...and a pillow to sit on! He wears cowboy gear and might even carry a lasso.
- * Inflate 10 to 20 balloons to use for your "cattle drive." Although any color will work, brown balloons or cow-print balloons will help kids imagine they're herding cattle. Or just draw cow spots on white balloons.
- * Thirty minutes before Yee-Haw is scheduled to start, begin playing the Moo-sic & More CD. This will create a fun and inviting atmosphere as the kids and Crew Leaders enter your area.

Cowboy Kickoff

Say: Hi, trailblazers! Welcome to Yee-Haw. Since we're spending a few days in the wild west, I want to hear what you think would be the most fun thing to do on a ranch. Tell what you'd love the most, such as learning to use a lasso, hiking trails, riding horses, or playing with all the cattle dogs. Turn to someone sitting nearby and tell what you think would be fun to do on a ranch way out west.

Let kids talk in pairs for about a minute. Then move into the audience with a microphone and let several kids tell what they shared.

A western ranch would be so fun—full of animals, excitement, and tons of action! That's why I'm so wild about having you here at Yee-Haw! When people are excited about something or celebrating something good, they might shout a big, loud "Yeeee-haw!" Lead kids in shouting their best, wildest "Yeee-haw!"

We're celebrating God's best gift of all—Jesus!

We'll start each day here at Moo-sic & More. (Have fun "mooing" when you say "Moo-sic.") Here we'll sing a little, talk a little, and start our day with a stampede of smiles. Everything we do at Yee-Haw will help us celebrate God's awesome gifts. Gifts fill my heart with joy! Let's sing "Joy to the World!" to get started.



Lead everyone in singing "Joy to the World!" Words and motions are on page 36.

Drive "Cattle"



Say: That's a song you may be used to hearing only at Christmas. But we don't have to save our celebrations for just one month of the year. We can celebrate God's gift of Jesus every day. God gave us that gift because he loves us so much. Turn to three people sitting nearby, give them each a high-five, and say "You're moooo-velous!" While kids give high-fives (and moo!). you give three affirmations, too!

Out in the wild west, ranchers sometimes have to move their cattle from one area—where the herd is grazing—to another area where there's more food. Let's see how guickly you ranchers can round up a herd and move it from here (motion to one side of your room) to there (motion to the opposite side of the room). We'll imagine these balloons are our cattle. Hold up a brown or cow-print balloon.

Move to one side of the audience and empty your bag of balloons. Guide kids to stay in their seats as they gently (without hitting the balloons too hard) "crowd surf" the balloons across the audience to the other side of the room.

Those were the guietest cattle on the range! Let's try that again, but this time I want to hear lots of mooing and maybe **some stampeding!** Stomp your feet to show kids how to make "stampede" sounds. Then have kids herd the balloons across the audience again, back to the place they started. Have a helper assist you in putting the balloons back in the bag.

That was a cool cattle drive! You gave it your all! Let's sing another awesome song called "All That I Am."



Lead everyone in singing "All That I Am" (Psalm 103:1). Words and motions are on page 37.

Explore God's Gifts

Say: Everything at Yee-Haw will help us discover that GOD GIVES GOOD GIFTS. When you hear those words—"God gives good gifts"—anywhere during Yee-Haw, you'll raise your fist in celebration and shout "Yee-haw!" That's because we can celebrate God's awesome gifts. Practice that with me a few times. Repeat the Bible Point and response a few times.

Ask:



What are some of the best gifts you've ever received? Share your own example, such as a special birthday gift or anniversary gift. Then let kids share in their Crews. After about a minute, sound the Buckaroo Bell and draw attention back to yourself. Take a few reports from kids, repeating their answers into the microphone.

Say: People give us gifts like [some of the things kids shared]. Gifts show that people care about us, know us, and are thinking of us. God's gifts aren't really things like bikes or toys—although sometimes God does provide those things for us out of his love! God gives gifts like love, kindness, forgiveness, and friendship.

Hold up your Bible, opened to John 3:16. The Bible tells us about God's very best gift ever. John 3:16 says, "For this is how God loved the world: He gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life." Perish means die, and eternal means forever. God's gift of Jesus allows us to have a forever friendship with God! Wow! That's something worth celebrating!

Let's learn some actions that can help us remember those important words.

Lead kids in the actions below, saying the Bible verse as you do the actions.



"For this is how God loved the world:"



"He gave his one and only Son,"



"so that everyone who believes in him will not perish"



"but have eternal life."

Tell kids that *believing* is when we hold on to something, which is why you clasp your hands together firmly. Practice the actions a couple of times.

Say: I'm so thankful for all God's good gifts to us. Let's sing a song that lets us say how thankful we are!



