Hi, my name is Dustin, and I recently began my Supported Employment position at the Times Kahala deli. Through the help of Clubhouse and staff Jason, I was able to secure the position. Before I go into further details about the job, I will share with you a little of my employment history.

Before I came to Clubhouse, I had an extensive history of various jobs. I previously worked as a warehouse staff through Snelling contract work, as a stock clerk at Fisher Hawaii, and a cook with Zippy's. The most recent position that I can recall is a dock supervisor at Copper River Seafood in Alaska, which lasted from 2011 to 2016. I moved to Alaska because I wanted to better my life and I really enjoyed the environment there. The thing I miss the most is working with my fellow coworkers and reveling in the camaraderie. The reason why I returned to Hawaii is because I missed my family so much.

I became a member of the Diamond Head Clubhouse in June 2025 and joined the Kitchen Unit. One of my favorite things about the Kitchen Unit is learning how to

cook on a daily basis. I was engaging in the work-ordered day at the Clubhouse for three months before I approached staff Jason about my interest in beginning to work again at Times Supermarket. After we discussed the job roles and responsibilities, Jason and I called Times to inquire if they had an opening. It turned out that they did, so I went down in person to meet the store supervisor. I made such a good impression that they offered me the job and sent me paperwork to fill out. Before I knew it, I was scheduled for orientation, and it was both long and informative. I am currently scheduled to work 20 hours a week. The most challenging aspect of the job is memorizing all of the codes to print out the prices, but the best part is helping out the customers.

I am motivated to continue to do my best and maintain my position at Times Kahala. In order to maintain that drive, I will remember how this opportunity will allow me to get closer to my kids. If I have difficult days, I will remember that work is counting on me to be there and the financial compensation is also a major plus! What

drove me to return to work is the appeal of being financially self-sufficient and stable since I do not have any government support. So for those who are hesitant

about returning to work, I encourage you to give it a try because work keeps me motivated and it also feels good to make my own money. In closing, I know I will do my best and I'm glad to have the support of Clubhouse members and staff!