Lead kids in singing "Thankful." Song lyrics and motions are on page 39.

Rawhide McSpur Skit

While the Leader is talking, Rawhide McSpur ambles in slowly. He's walking "delicately," as if in pain but trying not to show it too much.

Rawhide: (Speaking on each step.) Ouch. Ouch. Ouch.

Leader: (Watches Rawhide for a few seconds.) Um, can I help you? You seem to be in a lot of pain.

Rawhide: No ma'am [or sir], I'm just as fine as an armadiller on roller skates!

Leader mutters "armadillo on roller skates," scratching his or her head, as if trying to figure it out. Rawhide interrupts with an extended hand.

Rawhide: Rawhide McSpur, here. I'm head cattleman at this here ranch. (*Tips his hat in greeting.*)

Leader: (Excitedly) Rawhide McSpur?! The Rawhide McSpur? I've heard so much about you! (Introduces himself or herself and slaps McSpur on the back in greeting.) Nice to finally meet you!

At the slap, Rawhide stiffens, eyes wide, and howls, merging his howl into a "Howwwwdy, partner!"

Leader: Wow, you seem kind of...excitable.

Rawhide: Naw...nope...it's just...uh, the way we greet each other out here on the ranch. (Leads kids and Leader in a loud, crazy "Howwwwdy, partner!")

Leader: You're a legendary cowboy! (*Brings out a stool for Rawhide to sit on.*) Here, sit down and stay awhile. Maybe you can tell us some stories of all your wild west adventures.

Rawhide: (Scratches his head and looks at the stool.) Well, that's just the problem. I'd like to sit a spell, but...uh. (Tries to sit down, making all kinds of uncomfortable positions so he's not sitting quite right. Ends up leaning comically on the back of the chair.)

Leader: That doesn't look right at all. In fact, you look about as comfortable as an...um...armadillo on roller skates?

Rawhide: (Nods.) Well, that about sums it up. Here's the deal. (Acts out his adventure somewhat painfully as he tells his story.) I was out driving my cattle toward the stream, dreamin' about a big pot of Chuck-Wagon Charlie's famous rattlesnake chili, when my horse—Jumpin' Jack—saw a prairie dog skeedaddlin' across the trail. Well, that little old critter spooked Jumpin' Jack, and he reared up and took off. When I said "whoa," he shore enough hit the brakes. I flew off—hat over spurs—and landed backside down...(gulps, then continues in a weak voice) in a cactus patch. (Rubs his backside painfully.)

Leader: (Winces.) Ouch! Well, I have a gift right here that might make things a little better. (Brings out a pillow and sets it on the stool.) I was going to use it later for a nice, comfy break, but you can have it.

Rawhide: (Sits down carefully and sighs with contentment and comfort.) Aaaah, that's a good gift! I'm as happy as a pig in a pie-eating contest. Thanks, [Leader's name].

Leader: Rawhide, we're learning about someone else who gives good gifts—in fact, the best gifts! **GOD GIVES GOOD GIFTS.** (Yee-haw!)

Rawhide enthusiastically joins kids' "yee-haw."

Rawhide: Oh, sorry, I jest get carried away sometimes. But you're as right as rain! God does give good gifts. I've seen God's gifts when he paints a sunset across the prairie or shows off a sky full of stars. I s'pose the cactus even thinks its stickers are a good gift since they keep hungry critters from having it for chow.

Leader: Yep, God's gifts can sometimes be surprising, that's for sure.

Rawhide: Well, I'd love to stay here and shoot the breeze, but I've got a herd of heifers I need to see to. (*Turns to look behind him, then leans toward Leader and says in a stage whisper*) And I need to figure out a way to get my backside unstickered. (*Picks up pillow and ambles off, saying "ouch" with each step.*)

Leader: 'Bye, Rawhide. Good luck getting unstickered!

Start the Stampede

Say: Right now we're going to say goodbye to our preschoolers so they can mosey on over to Ponderosa Preschool for their own awesome adventures. Dismiss the preschoolers, but have elementary Crews stay seated. (You may want to play "To God Be the Glory" while preschoolers exit. This is an easy song for elementary kids to sing along with while little ones are making their way out of the room.)

Our whole time at Yee-Haw, every Crew member has an important job. There are Prayer People, Guides, Materials Managers, Thank You-ers, and Schedule Supervisors. Have Crew Leaders get the "Who's Who on the Crew" handouts from their Crew bags.





FIELD TEST FINDING

Be sure to allow time for children to choose their roles each day. Kids are excited about having special jobs! Crew Leaders who participate in our field tests say they're surprised what a big deal these jobs are for kids.

Say: Crew Leaders, go over the job descriptions, and have your Crew members decide who will do each job. The jobs are listed on your name badges, too. A person can have a different job each time we meet or the same job both times. Allow a few minutes for kids to choose jobs. When it looks like everyone has finished, sound the Buckaroo Bell to get their attention.

You all have important jobs now. The fun and excitement you bring to these jobs will help us have a great time at Yee-Haw. Before we hit the trail, let's close with a prayer.

Invite a willing Prayer Person to pray for the day at Yee-Haw. Then dismiss Crews, playing Yee-Haw music as everyone exits.

Closing Corral-Day 1

Before Kids Arrive...

Make five catapults:

- * Use tape to secure a 24-ounce container to one end of each of four yardsticks.
- * Use more tape to secure the 28-quart container to one end of the 2"x3" stud.
- * Place at least 50 ping-pong balls in the 28-quart container.
- * Put the rest of the ping-pong balls in the laundry basket, and place it up front out of kids' sight.
- * Place the 5-gallon water cooler or bucket on its side, and place the 2"x3" on it.
- * Recruit four volunteers to help you with the Big Launch, and practice the timing and script several times.

Set up the launch area:

- * Use tape to mark the spots where three of the volunteers will line up to launch the smaller catapults and where they'll place their cans. Remember, cans will be placed on their sides!
- * Use tape to mark the placement of the cooler or bucket, which will also be placed on its side.




Supplies

IELD TEST FINDING

While practicing the Big Launch, a few of the yardsticks broke when we stomped on them. To launch your catapults, place your foot on the yardstick instead of stomping on it.

HAVE YOU HERD?

Fill the King Catapult with enough ping-pong balls to cover at least the bottom of the container. The more ping-pong balls you put in the container, the bigger the wow!

- * Draw a line with marker at the 22-inch mark on each yardstick. On the 2x3 stud, draw a line at the 4-foot mark. To change the trajectory of the ping-pong balls (to make them go higher or lower), adjust where you place the yardsticks and the 2x3 stud on the cans and cooler.
- * Place one catapult and can up front for you to use. Mark the spot for the can with tape. (We placed the cooler up front in the center of the smaller catapults for a bigger wow!)
- * Put a ping-pong ball next to each Crew sign.
- * For each Crew, put a bag containing the "God Gives Good Gifts" Wristbands (one per child, plus one for the Crew Leader) into a large, gift-wrapped box. Wrap the box and the lid separately.
- * Gift wrap a second box (again, wrap the box and the lid separately), and place the following simple paper shapes inside: a music note, a smiley face, a soccer ball, a book, and an art palette or paintbrush. The shapes should be large enough so kids can see them when you hold them up.
- * Practice the launch with your assistants.
- * Review the day with your teenage assistants so they know when to help lead singing and assist with media needs.
- * Several minutes before Closing Corral is scheduled to start, begin playing the Moo-sic & More CD. This will create a fun and inviting atmosphere as the kids and Crew Leaders enter your area.

Welcome Crews

Say: Welcome back! While we're waiting for everyone to get here, let's celebrate what we've learned about God's gifts today with the song "Joy to the World!"



Lead everyone in singing "Joy to the World!" Words and motions are on page 36.

Welcome to Closing Corral! I'm [name], and each day we'll wrap up our adventure with fun-filled activities to celebrate that GOD GIVES GOOD GIFTS. (Yee-haw!)

Watch the "Matt's Family Jam" Video

Hold up the gift-wrapped box that contains the paper shapes.

Say: Lots of gifts come wrapped in shiny paper, like this one. But some of God's best gifts don't come wrapped in paper.



Open the box and pull out the paper shapes. Say: God put special gifts in each of you! As you mention each "gift," hold up its corresponding shape.

Some of you can make beautiful music. I know there are people here who are gifted artists. Others have the gift of strong and healthy bodies that can play different sports. And others have a special gift of writing. Some of you are even gifted at making friends!

Share a brief story about a friend you have who has a special gift or talent.

GOD GIVES GOOD GIFTS (Yee-haw!), and we can use those gifts to make others happy. Let's see how one family is doing just that.



Dim the lights, and play "Matt's Family Jam" from the Yee-Haw Program Resources DVD. When the segment **DVD** ends, turn the lights back up. Ask:

How did you see the Rolf family using their gifts to

Let kids call out responses, and repeat them into the microphone so everyone can hear. Then ask:

How can you use your gifts to bring joy to or help other people?

Say: Let's celebrate the good gifts God has poured into each person and think of ways we can use all our hearts, minds, and bodies to praise Jesus!



Lead everyone in singing "All That I Am" (Psalm 103:1). Words and motions are on page 37.

Gifts for All

Hold up the Bible.

Say: God's Word reminds us that God loved the world so much that he gave a precious gift—Jesus—to everyone! God has shown us his love today through the kindness and friendship of your Crew Leaders, the way he protected us, and the joy you experienced as you praised him. Crew Leaders, pick up the ping-pong ball from near your chair. It represents God's gifts. Pass the ball around your Crew. As each person holds the ball, affirm him or her by saying one gift you've seen in that person. What is a gift God has given that Crew member? So it would look like this:

Demonstrate with a Crew Leader, saying that person's name and one gift you feel God has given to him or her—for example, "Sarah, God has given you the gift of kindness. I saw it when you hugged a Crew friend who was crying."




Say: After you've been affirmed by your Crew Leader, hand the ping-pong ball back to your Crew Leader so he or she can move on to the next person.



Softly play "Silent Night" while Crew Leaders affirm each child.

Thank you for sharing kind words with your Crew friends. Now let's take all this love and share it *outside* your Crew. Crew Leaders, huddle up with your Crews and talk about this:



Allow one minute, then sound the Buckaroo Bell. Quickly assign each Crew a "partner" Crew that will receive their gift of love. For example, if Crews are sitting across the aisle from each other, choose one Crew to go first and show God's love to the one across from them.

Wait about 30 seconds, then sound the Buckaroo Bell. Point to the other Crews. **Now it's your turn to share your gift. Ready? Go!**

Allow 30 seconds, then have everyone sit down.

Ask:

How did it feel to give a gift of God's love to another Crew? Take a few responses.

Say: Now think of one person outside this room who you can give the gift of God's love to. Shout out that person's name. Pause. Everything we do, think, or say has the power to show that GOD GIVES GOOD GIFTS. (Yee-haw!)

Give "God Gives Good Gifts" Wristbands

Say: Every single one of us will have a time we need a gift from God. You might be lonely, confused, or afraid. Those are times to remember that God loves to give good gifts to his children. When you feel that way, I want you to remember that GOD GIVES GOOD GIFTS. (Yee-haw!) So I have a gift for each of you.

Open the gift box and bring out a bag of wristbands. Hold up your own wristband.

When you wear this wristband, you can remember that God promises to give us hope, comfort, peace, friendship, and love. **GOD GIVES GOOD GIFTS.** (Yee-haw!)



Say: In just a minute, Crew Leaders will come get a bag of wristbands. Let me show you how you'll hand these out. Bring a volunteer up front and demonstrate by putting a wristband on the person's wrist and saying: God gives good gifts, [name]. Have Crew Leaders retrieve the wristbands and hand them out with the affirmation you modeled. When you can see that everyone has a wristband, sound your Buckaroo Bell.

The Big Launch

Say: God shared his best gift—Jesus—with the world. Let's explore what happens when we share God's gift of love. Hold up a container attached to a yardstick. Leaders, bring your Crews' ping-pong balls forward and place them in this container.

Show the kids the container.

Ask:

Do you think these ping-pong balls represent all God's love? Let kids respond.

Say: Hmm, I don't think that's enough.

Have three volunteers bring out their catapults and vegetable cans. Have the volunteers place their cans on their designated tape marks and position their yardsticks in the center of the cans. As they position their catapults, position yours, too.

Fill the volunteers' catapults with ping-pong balls.

Ask:

What about now? Do the ping-pong balls in these containers represent all God's love? Allow time for kids to respond.

Say: Hmm, I don't think that's enough.

Have a volunteer walk up the center aisle carrying the King Catapult filled with ping-pong balls. As the volunteer comes forward, set the cooler in place on its side. Direct him or her to stand in the middle of the other volunteers.

Ahh. Now that's more like it.

Let's see what happens when we share God's love with one another. Check with your volunteers to make sure they're ready to launch the balls.

Lead kids in saying: **GOD GIVES GOOD GIFTS!** When kids say, "Yee-haw," you and your volunteers step on the short end of the yardsticks and 2x3-inch stud to launch all the ping-pong balls.



EIELD TEST FINDING

Keep the King Catapult a surprise! Store it in the back of your area in a place where kids can't see it. We placed ours behind a curtain near the sound booth. Kids were amazed to see the King Catapult when the volunteer carried it up the center aisle.





During our tests, we haphazardly placed the yardsticks on the cans. When the volunteers stepped on the vardsticks, some of the yardsticks slid and the ping-pong balls didn't launch very far. When you set up each catapult, place the yardsticks in the center of the cans (and the cooler) so they won't slide off.



Launching the ping-pong balls into the crowd is a huge wow! Kids and leaders gasped as they saw the balls fly through the air. Once the balls landed, it was a little chaotic because kids scrambled to get one. Our leader followed along and gave everyone the opportunity to take a ball. She even encouraged kids to share a ball if they had more than one—another way to teach kids that sharing God's love is fun!

Take time to quiet kids down, allowing them to each find a ball and hold it tightly in one hand. (You'll need to call on Crew Leaders to help with this step.)

Ask:



What happened in this room? Take a few responses.

Say: The room filled with laughter and excitement. And it got a little wild! Life is wild! Sometimes it's a good wild like this. Sometimes it gets scary or confusing—that kind of wildness you might not like so much. Hold up a ping-pong ball. But God loves us so much that he gave us his best gift to help us through those crazy times.

God's gift of Jesus changed everything. It changed this room, it can change us, it can change one person's life, and it can change the world.

Let's sing "Thankful." It's a great way to celebrate God's greatest gift.



Lead crews in singing "Thankful." Words are on page 39.

Close With Prayer

Say: Well, I've had so much fun horsing around with you at Yee-Haw! I'm glad you were here, and I can't wait to see what's in store tomorrow! Materials Managers, please help your Crew Leaders collect the name badges and put them in your Crew bags.

Make announcements, ask a Prayer Person to pray, and then invite parents or caregivers to come and get their children.



Play "To God Be the Glory" as children exit.

Moo-sic & More-Day 2

Before Kids Arrive...

- * Prepare your "Talk About Sin" object lesson. Pour 4 cups of water into one vase, and label it "You." Pour 3 cups of bleach and 1 cup of water into the second vase, and label it "God." Pour 3 cups of water and 1 cup of iodine into the third container and label it "Sin."
- * Practice the skit with Rawhide McSpur.
- * About 30 minutes before Yee-Haw VBS is scheduled to start, begin playing the Moo-sic & More CD. Continue the music until you're ready to begin the program.



Welcome Crews

Say: Welcome back to Yee-Haw VBS! Let's round up our Crews with an awesome song! When people hear us singing, they'll know that Moo-sic & More is beginning! Let's sing "Joy to the World!"

It's so good to see such a happy herd of hop-alongs!
Sometimes in Old West movies, you'll hear some cowboy names that are pretty funny. Well, like our friend Rawhide, who came to visit yesterday! I imagine you probably don't have many friends named Rawhide! A lot of times, cowboys would have nicknames based off things cowboys use—things like boots, saddles, lassos, and spurs. That makes me wonder something... If you were a cowboy, what would your cowboy name be?

*available from Group Publishing or your Group VBS supplier Give your own silly name and a reason. For example, if you like to go jogging, maybe your cowboy name would be Trailblazer. Or if you're a musician, you might want to be called Fiddler out on the trail! Encourage kids to look at the decorations and props around them for some inspiration. Then let kids share in their Crews what their silly cowboy nicknames would be.

After one minute, sound the Buckaroo Bell and draw attention back to yourself. Take a few responses from the audience, repeating them into your microphone so everyone can hear.

Rawhide McSpur

Rawhide: (Enters with his guitar.) Did I hear y'all flappin' yer gums about my name?

Leader: Hey, Rawhide! It's good to see you! We've just been talking about some of the fun nicknames cowboys have. We think Rawhide is a pretty cool name. How did you get your nickname?

Rawhide: Well, I'll tell ya. When I was a little whippersnapper, I went out ridin' on my pony and stumbled across a rattlesnake nest. Bein' a curious little tyke, I poked at them rattlers till one took a snap at me.

Leader: Oh no! That sounds terrible! Were you okay?

Rawhide: Aw, that critter tried gnawin' on my ankle fer a good 10 minutes! Turns out my skin's as tough as a tanned hide. So my ma and pa started callin' me Rawhide. (Lowers voice and moves closer to the Leader, in a stage whisper) Which is better'n my real name.

Leader: (Continuing stage whisper.) What's your real name?

Rawhide: Melvin.

Leader: Melvin's a *great* name! But we'll call you Rawhide. (*Points to guitar.*) Looks like you came to join us for some singing.

Rawhide: Well, y'all were so helpful yesterday, and I heard ya singin', too. So I wanted to try out a new song I wrote.

Leader: Wow! You wrote a song? That's so cool!

Rawhide: Yup. It's fer my best pal, Chuck-Wagon Charlie, on account a him savin' my life and all. (*Picks up guitar.*) Well, here goes. (*Prepares to strum, but the Leader interrupts him.*)

Leader: Wait! He saved your life? What happened?

Rawhide: Well, we was out on the trail and had made camp fer the night, and I was just buildin' up the campfire. (*Pretends to warm hands in front of a fire.*) I got that fire blazin' hotter'n a scorpion with a sunburn. Just then, I saw the biggest, blackest, hairiest, scariest spider I ever saw! (*Gulps.*) And it was right on my...arm! (*Holds out arm, reenacting his terror.*) Well, I figgered I

was a goner right then and there. Them giant desert spiders are lethal—that means they'll do ya in!

Leader: I'm not a fan of spiders, either!

Rawhide: Well, Chuck-Wagon Charlie, he saw me frozen-like just starin' at that hairy monster. And Charlie just reached out—riskin' his own neck, I'm tellin' ya—and picked it up and chucked it into the desert. (Acts out Charlie bravely flinging the spider away.)

Leader: Wow! That was pretty brave. You know, today we're talking some more about God's gifts and how God gave his greatest gift when he saved our lives.

Rawhide: I shore am grateful he did that! God's love makes me wanna...just...(*Gives a loud, long "yee-haw!" startling the Leader.*) Sorry 'bout that.

Leader: (Pointing to the guitar.) Now, you were telling us about a song...?

Rawhide: Yessir [or yes'm]. (*Prepares to play.*) This is fer my pal, Chuck-Wagon Charlie, fer savin' my life:

Rawhide sings offkey to the tune of the chorus of "Home on the Range":

No spiders for me!

'Cuz my pal Chuck-Wagon Charlie

Took the one off my arm.

It won't cause me no harm.

He's a pal, he's a pal, yessireeeee!

Leader leads kids in applauding for Rawhide, who exits, singing again.

Review the Bible Story and Verse

Say: Rawhide sang to show his thanks, and you and I can do the same. Let's sing to show our thanks that GOD GIVES GOOD GIFTS! (Yee-haw!)



Lead kids in singing "Thankful." Words and motions are on page 39.

The Bible gives us a great reason to be thankful. Hold up your Bible opened to the key verse. John chapter 3, verse 16 says, "For this is how God loved the world: He gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but

have eternal life." Remember, perish means die, and eternal means forever. God's gift of Jesus allows us to have a forever friendship with God.

Let's review the actions that can help us remember those important words.

Lead kids in the actions below, saying the Bible verse as you do the actions.



"For this is how God loved the world:"



"He gave his one and only Son,"



"so that everyone who believes in him will not perish"



"but have eternal life."

Remind kids that *believing* is when we hold on to something, which is why you clasp your hands together firmly. Practice the actions a couple of times.

Jesus was God's one and only Son, who came as a baby. Let's sing about the night Jesus came to earth.



Lead everyone in singing "Silent Night." Words and motions are on page 38.

Talk About Sin

Bring out your three vases, and position them so kids can see the labels.

Say: Jesus was God's best gift to us. Let me show you why. Let's imagine that this is you. Point to the vase marked "You." This

(point to the vase marked "Sin") is all the wrong stuff we do—things like lying, being selfish, or saying mean words. The Bible calls those "sin." The Bible also says that we all sin. No one is perfect, even if you think you're a pretty good person. You may think, "Most of the time, I'm pretty good." Maybe you just told a little lie. Pour a little "Sin" into the vase marked "You." Or maybe you just talked back to your parents once or twice. Pour a little more "Sin" into the water. Hold up the vase marked "You." Ask:



What difference does sin make in our lives?

Hold up the vase marked "God."



Say: God is perfect and pure. There's no sin in God—ever! Pour a little of the "Sin" into the vase marked "God." God gave us his greatest gift ever when he sent his Son, Jesus. Pour the bleach mixture from the vase marked "God" into the vase marked "You." Because of Jesus, God will forgive our sins so we can have a forever friendship with him! GOD GIVES GOOD GIFTS (Yee-haw!) The best gift he gave was Jesus, who paid the price to take away our wrongdoings. Let's sing and praise God, giving him glory and celebrating his perfect, awesome gift of Jesus.

Send Off Crews

Say: Right now we're going to say goodbye to our preschoolers so they can gallop over to Ponderosa Preschool for their own adventures. Dismiss the preschoolers, but have elementary Crews stay seated.

Have Crew Leaders get out the "Who's Who on the Crew" handouts. Like you did yesterday, take a minute with your Crew to decide who will do each important job today. Remember, the jobs are listed on your name badges, too. Allow a minute for kids to choose their jobs. When it looks like everyone has finished, sound the Buckaroo Bell to get their attention. Make announcements, and remind Crews which group they travel with. Invite a Prayer Person to come up and pray for everyone's day at Yee-Haw.

Play the Moo-sic & More CD as the children exit.





Closing Corral-Day 2

Before Kids Arrive...

Make the balloons:

- * Cut four 4-foot lengths of curling ribbon.
- * Cut the water bottle in half, and be sure both halves are completely dry. Use the lower half as a measuring cup for the confetti. Use the top half (with the narrow opening) as a funnel to put 2 cups of confetti into each balloon.
- * Fill the balloons with helium, and tie them off.
- * Tie a 4-foot string to each balloon.
- * Attach each balloon to a chair or rock so it doesn't fly away. Set the balloons up front but out of sight. Volunteers will bring them out during the "Celebrate Jesus" portion of the closing.

Set up the experiment:

- * Put the large sticky note or sheet of easel paper on the easel, and draw a large smiley face on the paper. Set the easel up front but slightly back.
- * Attach both heat guns to extension cords. Then set a heat gun on each side of the paper. (We hung ours on the easel.)
- * Open the cans of compressed air and discard the red strawlike attachments (if the cans include these). We found that they froze up and blocked the air.
- * Place the work gloves and cans of compressed air on the other side of the easel. (After spraying the air continuously for a few seconds, the can gets *really* cold. Make sure the volunteers spraying the air wear the work gloves.)

Practice with your assistants:

- * You'll need two volunteers to write on the easel paper, erase the words with the heat guns, and make the words reappear using the compressed air.
- * Four volunteers will carry the black balloons on stage and pop them. (The first two volunteers who are doing the writing and erasing can also help with this step.)

HAVE YOU HERD?

If you'd rather not use helium, you can fill the balloons with an air pump and simply have volunteers hold them. If you choose not to use helium, you don't need to tie the balloons to strings.

- * Set up a time to train and practice the closing experience with all the volunteers several times. Timing is everything! When volunteers are prepared, they feel successful and will volunteer again.
- * Review the day with your teenage assistants so they know when to help lead singing and assist with media needs.
- * About 30 minutes before Closing Corral is scheduled to start, begin playing the Moo-sic & More CD. This will create a fun and inviting atmosphere as the kids and Crew Leaders enter your area.

Welcome Crews to Closing Corral

Say: While we're waiting for everyone to get here, let's sing a song! When people hear us singing, they'll know that Closing Corral is about to begin!



Lead everyone in singing "All That I Am" (Psalm 103:1) as all the Crews arrive. Words and motions are on page 37.

It's good to see you rounded up here for our Closing Corral! A corral is a place that holds horses or cattle all in one safe place. But sometimes sneaky critters find ways to escape and run loose. I think sometimes we can be a little like that. Hold up a Bible. God gives us guidelines for living—sort of like the fence posts of a corral. We have all this room to do what we want inside the corral, but we want to go outside God's ways and do our own thing.

Pat your hands on your legs, like a galloping horse, if someone has done something mean or wrong to you. Pause.

Now be honest. Pat your legs and make galloping sounds if you've ever done wrong. (Be sure to make galloping sounds, too!) Pause.

We've all done wrong. Even grown-ups! That's why it's incredible to know that even though we do wrong, **GOD STILL GIVES GOOD GIFTS**. (Yee-haw!) God's best gift of all—ever—was Jesus!





Say: We've been exploring the verse that says, "For this is how God loved the world: He gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life." The first part of that says, "God loved the world." God doesn't only love kids here in [name of your community]. God gave his best gift for the whole, entire world.

I'd like you to meet a friend who lives far away. He's discovered God's good gifts, even when things seemed hard or unfair. As you watch this, look for good gifts God gave this boy. Let's watch!



Dim the lights and play "Gift's Story" from the Yee-Haw Program Resources DVD. When the segment ends, turn the **DVD** lights up. Ask:



What gifts did God give to Gift?

Repeat some of the words you hear kids say.

Say: Even in a hard life, Gift knows he's loved. Love is a great gift! God's love fills our lives with joy!

Celebrate Jesus: God's Ultimate Gift

Have your two volunteers come up front and move the easel forward. They'll stand on either side of the easel, holding the Disappearing Doodler Pens.

Point to the easel paper with the smiley face.

Say: In your Crews, share how you'd finish this sentence: "I'm happy when..." For example, "I'm happy when my sons text me and say 'Love you, mom.'" Crew Leaders, you go first and make sure everyone in your Crew has a chance to share.

Allow a minute for kids to share. Then ask kids to call out their answers. Repeat answers as you hear them so the volunteers know what to write on the paper with the smiley face. Volunteers can condense larger responses, so they're only writing words like "cake," "swimming," "fun times," or "texts." Be sure your volunteers write the words as large as possible so everyone can see them!

Look at all this happiness. Read some of the words on the paper. But life isn't always happy like that. Like we saw in our video, sometimes...life is sad.

Your volunteers will run the heat guns over the paper, without touching the paper. This erases the ink.

Ask:

What happened to all those things—our hopes and happiness?

Say: That makes me sad. Being sad happens to all of us. Life is sad when someone we love dies, when our feelings get hurt, when we miss a friend who moved away, or when we didn't do well on a test. Sadness is real, and it hurts. Hold your hands together in a heart shape, with your fingertips curved together and your thumbs together. Some people say that their hearts break (pull your hands apart so the "heart" breaks) when they're sad.

Ask:

When do you feel sad or brokenhearted? Circle up in your Crews and whisper quietly times you feel sad. Leaders, you go first. Allow time for kids to whisper.



We had our helpers record kids' answers making extra thick, bold lines. If volunteers need to go over the letters to make them darker, have them do it when the leader is repeating some of the words kids shared. (This is also why you have two volunteers, so they can quickly and efficiently write plenty of responses!)



FIELD TEST FINDING

We heard a room full of gasps when the ink erased! "Wow! That is so cool! How did that happen? No way!"





CIELD TEST FINDING

One of our balloons had too much confetti and wouldn't stay afloat. Our volunteer simply held the balloon overhead. The "wow" was the same—in fact, the kids loved seeing her covered in confetti!

HAVE YOU HERD?

Gently shake the can of compressed air while spraying. This helps the cold air flow evenly and quickly. Test making the letters reappear a few times to determine the best position to hold the can of air and the correct distance to position the can from the paper.

Say: When Jesus lived on earth, he did things that made a lot of people so happy! He healed people. He helped people. He encouraged them and showed them God's love. But some people thought he was lying, so they hurt Jesus. Jesus died.

Have four volunteers bring up the balloons and line them across the stage.

That was a sad, sad, dark day. Point to the blank paper. Without Jesus, all these joyful, happy things...would be gone forever. Without Jesus, there's no hope for those things, and there's no hope for a friendship with God! Life would be sad. But GOD GIVES GOOD GIFTS. (Yee-haw!) God gave Jesus.

Jesus came to heal the sadness you whispered earlier.

Jesus didn't stay dead! Jesus was stronger than death—he won! Jesus came back to life, making a way for us to have new life and be friends with God forever.

As you say the Bible Point, have volunteers use the straight pins to pop the balloons on the word "Yee-haw!"

Let's celebrate and sing! Please stay seated while you sing... and keep an eye on our sheet of paper.

Have volunteers spray the compressed air on the paper while kids are singing. The cold air makes the ink reappear!

After the song, motion to the paper with the "happy" words back on it.

Say: Because of Jesus, we can have hope for joy and happiness.

Our happiness, joy, and all the wonderful things we hope for return. Read the words as they reappear on the paper.

Close the Show

Say: Before we finish this amazing day at Yee-Haw VBS, I want to give a special thank you to some of the best gifts in the room—your Crew Leaders! Crew members, circle up and give a hug to your incredible Crew Leaders.

When kids have finished with their hugs, have everyone sit. Make any necessary announcements. Ask a Prayer Person to pray, and then invite parents and caregivers to come get their children.

Sunday Celebration

A Celebration Stampede!

Wrap up your Yee-Haw VBS with an easy Sunday morning celebration that not only celebrates your program and all the kids who attended but also slides easily into any Sunday morning service at your church! The following script will take about 15 to 20 minutes and gives kids a chance to share the incredible music from Yee-Haw, their adorable faces in a Spotlight VBS presentation, and how they're serving through Projects-With-a-Purpose. Plus there's a fun cameo appearance from Rawhide McSpur!

Prepare for the Celebration

- * Ask your Yee-Haw team to be available to help you lead songs up front with the kids and be enthusiastic representatives of the fun two days at VBS.
- * Work with the Spotlight VBS Leader to have everything ready to show the fun Spotlight VBS slideshow.
- * Stash Rawhide's guitar or banjo behind a prop, within easy reach.
- * Connect with the Projects-With-a-Purpose Leader to be sure he or she is ready to show and explain the project kids have worked on and how they'll show God's good gifts through serving others.

Start With a Song

Say: Welcome to our Yee-Haw celebration! I'm [name], and I've been the Moo-sic & More Leader during Yee-Haw vacation Bible school. All right, trail team, I need your helping hands and voices with this next part, too. Let's lead everyone in one of the best parts of VBS—singing spectacular songs! We love our mooosic! Invite kids and any adults involved in your VBS to come up front with you to lead everyone in the song and the motions. Everyone stand up and join us in a joyful song!
